## 2 NEW UNITS ADDED TO PALESTINE FORCES

JERUSALEM, Feb. 9. (JTA) -- Recruiting has opened for two new Jewish and Arab units to serve with the British forces, it was officially announced today.

The Jewish authorities expressed confidence that enlistment for the Jewish unit would be concluded within a week. Each unit will comprise 250 men. Approximately 8,000 Jews are already serving in the British forces.

# Wavell Praises Work of Palestinians in Libyan Victories

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 9. (JTA) -- Praise for the role played by Palestinians in the British victories in Libya was voiced in a cable from General Sir Archibald Wavell, commander-in-ohief of the British Meditarranean forces, made public today by Dr. Jose Mirelman, president of the New Zionist Organization of Argentina.

The cable, in reply to a query by Dr. Mirelman sent in connection with the current campaign here in behalf of the proposed Jewish army and air force, said: "Palestinians in Libya, mainly employed in the lines of communication, participated prominently in the occupation of Sidi Barrani, Solium, Sepuzzo, Bardia, Tobruk and performed fries work. Their morale was excellent despite frequent bombing. They are eager to overthrow the dictators."

# LORD MOYNE, NEW COLONIAL SECRETARY, HELD FRIENDLY TO JEWISH CAUSES

LONDON, Feb.9. (JTA) -- Lord Moyne was named Secretary of State for Colonies yesterday to succeed Lord Lloyd, who died last week. Lord Moyne, who is 60 years old, has served has Minister of Agriculture, Undersecretary of State for War and Financial Secretary of the Tremmary.

Former chairman of the Polish Relief Fund, Lord Moyne has been active in relief for refugees. He helped a group of Polish Zionist leaders to leave Lithmania for Palestine. He was described today by A.M. Kaizer of the Polish Jewish Relief Fund as "a thorough gentlemen, straight-forward and most sympathetic of all to Jewish causes."

In a speech on Jen. 15 at a luncteon of the Folish Jewish Relief Fund, Lord Moyne praised the Jews for their philanthropic work and denounced German oppression of the Poles.
"Hitler could not have chosen a more intractable material for the cruel and craw experiment of so-called 'Nordification', "he said. "The Nazi savagery has only achieved a wonderful union throughout the Polish race."

### INTERNED REFUGEES MALTREATED ON SHIP TO CANADA, LONDON HEARS

LONDON, Feb. 9. (JTA) -- Harsh treatment of refugees on a transport to Canada is described in the current issue of the Jewish Chronicle on the basis of the account of a returned internee.

Aboard the ship the Jewish refugees were allegedly called "soum of the earth" and
"a lousy lot" by the military commanding officer. In the internment comprefugees were
not allowed to write regarding release and reemigration or to contact refugee organizations
and perliamentarians. They were treated as prisoners of war, although 85 per cent of them
woted for separation from Nasi sympathizers and 90 per cent refused to give their names to
the Swiss Legation, acting for Germany.

The refugees even refused to use letter forms marked "prisoner of war" for fear that they would endenger friends and relatives in Britain and the United States.

### ITALY ISSUES SPECIAL RATION CARDS FOR JEWS

LISON, Feb. 9. (JTA) -- Special ration cards for Jews, providing for reduced allotments, have been introduced in Italy, it was reported here today.

# A.J. CONGRESS OPPSES CREATION OF BUDGET BODY TO ADVISE WELFARE FUNDS

NEW YORK, Feb. 9. (JTA) -- The Governing Council of the American Jewish Congress has unanimously adopted a resolution opposing the proposal for a national budgeting committee to establish the facts concerning the activities and the budgets of national and overseas against with a view to advising local welfare funds, President Stephen S. Wise announced today.

Dr. Wise also made known that a communication had been addressed to the representatives of the Congress in cities where there are welfare funds and community councils advising them to act in concert with other according to register their opposition to this appeal.

The board of directors of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds approved the proposal to set up the national budgeting committee at its General Assembly in Atlanta and is submitting it to a referendum of the welfare funds and community councils.

### PARLEY FEB. 16 TO OPEN J.D.C. FUNDS DRIVE

NEW YORK, Feb. 3. (JTA) -- To insugurate a nationwide compaign for funds for rescue and rehabilitation of millions of Jewish victims of war and persecution throughout the world, an extreordinary meeting of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, will be held on Sunday, Feb. 16, at the Hotel Astor. Governor Herbert H. Lehman, a J.D.C. vice-chairman, will address the meeting, which will be attended by Jewish leaders from all parts of the country.

In New York City arrangements are being made for a combined campaign for assistance to refugees in the city and throughout the country as well as for overseas Jewish meeds.
Announcement of plans for this campaign is expected to be made in the next few days.

A report on the oversees work of the J.D.C. by Morris C. Troper, European chairman, who recently returned from his headquerters in Lisbon, will be one of the features of the Feb. 16 meeting.

## 3 GROUPS TO SHARE FUNDS RAISED BY BRITH ABRAHAM

NEW YORK, Feb. 9. (JTA) — The Independent Order of Brith Abraham, which has an enrollment of more than 60,000 members throughout the United States, today announced the inauguration of a combined compaign in behalf of the United Falestine Appeal and oversees relief and refugee agencies.

In an appeal to the membership, Herman Hoffman, Grand Master and Max L. Hollander, Grand Secretary of the Order amnounced that all contributions to its campaign would be divided equally between the United Palestine Appeal and the combined drive of the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Refugee Service. Fifty per cent of the total funds will go to the UFA, the remaining half going to the JDD and NRS.

# LEHMAN, MACK URGE WIDE SUPPORT OF PALESTINE AS HAVEN FOR REFUGEES

NEW YORK, Per. 9. (JTA) -- Accepting honorary chairmanships in the \$12,000,000 war \*mergency compaign of the United Palestine Appeal Governor Membert H. Lehman and Judge Julian W. Mack issued statements today urging the widest support for the drive and asserting that Palestine, today more than ever, offered a reven for thousands of refugees from oppression.

### LICENSES RESTORED TO ITALIAN JEWISH STREET VENDORS

ROMS, Jan. 25. (3TA-By Airmail) -- Italien Jewish street vendors, who for more than five months have been without means of livelihood, have now had their peddling licenses temporarily renewed. The licenses were withdrawn in August of last year.

Approximately 1,200 heads of families, or more than 10 per cent of the whole of Italian Jewny, are affected.

#### 1,800 JEWISH REFUGEES INTERNED IN ITALY

ROME, Jun. 27. (ITA-By Ainmail) -- Approximately 1,800 Jewish refugees are now intermed in Italiam concentration camps, while about 1,400 other--nearly all women and children—are still at liberty, principally in the cities of Milan and Rome.

The largest group of those interned, numbering about 1000, are concentrated in barracks near the village of Somenza, in Southern Italy. Although the accomposation is improvised and heating and toilet facilities are lacking, conditions are described as being reasonably confortable, and the internees enjoy a fair amount of liberty although under close supervision. Sport is encouraged, and there have been occasions when "all-star" terms from among the refugees have met—and usually bestem—local village football terms.

Their greatest need has been for clothing, particulerly warm clothing for the winter months. This need has been satisfied to some extent by the Jewish Committee in Milan. In that city there were some 800 women and children refugees at liberty, none of whom was permitted to engage in my occupation, due to the restrictions against foreigners. In order to make use of this potentially productive body the Committee borrowed a number of sewing machines, and solicited from Jewish manufacturers gifts of woolen and octton cloth. Many of the refugee woman are now buslly engaged in turning out suits overcoats, shorts, socks that underclothing for the men in intermment, who are thus able to cope better with the rigours of emp life.
