EXPULSION OF ALL POLISH JEWS FEARED AS NAZIS INCORPORATE POLAND INTO REICH

LONDON, Nov. 2. (JTA)-- The eventual expulsion of all Jews from Nazi-occupied Poland was predicted here today as a result of an announcement made by Hans Frank, Nazi commissar for Poland, that the occupied Polish territory hitherto known as the Government General is now considered a part of the German Reich.

The announcement of the incorporation of the whole of Poland into the Reich was made by the Nazi commissar in the course of an interview with the Warsaw correspondent of the Pariser Zeitung, a Nazi newspaper published in Paris. He declared that by making the Polish territory an integral part of the Third Reich, the Nazi authorities are "marking a new era in the history of Europe."

Parallel with Frank's announcement that Germany was swallowing up the whole of Poland, it was also reported here that the Nazi authorities have imposed a one-million zlotys fine upon the population of Warsaw as punishment for attacks on German soldiers in the streets of the city. The report did not indicate whether the Warsaw Jewish ghetto is to pay a part of this fine.

Jews Protest Appointment of Polish Anti-Semite to Post in New York

The annual meeting of the Council of Polish Jews in Great Britain today adopted a resolution expressing "surprise and astonishment" at the fact that the Polish Government-in-Exile has appointed the anti-Semitic professor Swientoslawski to the post of president of the Polish Institute in New York.

"Considering the fact that Prof. Swientoslawski was responsible for the introduction of 'ghetto benches' for Jewish students in the universities of pre-war Poland, when he was the Minister of Education, we do not think him suitable for this important post," the resolution stated. At the same time the meeting adopted a resolution expressing satisfaction with the declaration made by Polish Premier Sikorski at the meeting last week at Albert Hall in London called for the purpose of protesting Nazi atrocities against Jews. In his declaration, Premier Sikorski reiterated his promise of equal rights for Jews in post-war Poland.

Objection to the appointment of Prof. Swientoslawski was also voiced in other circles here interested in Jewish problems. It is pointed out that Prof. Swientoslawski is not only responsible for the "ghetto benches," but that he took no action to check the anti-Jewish riots which occurred during his administration in some of the universities and which led to the killing of more than thirty Jewish students and the wounding of several hundred others.

A general debate on the treatment of Jews serving in the Polish armed forces is scheduled to take place at the session of the Polish National Council here on Wednesday. The scheduled debate was precipitated by inquiries made by members of the Council who received information concerning serious discrimination against Jewish soldiers and officers in the Polish Army in Russia.

JEWS WORKING ON LAND IN FRANCE ARE EXEMPT FROM DEPORTATION TO NAZI TERRITORIES

LISBON, Nov. 2, (JTA)-- Jews in unoccupied France who are working on farms are classified as "elements needed for French agriculture" and as such are exempt from deportation to Nazi-held territories, it was disclosed today over the Vichy radio by Darquier de Pellepoix, French commissioner for Jewish Affairs.

The anti-Semitic French official in a bitter anti-Jewish broadcast denounced allowing Jews to work on the land. "The Jewish rush to farm work," he said, "is not due to the fact that Jews love to work on the land, but because they seek to evade the existing laws. The smallest farms and the poorest peasants are being besieged with Jews asking employment, since it is necessary for Jews to prove that they are actually employed on the land."

Urging a check-up on all Jews who are exempt from deportation as farm laborers, the Vichy commissar for Jewish Affairs alleged in his address that "Jews promise to pay peasants as much as 1,000 francs monthly for a certificate stating that they are regularly employed by the peasants as agricultural workers." After securing such certificates, the Jews "are happy because they have evaded the existing regulations," Pellepoix asserted.

JEWS SETTLED FROM CENTRAL EUROPE INVEST FIFTY MILLION DOLLARS IN PALESTINE

JERUSALEM, Nov. 2, (JTA)-- Approximately fifty million dollars have been invested in Palestine by Jewish refugees from Germany, Austria and other countries of Central Europe, it was reported today at the conference of the Federation of Jewish Settlers from Germany and Austria which is taking place in Kfar Shmaryahu, the settlement named after the late Zionist leader Shmaryahu Levin, and developed by refugees from the Reich.

