JOHNSON, AT BROADCASTERS! PARLEY, WARNS AGAINST RACE HATRED

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- A warning against efforts to spread racial and other discord in this country was sounded by Louis Johnson, former Assistant Secretary of War, in an address today before the annual convention of the National Association of Broadcasters.

STREICHER RUMORED DEAD; NAZIS DENY REPORT

The statement was in reply to a Reuters (British news agency) report in which a well-informed German source claimed Streicher was dead.

NEW BOOK ON JEWS PUBLISHED BY PORTUGAL SCHOLAR

LISBON, July 26. (JTA-By Airmail) -- Essays on past and present Jewish problems are contained in the newly-published book "Grandeur and Misery of Israel" by Dr. Augusto d'Essayu, Portuguese Jewish scholar and honorary secretary of the Portuguese Refugee Committee. The book contains penetrating chapters on the fate of Jews in Germany and Poland and also deals at length with the cultural activities of the Jewish people.



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After a procession described by police as "one of the largest in the East Side's history" and "the largest with a military background," Jabotinsky was buried in a threeton concrete-bronze vault in the Max Nordau Circle of the New Monteflore Cemetery, Farmingdale, L.I., pending removal after the war to Palestine--from which he had been in exile for 20 years.

The simple orthodox service in the chapel was conducted by Rabbi Morris N. Rose of Temple Sinai, Brooklyn, and there were no sulogies, following the precedent set by Theodor Herzl's funeral in 1904. While the rites were in progress, large crowds mourned on Second Avenue. Some had been there all night.

After the services a procession wended slowly up Second Avenue to Fourteenth Street and down to East Houston Street, where about 1,000 persons boarded buses and private automobiles to proceed to the cemetery. Yiddish theaters and Jewish institutions along the route were draped with black. As the procession passed the chapel a second time, it halted briefly while the Cantors' Association sang "El Mole Rachamim." The ceremony concluded with the singing of "Hatikvah," in which thousands of bystanders joined the cantors. From the chapel, the procession was led by Max Greenberg, who lost a leg while fighting by Jabotinsky's side with the Jewish Legton in Palestine.

In the procession were delegations from the Brith Trumpeldor, American Friends of Jewish Palestine, Jewish War Veterans of the United States, American Palestine Jewish Legion, Young Israel and other Jewish organizations. Many had tears in their eyes as the mass slowly moved down Second Avenue.

Borough Police Inspector John di Martino, who commanded a large police contingent, averted a possible accident when he diverted to another street an emergency truck speeding to a fire.

At the cemetery, the mourners were joined by scores of youths from the Betar Camp at Hunter, N.Y., where Jabotinsky died.

Among those who attended the chapel service were representatives of the British, Czechoslovak and Polish Governments, Stanley Lowe, representing Mayor LaGuardia; Ben Howe, chairman of the City Fusion Party, and James G. McDonald, chairman of the President's Advisory Committee on Refugees.

Revisionist leaders present included Prof. Benjamin Akzin, Eliahu Ben-Horin and Captain Jeremiah Halpern. Others who attended were Edmund I. Kaufmann, president of the Zionist Organization of America; Dr. Hirsch J. Gordon, commander of the American Palestine Jewish Legion; Sol Masch, State Commander of the Jewish War Veterans; Maurice Schwartz, the actor; John Gunther, the author; Willard G. Stanton, secretary of the American Friends of a Jewish Palestine, and Col. J.H. Patterson, commander of the 1918 Palestine Jewish Legion.

The Yiddish press joined today in paying tribute to Jabotinsky. The Jewish Morning Journal said that "just as he represented the best in the Jewish people, so his death symbolized the tragedy of our time." The Day said: "With Jabotinsky's death there is removed from us a glorious personality in Jewish life, a wonderful and romantic figure, a clean man and a great idealist." The Jewish Daily Forward called him "one of the most colorful personalities in a colorful, stormy Jewish generation."

Mourning in Palestine

JERUSALEM, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Palestine's 500,000 Jews observed a complete work stoppage today in mourning over Vladimir Jabotinsky, Zionist leader, whose funeral was held in New York this afternoon. Shops and places of entertainment were closed. Synagogues were crowded with mourners. Processions were held in Tel Aviv and Haifa. Memorial meetings were held in Jewish colonies.

