PARIS RADIO REPORTS RELEASE OF ALL INTERNED JEWS THROUGHOUT LIBERATED FRANCE

ZURICH, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- The release of all Jews from internment camps in the liberated parts of France was announced today over the Paris radio.

The Bratislava radio today reported that a Bratislava Jew, Dr. Kohn, who escaped from a Slovak labor camp, has been named a member of the Czechoslovak National Committee in Bank-Bystrica which is now occupied by partisans awaiting the entrance of Russian troops into Czechoslovakia.

German newspapers reaching here report increased anti-Jewish measures in Slovakia and in Hungary. The Slovak press utilizes the uprisings of Slovakian partisans in various sections of the country to accuse Jews of organizing and leading partisan units and to ask for stricter measures against them. "Vigorous elimination of Jews" is also demanded in broadcasts over the Nazi-controlled Bratislava radio which constantly emphasizes that Jews are leading the partisans in Slovakia.

SWEDISH ORGANIZATIONS POLL REFUGEES FROM GERMANY ON QUESTION OF RETURN TO REICH

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- With the defeat of Germany in sight, Swedish relief groups are now distributing a questionnaire among refugees from Germany and Austria who have been living in Sweden for several years asking them whether they intend to return to their native lands after the war is over.

The Swedish press today renewed its warning to Hungary regarding the consequences of the intensified anti-Jewish persecution. The same papers also address a warning to Germany which has refused to permit the passage of Jews from Hungary to Sweden through the Reich.

The Dagens Nyheter, leading Swedish newspaper, says: "The new Swedish demarche to the Hungarian Government with regard to the Jewish situation there has a disquieting background. Reports from Budapest indicate increased German pressure in dealing with the Jewish question. The Hungarians find it difficult at present to resist this pressure. Continued alertness, and if necessary demarches, have been promised by Sweden and Switzerland. All influential circles in Hungary and Germany must understand that those cooperating in the oppression of defenseless Jews will be punished. Even sins of omission may be judged seriously. Let Germans and Hungarians beware!"

Meanwhile, it was reported here today that the Hungarian Government is speeding the disposal of confiscated Jewish property, especially farm land. Another report stated that all Jewish men and women throughout Hungary, between 14 and 70 years of age, have been called up for labor service to work on fortifications under an order issued by the War Minister.

25,000 JEWS ALIVE IN GREECE, MANY JOINED GUERRILLAS, GREEK MINISTER REPORTS

CAIRO, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Twenty-five thousand Jews have survived the German persecutions in Greece but they are in dire need, it was reported here today by Finance Minister Alexander Svolos.

Svolos, who recently arrived from Greece, where he was president of the Greek Liberation Committee, said five thousand of the survivors were hiding in the mountains, protected by the partisans. Many, including refugees from occupied Macedonia, joined the guerrillas.

Svolos, who came with five other leftwing leaders to participate in the new national unity government, said every trace of racialism would be wiped out in Greece after the liberation and all Greek Jews would be fully integrated into Greek national life. (There were 72,000 Jews in Greece before the war. The majority were deported to death camps in Poland or died of undernourishment and disease.)

GESTAPO SLIP-UP SAVES LIVES OF AGED JEWS IN FRANCE; VILLAGERS SHELTERED FUGITIVES

GRENOBLE, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Eighty-five aged, feeble Jews who were deported to this city from Germany over a year ago are alive today due to a slip-up somewhere in the usually efficient Gestapo machinery. Most of them are German Jews, but a few are French and Belgians who had been deported to Germany and inexplicably sent back here and forgotten.

Sixty-five of them have been living in a public home for the aged here while the other 20 were scattered in private homes in the countryside. They were provided with food and other supplies by the underground Jewish organization. The inmates of the home wept with joy, laughed and prayed yesterday when a representative of the committee drove up openly and began unloading supplies.

The story of how another 40 Jews were saved from death by the villagers of the Alpine town of Allemont was told to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent today by Edmund Kahn, who was a jeweler in Paris. The villagers sheltered the Jews for more than a year without disclosing their presence even when the Nazis occupied the town during a week-long drive against the Maquis in the area, he revealed.

The situation of the Jews in Lyon, which a JTA correspondent has just visited, is less clear than in Grenoble. Since complete order has not yet been established there, most of the Jews have not abandoned their false identification papers and come out into the open. It is impossible, therefore, to estimate what proportion of Jews are still alive there. As a group of American correspondents came into Lyon they were greeted with the words: "We are very glad to see you here. We have suffered very much." The speaker was a young Parisian Jew named Alfred Haguenauer whose family has been hiding there for three years.

OSE RESUMES WORK IN PARIS AND BUCHAREST; AIDS 1,400 JEWISH ORPHANS IN RUMANIA

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- The American committee of Ose, Jewish Health Society, today received a cable from its representative in Switzerland stating that Ose offices have resumed their activities in Paris and in Bucharest. The Paris office is headed by Dr. Minkovsky.

The office of the Ose in Bucharest, the cable said, is now engaged in placing 1,400 Jewish orphans in children's homes. The children were returned from Transnistria and are to proceed to Palestine at the first opportunity. Dr. Jancu, president of the "Save the Children" organization is the head of the Ose office in Bucharest.

J.T.A. OPENS OFFICE IN MEXICO; PUBLISHING NEWS BULLETIN FOR LATIN-AMERICAN COUNTRIES

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- The first issue of a daily news bulletin issued by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in the Spanish language made its appearance here today, following the opening of a J.T.A. office in Mexico by Mr. Jacob Landau, managing director. The news bulletin will reach all Latin-American countries.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency's news service in Mexico will be edited by Leon Gruszko, well-known writer and contributor to Spanish-American publications. Mr. Gruszko was the editor of Mundo Judio in Santiago, Chile, for more than four years.

