NAZIS IN HOLLAND TIGHTEN ANTI-JEWISH RESTRICTIONS FOLLOWING DEPORTATIONS

STOCKHOLM, July 30. (JTA)-- The expulsion of thousands of Jews from Holland by the German occupation authorities has been followed by a tightening up of anti-Jewish restrictions, it is revealed in the Joodsche Weekblad, official organ of the Amsterdam Jewish community, which reached here today.

Intensifying the curfew restrictions for Jews, who are now compelled to remain at home between the hours of 8 PM and 6 AM, the Nazis have ordered that Jews are forbidden to lean out of windows or stand or sit on balconies that face the street. When Jews are standing near a window, they must display the Mogen David on their outer clothing, the order also specifies. The occupation officials have also announced that Dutch Jews who fail to comply with orders to report to German labor camps will be dealt with by the Gestapo.

The extent of the expulsions of Jews from the provincial towns to the Amsterdam ghetto, where most Jews in the country are being concentrated preparatory to their being deported to Eastern Europe, is indicated in an urgent appeal in the Joodsche Weekblad from the Jewish Council of Amsterdam, requesting mattresses, sofas and beds for the evacuees.

U.S. LEND-LEASE HEAD PROMISES FOOD, MEDICINE, CLOTHING FOR REFUGEES IN RUSSIA

LONDON, July 30. (JTA)-- A promise that Polish refugees in Russia - among whom are hundreds of thousands of Jews - will continue to receive food, clothing and medicine on a lease-lend basis from the United States has been given to Jan Stanczyk, Polish Minister of Social Welfare, by Edward Stettinius, American Lease-Lend administrator, it was announced here today in Dziennik Polski, official organ of the Polish Government-in-Exile.

In the course of the conference between Minister Stanczyk and Mr. Stettinius the Polish official informed the Lend-Lease administrator concerning the situation of the Polish refugees in Russia and the Middle East and discussed the possibilities of aiding these refugees, the Polish newspaper stated.

Meanwhile, Polish Jewish circles here received word from Kuibyshev that Dr. Henryk Schrieber, Jewish Socialist leader and for many years a member of the Cracow municipal council, died in Siberia on June 27.

ONE HUNDRED BELGIAN JEWS REPORTED DEPORTED TO EASTERN EUROPE

STOCKHOLM, July 30. (JTA)-- One hundred Belgian Jews who had been confined in the St. Giles prison in Brussels on charges of "sabotage," have been deported from Belgium to Poland or occupied Russia, according to information reaching here today.

JEWISH REFUGEES WHO WERE STRANDED IN PORTUGAL AND SPAIN ARRIVE IN BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE, July 30. (JTA)-- Five hundred and fifty-seven refugees from Nazism who had been stranded in Portugal and unoccupied France, arrived here last night aboard the Portuguese liner, S.S. Nyassa. The Nyassa left Lisbon, Portugal, on July 10, put in at Casablanca, French Morocco, several days later to pick up the bulk of her passengers who had been transferred from Marseille, unoccupied France, in order to board the ship, and stopped over at Bermuda on July 21 for a week.

Among those on board were 38 children who came here under the care of the U.S. Committee for the Care of European Children. About 350 passengers were Jewish refugees. Arrangements for the transportation of the refugees were made by the Joint Distribution Committee and the Hias-Ica. The passengers were met at the dock here by members of the Hias pier service who came from New York to arrange for reuniting them with relatives in the United States. The arrival of the Nyassa brought to 6,000 the number of persons evacuated by the JDC since Pearl Harbor. Through its American representatives in Lisbon, the JDC is arranging for the sailing of another ship during August.

In the ages between the oldest and youngest passengers aboard the Nyassa there was a difference of nearly a century. The youngest were Roger and Jeanne Martin, twins, who were born in June. Their mother, Mrs. Jeanette Bougerol Martin, Canadian-born, is a 28-year-old widow whose husband, a French army officer, was lost at sea before the children were born. The oldest passenger was Mathilde Wertheimer, 99 years old. Mrs. Wertheimer, a native of Germany, traveled with her daughters Rosa and Sophie.

