THE PABBI OF ROME BECOMES CONVERTED TO CATHOLICISM; JEWISH COMMUNITY ASTONISHED

ROME, Feb. 142 (JTA) - Dr. Israel Anton Zolli, for seven years Chief Rebbi of today announced that he has become converted to catholicism. The announcement said that Dr. Zollies wife and daughter have also renounced Judaism and have been exerted as converts by the Catholic Church.

In recognition of the humanitarian work which the pope did in behalf of Jews during the German occupation of Rome, Dr. Zolli, who resigned as Chief Rabbi on Feb.l, is taking the name of Eugenia Maria, which was the name of the Pope before he was elevated to his present office, the announcement, which appeared in the newspapers here, added. w. Zolli could not be reached for a statement.

The disclosure of their former Chief Rabbits conversion was received with astonishmut by the Jewish community of Rome. Joseph Nathan, head of the Union of Italian Jews, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent that "we had no intimation of Zolli's plans, All we know is what we have read in the newspapers, Naturally, we are sorry," becontinued, "but the less said about it the better." A few days ago Dr. Zolli commissted with Mr. Nathan informing him that he could not accept appointment as head of the Rabbinical College here, which is to reopen soon, because of "personal reasons,"

Other members of the local Jewish community told the JTA correspondent that Dra felli has for a long time been primarily concerned with scholarly studies and out of twoh with his community. His reaent resignation brought the gap between him and the temmity into the open. Zolli told the JTA a few days ago that he felt estranged from the Jewish community and expressed his unwillingness to accept any new responsibilities from it.

Born in Brody, Eastern Galicia, in 1881, Zolli studied for the rabbinate in Vienna, In 1918 he was appointed Chief Rebbi of Trieste, a post he held until he became Chief Robbi of Rome in 1938.

Dr. Stephen S. Wise Expresses Amasement at Conversion of Dr. Zolli

MW YORK, Feb. 14. (JTA) - Commenting today on the announcement by Chief Rabbi Israel Zolli of Rome that he has become converted to Catholicism, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Mobil of the Free Synagogue here and president of the American and World Jewish Con-Fesses, said, "Naturally, I am amazed, as every jew will be amazed, to learn of the so called conversion to Roman Catholicism of the Chief Rabbi of Rome and the members of his furtly. What lay behind this, I do not know, excepting that I have heard of certain things which surely have nothing to do with the change of a man's innermost faith, The Citief Rabbi has met with kindness at the hands of the Vatican and has had differences with his own flocks

"If it be the duty of a private to stand at his post, what shall we say of a General, the man in highest command. It will only be fair to wait and see what Dr. Zolli has to say about his advent into the Roman Catholic Church. It will take a great deal of explaining on his part to make intelligible the substitution by a Chief Rabbi of the Jowish Community of his own simple, reasonable, ethical faith for a faith which departs from the monotheism which prozollits and my people have upheld for nearly 4,000 years.

DIED PAISTINE APPEAL ISSUES STATEMENT ON DISSOLUTION OF UNITED JEWISH APPEAL

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MEM NURK, Feb. 14. (JTA) — Emphasizing that "statements concerning the reasons for the disolution of the United Jewish Appeal can serve no useful purpose in this period which destiny for the Jewish people," Robbi James G. Heller, national online of the mited Pelestine Appeal and of the United Jewish Appeal, today issued a statement calling upon American Jews to give their widest support to the reconstruction of the Jewish Mincel Home in Palestine to solve the problem of Jewish homelessness in Europe. "Phrough the channel of the United Jewish Appeal the Jews of America, during the put it years, extended their sympathetic support to the United Palestine Appeal as will us the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Refugee Service. Statements onering the reasons for the dissolution of the United Jewish Appeal can serve no making purpose in this period of high destiny for the Jewish people.

We have given the problems of this year's campaign long and careful consideration, the primary regard for the welfare of our brothers abroad who have always been and will autime to be our chief concern. In conducting its 1945 campaign the United Palestine pred recognizes the authority and central importance of local welfare funds. The prish welfare funds are the great symbol of unity in American Jewish life. They now have directly in decisions which will weigh heavily in the determination of the future of the surviving remnants of the Jewish people.

The needs of the United Falestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee are gest. Regardless of whether the appeals in their behalf are made to the communities independently or in combination, we feel confident that American Jewry will meet the sepaded opportunities to sustain the Jews of Europe in this transition period and to sesure for the vast majority of them a permanent and secure future in the Jewish Mational School in Falestine. In these terms the United Falestine Appeal calls upon the Jews of the United States to give their support in unmatched degree to Eretz Israel.

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The statement indicates also that the failure to reach a UJA agreement in no way reduce the need for support of the causes served by the former UJA constituents. "The needs for 1945 both for general overseas relief, rescue and rehabilitation falling within the scope of the JDC and for the Palestinian programs financed through the UPA are probably greater now than they were at any previous time. The Council feels that the melfare funds should speedily readjust their campaign plans to the separate appeals for the purpose of raising the largest possible amount for all causes and for the purpose of preserving and strengthening communal solidarity which is more important now than ever before."

