BRITISH JEWS WILL INTERVENE WITH THEIR GOVERNMENT ON STATUS OF JEWS IN NORTH AFRICA

LONDON, Dec. 21.(JTA) -- The Board of Deputies of British Jews today announced that it will make respresentations to the British Government with a view to establishing the exact status of the Jews in North Africa since it is not clear to what extent the Jewish population there has had its rights restored by the Darlan administration.

Lord Nathan, addressing a meeting of the Board of Deputies, urged that the atmosphere of world sympathy for the Jaws in Europe which has been created by the joint declaration of the Allied Nations against the Nazi massacres of Jaws, should be utilized for practical steps. He expressed the opinion that the labor schedule sy tem which the Palestine Government applies in admitting Jawish immigrants should be abolished in the case of Jaws who succeed in escapsing from the Nazis and Nazi-dominated countries. As to the restoration of the Jaws in North Africa to their former positions, he emphasized that "the United Nations have the power to do something there, therefore they must do it."

NAZI FRESS REFORTS SOSNOWIEC IS "JUDENREIN", JEWS SLAUGHTERED IN ROWNO

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 21.(JTA) -- German newspapers reaching here today reported that not a single Jew has been left in the city of Sosnowice, Poland, and that mass-executions of Jews are being carried out in the city of Romo. They also revealed that a number of towns in the Czech Protectorate "have been cleared of Jows" during the last two weeks, including the town of Tabor.

Quoting the Berliner Boersen Zeitung which carries a report on the executions of Jows in Rowno, the Swedish newspaper Swenska Dagbladet says that many Jows from Nazi-cocupied countries of Central and Western Europe are now being transported to the Rowno district which constituted the Polish-Russian border before the war and are undergoing there "a Mological extermination."

AGREEMENT BETWEEN ZIONISTS AND NON-ZIONISTS IN AMERICA LIKELY, SHERTOK REPORTS

LONDON, Dec. 21.(JTA) -- The present negotiations between Zionist and non-Zionist leaders in America with regard to the presentation of joint demands to the peace conference have produced some results and have shown that an agreement on fundamental questions between the two groups is possible, Mosho Shortok, head of the political department of the Jewish Agency, declared here today at a press conference.

Should no final agreement be reached, the Jewish Agency is determined to prosent its demands to the peace conference independently, Shertok added. He stated that he does not intend to proceed to the United States and hopes to return to Palestine scon. He revealed that the prospects of the 1,600 Jews insterned on the island of Mauritius being returned to Palestine "are now slightly better."

RABBIS, LAYMEN OPEN FOUR DAY CONFERENCE TO DRAW UP BASIC PEACE PRINCIPLES

CINCINNATI, Dec. 21.(JTA) -- Leading rabbis and laymen from every section of the United States today participated in the opening session here of a fourday round table which, under the title "American Institute on Judaism and a Just and Enduring Peace," will formulate a statement dealing with the basic prime a ciples of a just and enduring peace in the light of the teachings of Judaism.

In opening the first session of the Institute today at the Hebrew Union . College, Rabbi Fordinand M. Isserman of St. Louis, ohairman of the Commission on Justice and Peace of the Central Conference of the American Rabbis, emphasized that the Institute has been called in accordance with the decision of the last convention of the Central Conference to "invite our brethren of the Household of Israel to aid in the planning of a peace based on the principles of the Rebrew prophets."

"I am not ploading for an Anglo-Sexon dominated peace, any more than I plead for a Russian or a Chinese-dominated peace," Rabbi Isserman said. The peace must have no national tings, unless the national aims coincide with the universal teachings of God as expressed through the prophetsof Israel. It must be super-national and super-racial." Pointing out that the forthooming peace "must be a peace in which all men of all races, of all nations, of all faiths shall have an equal part," and lauding the appointment of Herbert H. Lehman by the U.S. Government to feed and clothe the people of the liberated countries, Rabbi Isserman declared:

"We have gathered to interpret the message of Judaism for the aid of all mankind. Yet we cannot at this tragic hour of Jewish history be silent over the unuttorable wees of decent Jewish men and women in conquered lands, innocont of wrong, whose martyred deaths reveal their moral courage and at the same time the moral disintegration of their murderers. Their plight is not unrelated to the world's wee. It was its forerunner and its warning, which, alas, wont unheaded. The low of history is that there can be no peace for mankind until there is peace for all mankind. In seeking a solution to Israel's post-war problems, we shall be truly tested to see if we shall apply prophetic teachings as rigorously to our own brothern and their plight as we shall demand their application to all human situations. In our final statement, we hope to include suggestions for the treatment of oppressed Jewish minorities, as we shall demand their application to all human situations.