WORLD JEWISH CONGRESS FORMULATES DEMANDS TO UNRRA CONFERENCE IN MONTREAL

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- The World Jewish Congress today announced that it will "present the Jewish case" in a memorandum to the forthcoming session of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration which will open in Montreal on September 15. The summary of the "Jewish case" to be presented outlines the following points:

1. That the Jewish problem be treated as distinctive of all others, since the Jews were singled out as victims of brutality everywhere in Nazi-dominated Europe, and since the number of displaced Jews is 5 times larger than that of Poles, 11 times that of Belgians, 13 times that of the French, 30 times that of the Greeks and 140 times larger than the number of displaced Norwegians. Approximately 90 per cent of the Jewish survivors of Europe are displaced persons.

2. That the Jews should be represented at the UNRRA Councils as observers and should attend the meetings of the standing committees on Displaced Persons, Health and Welfare. That UNRRA should have Jews on its staff to perform the relief work in Jewish communities.

3. That displaced persons of enemy or ex-enemy nationality who were victims of the Nazis because of racial, religious or political persecutions should be taken care of by UNRRA and assisted in their return, repatriation or re-settlement, even if their forced displacement occurred before the formal outbreak of the war.

The total number of displaced Jews in Europe is estimated at 4,100,000 -- approximately 2,100,000 from Nazi-dominated areas, and about 2,000,000 from territories under the control of the United Nations or neutral countries. "Among these millions of people there will be many who for justifiable reasons will not wish to return to their former homes," the memorandum says. "It is urged that UNRRA include the settlement of these persons in a suitable place, preferably Palestine, as a regular part of its program."

LEADER OF "MOTHERS OF AMERICA" ATTACKS JEWS AT HEARING BEFORE SENATE COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Testifying today before the Senate Education and Labor Sub-Committee's hearing on a measure to establish a Permanent Fair Employment Practice Commission to fight racial discrimination in employment, Mrs. Agnes Waters, leader of "The Mothers of America," attacked Jews and Negroes as being behind the bill.

"Why should Negroes and Jews be given the jobs of white men?" she stated. "Jews hold the finest jobs in the government. They came here a generation ago and rose from peddlers to become the richest merchants of this country. They own most of the stores, theatres and movies, and became millionaires. If we wanted to really deal with them, we would refuse to buy in their stores or go to their movies. And we will do it if they get obnoxious."

SYNAGOGUE COUNCIL OF AMERICA DISCUSSES ELIMINATION OF POSTWAR ANTI-SEMITISM

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- Elimination of postwar anti-Semitism, cooperation between all religious forces for the establishment of a just social order, and the deepening of moral and religious roots at home and abroad, were the principal questions discussed here at a conference of the Synagogue Council of America held yesterday at the Hotel Waldorf Astoria, at which the new administration, headed by Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, took office.

Rabbi Israel Goldstein, the retiring president of the Council, called anti-Semitism social leprosy and said that the treatment of the Jew has become the barometer of civilization. "As the former Nazi satellites break away from the master gangster, one of their first acts is to make a show of repentance by rescinding their official anti-Semitism," he stated. "It remains to be seen how genuine is the repentance. Yet the fact that it is deemed expedient to disavow anti-Semitism in order to be included in decent company is itself worth noting. The same standards should be applied in our domestic scene."

Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, the incoming president, reminded the delegates that most of the religious institutions of European Jewry have been destroyed and that it devolves upon American Israel to help rebuild them. He called for a strengthening of our religious forces at home. Rabbi Ahron Opher, assistant to the president, reviewed the achievements of the Council in the past year.

The Synagogue Council of America is the representative body of all religious branches of American Jewry, rabbinical and congregational. Its delegates are chosen by the Central Conference of American Rabbis, Rabbinical Assembly of America, Rabbinical Council of America, Union of American Hebrew Congregations, Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, and the United Synagogue of America.

JEWISH WORKERS ALLIANCE OPENS FOUR-DAY NATIONAL CONFERENCE IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Sept. 7 (JTA) -- The annual conference of the Jewish National Workers' Alliance, labor Zionist fraternal order, opened here today at the Hotel Astor, attended by delegates from more than 100 cities in the United States and Canada. The conference will last four days.

The Alliance, which has a membership of over twenty-five thousand, raised over a million dollars during the past year for the upbuilding of Palestine, through the Geverkshaften Campaign, for the Histadruth, Jewish National Fund, United Jewish Appeal and other Palestinian institutions. The Alliance branches also raised large sums of money for the Red Cross, United Service Organizations, National War Fund, and other war activities.

AMERICAN FUND FOR PALESTINE INSTITUTIONS DISTRIBUTES \$150,000 IN PALESTINE

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. (JTA) -- The American Fund for Palestinian Institutions, coordinating through a united campaign, the fund-raising drives of 52 Palestinian religious, secular, educational, cultural, and social welfare agencies, today reported that it has distributed \$150,000 to its beneficiaries during the Jewish calendar year now ending.

Among the numerous institutions receiving support there are the Palestine Symphony Orchestra-\$20,000; Hechalutz Farms-\$18,000; Palestine Hebrew Culture Fund Keren Hatarbut-\$15,000; Yemenite Children-\$9,000; David Yellin Teachers Seminary-\$8,000; Habimah Theatre-\$8,000; Physical Education-\$8,000; Hungarian Kollel-\$10,000; Haifa Nautical School-\$5,000; Ezrath Nashim Hospital for Mental Diseases-\$5,000; Tel-Aviv Theological College-\$5,000.
