EFFORTS MADE TO SPUR EMIGRATION OF REFUGEES FROM PORTUGAL

LISBON, July 24. (JTA) -- The Polish, Belgian, Canadian and Luxemburg Governments are increasing efforts to facilitate emigration of refugees, it was learned here today.

The Polish Minister is seeking Brazilian visas for Polish refugees while the Polish Government in London is attempting to secure admission for Poles to Australia and British colonies.

Canadian authorities have opened an office to facilitate emigration to that Dominion while representatives of the Luxembourg Government, now at Caldas da Arainha, were giving all possible aid to refugees from the occupied duchy. The Belgian Consulate is issuing visas for the Congo to Polish refugees who resided in Belgium.

Julian Tuvim, noted Polish Jewish writer and poet, and his wife have secured Brazilian visas here through the good offices of the Brazilian poet, Olegario Martins. Martins arrived here to participate in Portuguese celebrations of the 900th anniversary of Portugal's independence and took an interest in the case of Mr. Tuvim and other refugees. The writer, Joseph Kessel, has arrived here en route to the United States.

Charles Levy, representative of the Joint Distribution Committee, left Lisbon today for Marseille to study the refugee situation there.

Dr. Serge Voronoff, famous champion of surgical monkey-gland rejuvenation, and Prof. Kurt Bondy, representative of the Dominican Republic Settlement Association, have also arrived here.

Dr. Bondy, who is en route to the United States to take over a post at Richmond University, had been detained for some time at Toulouse, France. He secured Dominican citizenship in Belgium and escaped from that country under Nazi machine gun fire. Dr. Bondy had gone to Belgium to select refugees for settlement in the Dominican Republic.

ANDERSON PROMISES TO SEGREGATE NAZIS FROM REFUGEES IN CAMPS

LONDON, July 24. (JTA) -- An effort will be made to segregate declared Nazis from German and Austrian refugees in intermment camps, Home Secretary Sir John Anderson said today in reply to a letter from the Archbishop of Canterbury, who expressed concern regarding the position of interned refugees.

NAZI PAPER STRESSES JEWISH DEVELOPMENT OF PALESTINE

GENEVA, July 24. (JTA) -- The important aid given Britain by the Jews to consolidate its strategic position in the Near East is stressed in an article in the Berliner Boersen Zeitung.

The paper declares that with the aid of Zionists and new Jewish industry, Britain has been able to construct new highways and airdromes which strengthened its military position in the Eastern Mediterranean. The paper gives oredit to Jewish economic enterprise by pointing out that Haifa has grown from a tiny port under the Turks to the greatest port in the Eastern Mediterranean. This port was bombed by Italian planes on July 8.

AIR CODE GIVES COUGHLIN DIFFICULTY IN FINDING CUTLETS FOR RADIO TALKS

NEW YORK, July 24. (JTA) -- "Radio-priest" Charles E. Coughlin is having difficulty in finding outlets for his weekly radio talks, which will be resumed the second Sunday in October, it was learned today.

A survey conducted here revealed that no New York station will carry the broadcast, although WHEL, small Newark station, is expected to renew a contract which expired in May. Only small, outlying stations are expected to contract for the programs because the new code of the National Association of Broadcasters, which goes into effect this fall, bars such controversial programs as Coughlin's.

To date, 21 stations have been approached to carry the Coughlin talks. Aircrafters, Inc., the radio priest's agent, has been corresponding with stations throughout the country for several weeks to buy time. Unlike previous years, the station is offering transcriptions of Coughlin's speeches if the desired time is not available for direct broadcast. According to trade publications, a series of 52 such recordings have been placed on the market by the agency. The same agency is offering transcriptions of talks by the Rev. Gerald L.K. Smith, organizer of the "Committee of One Million."

Coughlin announced in Detroit yesterday he would discuss, "among other things," the principles and personalities in the presidential campaign. His paper, Social Justice, has already come out in favor of Wendell L. Wilkie, Republican nominee.

AMERICAN SECTION OF WORLD JEWISH CONGRESS FORMED

NEW YORK, July 24. (JTA) -- Formal constitution of an American Section of the World Jewish Congress, with headquarters in New York and Washington, was authorized by a special meeting summoned by those members of the World Executive Committee who are in the United States and attended by the American members of the Administrative Committee, Dr. Stephen S. Wise announced today.

The American Section is to comprise the American members of the Administrative Committee, the European members of both the Administrative Committee and the Executive Committee who are now in the United States and who are expected to arrive in this country shortly. The Section will have as its purpose the reorientation of the World Congress program to meet present day conditions and future eventualities.

Fortnightly meetings of the Administrative Committee are to be held henceforth. The meeting voted to set up commissions on Pan-American problems, European Jewish affairs, Polish-Jewish relations and relief.

REMOVAL OF RIED AS NAZI CONSULAR OFFICIAL HERE DEMANDED

NEW YORK, July 24. (JTA) -- The removal of Dr. Friedrich Ried, German consul at Porto Alegre, Brazil, who was recently transferred to the German Consulate here, was urged by the New York Post in an editorial today.

Pointing out that Dr. Ried was shifted after the Brazilian Government had complained of his undue pro-Nazi activities, the Post stated it should be a primary rule of Pan-American unity that a diplomat who was unacceptable to any one of the 21 nations be unacceptable to all.

The Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League urged an investigation of Dr. Ried in a wire to the State Department yesterday.

OTTO STRASSER REPORTED CAPTURED BY NAZIS

NEW YORK, July 24. (JTA) -- The Germans have captured Otto Strasser, exiled leader of the anti-Hitler "Black Front" who is accused by the Gestapo of organizing the Munich bomb plot against Chancellor Hitler, the Associated Press reported today from Berlin.

An informed German source was quoted as saying in another A.P. Berlin dispatch that when the Nazis entered Paris they found Herschel Grynszpan, young Polish Jew held in the Sante Prison pending trial for the slaying of Ernst vom Rath, secretary of the German Embassy in Paris. (This dispatch apparently confirmed reports from abroad late in June that Grynszpan had been seized by the Nazi invaders.)

JUDGE ORDERS PROBE OF WIRES URGING AID TO INTERNED SISTERS

WASHINGTON, July 24. (JTA) -- Justice Bolitha Laws of the United States District Court today ordered an investigation of six telegrams he received before he took the bench to decide the cases of Mrs. Wera Giegerich, 48, and Mrs. Fannie Rubinowicz, 46, Jewish sisters who claim to be of American birth but who are now held in Nazi concentration camps. Two of the persons whose names appeared on the telegrams denied to a reporter that they had sent them.

BOAS COMMITTEE URGES AID TO ANTI-FASCIST REFUGEES IN FRANCE

NEW YORK, July 24. (JTA) -- In an open letter to Rep. Thomas C. Hennings Jr. of Missouri, the American Committee for Democracy and Intellectual Freedom through its national chairman, Prof. Franz Boas, today urged the Congressman to amend his bill permitting evacuation of British children on American ships to include also evacuation of anti-Nazi and anti-Fascist refugees trapped in France.

POLES UNITE TO AID REFUGEES HERE

NEW YORK, July 24. (JTA) -- Formation of an executive Committee for Aid to War Refugees from Poland in the United States was announced today. The preliminary work, according to the committee, will be to register the refugees here, to establish contact with organizations and institutions assisting refugees in this country and to render any legal help that may be necessary to settle the status of the refugees in the United States.