An announcement that Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Executive, is not expected in Palestine in the near future was made at the conference by Eliezer Kaplan, member of the executive of the Jewish Agency who addressed the conference on the economic development of Palestine. Kaplan stated that Dr. Weizmann, who is in New York, had cabled the executive of the Jewish Agency that his health does not permit him to come to Palestine at present.

The 130 delegates attending the conference also heard a report from Dr. Felix Rosenbluth, leader of the Federation, who emphasized that one of the principal aims of the organization is to help the German and Austrian Jews who still remain in the countries of Central Europe. He estimated that there are now about 90,000 Jews from Central European countries in Palestine of whom 75,000 are members of the Federation. He proposed that the Federation become an integral part of the Zionist Organization, continuing at the same time to assist Jews from Germany and Austria in their colonizing activities in Palestine.

MUFTI OF ORAN URGES MOSLEMS TO FIGHT AGAINST JEWS, BRITAIN, RUSSIA

LISBON, Nov. 2, (JTA)-- The Grand Mufti of Oran, one of the principal cities of Algeria, joined the ex-Mufti of Jerusalem in the ranks of the anti-Jewish propagandists with an address he delivered to a group of Moslems leaving with the Vichy French Tri-Color Legion to fight on the Russian front.

The Mufti, according to the Nazi radios which rebroadcast his address today in Arabic and other languages, told the departing Moslem soldiers that "as good Mohammedans" they should fight against Russia, Britain and the Jews.

ANNIVERSARY OF BALFOUR DECLARATION OBSERVED BY ZIONISTS THROUGHOUT AMERICA

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.(JTA)-- The twenty-fifth anniversary of the Balfour Declaration, which promised the establishment of a Jewish National Home in Palestine, was observed last night in a number of Jewish communities throughout the United States by special meetings and conferences, including a conference in Boston at which it was decided to establish a colony in Palestine to be named "Nachlath Massachusetts." The Balfour Declaration was issued Nov. 2, 1917.

The Boston conference also pledged itself to raise funds to redeem 4,000 dunams of land in Palestine upon which the colony will be established. It also decided to subscribe \$100,000 towards the \$2,500,000 loan which the Jewish National Fund is now raising in the United States.

At an inter-faith meeting held in New York to commemorate the anniversary of the Balfour Declaration, three speakers declared that the adequacy of the coming peace will be measured by the extent to which the Jewish problem is solved. The meeting held at B'nai Jeshurun synagogue was addressed by Bishop Francis J. McConnell, Dr. Israel Goldstein and Dr. Clark Eichelberger, director of the League of Nations Association. Bishop McConnell emphasized that "vast masses of American people favor the establishment of Palestine as a Jewish National Home."

The anniversary of the Balfour Declaration was marked in the New York Times by a special editorial, an article on Dr. Chaim Weizmann, and a statement by Dr. J. L. Magnes. The editorial expressed the hope that an Arab-Jewish understanding would be reached, pointing out that the Jewish and the Arab peoples "have much to give to each other and the world." Dr. Weizmann, in the interview in the Times said that he believes that the Arab-Jewish problem can be solved "if a firm stand is taken and the Arabs are told that the Jews will be encouraged to settle in Palestine and will control their own immigration." Dr. Magnes, in his statement, wired from Palestine, expressed regret at the fact that "the Jewish national movement and the Arab national movement are farther apart today than at any time during the past twenty-five years." He also regretted that the Jews and the English in Palestine "are less able now than at any other time to understand one another."

POST-WAR WORLD WILL NOT BE FREE IF PALESTINE IS NOT JEWISH, MANIFESTO SAYS

JERUSALEM, Nov. 2.(JTA)-- "The new world which will be established on the ruins of the old, will not be a world of justice and freedom if it does not bring freedom and redemption to the Jewish nation by fulfillment of the Balfour Declaration," says a manifesto issued here today by the Jewish National Council of Palestine.

