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UNITED MATICUS URGED TO INSTRUCT GUERRILLA UNITS TO RESCUE JEWS FROM NAZI LANDS

LONDON, Feb. 24, (JTA) -- A suggestion that all Allied commanders and chiefs of guerrilla units be instructed to do their utnost to rescue Jews and political griencers who could be transferred with minimum formulities to countries of safety, was made here today by the Intional Committee for Rescue from Masi Terror to representatives of the United Nations.

Three latters from Jewish leaders in the underground movements in occupied Paland reached here today. Their contents throw light on the despair prevailing among those Jews in Paland who have so far escaped Nasi extermination.

"We believe that the country will be liberated soon, but very few of as will live to see it," says one of the latters. Another letter emphasises the torture which the remaining Jews are still undergoing. "You cannot understand our sufferings," the letter states. "One living in London must have a pathological imagination in order to conserve what is being done to us here. All centers of Jewish life are oblitarated from the face of the earth and their inhabitants have gone to death in torture compa."

The third letter, written by a well known Zionist Lador Leader whose name can not be dissolved for obvious reasons, reads:

There are but a few of us left alive. Some of those still surviving are held in closed camps and they are dosmed, others are still free, living under ginatly conditions under constant threat of death. Each day we come through affely is accepted as purely accidental. Beath has become too common a thing to excite any fear in us. We have acquired a new mentality and a new psychological attitude. If we have any mettirit is only that in spits of everything we have retained our nextle more and idealogical force. This is by no means due to us, but to those values which entered our blood. Thanks to them, the initiative to resist and flight has some to us, who are part of the movement for a labor pelectine.

GERMAN AUTHORITIES IN BELGIUM ARREST ALL TURRISH JEWS THERE; DEFORT TH. 10 CAMPS

LONDON, Feb. 26. (Jun) - All Turkish Jews in complet Helgium, hitherto excepted from the German anti-Jewish laws as a concession to neutral Turkey, were rounded up this week and sent to the Malines concentration comp. Helgium Government afficials reported today.

The Helgian Government-in-Exile announced that it has definitely established that there is no truth to the German reports that Jews from Belgium have been sent to Belland. "Actually these Jews have been departed to Silesia under the most terrible smilltone after being stripped of all their belongings," the amountment said.

A report reaching the Belgian Government here states that the furniture and other belongings confiscated by the German accupation authorities in Belgium from homes of deported Jews are now installed in "homes for German soldiers" which are being established all over Belgium.

STEDEN TRAINSS"RESCUE UNITS" TO SPEED AID TO JEWS AND OTHERS IN EUROPE

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 24. (JTA) -- Special units trained to bring immediate aid to Jess and other personned people in occupied Europe are now being formed in Sweden, from where they will proceed to various sections of the European continent on relief and recome missions as soon as circumstances permit, it was learned here today.

A representative of the Swedish Red Cross, which is organizing these units, is now conducting important talks in London, it was revealed. These talks will result in assisting refugees wherever possible through neutral Sweden.

Heading the Swedish "rescue units" is Prince Carl, a brother of Khigagustav.
The Prince is personally engaged in preparing plans for both immediate and long-term
reliaf programs aimed at facilitating Swedish offort to alleviate the sufferings of
Jess and other people under the Mails, it was indicated.

THENAND TAKES ACTION AGAINST JEWISH PUBLICATION FOR INSULTING "FRIENDLY NATION"

LONDON, Feb. 24. (JTA) -- The Minister of Interior of Eire today told the Dail Eirean that "appropriate action" will be taken against a Jewish youth publication in Dabla for publishing an uncensored article "offensive to a friendly nation." The Minister refused to disclose both the nature of the article and the name of the nation which took exception to it.

In the House of Commons today, Minister of Information Brenden Brecken was saked to take steps against the anti-Jewish propagands contained in the bulletins published by an organization which calls itself the "Medical Policy Association." Mr. Brecken replied that in view of the fact that even Hitler's anti-Semitia ravings made na impression on the people of Britain, he thought that the ravings of the anti-Semitia bulletin could safely be ignored.

The Landon Times today carries a letter from Jerusalem written by Bernard Joseph, acting head of the political department of the Jewish agency, in which exception is taken to the report of the Pelestine correspondent of the paper asserting that Jerusal opposition to the white Paper and the demand for a Jewish Commonwealth is limited to terrorist groups. Mrs. Joseph points out that while leading Jewish bodies strongly condemn the recent terroristic outbreaks in Pelestine as a Jewish Commonwealth.

LARGE JESTSH LIBRARY IN KHARROV SAVED FROM DESTRUCTION BY GERMANS

1005COW, Feb. 24. (JTA) -- The bulk of the 50,000 volumes in the Jewish section of the Karolenka Library at Kharkov escaped destruction by the Germans during their occupation of the city, it was reported here today by a young Jewish officer who was with the Red Army forces that libraried the Utraine center. Among the volumes are true encient works from Amstardam, Leghorn, Pias Koretz, Slavuta, Grodne, Villa, Frankfurt and Venice, and large quantities of rabbinical and talmudic literature.

The officer revealed that during the shelling of Kharkov, prior to its capture by the Maxis, the upper stories of the Karcienka Library were destroyed and hundreds of the seas of masonry and other debris cell into the lower story, where the Jewish collection as housed. During their occupation of the city the Germans destroyed all the volumes of the library which were found scattered in the debris, but missed the buried Jewish volumes. They were unsarthed when the Russians receptured the city.

