OUSE OF LORDS WILL DISCUSS ANTI-SEMITISM IN POLISH ARMY; FOLISH INQUIRY HELD BLASED

LONDOW, April 13. (JTA) -- The question of anti-Semitism in the Polish Lemy, which was discussed in the House of Commons last week, will shortly be reised in the House of Lords, it was announced here today by Tom Driberg, Independent member of Commons.

"The question of the mistreatment of Jewish soldiers in the Polish armed forces is by no means settled," Briberg said. "The attempts on the part of the Polish Inquiry commission to minimize the anti-Sentic outbreaks would be more convincing if the constitution and the procedure of this commission were clearly shown to be impartial. The commission of five included four officers of the Polish Army and not even one Jew. Nor was any Allied liason officer invited to join this commission, despite the interest taken by the British Government in the matter."

"We shall continue to draw the Government's attention to this blot on the allied war effort until it is removed by the transfer of the Jewish men to an army where they will be treated as human beings," Driberg declared.

Polish Authorities Bar Jew from Party Performing for Troops

Sir Herbert Bunnico, who is in charge of arranging concerts by the governmentsponsored ENSA organization for the entertainment of British and Allied troops, today revealed that the Polish authorities did not allow him to include a Jew in a concert program which was to be given for Polish soldiers.

The Jewish Chronicle in a leading article featured under the title "Back to the Jungle" today analyzes the Jewish position in the Polish Army. It is pessimistic with regard to Polish-Jewish relations, and assails "the decision to leave the Polish Jewish soldiers in the infermo of murderous hatred and demy them access to British ranks." The paper suggests that the problem be solved by establishing special Jewish units in the British armed forces into which the Jewish soldiers could be transferred. Emphasizing that Polish anti-Semitism did not start with the present war, the Jewish Chronicle expresses the hope that British pressure will not be exerted "to make exiled Polish Jews go down to hell again."

Designmik Polski, official organ of the Polish Government, today expresses regret that the debate in Commons on the question of anti-Semitism in the Polish Army has received so much publicity. "In the present situation, every attempt to destroy solidarity between Jews and Poles who are fighting the same enemy for the same cause must be met with condemnation," the paper writes.

Anti-Semitism is Internal Polish Affair, Gazeta Polska Says

JERUSALEM, April 13. (JTA) -- The debate in Parliament on anti-Semitism in the Folish Army is being used as "camouflage" for other purposes, it is charged today in Gazeta Polska, official Polish newspaper published chiefly for the Polish troops in the Middle East. It esticizes the Reuter news agency for "giving prominence to second rate official pronouncements regarding anti-Jewish feelings in the Polish armed forces and emphasizes that anti-Semitism in the Folish Army "is an internal Polish affair" which will be fought against by Jewish representatives in the Polish Mational Council.

GOVERNOR OF NEW YORK ESTABLISHES COMMISSION TO STUDY RACIAL DISCRIMINATION

NEW YORK, April 15. (JTA) -- A commission to study practices of racial and religious discrimination in New York State and to recommend remedial legislation will be established as result of a bill signed yesterday by Governor Thomas E. Dewey. The commission will be composed of 25 members, fifteen of whom will be appointed by the Governor. The other eight are to be members of the State Legislature to be appointed by legislative leaders.

The Governor's bill creating the new commission declares that practices of discrimination against any inhabitants of the state because of race, color, creed or national origin are matters of state concern that threaten "the rights and proper privileges" of the inhabitants of the state and menace "the institutions and foundation of a free democratic state."

Acting on the Governor's recommendation, the legislature sidetracked all pending anti-discrimination bills to await the commission's report, to be submitted at next year's legislative session. Eight members of the state war council committee on discrimination resigned in protest because two bills which it had recommended were among those sidetracked. One of these bills provided for the creation of a civil rights bureau in the Department of Law to combat discrimination and the other would be made it unlawful for employers and labor unions to practice racial and religious discriminations
