

30,000 JEWISH REFUGEES IN FRANCE URGENTLY IN NEED OF RELIEF

LISBON, July 11. (JTA) -- Thirty thousand Jewish refugees in France are in urgent need of food and clothing, this correspondent was informed today from Toulouse. Ten thousand of the refugees are concentrated in unoccupied France between Pau and Toulouse, while 20,000 others are in the occupied cities of Bordeaux, Bayonne, Biarritz and Dax.

Especially precarious is the position of released Austrian and German internees, who are without shelter or funds. In a similar plight are hundreds of Jews who were serving with the Polish forces in France and who were prevented by their Polish officers from embarking on British ships which evacuated the Polish army to England.

The position of other categories of Jewish refugees was described to this correspondent as "painful." The majority are without shelter and are sleeping in parks. Thousands are besieging the offices of the temporary relief committee in Toulouse, begging for one-time grants of not more than 50 francs. The committee, however, which is headed by a few Jewish leaders from Paris who are themselves refugees, is without funds.

Among those begging for aid are Jewish intellectuals, including writers, journalists and painters. Among them are such men as David Einhorn, poet and correspondent of the Jewish Daily Forward of New York, and Ben Adir, an editor of the General Jewish Encyclopedia recently published in Paris. All are penniless and have cabled to the Jewish Writers' Club of New York for aid.

Among the refugees facing starvation are 300 children in boy scout camps formerly supported by the Joint Distribution Committee. They are now subsisting on one meal a day, consisting of a fatless and meatless vegetable soup and bread, supplied by money collected by the local police. The children have not tasted meat for three weeks. Efforts to place them with peasant families have failed.

Relief for these children and other refugees in the unoccupied area is possible through American agencies. In occupied France, however, the problem is becoming the same as in Poland, since the German Red Cross reportedly is insisting on monopolizing all relief work. This has already resulted in serious differences between the German agency and the International Red Cross, with the American Red Cross also involved.

RUMANIA DRAFTS ANTI-JEWISH LAW ON HUNGARIAN MODEL; NEW VIOLENCE REPORTED

EUDAPEST, July 11. (JTA) -- New anti-Jewish excesses have broken out in Rumania and two Jews were killed in Botosani and Husi, the newspaper Magyar Nemzet reported to-day. The paper also reported that hundreds of Communists and Jews were rounded up and sent to concentration comps in Transylvania.

The Rumanian Cabinet yesterday drafted a series of anti-Jewish laws on the Hungarian model. Implementing decrees are expected in a few days eliminating Jews from professions and public offices.

Under the laws Jewish merchants and industrialists will gradually be eliminated as soon as it can be arranged for non-Jews to take over their enterprises. Licenses have already been withdrawn from all Jewish proprietors of hotels, taverns, liquor stores and tobacco shops.

The Rumanian newspaper Neamul Romanesc has published an editorial demanding an imm.diate order forbidding Jews to engage in any form of commerce, even peddling, in Rumanian towns. The editorial said the demand was based on the allegation that Jews asked exorbitant prices from poor Rumanian peasants.

Plight of Zionists in Occupied Zone Told

JERUSALEM, July 11. (JTA) -- The desperate plight of Bessarabian and Bukovinian Zionist leaders was revealed today in a cable to the Jewish Agency from Bucharest. The cable said that those leaders who remained in the Soviet-occupied provinces are unable to escape while those who fled to Rumania cannot go on to Palestine because of the Government's order that they must return to Russia.

NUREMBERG LAW FOR HUNGARY SOUCHT BY NAZIS

REICH TO USE MIGHT AGAINST JEWS THROUGHOUT EUROPE, NAZI ORGAN ASSERTS

GENEVA, July 11. (JTA) -- A warning that German might would be used against Jews in any country of Europe where they sought to increase their influence was voiced today in the Krakauer Zeitung, official Nazi organ in Cracow.

The newspaper, in an article on the "Jewish question," said anti-Semitism was gaining ground in Europe and that even France, where it had been unknown since the famous Dreyfus case, was returning to anti-Semitism since its defeat. Countries under the control of Germany and Italy, the newspaper asserted, are evicting Jews from all positions and they will "never again enjoy their former position in Europe."