Rosenberg Calls for Unity in American-Jewish Life

Adolph Recemberg, chairman of the executive board of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, addressing the opening session said that Judaism today faces its greatest challenger. "All of our strength must be thrown against him," he stated. "We cannot, we dere not diminish our power by internal dissensions Let us be patient and understanding, so that we may here build a platform upon which we can all stand. Let us submerge our differences for the duration and move forward together through victory to a just and enduring peaces."

Dr. Julian Morgenstern, speaking in behalf of the Hebrew Union College, stated that through bitter exportence following the last war, manishad has learned the sad lesson that the planning and preparation for peace can not be deformed until the war is finished. "Our brethren of the Anglian, Protestant and Roman Cantolic Churches have spoken already and spoken well, now it is indeed the time for Judaism to spoak and to voice its own distinctive message of peace and hope for manished," he said.

ZIONIST EMERGENCY COMMITTEE WARNS COUNCIL FOR JUDAISM ON IMPENDING CONFLICT

NEW YORK, Dec.21.(JTA) -- The American Emergency Committee for Zionist Affairs today released a statement taking issue with the recently formed American Council for Judaism on its attitude towards Zionist aspirations in Palestine.

"The formation by a small group of rabbis of the so-called 'American Council for Judaism' whose avowed object it is to fight the restoration of the Jows as a nation in their own home and, has come as a painful shock to the vast majority of Jows throughout the country," the statement said Signed by Dre Stephon S. Wise, president of the Committee, the statement denounced the American Council for Judaism as being against the policy of the Balfour Declaration which was endorsed by the nations of the world" and warned that "the responsibility for the conflict which impends within American Jewry, if the sponsors of this body proceed with their proposals, is their own. We can only deplore their missignified activities, the sole result of which will be to sow confusion."

MATION'S LEADING JURISTS HONOR BRANDEIS AT SUPREME COURT MEMORIAL LEETING

WASHINGTON, Doc. 21.(JTA) -- The nation's foremost jurists joined today in a memorial service for the late Justice Leuis D. Brandeis of the Supreme Court. Son. George W. Norris, Nobraska Independent who formulated many of Brandeis' ideas into legislation, delivered the key speech at the ceremony. Attorney General Francis Biddle also spece, halling the late Justice as a "great American" who "believed, never doubting, in Democracy."

"The life of Justice Louis D. Brandois will always be a shining star in the broad firmement of American jurisprudence," Senator Morris said. "He loft his mark upon the history of our country. The work he did, and the life he lived, will be an inspiration to these who have never seen his face nor heard his voice. His dissenting opinions have become the law of the land."

Mr. Biddle stressed the fact that Erandais early saw "the threat to this way of life (Democracy) from the opposing view that one race was superior to enother," citing an address by the Justice delivered in Besten 27 years ago, loss than a year after the first World War had begun. "Today," Mr. Biddle concluded, "Brandais takes his place in the moving stream of history as a great American whose life work brought nearer to fulfillment the assentially American belief in equality of opportunity and individual freedom."

Dean Lloyd Garison, dean of the Wisconsin University Law School, praised Brandois' devotion to his work as chairman of the Provisional Commattee for General Zionist Affairs during the critical years 1914-15. Dean Garison prosented resolutions to the meeting testifying to the regret of the bar at the loss of Justice Brandois, acknowledging its debt to his wisdom and recognizing his outstanding qualities of leadership. These resolutions were presented later in the day to the Supreme Court by Mr. Biddle and accepted by Chief Justice Harlen F. Stone as a part of the courts permanent record.