GERMAN JEWS IN BRITAIN STILL CONSIDERED "ENEMY ALIENS," MORRISON STATES

LONDON, July 30. (JTA)-- German Jews in Britain are still considered "enemy aliens," it was indicated today in a statement made in the House of Commons by Minister of Home Security Herbert Morrison.

Graham White, Laborite, queried Morrison on whether the British Government recognized the German Government's decree of November, 1941, depriving Jews who left Germany of their citizenship, and consequently whether the British Government recognized such Jews now in Britain to be "stateless."

In reply, Morrison stated that while under German law such persons were considered permanent residents abroad, and deprived of German nationality, it would be contrary to public policy to recognize the power of an enemy state in war-time to relieve its nationals of any disability, liability or restriction imposed by British law on aliens of enemy nationality.

POLISH-JEWISH SOLDIERS FROM RUSSIA MIDDLE EAST WELCOMED AT NEW YORK RECEPTION

NEW YORK, July 30. (JTA)-- A group of Polish-Jewish soldiers who saw action in the Libyan campaign were welcomed here last night at a reception arranged by the Federation of Polish Jews. They are part of a group of 300 Polish soldiers who arrived here this week from Russia and the Middle East.

Present at the reception were prominent Polish military leaders and the Polish consul-general in New York, Sylwin Strakacz. Both Mr. Strakacz and Benjamin Winter, president of the Federation, addressed the reception expressing the hope that victory will soon be achieved and that a free Poland with equality for all will be created.

CERTAIN CATEGORIES OF ROMANIAN JEWS FORCED TO SERVE IN ARMY

ZURICH, July 30. (JTA)-- Certain categories of Jews in Rumania will be forced to serve with the Rumanian Army under new instructions issued yesterday by the Ministry for War, it was announced today on the Bucharest radio.

The Rumanian broadcaster stated that the Minister of War had directed that all Jewish doctors, pharmacists, engineers and architects in the country will henceforth be required to serve ninety days in a "civilian capacity" with the army.

Heretofore, all Rumanian Jews have been excluded from serving in the army and have been forced to pay a large tax in lieu of service.

CANADIAN SOCIALISTS ASK FIGHT ON ANTI-SEMITISM, CONDEMN MASSACRES OF EUROPE'S JEWS

TORONTO, July 30. (JTA)-- A resolution condemning anti-Semitism, assailing the massacres of Jews in Europe, expressing sympathy with the "prisoners in the ghettos," and hailing the activities of the anti-Nazi underground movements, was adopted here last night at the closing session of the joint convention of the Canadian Commonwealth Federation and the Dominion Socialist Party.

A report on anti-Semitism in Canada and the persecution of the Jews in Europe was delivered by Alderman Michael Rubinstein, chairman of the Canadian Jewish Labor Committee. J.M. Coldwell, who was elected president of the Canadian Socialist Party at the convention, appealed to the party's members to fight anti-Semitism, stating that "the world can never atone or compensate for the sufferings of the Jews." The delegates also adopted a resolution asking the release of Victor Alter and Henryk Ehrlich, Polish-Jewish Socialist leaders, who are imprisoned in Russia.

CRISIS PRECIPITATED IN SLOVAKIA BY CHARGE THAT EDITOR OF OFFICIAL PAPER IS JEWISH

ZURICH, July 30. (JTA)-- The question of whether or not the editor of the anti-Jewish pro-Nazi newspaper "Slovak," organ of President Tiso and Premier Tuka of Slovakia, has Jewish blood has precipitated a minor crisis in the German puppet state, it was revealed today.

