HUNGARY DRAFTING THIRD ANTI-JEWISH LAW; LIQUIDATION OF LAND OWNERS PLANNED

BUDAPEST, July 16. (JTA) -- The Hungarian Government is now at work drafting a third anti-Jewish law aimed at tightening the provisions of present anti-Semitic legislation.

Observers believe the new measures will be designed to achieve the following three objectives: (1) liquidation of all Jewish land owners, (2) expropriation of all large capitalist interests and (5) abolition of exemptions in the present law for converted Jews, "half-Jews" and Gentiles married to persons of Jewish origin.

Oritics of the present law complain that exemptions in this act permit expropriation of only 125,000 acres of Jewish-owned agricultural land. The new law is expected to enable the expropriation of at least 500,000 acres.

Anti-capitalist provisions of the new law are expected to answer such critics as ex-Premier Bela Imredi, who frequently complained that while the present law sufficiently penalized small Jewish merchants and artisans, it failed to penalize Jewish capitalists, who found a way to elude the provisions. Extension of the penalities will close the gap in the law and make it impossible in the future for wealthy Jews and their relatives to escape the onus attached to their race.

Another feature of the law will be a clause defining as Jews all persons with more than one Jewish grandparent.

Meanwhile, the present law, despite the criticism of its "mildness," is a considerable trouble to employers, who are not observing the embargo on Jewish employees. The press reports that a number of proceedings have been instituted against proprietors of enterprises in the industrial suburbs of Ujpest, Rakos, Szent and Istvan for failure either to register Jewish employees or to discharge those above the legal limit.

According to Bucharest reports to newspapers here, Premier Ion Gigurtu of Rumania has ordered that present Hungarian anti-Jewish laws be translated into Rumanian as a guide for coming anti-Semitic legislation in Rumania. Commenting on this, the Arrow-Cross organ, Magyarsag, advises a study also of the impending anti-Jewish law in Hungary to avoid "oversights" in the present legislation.

65 Doctors Lose Posts in Rumania

BUDAPEST, July 16. (JTA) -- Under the new anti-Jewish decree in Rumania 34 Jewish physicians have been dismissed by the Ministry of Public Health and 31 others by the Social Insurance Commission.

The decree bans from Government posts non-members of the totalitarian Party of the Nation, from which Rumania's Jews have been officially barred.

Commenting on the growing demand for more severe anti-Jewish measures in Rumania, the Bucharest newspaper Curentul advises against hatred in anti-Jewish legislation, pointing out that Rumania is depending on Germany to "solve the Jewish question" throughout Europe as soon as the war is over.

Slovakia Enacts Land Curbs

ROME PAPER DEMANDS ITALIAN PROTECTORATE OVER PALESTINE

ROME, July 16. (JTA) -- The newspaper La Tribuna today claimed for Italy, "as the strongest Mediterranean Power," the right to take Palestine under its protection.

The newspaper said that the Palestine question could be solved only by eliminating Zionism and British rule "which has cost the country heavy sacrifices in blood during the past 20 years."

ROME, July 16. (JTA) -- Italian airmen who raided Haifa, Palestine, caused widespread damage and touched off great fires, an Italian military communique claimed today. The fires were visible for a distance of 125 miles, the communique said. The raid, the first air onslaught against a Holy Land objective, was carried out yesterday morning.

Arab Killed in Raid

JERUSALEM, July 16. (JTA) -- It was announced officially today that an Arab died of wounds sustained in yesterday's Italian air raid on Haifa, in which an American citizen named Flanigan was injured and several Arabs were wounded. The material damage was slight, the announcement said.

Raid Seen as First Blow at Britain's Oil Supply

WASHINGTON, July 16. (JTA) -- Italian air raids on Haifa, Palestine's chief port, were intended as the first blow at Britain's vital oil supply from Iraq, the National . Geographic Society said in a special bulletin tonight.

At the same time, Government officials familiar with Near Eastern problems said they believed this raid would undoubtedly be followed by others.

The strategic importance of Haifa and Palestine in the battle for oil was told by the National Geographic bulletin as follows:

"The indispensable petroleum which oils the machines of war and commerce flows for more than 600 miles from Iraq to Haifa. On its journey across desert and plain it crosses not only the country of origin but also the northern expanse of Transjordan and Palestine. At one point the long pipeline which carries it curves northward within a few miles of now-enemy-controlled Syria, a mandated state under Britain's former ally, France.