"If the Jews manage to establish themselves in any country and seek to increase their influence there," the article said, "Germany will oppose them. The Jews know what German opposition means."

The newspaper said that the Jews would have to find some solution to their problem in some overseas country, adding that "what they do there is of no importance to Germany because if it had importance the Reich was strong enough to destroy them."

"But Germany is not worrying," the article concluded, warning that if the Jews "raise a hand against Germany in the new Europe they will be repulsed."

The Krakauer Zeitung, in an article about "Haifa, Singapore of the Eastern Mediterranean," points out the military importance of Jewish industry in Palestine and declares that the Arabs of the interior are not tranquil and will soon revolt.

PALESTINE QUIET, HALIFAX REPORTS; LAUDS AID OF JEWS AND ARABS

LONDON, July 11. (JTA) -- Foreign Secretary Lord Halifax, in a review of the general situation in the House of Lords today, declared that the position in Palestine was quitet. Apart from isolated cases of banditry the country enjoys a respite from internal disorder, he said.

Lord Halifax said Arab circles were generally pleased by the release of internees and by the fact that military courts were no longer empowered to impose the death sentence. The Jewish community, he said, is cooperating fully in matters of defense and in various emergency measures demanded by the situation. Arab cooperation is no less wholehearted, he declared.

The economic prospect, especially regarding the citrus crop, is causing some anxiety, but is relieved to some extent by the demand for goods and labor caused by the presence of the troops in Palestine, the Foreign Secretary added.

Jewish Council Reorganized

JERUSALEM, July 11. (JTA) -- Reorganization of the executive committee of the Jewish National Council was decided upon today following long negotiations. The new committee will comprise 11 members, including President Pinchas Rutenberg and Chairman Isaac Ben Zvi, instead of 18 as formerly. Rutenberg is empowered to appoint members to the committee in accordance with party representation.

Members of the Zionist General Council residing in Palestine met in an all-day session under the chairmanship of Isaac Gruenbaum and heard a report on the political situation by Moshe Shertok, political chief of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, on the economic position by Arthur Ruppin and on organizational problems by Gruenbaum.

Commerce Dept. Report Discusses Palestine

WASHINGTON, July 11. (JTA) -- The war in the Mediterranean area and the lack of shipping facilities "constitute a serious threat to the marketing" of the Palestine citrus crop, it was brought out in a Commerce Department report made public today.

However, steps have already been taken to utilize a portion of the citrus yield as by-products, the report stated. The difficulties in marketing of the citrus product, Palestine's principal "money crop," have applied to the other export commodities of the country. Other agricultural products which are normally part of the export market are being consumed within the country as an increase in population makes Palestine a large foodstuffs importing country.

Economic control measures instituted by the United Kingdom and applicable to Palestine somewhat restrict business transactions and numerous restrictions are placed by the British Government on dealings in securities.

Nevertheless, the report indicates that there has been steady advancement in many fields of endeavor in Palestine. Greater improvements have been inaugurated in irrigation work, and despite limited resources and lack of fuel, considerable progress has been made in industrial development.

SHIP BRINGS 675 REFUGEES FROM FRANCE TO DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic, July 11. (JTA) -- One of the last trans-Atlantic ships to leave warring France, the S.S. Cuba, has arrived here from Bordeaux with 675 refugees, most of whom have not yet been permitted to land because their documents are not adequate.

About 40 of the passengers are Jewish refugees, most of them Central Europeans, the others being largely Spaniards. All the passengers possess Dominican visas issued by the Dominican consul in Bordeaux which permit embarkation but not disembarkation. Their emigration was not arranged by any organization.

The Dominican authorities permitted 86 of the passengers to land because they have relatives here or are transients with valid visas. It was expected that more would be able to disembark after investigation. None of those who have landed are suitable for settlement in the Sosua colonization project.

Jewish and Christian organizations sent soap, cigarettes, tropical fruit and milk for the children to the passengers held on the ship. The date of the ship's departure and its destination are not known.
