EXECUTION OF ALL U.S. JEWS DEMANDED BY ANTI-SEMITIC WITNESSES AT WASHINGTON HEARING

WASHINGTON, Jen. 21. (JTA) -- The House Committee Investigating Un-American Activities today secretly questioned witnesses active in disseminating anti-Jewish propaganda in this country, some of whom edmitted at the hearing that they are "in favor of executing all the Jews in the United States."

While the names of the witnesses were withheld, Martin Dies, the chairman of the Committee, disclosed after the hearing that all the material submitted by the witnesses was directed against the Jews. One of the witnesses, he said, expressed himself freely, stating he favored "not persecution but execution of the Jews."

Dies added that the committee report, when completed, will show that the Fascist elements in this country are conducting a tremendous smount of enti-Semitic activities. "The report will disclose that the Fascist movement in America is as well organized and has as many people connected with it as it did in Germany shortly after the Mazi movement had started," Dies deelered.

William Dudley Pelley, anti-Semitic leader of the Silver Shirts of America, was yesterday sentenced by Superior Court Judge F. Phillips in Ashville, N.C., to serve two to three years in prison for violating the North Corolina Security Laws. The judge directed that Pelley be immediately confined in the county jeil.

NAZIS RESUME DEPORTATION OF JEWS FROM REICH AFTER BRIEF RESPITE

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 21. (JTA) -- The deportation of German Jews to Nazi-occupied Eastern territories which was suddenly suspended during the week-end was resumed on Monday night, the Berlin correspondent of the Gotesborg Posten, a Swedish newspaper, reported today. Prior to their deportation, the Jews were ordered by the Gestapo to surrender all woolen articles they possessed, the correspondent informs.

The Berlin correspondent of enother Swedish newspaper, Svenska Dagbladet, reports today that the Jawish Community of Berlin issued an appeal to its members to donate food ration coupons to the deported Jews in order to provide them with food for the journey. The appeal asked each Jew to contribute coupons for 100 grams of bread, 20 grams of margarine, 50 grams of meat and 50 grams of macaroni.

MON-JEWS IN HOLLAND DISPLAY SOLIDARITY WITH JEWS BY SUPPORTING THEM FINANCIALLY

ZURICH, Jan. 21. (JTA) -- A striking example of solidarity between the non-Jews in Holland and the Jews there is reported in the Amsterdam press reaching here today. The reports reveal that 37 non-Jewish butchers in Bussum and 13 butchers in Naarden have each pledged themselves to pay every week the equivalent of fifty American cents for the support of Jewish butchers in Bussum who are no longer allowed to procure and soll meat. JEWS IN RUMANIA TO PAY CASH FOR NON-DELIVERY OF WINTER CLOTHING TO ARMY

BERNE, Jan. 21. (JTA) -- Rumanian authorities today issued an order in Bucharest stating that Jaws who are unable to deliver warm clothing for the army as requested, will have to pay cash instead. The order was announced over the Rumanian radio stations.

The following prices are to be paid by Jews to the government: 10,000 lei for an overcoat: 6,500 lei for a suit; 3,500 for a pair of trousers; 5,000 for a blanket; 1,500 for a sheet of linen or a strew matress; 1,500 for a cap or a lat; 800 lei for a shirt; 500 lei for underweer; 200 lei for a towel; 150 lei for a pair of socks and 100 lei for a handkerchief.

FURTHER RESTRICTIONS AGAINST JEWS REPORTED FROM SLOVAKIA AND BULGARIA

GENEVA, Jan. 21. (JTA) -- Helf of the 15,000 Jewish population of Bratisleve, the Slovekian capital, have already been deported from the city and sent to lebor camps, the Slovek press reaching here today reported. It quoted high officials as announcing at a press conference that "soon all Jews will be deported from towns with a population of over 1,500 inhabitents."

The Slovakian newspaper Granzbote reports that the Bulgarian government issued a decree in Sofia, capital of Bulgaria, prohibiting Jews from establishing new business enterprises or taking over such enterprises from Jews who wish to sell them.

ALLOWANCES FOR PALESTINE JEWISH SOLDIERS TO BE INVESTIGATED, MINISTER PROMISES

LONDON, Jan. 21. (JTA) -- The British Government is investigating to determine whether any special action is necessary in connection with the allowances and pensions for Palestine Jewish soldiers, it was announced today by Sir Edward Grigg, Under-Secretary of Wer, in reply to a question in Commons by A. Creech Jones, Laborite M.P.

Sir Edward stated that the family allowences in Palestine were granted after consideration of all related circumstances and that they had been raised from time to time as the rates allowed dependent families of soldiers in England had been increased. Awards to disabled Palestinian Jewish soldiers are now about two-thirds of those paid to English soldiers at home, he said.

There will be no honorary pallbearers, in accordance with Dr. Lowenstein's request in a letter which he left.

Messages of condolence were received today by the Federation from various parts of the country as well as from the 116 medical and sociel agencies in New York and Brooklyn affiliated with the Federation. The Board of Trustees, officers end staff of the Federation which was guided by Dr. Lowenstein for 22 years made public a statement expressing their grief over his passing. "His warm sympathies and unfailing kindliness endeared him to us all, and there is no measuring what the Federation and the community owe to his wisdom, his deep humanity and his unfaltering devotion,"...

He Contributed Much to Human Betterment, Says Medalie

George Z. Medalie, President of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of New York, in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency declared: "The news of Dr. Lowenstein's sudden death will bring a deep sense of personal loss to the host of men and women who have been associated with him in his lifelong spen of youthfulness in so many areas of our community life.