Editor Pauco of the "Slovak" is suing Anton Maly, director of the Zilina Electrical Works, for libel because the latter said Pauco was of Jewish origin. The Gardists, organ of Sene Mach, Slovakian Minister of the Interior, and a political opponent of Tiso and Tuka, received here today, plays up the case with obvious relish, in order to bring the President and Premier into disrepute. Mach is violently anti-Semitic and has been in charge of the anti-Jewish campaign in Slovakia, which has resulted in more than half the Jewish population of the country being deported.

Meanwhile, the Zilina court where the libel suit is being heard has allowed Maly's lawyer to introduce evidence proving his assertion, but no verdict has yet been rendered.

DISCRIMINATION AGAINST JEWS BY NEW YORK STATE DEFENSE FIRMS DECREASING

NEW YORK, July 30. (JTA)-- Employment of Negroes, Jews and persons of foreign origin in New York State's war industries has greatly increased since war was declared, but the problem of discrimination is far from solved, Industrial Commissioner Frieda S. Miller said today. Miss Miller is chairman of the Committee on Discrimination in Employment of the State War Council and as Industrial Commissioner has legal power to prosecute employers guilty of discrimination. "We are following up our field and are prepared to take legal action against recalcitrant employers," she said.

SIX OF TWENTY-EIGHT INDICTED FOR CONSPIRACY TO WRECK ARMY MORALE PLEAD NOT GUILTY

WASHINGTON, July 30. (JTA)-- Six of 28 defendants indicted for conspiracy to wreck the morale of the armed forces - including several of the nation's leading anti-Semites - pleaded not guilty in United States District Court here today. Ralph Townsend, already serving an eight to 24 months sentence as an unregistered Japanese agent, refused to plead until he had consulted a lawyer.

Those who pleaded not guilty were: George Sylvester Viereck, also serving two to four years for violation of the Foreign Agents Registration Act; Prescott Donnett, who was recently drafted into the Army; James True, Charles B. Hudson, Elmer J. Garner and his son, James F. Garner.

IMMIGRATION COMMISSIONER PLEDGES HE WILL SPEED NATURALIZATION OF ALIENS IN U.S. ARMY

WASHINGTON, July 30. (JTA)-- Earl G. Harrison, newly-appointed Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, has pledged that he will "do everything possible" to facilitate the naturalization of aliens serving in the armed forces of the United States. The pledge was given in a letter replying to a query by a loyal alien concerning a recent modification by the War Department of the naturalization regulations for alien soldiers, it was disclosed here today.

Meanwhile, Mr. Harrison reported to Attorney-General Biddle that 265,930 German aliens in the United States have received their identification certificates from the Department of Justice.

JEWISH UNIT WITH BRITISH ARMY DONATES FUND FOR COLONIZATION OF JNF LAND

JERUSALEM, July 30. (JTA)-- The British officer commanding the 14th Jewish Unit of the Buffs, stationed here, today turned over £26 to the Jewish Agency's headquarters to be used for colonization of Jewish National Fund land which will be distributed to Jewish soldiers after the war. The funds were collected among the soldiers in the unit.

MIRIAM PEIMAN APPOINTED DIRECTOR OF JUNIOR COUNCIL OF MIZRACHI WOMEN

NEW YORK, July 30. (JTA)-- The appointment of Miss Miriam Peiman, formerly of Detroit, as new executive director of the Junior Council of the Mizrahi Women's Organization of America, the national religious women's Zionist movement, was announced today by Miss Sylvia Klepner, president of the Junior Council.

A former leader in Jewish youth movements, including Young Israel, Young Judea and Junior Hadassah, Miss Peiman came to New York recently from Detroit to take over her new post.

AIR-RAID PRECAUTION COURSE TO BE GIVEN IN YIDDISH IN MASSACHUSETTS TOWN

CHELSEA, Mass., (JTA)-- Believed to be one of the first of its kind in the nation, an air-raid precaution course in Yiddish will be given in Chelsea under the auspices of the local Committee on Public Safety, it was announced today. The course is being offered to aid the many elderly Jewish people in Chelsea who cannot understand English well and thus do not have a clear knowledge of air-raid precautions.
