HUNGARY EXPRIS JEWS FROM TRANSFIVANTA

HUDAPEST, Nov. 4. (JTA) — Wholesale expulsion of Jews from the Maremoros region of Northern Transylvania was reported here tonight.

The military authorities, according to reports, have been rounding up indigent Jess and escorting them to the nearby Soviet frontier, forcing them at pistol point to cross into Russian territory. The Russo-Hungarian frontier in this region is formed by deschate ridges in the Carpathian mountains, very sparsely patrolled by Soviet frontier guards.

When the Jews protested against the expulsions the authorities were reported to have declared that they were not Hungarian citizens and therefore had no right to remain in the mealy-acquired Hungarian territory of Transylvania.

500, MOSTLY JEWS, STRIFFED OF FEBRUE CITIZENSHIP

WICH, Nov. 4. (JTA) — The first group of 500 naturalized citizens, chiefly emigrants from Central Europe "particularly difficult to assimilate" and also political applications, have been deprived of French citizenship by decision of the Commission for Rewission of Natura ization, an official communique amounced tonight.

The communique stated that "these categories include a notable proportion of Jews."
It added that those who had good grounds for acquiring French citizenship meed not worsy
elimit revision of naturalization. The list of persons affected has not yet been made
public.

Meanwhile, it was reported here, that all Jewish enterprises in occupied France have been ordered by the German authorities to declare their movable and immovable property in Ermane and abroad. "Jewish enterprise" is defined as one with at least 50 per cent under Jewish ownership.

American citizens are exempt from the census of Jews in occupied France, the newspaper La Petite Gironde of Bordeaux reports. Soviet citizens will also not be affected, it is stated.

NAZIS TO INTRODUCE ANTI-JEWISH LAWS IN BELGIUM NEXT WEEK

ZURICH, Nov. 4. (ONA) -- The Berlin press states that anti-Jewish laws will be applied in Belgium next week under instructions of the German authorities since the Belgiam Government has failed to put such laws into effect, it was reported here today.

SPANISH RADIO ATTACKS JEWISH REFUGEES IN TANGIER

LISBON, Nov. 4. (JTA) -- A sharp attack on Jewish refugees residing in Tangier, in the International Zone of Morocco, was broadcast today by the Spanish radio station at Valladolid, which expressed regret that Hitler had not exterminated them all.

CHRISTIANS TAKING OVER TRADE IN HUNGARY

BUDAPEST, Nov. 4. (ONA) -- Great progress in introduction of Christian elements into trade was reported by Commerce Minister Vargo addressing the parliamentary trade commission.

He declared reorganization of the sugar, oil, timber and potato trades would soon be completed and the most important branches of foreign trade were already in Christian hands. He announced that special credits would be furnished to new Christian traders.

PALESTINE INDUSTRIALISTS PLEDGE FULL AID TO BRITAIN

TEL AVIV. Nov. 4. (JTA) -- A message pledging Palestine Jewish industry's readiness to give utmost aid to Britain's war effort was sent to Prime Minister Winston Churchill today by delegates attending the 31st conference of Palestine Jewish industrialists.

The conference decided to send delegations to the United States and England to arrange for adequate supplies of raw materials for industrial enterprises in Palestine. It passed resolutions asking the Government and Jewish financial and political institutions to assist actively in industrial development, in the improvement of war insurance arrangements and normalization of exports.

BALFOUR DECLARATION ANNIVERSARY MARKED IN CHILE.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 4. (JTA) -- The 22nd anniversary of the Balfour Decleration was commemorated by the Jewish population here on Saturday night. The Chilean newspapers Mercurio and Nacion marked the occasion with editorials stressing this country's friendship for the Jews and Palestine.

The anniversary was cited by Samuel Goren, president of the Chilean Zionist Federation; Samuel Oreiver, representative of the Jewish Agency, and other Jewish leaders at the opening of the 22nd Chilean Zionist Congress on Saturday. British, Polish and United States diplomatic envoys to Chile sent messages to the Congress expressing the hope that Jewish aspirations in Palestine would be realized.

THOUSAND ATTEND SHAPIRO RITES

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. (JTA) -- Nearly 1,000 persons, including leaders in all walks of life, attended funeral services this morning for David Shapiro, founder and publisher of The Day, who died Friday night at the age of 68. Burial was in the Lebanon Cemetery. Messages of condolence continued to reach Shapiro's family from many parts of the country.

The services were held at the Riverside Memorial Chapel. Rabbi Israel Levinthal, who officiated, stressed Shapiro's role in communal life in New York and his deep interest in Palestine.

Among those who sent messages of condolence were Governor Herbert H. Lehman, Senators Robert F. Wagner and James M. Mead, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Dr. Israel Goldstein, Judge Morris Rothenberg and Louis Lipsky. Among the organizations which sent statements were the United Jewish Appeal, American Jewish Congress, Zionist Organization of America and Jewish Writers' Club.

CHRISTIANS USE JEWISH FACILITIES IN TWO N.Y. INSTITUTIONS

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. (JTA) -- Examples of inter-faith harmony have occurred at Bellevue Hospital and at Brooklyn College.

At Bellevue, a Catholic chapel was dedicated yesterday in the Administration Building, situated between a Protestant Episcopal chapel and a synagogue on the same floor. Since the Catholic chapel's organ was not ready in time for the dedication, arrangements were made to use that of the synagogue, use of which was given by the chaplain, Rabbi Henry A. Schorr.

At Brooklyn College, the Catholic Newman Club and Protestant Student Christian Association accepted an invitation of the college's B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation to center all their activities at the Hillel Foundation. The plan grew out of the organization of Brooklyn College's first student Interfaith Council.

COURSE ON THE HISTORY OF JEWISH ART GIVEN

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. (JTA) -- Rachel Wischmitzer-Bernstein, former curator of the Jewish Museum in Berlin, has started a course on Jewish art history which, in 12 sessions, will give a survey of the evolution of Jewish art from the old oriental period to the modern times. As there is no chair for the study of Jewish art, this course is the first attempt to represent the developments of Jewish art. The course, illustrated with lantern slides, is being held on Thursdays, 8:15 to 9:10 P.M. at the Adult School of Jewish Studies at the 92nd Street Y.M.H.A.