"Haifa, on the Bay of Acre, just across from the ancient biblical settlement of the same name, is itself only about 20 air miles from the Syrian border. It is, however, far from Italian bases of operation. The nearest Italian-held territory is in the Dodecanese Islands, some 485 airline miles away. Italy's North African colony of Libya is nearly 600 miles to the west, a ride for the bomber of well over two hours. Moreover, Haifa lies within the protective range of two powerful British outposts—the big island of Cyprus on the north-west and the Suez Canal in Egypt to the south-west.

"As a strategic center of commerce and industry Haifa has tremendously increased in value in recent years.

"An active Jewish colony settled there following Britain's 1917 designation of Palestine as a haven for the Jews. To its population, with each set of anti-Semitic laws passed in Europe, have been added new members until Haifa today has more than 100,000 inhabitants, some three times its population of a decade ago.

"Modern housing programs have been put through, new schools and recreation centers established. Industries have been developed, calling for more factories each year to turn out such assorted products as chemicals, flour and cement, beer, metals and cigarettes. With the completion of the oil pipeline in 1935 appeared huge oil tanks such as are found in the Texas oil fields or in Soviet Russia's rich Baku region.

"With its improved harbor facilities Haifa is the natural doorway for the longdiscussed motor road that will, it is planned, eventually stretch across the Near East land bridge to British India and the Far East. Already railways link the port, by way of numerous coastal centers, with Egypt to the south and Damascus and Baghdad to the east.

"Sun-baked, whitewashed Haifa is an international town of conflicting races, religions and politics. The mixture includes Arabs and Jews, Greeks and Turks, Moslems and Christians. There is a flourishing German colony, established nearly three-quarters of a century ago. To its British garrison are sent English officers and English 'Tommies.' Lately, following the defeat of France in Europe, a number of refugees are reported to have fled into Haifa from next-door Syria."

RED CROSS RELIEF SHIP ARRIVES AT FRENCH PORT

WASHINGTON, July 16. (ONA) -- Bearing relief supplies desperately needed by millions of French refugees crowded into the unoccupied part of southern France, the S.S. McKeesport, Red Cross mercy ship, arrived in Marseille last night, it was announced at national headquarters today.

The cargo of the McKeesport, Chairman Norman H. Davis explained, will be distributed only in unoccupied France. Previous reports from Red Cross headquarters in France advised national headquarters that there was a desperate need for relief supplies of all kinds, especially food for refugee children.

Davis said American Red Cross workers would supervise the actual distribution of the supplies in the areas where the need was greatest.

BRITAIN URGED TO FREE INTERNED TEACHERS

LONDON, July 16. (ONA) -- A resolution urging British authorities to release many exiled teachers and research workers who have been interned was adopted today by the executive committee of the Association of University Teachers. The resolution pointed out that all these persons were completely loyal to England and if released could render valuable services to the country's war effort.

NO REFUGEES ABOARD ARANDORA STAR, EDEN TELLS COMMONS

LONDON, July 16. (ONA) -- War Secretary Anthony Eden today assured the House of Commons that there were no B or C aliens aboard the torpedoed Arandora Star but promised to investigate renewed charges that a number of these aliens were among the survivors.

Class B aliens were under certain restrictions before they were interned and the Class C were those who enjoyed complete liberty but were interned nevertheless. Both classes consist largely of refugees.

The War Secretary promised that no Nazis and anti-Nazis would be sent abroad together and that any B or C aliens sent out of the country would be accompanied or followed by their families.

The families of thousands of interned refugees were thrown into a panic by the disaster, fearing their interned relations were among the more than 1,000 German and Italian prisoners who perished when the ship went down.

REFUGEES STRANDED ON SHIP OFF LISBON

LISBON, July 16. (ONA) -- The steamer Dora, flying the Panamanian flag and carrying a large number of refugees, dropped anchor off this harbor today. Deepest despair prevailed among the refugees who were scheduled to proceed to Casablanca, French Morocco, but now are unable to reach their destination.

HADASSAH MAPS COOPERATION WITH BRITISH IN PALESTINE; TO GIVE AMERICANS HAVEN

NEW YORK, July 16. (JTA) -- Hadassah announced that it had cabled authorization to its American-supported medical and nursing staffs in Palestine to give full cooperation to British military health authorities for the duration of the war.
