

5,000 UNUSED PALESTINE CERTIFICATES EXTENDED; TOTAL WAR ENTRY REACHES 20,000

JERUSALEM, Dec. 20. (JTA) -- The Palestine Government has extended for three months the validity of more than 5,000 unused immigration certificates under the former schedule, it was learned today. The action followed appeals from the Jewish Agency. The Jews to whom the certificates were issued have not yet been able to use them because of wartime travel difficulties.

The Jewish Agency, it was learned, is making efforts to obtain transit for 1,500 immigrants with certificates who are still in the Baltics. The first group, from Sweden and Denmark, is expected to arrive soon.

A total of 20,000 Jews entered Palestine in the 16 months since the beginning of the war, Elizan Dobkin of the Jewish Agency reported to a conference of the World Union of Poals Zion-Hitachduth at Ayanoth. They included 8,700 in verious quota categories and more than 10,000 refugee illegal immigrants.

Dobkin added that the Palestine Government had turned over to the care of the Agency more than 7,500 illegals after they had served six months' internment and that 2,400, including some 1,600 survivors of the sinking of the S.S. Patria on Nov. 25, were still in the Athlit camp.

The Patria death toll reached 72 today when four more bodies, including Max Zwillinger, 49, of Vienna and three unidentified women, were recovered from the submerged ship.

The Ayanoth conference adopted resolutions calling for continuation of the organization's work in occupied European countries, demanding that American Jews increase their assistance to suffering European Jews and asking strengthening of the World Jewish Congress to make it an authoritative representative body.

JEWISH CENTERS PLAN CHANUKAH CELEBRATIONS FOR ARMY MEN

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. (JTA) -- Chanukah will be celebrated by more than 500 Y.M.H.A.'s, Y.W.H.A.'s and Jewish community centers throughout the United States beginning Tuesday evening, Dec. 24, and extending to Wednesday, Jan. 1. Special invitations have been addressed to Jewish soldiers and sailors to attend these festivities in communities adjacent to Army posts and naval training stations, it was announced by the Jewish Welfare Board.

Meanwhile, Jewish soldiers stationed at Fort Dix, New Jersey, have presented an unusual Christmas present to their Christian fellows at the post, it was revealed in an announcement of Christmas furloughs made by General Clifford R. Powell, commanding officer at the fort. The Jewish soldiers have offered to waive their eligibility for furloughs to make it possible for more soldiers of the Protestant and Catholic faiths to obtain holidays during the Christmas season.

The Jewish men revealed their willingness to give up their eligibility for a holiday through Chaplain Bernard Siegal, the Jewish chaplain at the post. At least 25 per cent of the 44th Division, which is stationed at Fort Dix, must remain in camp at all times. There are some 800 Jewish men in the division.

The Jewish Education Committee's annual Chanukah Dinner will be held Sunday evening at the Hotel Astor. Speakers will include Justice Samuel I. Rosenman, president; Harry H. LASKI URGES JEWS TO PREPARE PLAN FOR PEACE CONFERENCE

LONDON, Dec. 20. (JTA) -- Jewish communities the world over must begin without delay to consider the best system of protection for Jewish minorities in Europe after the war, in order to submit agreed demands to the peace conference, Neville Laski, former president of the Board of Deputies of British Jews, declared today.

Addressing the quarterly meeting of the Jewish Council of Manchester and Salford, Laski welcomed the exiled Polish Government's declaration of equality, but stressed the necessity of reeducation of the masses of Polish peasantry infected with anti-Semitism.

Regarding Britain, he warned that the problem of anti-Semitism was still immediate, especially where populations had been shifted because of the war. He declared that during the period of change, economic hardship and dislocation after the war anti-Semitism might be serious.

Nathan Laski, chairman of the Council, revealed that after intervention on behalf of the Manchester Jews he had received assurance from Air Secretary Sir Archibald Sinclair that in the future Britishers of foreign parentage would not be excluded from the Royal Air Force.

REFUGEE BROADCAST TO BE INCLUDED IN ROOSEVELT INAUGURAL PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (JTA) -- Immediately after the President's inaugural address is broadcast, the airways will be turned over to a series of speeches by prominent refugee scientists, authors and scholars, Joseph E. Davies, chairman of the inaugural committee, said today.

The refigees, who are not yet selected, will emphasize the necessity for Western Hemisphere defense of free institutions if they are not to perish completely from the earth, Davis said, indicating that this ideal would be one of the themes of President Roosevelt's third inaugural address.

The broadcast will be under the direction of Columnist Dorothy Thompson.

DISCHARGE OF JEWISH DIRECTORS TIES UP DUTCH COMPANIES

LONDON, Dec. 20. (JTA) -- Mass resignation of Jewish directors of Dutch companies, in connection with anti-Jewish decrees of the Nazi occupation authorities, is creating a major organizational problem for Holland's economy, according to information received in Dutch circles here today.

Many companies were compelled to call extraordinary meetings to select new directors. Dutch shareholders in many cases did not attend the meetings, thereby showing their disgust with the anti-Jewish measures. In nearly every instance convocation of a second-meeting was necessary to obtain a quorum.
