PRESIDENT .. SKED IN SENITE TO WIRN GERMINS OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR MURDER OF JEYS

W.SHINGTON, April 19. (JTA) -- A statement by President Harry S. Trumon or Searctary of State Edward R. Stettinius impressing on the German people their responsibility for crimes against Jews of Lxis nationality as well as atrocities in slave labor camps is asked in a resolution introduced today in the senate by Sonators Claude Pepper of Florida and Leverett Saltonstall of Masachusetts.

The resolution, which was referred to the committee on Foreign Relations. asks not only that the German people be informed of their responsibility for such crimes to be classified as war crimes, but that the statement be combined with "an appoil to the Gormans expressing the abhorrence of the American people to the mass murder of Joss, and warning the Germans that just punishment will be meted out to every participant in this appalling orime."

The resolution further asks announcement by a "responsible authority" that the asked for declaration by the President or Secretary of State will be official policy to be implemented by the United Nations War Crimes Commission and by the Army of Occupation in Gormany.

The late Major General Maurice B. Rose of Denver, who was killed by the Germus after having been captured, was lauded as a great soldier by Representative loui H. Gilospie of Donver yesterday in the House, and announcement was made of the num-sectarian hospital to be built in Denver in honor of Rose. Declaring General Rose's military record "a credit to the flag he served and to the country which deplores what appears to be his cold blooded murder." Representative Gilespie said the heapital association planning the memorial received contributions of several hundred thousand dellars within a few hours of the announcement.

ETB OF H. LF-MILLION DEPORTED HUNGIRLIN JEWS REVELLED; MOST CREMITED IN OSWIECIM

WITH U.S. 4TH ARMORED DIVISION IN GERMANY, April 19. (JTA) -- The mystery of what happened to the bulk of the 500,000 Jows deported from Hungary by the Germans was sloared up here today by one of the Jowish slave laborers from a munitions factory in litenberg, who was freed yesterday by units of this division.

Ludwig Penko, a former Berlin economist, who was confined in the Oswiccim death samp in Poland before being sont to Germany for slave labor, reports that he, perimally, sow a roport concorning 350,000 Hungarian Jows who arrived at the samp. Of these, he said, 315,000 were eremented and 55,000 were sent to forced 1 bor.

WISH LE DERS IN LONDON MEET WITH MEMBERS OF BRITISH DELEGATION TO SAN FRANCISCO

LONDON, ..pril 19. (JT.) -- Leaders of the Board of Deputics of British Jews have met with leading members of the British delegation to the San Francisco Conference it was revealed here by Prof. Solig Brodetsky, president of the Board.

The meeting was held for the purpose of establishing contact between the makers of the British delegation and the two representatives of the Board of Deputies where proceeding to San Francisco as observers. The two are A. G. Brotman, secretary of the Board, and Councillor Moss of Manchester.

The foreign committee of the Board was criticised at a plonary session of foreign interesting for cooperating only with the imerican Jowish Conference and with the field Jowish Congress. H. A. Goodman, leader of the igudas Israel, said that by limiting its cooperation to these two bodies, the Board of Deputies is encouraging a split is Jowish ranks and is creating an "international caucus," arousing dissatisfaction many the Jows of England. Cther members of the Board, including Dr. Israel Foldman and the Brail Brith loader Maurice G. Liverman, similarly complained that the basis for emulations with other Jowish control bodies is "too marrow."

Prof. Brodotsky, replying, emphasized that Councillor Moss was appointed by the foreign committee as one of the Board's two representatives at San Francisco "be-case he is not connected with any caucus."

"Mr. Moss and Mr. Brotman have been instructed to endeavor to obtain maximum coperation in their consultations with other Jowish groups," Prof. Brodetsky said, "To must, however, realise that the real issue is the difference of attitude of various latish organizations with regard to the Palestine question. It is clear without doubt that the views represented by myself in connection with this question are shared by an earnhalming majority of the Juws in England and the world over." Prof. Brodetsky's stand was supported by Norman Jacobs, Phineas Horowitz and Levy Bakstansky.

Meanwhile, it was amounced here today that Sir Robert Waley Cohen is leaving for New York shortly, as a representative of the ingle-Jowish issociation, to contain the imerican Jewish leaders on issues affecting Jews which may come up at San Armisso.

Max Gottschalk, special European representative of the imerican Jowish Committee, is also leaving for New York after spending several months visiting Britain, ingium and Holland. Mr. Gottschalk told the Jewish Telegraphic ignory that he had deceased Jowish post-war problems with the principal Jowish organizations here on the hais of the program of the american Jowish Sommittee, and had cooperated closely with the Bard of Deputies and the ingle-Jowish issociation. He also saw Zionist leaders with whom he discussed joint action at San Francisco.

R. S.YS J.D.C. REJECTED PROPOSIL FOR RECONSTITUTION OF U.J.I. THROUGH /REITRITION

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) - The United Palestine Appeal today issued a statement asserting that the Joint Distribution Committee has rejected its proposal for reconstitution of the United Jowish Appeal through arbitration. The UPA statement rads as follows:

" on April 17, the United Palestine Appeal, responding to the expressed wish of may communities for the reconstitution of the United Jowish Appeal, offered to submit to unconditional arbitration with regard to the terms and provisions of an egreement reconstituting the United Jowish Appeal and with regard to all aspects of perference thereunder, such arbitration to be administered by impertial persons chosen juicity by the J.D.C. and U.P.A. This proposal, containing no reservation, was rested by the Joint Distribution Committee.

"The occasion for the proposal was a meeting in New York City held at the inritation of three preminent members of as many Jowish communities. They were Messrs, Ford Butsel, Detroit, Louis Caplan, Pittsburgh and Irwin Spiegel, New.rk. They met at the Hotel Semmedore, on the afternoon of April 17, with representatives of the Unitial Missine Appeal, including Rabbi James G. Holler, Cine Innatt, and Messrs. Josl Gress, Newark, Harold Goldenberg, Minneapolis, Alex Lowenthal, Pittsburgh, Judge Morris Ethenberg, Rudolf G. Sonneborn and Horman L. Weisman, New York.

The United Palestine Appeal reports the autonomous right of the Joint Distribution Committee to make such decisions as it chooses. But it helicous it equally essential that the American Javish committy understand that the United Palestine Appeal permitted nothing to stand in the Way of a reconstitution of the United Javish Appeal, in accordance with the expressed Tabes of the community."