AMERICAN JEWISH SERVICEMEN OVERSEAS CONCERNED OVER ANTI-JEWISH INCIDENTS AT HOME

NEW YORK, Feb. 24. (JTA) — Jewish men in the United States forces overseas are greatly concerned with the anti-Semitic incidents which have occurred at home, it was disclosed teday by Rabbi Barnett Brickmer, who has just returned from a visit to Jewish servicemen in all theatres of the war, except the Pacific, as a representative of the Mational Jewish Welfare Board.

At the same time, Rabbi Brickner reported that among the fighting men racial and religious prejudices are being broken down. "The troops of all faiths," he said, "are not interested in narrow denominationalism, but rather in whether a man is doing his job efficiently and to the best interests of all."

Jewish coldiers, he declared, are greatly interested in the plight of the Jewish refugees in Europe and in the situation in Palestine. This is true, Dr. Brickner said, of not only American troops, but of Palestinian units, which he saw in Italy, Morth Africa, Sicily and Egypt, and of British and other Allied forces. The Palestinians, particularly, he declared, attempt to assist the Jewish refugees with whom they come in contact in liberated territory.

While in Italy, Dr. Brickner saw several refugee camps where Jews who had fled from occupied Northern Italy and from other places were quartered. Among them were Jews of many nationalities who had found refuge in Italy before anti-jewish measures were introduced there. While praising the assistance rendered the refugees by the British and American military authorities, especially the Jewish chaplains, Rabbi Brickner stressed the necessity for the immediate dispatch to liberated areas of civilian Jewish social workers with adequate facilities to help the refugees rebuild their lives.

Brickner Describes Jewish Life in "Neglected Communities"

Even in the most remote places he visited, where there were hardly enough Jewe to constitute a community, individual Jewish families performed superhuman feats in entertaining Jewish troops, Rabbi Brickner stated. In the countries of the Caribbean and in India, for example, Jewish families made special efforts to receive Jewish soldiers in their homes where they were "wined and dined." In Palestine, where he spent some time, Dr. Brickner saw the large modern service clubs which the Jewish community has provided for Allied soldiers of all faiths and nations. American soldiers stationed in the Middle East, he said, look upon Palestine as an "oasis of settern life" in the midst of unfemiliar living conditions and customs.

During his tour Dr. Brickner had occasion to visit what he described as the "meglected Jewish communities" in sections of India, Iran, and North Africa. These less live amidst filth and squalor, he revealed, with little if any contact with other less. He urged that young Jewish rabbis from America and Britain go into these committee as "missionaries" to raise the standards of living and to make modern educational and outlural facilities available.

Among the highpoints of his trip, Rabbi Brickmer said, was a conference in Sples of Jewish chaplains of the American, British, French and other Allied forces, were plans were discussed for the holding of joint Passover services next month; and his meeting in Algeria with some of the Jewish residents who had functioned as an "illied fifth column" during the period of Vichy rule and who helped to pave the way for the Allied invasion.

HED CROSS WILL PROVIDE JEWISH INTERNEES AND WAR PRISONERS WITH MATZOTH

THATE AGREEMENT WITH SEYPT WILL NOT MATERIALLY IMPROVE PALESTINE FOOD SITUATION

JERUSALEM, Feb. 24. (JTA) — Despite the trade agreement just concluded between Egypt and Palestine, the food situation here will not be materially improved, informed sources pointed out today. Because of prior commitments to the Middle East Supply Center, Egypt is unable to provide the foods which Palestine needs to raise nutritional standards, such as whenty, rice and sugar. Some barleys, bran and small quantities of secondary foodstuffs will be shipped and the conference agreed that the shippents will be increased when conditions warrants.

For its basic food requirements, Falestine will have to turn to the Middle Bast Supply Center, which controls most of the available food supplies in this area. It is reported that Falestine food authorities will open talks with Supply Center quantities this week-and where they will discuss the possibility of importing larger quantities of essential foods. They will probably also discuss with the supply officials the question of clearance for raw materials which Egypt is willing to expert if amovael is granted.

The principal commodity which Palestine will expert to Egypt will be oranges. The Egyptian mission space of importing "considerable quantities," but as yet no definite amount has been fixed. Local citrus growers, faced with the loss of the present happer crop, are anxiously sweiting official word on what relief they can expect. In the mentine they have postponed an emergency conference called to discuss the crisis in the industry.

Another expect to Egypt will be pharmaceutical products, which it meets bedly, and also some manufactures which are produced in Egypt in only limited quantities. Expect of the latter depends on whether Pelestine producers on offer the Egyptians a stiefactory prior. This involves the whole question of the high production costs here, which are the result of the inflationary rise in the cost of living. The Middle But Supply Center will also have to approve Pelestine imports of now materials, in order to make possible the expect of manufactured items to Egypts. Included are materials from the United States which are used in the manufacture of atabrine which is meeted to combat a malarin epitiemic now reging in upper Egypts.

HABBI KATZ, CHAPLAIN TO AMERICAN JEWISH SERVICEMEN IN NEW ZEALAND, DIES

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Feb. 10. (JTA) — By Airmail — Rabbi Solomon Kats, who as senior rabbi of New Zealand had for the past two years been acting as chaplein the Jewish Welfers Heard to American Jewish servicement in this country, died here today. He was instrumental in securing the entry of hundrods of Jewish refugees into the Zealand.

Hown in Kelbrash, Russin, Rabbi Katz was a graduate of Jew's College, London and the Jewish Theological Seminary. After living for some years in England, Rabbi Ket served in Auckland New Zerland, and came to the United States in 1920. A member of the Rabbinion! Assembly of the U.S., he served ongregations in New York, Elraing—am, Ale,, and New Rechelle, before returning to New Zerland in 1931 to be Senior Rabbi for the Wellington Hebrew Congregation, which he served until his deaths.