Public buildings flew black flags during the funeral. Newspapers featured lengthy dispatches from New York about Jabotinsky. Dr. L. Altwan, Zionist-Revisionist leader, gave a long appreciation of Jabotinsky over the Palestine Broadcasting Service station.

A crowded memorial meeting was held at the Jewish Agency hall, with Jewish leaders eulogizing Jabotinsky. Moshe Shertok, head of the Agency's political department, read a copy of the condolence cable sent to Jabotinsky's widow in London. The meeting concluded with the singing of "Hatikvah."

District Commissioners Edward Keith-Roach of Jerusalem and James H.H. Pollock of Haifa sent condolences on Jabotinsky's death. The acting Polish Consul General also sent a message.

CHICAGO RADIO STATION BARS NAZI GROUP FOR 'CONTROVERSIAL' BROADCASTS

CHICAGO, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The German-American National Alliance of Chicago, whose regular broadcasts over Station WHIP will cease this week by order of the station owners, has used threatening language in its broadcasts in an effort to induce citizens to join the organization, also known as the Einheitsfront (United Front), it was recalled today.

The station owners yesterday notified Paul A.F. Warnholz, director of the Einheitsfront, that the station would not broadcast the "German Hour" sponsored by the organization because its present tenor "is of such controversial nature as to make it unacceptable to many leading Americans."

In the broadcasts last week the organization issued an urgent summons to all members and listeners to attend Sunday's mass meeting at Soldiers Field during which Col. Charles Lindbergh advocated American cooperation with Germany if she wins the war.

The Einheitsfront has boldly admitted its separatist aims and its Reich-criented platform. Its broadcasts have defended the "oppressed" German-American minority and warned listeners to join the alliance now so that when the "oppressed minority" is in control of the nation they may not be considered enemies.

Although the broadcasts have emphasized the American allegiance of the members, persons urging aid to the Allies in their fight against Hitler have been called warmongers and otherwise attacked. The "German Hour" has been on the air daily since last February. The alliance has kept its weekly payments of about \$400 for radio time paid up two weeks in advance. The programs have been about 99 per cent in the German language. Homer H. Maertz, member of the local anti-Semitic Silver Shirt chapter, who was arrested in October, 1939, for terroristic anti-Jewish activities, was one of the founders of the alliance.

Denunciations of Lindbergh Mount

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Col. Charles Lindbergh's speech at Chicago Sunday urging the United States to cooperate with Germany if it wins the war drew increasingly bitter demunciations today, with notables in various fields branding him the country's foremost fifth columnist.

One of the most scathing attacks against the aviator is contained in a two column editorial entitled "Denouncing Charles A. Lindbergh" by Ralph Ingersoll, editor of PM, on the front page of that newspaper. The editorial is coupled with a photograph showing Lindbergh chatting with Marshal Hermann Goering during the flier's visit to Berlin in 1938.

"I say very simply that Col. Lindbergh in his speech in Chicago Sunday identified himself as Spokesman No. 1 for the Fifth Column," Ingersoll says. "The Fifth Column, in America as in Madrid, is a group who love their country's enemies and who first argue and then fight for them.

Col. Lindbergh in his speech made "naked and unashamed" fifth column statements, the editor charges. "Lindbergh is a political novice. His speech was post-graduate work. Obviously, he was helped in writing it. Who are the people who did his thinking and helped in his writing? Who are his gang?"

Col. Lindbergh was charged by L.M. Birkhead, director of the Friends of Democracy, Inc. with following the official Nazi line and of giving "aid and comfort to Hitlerism and the enemies of American democracy," in a telegram to Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson in which Col. Stimson was asked to clarify in a public statement Lindbergh's present connection with any of the armed or reserve forces of the United States Army.

In the Senate yesterday, Senator Claude Pepper (Dem., Fla.) said: "The American people will have to decide whether they are going to follow the chief of the fifth column in this country-Col. Lindbergh-or are going to follow Gen. (John J.) Pershing,"