MANA STATEMENT CRITICISED FOR FAILING TO INCLUDE MEASURES AGAINST ANTI-SEMITISM

LONDON, Feb. 14. (JTL) — Regret that the statement issued at the conclusion of the Rossevelt-Churchill-Stalin conference in Yalta did not include any assurance that anti-Senitism will be curbed by "decisive steps" after the war was expressed here to-day by Harold J. Easki in an article on the conference of the "Big Three".

"I regret that no assurance was given to that people which has suffered as no ther people has suffered since Hitler's advent to power, that the United pations will ake decisive steps against a recurrence anywhere — even in Dorchester, Mass, — of anti-Sentitism," Mr. Laski writes. "For when Hitler and his gong are overthrows, thore will still be a considerable number of duodecime imitators — Mosley in England, Taker Coughlin and Gerald Smith in the United States and Mayor Camille Houde in Cana—who need to be told in unmistakeable tarms that when the war ends there ends with it the phastly tragedy of anti-sentium.

"I say this because there is, alas, a considerable volume of evidence to show that fithers poison has seeped into immunerable veins. None of the three men at yalta have the tense much to relieve the tragic burden the Jews have had to bear since 1935. It would not have been too much to expect had they given this forlorn, unhappy people a pledge that they will not have suffered in value."

FRENCH GOVERNMENT DECIDES TO SUBHIT TO ASSEMBLY PLAN FOR RESTITUTION OF JEWISH PROPERTY

PARIS, Feb. 14. (JTA) — The French government has decided to submit to the Consultative Assembly its projected ordinance for the restitution to their original owners of properties and outcrprises seized from Jews and others under the Vichy racial laws. That intention was contained today in a communique issued after a meeting of the cabinets.

According to the Ministry of Information, the ordinance "concerns the category of the property confiscated by the Vichy government or the German authorities, and ceded to acquirers who did not always act in bad faith." The text going to the Consultative assembly in virtually the same as the draft recently propared by the Ministry of Firstee and which was severely criticised by some of those who studied it on grounds that it made recovery of property by the original owners a long and difficult process, and because it established the rights of the Vichy acquirers, which had been denied them by the present government before the liberations.

There have been certain amendments of this draft to meet some of these objections, but it is understood that they do not affect the basic principles of the measure. According to Felix Gouin, president of the Consultative Assembly, the measure will come up for action within the month. It is generally expected, however, that in its Pessut form it will have rough handling in that body, and that further amendments may be required to meet objections within the assembly.

MUSTIME MOURNS DEATH OF HENRIETTA SZOLD; SIMPLE RITES MARK BURIAL CEREMONY

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ERUSAIEM, Febe 14e (JTA) — Simple rites marked the funeral today of Henrietta stalk, founder of Hodassah, who died of a heart attack last night in her room at the missah mursing School, on Mt. Scopus, at the age of 84. She was buried on the Mount of alives.

All jewish institutions throughout the country flew their flags at half mast, murning the death of the "mother in Israel". Work did not stop because Miss Szold had abuys opposed any cessation of work in Jewish institutions in palestine. The Jewish genry for palestine and the Jewish National Council issued a joint tribute emphasizing the loss suffered by the Jewish people.

Representatives of the 12,000 young jewish refugees whose settlement in palestine ms made possible by the youth Aliyah, of which Miss Szold was the leading spirit, erived here during the day from settlements throughout the country to attend the funeral of the woman who was the heart and soul of the youth Aliyah movement. The funeral took place at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and there were no culogies.

Mss Szold was stricken with pneumonia last August, but recovered sufficiently to neume her work at improvised offices in the Henricta Szold School of Nursing, adjacent to the Rothschild-Hadassah University Hospital from which she continued her activities until she was again stricken with double pneumonia and was confined to the kepital.

The entire Hebrew press appeared today with black-bordered pages carrying warm tributes to hiss szold and publishing lengthy biographical articles.

Born in Baltimore, Maryland, Miss Szold was the daughter of the well-known Rabbi, Smignin Szold, She was educated in Hebrew, French and German by her father and in the philic schools of the city, When the Jewish publication Society of America was founded, his Szold become its secretary in 1898, a post she held until 1916.

In the 1890's when thousands of Russian Jewish immigrants fled to America from the pogroms in Russia, hiss Szold started a new activity, when she became one of the first women in America to engage in Americanization work. She organized classes where Bussian Jewish immigrants were taught the language, customs and the ideals of America.

In 1909 Miss Szold went to palestine for the first time. She was herrified by the Bear East standards of living which prevailed in palestine under a Turkish regime and was galvanized into action. She returned to America the following year, and in 1912 organized a group of women whose specific task was to bring modern methods of medical science into palestines. Her unique talents as an organizer, her broad jewish teatground and her compelling personality were in a large measure responsible for rading this group, which became known as Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, one of the largest and most influential Zionist bodies in the world.

In 1930, the jewish National Council of Palestino elected her a member, with a particlic in health. After the advent of Hitler when German jewish children had to be resued from the Nazi regime, Miss Szold bocame director of the movement which has sime brought children to Palestine from Germany, Austria, Hungary, Rumania, Czechoslovskia, Foland, France, Italy, Denmark, Sweden, Bulgaria, Italy, from the north coast of Africa, from India, and even from far-amay Japans Thousands of these children have been wanderers for years. Many were resoued from countries of temporary refuge. The majority are orphans.