The manifesto points out that during the twenty-five years since the Balfour Declaration was issued, "Jewish immigration into Palestine has proved the Jewish nation's resolute will to use the rights given it by the Balfour Declaration, and its readiness to make any sacrifices. It has also proved the tremendous possibilities and blessings for the country derived from Jewish immigration, which has widened Palestine's absorptivity without harming the rights of the local population."

SLOVAKIAN OFFICIAL "ASSURES" JOURNALISTS THAT NO JEW WILL BE LEFT IN SLOVAKIA

ZURICH, Nov. 2.(JTA)-- Slovakia will be a country without Jews within the next few months, Dr. Vasak, an official of the Slovakian Ministry of the Interior, yesterday "assured" a press conference in Bratislava attended by German and Slovakian journalists. Vasak stated that two-thirds of Slovakia's Jews have already been expelled and the remainder will be deported "before the winter is over."

WISE LEAVES FOR MEXICO TO CONFER ON JEWISH MATTERS; WILL BE RECEIVED BY THE PRESIDENT

NEW YORK, Nov. 2. (JTA)-- Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president of the American Jewish Congress, left for Mexico today for a ten-day series of conferences with the officials of the Mexican government and representatives of the Jewish community. He will be received by the President of Mexico and the Secretary of State, among others.

Dr. Wise will be joined in Mexico on Friday by Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the administrative committee of the World Jewish Congress. Among the matters to be discussed by Dr. Wise and Dr. Goldmann with Mexican officials and Jewish representatives is the holding of an Inter-American Jewish Conference in Mexico City in the early Spring.

UNION OF AMERICAN HEBREW CONGREGATIONS DISCUSSES WAR-TIME PROBLEMS

CINCINNATI, Nov. 2. (JTA)-- War-time problems of Jewish religious life were discussed here yesterday at an all-day session of the executive board of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

The board discussed the problem of providing Jewish chaplains for the armed forces and securing replacements for congregations whose rabbis have gone into the army or navy. The question of rabbinical pensions and the 38th Council of the Union, which is scheduled to be held in Toronto next February, were also discussed.

AMERICAN JEWISH YEAR BOOK REPORTS ON JEWISH PARTICIPATION IN WAR EFFORT

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 2. (JTA)-- Reports of Jewish participation and distinction in the American armed forces and in the war efforts of the United Nations are among the new features of the forty-fourth volume of the American Jewish Year Book, issued today by The Jewish Publication Society of America. A full list of Jewish men in the American Army and Navy who received awards, citations, letters of recommendation and important promotions was compiled by the Bureau of War Records of the Jewish Welfare Board, especially for this volume of the Year Book. This is followed by listings of Jewish men who distinguished themselves in the armed forces of the United Nations.

Edited by Harry Schneiderman, assistant secretary of the American Jewish Committee and director of its Library of Jewish Information, and Morris T. Fine, assistant editor, the new volume of the American Jewish Year Book reflects the war situation, especially in the Review of the Year, which summarizes all significant events affecting Jews throughout the world during the past year. This review which covers 200 pages constitutes the largest annual report of Jewish affairs published anywhere in the world and was written by experts in various fields of Jewish communal life and authorities on foreign Jewish communities. The chapters of the review covering the United States deal extensively both with the internal development of Jewish communal life in its religious, social and cultural aspects and the relationship between the Jewish and non-Jewish groups in this country.

OVER 200 JEWISH REFUGEES FROM FRANCE ARRIVE IN BALTIMORE FROM LISBON

BALTIMORE, Nov. 2. (JTA)-- More than 200 Jewish refugees, most of them from Southern France, arrived in Baltimore today on the Portuguese steamers Pero De Alenquer and Carvalho Araujo from Lisbon.

The refugees were met at the pier by representatives of the HIAS, who routed them to relatives in different parts of the country.
