THE WILL SUPPORT ROOSEVELT'S STAND ON PALESTINE; ASKS PROSKAUER MONSKY TO WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, April 20. (JTA) -- President Harry S . Trumon will continue the hte President Recovered's policy on Zichism, he today, told Dr. Stephen S. Wise. chirmon of the American Zionist Emergency Souncil.

The President authorized a delegation of the council, which consisted of Dr. Tiso. Hayim Greenberg and Herman Shulman, to state that he is carrying out the poliels of President Rossevelt and that the delegation know what Mr. Rossevelt's policy ngarding Palestine has been.

President Recevelt's most recent statements on Zionism were before Presiient frumen when he mot with the delegation, according to Dr. Wise, who said that the President indicated to us in clear and unmistakeable terms that he supports the Program.

The President's press secretary, Leonard Reinsch, announced, meanwhile, that Mage Joseph M. Proskauer; president of the American Jowish Committee, and Henry kersky, a member of the interim committee of the American Jowish Conference, have been invited to see Mr. Truman.

Mr. Reinsch said that since both Judge Proskauer and Mr. Monsky are en route to San Francisco, they will call upon the President some time in the near future.

4,500 JESS FOUND IN BUCHEMENLD CAMP ASK "WHERE DO ME GO FROM HERE": 1,000 ARE CHILDRED

PARIS, Apr il 20. (JTA) -- About 4,500 Jowish survivors were found at the behamild concentration comp, according to a report by an imerican army chaplain reteived here teday.

Chaplain Herschel Schneter, who is at the camp at the present time, says that 2,000 of the survivors are from Peland, 1,000 from Hungary and the reachinder from wrians Suropean countries. About 1,000 are children between the ages of three and fiftoen.

Capt. Sheeter said that he speke to hundreds of the survivors and that they Were overjoyed at seeing an imerican rabbi, but that their main question was: "Where to we go from here?" Children of five and six, he reports, told him, pridefully, in !iddish, "I am a Jew,"

The Paris press features the accounts of the harrors at Buchemwald despite the removed desire of the Ministry of Deportoes to soft-pedal reports of atrocities. Emorer, Jowish circles feel that those accounts will not do much to onlighten the Phile about Jowish sufforings, since Buchenwald was not, primarily, a Jewish comp.

Some means of informing the public about the atracities committed upon Jows is necessary to offset the whispering and leaflet campaign of anti-Somitic groups, which are spreading rumors that "there were no Jowish deportees nor any Jowish resistunes. Organized opposition to restraction of Jewish apartments is also being conthread, by the "Association for Reconstruction of the French Home."

MISSENTISM IN BELGIUM, HOLLAND NOT SERIOUS, SAYS JESTISH COMMITTEE REPRESENT. TIVE

LOMDON, April 20. (JTA) -- Although the population of Bolgium and Holland kee beene protty much "Jow conscious," manifestations of anti-Somitism, at present, so not serious, Max Gottschalk, special European representative of the American Jow-th Committee, teld the Jowish Tolographic Agency today. Mr. Gottschalk has just resigned from a visit to those countries.

He warned, however; that the situation must be carefully watched, since changes in the political and common situation could influence the general attitude towards to Joss. Hr. LONDON, April 20. (JL.) -- The insurrection in the Warsaw Ghette was a fitting rely to the messacre of over 3,000,000 Polish Jows by the Germans, President Meri Csuba-Morawski of the Polish Provisional Government said in a statement bread-ent today over the Lublin radio on the occasion of the second anniversary of the remain,

Deckring that "Polish democracy acknowledges the ghetto battle as part of is an struggle," Morawski said that "teday there is no room for racialism and antimitism in Poland." Speaking on the same broadcast, the provisional government's instructed Education, Stanislaw Skrzeszewski, pledged that all demonstrations of antilambian will be fought ruthlessly.

MC EMPRESSES WILLINGNESS TO RENEW UJA; OFFERS FOUR LITERNATIVE PROPOSALS

NET YORK, April 20. (JTA) -- The Joint Distribution Committee, in a statemot issued here today, truncated that it is prepared at any time to renew the United Juish Appeal for 1945, and disclosed that it has offered four alternative proposals as basis for reconstitution of the UJL. The statement, which was issued by Joseph G. Ryan, JDC executive vice-chairman, reads as follows:

"On Tuesday, April 17th, a special committee representing the Inter-City Taire Fund Committee to try to reconstitute the United Jewish Appeal, mot with representatives of the JDC and separately with the representatives of the UPA, in order to helitate the reconstitution of the United Jewish Appeal. The representatives of the MC made four, alternative, specific proposals. We are officially advised that when these proposals of the JDC, made to the Reconstitution Committee of the Inter-City elfere Fund group, were about to be presented to the United Palestine Appeal for empideration, the representatives of that organization refused to permit these propels to be submitted in detail to them, but stated that they were interested only in whater the JDC accepted or rejected their proposal.

"The JDC has felt all along that the negotiations conducted since last November, have been carried on by both sides with sericusness and with an honest conviction that each party was representing the fundamental interest of Jewry both here and abroad. It is the firm belief of the JDC that no advantage is served by further attempts by may prive to place blame upon the other for the failure of any of the negotiations. It is question has nothing whatsever to do with the essential, crucial problems that makent the communities and the various allocation committees. Those are how to raise the minume sum of money for all of the causes; to determine what moneys are needed now for the immediate resoue, relief and rehabilitation of the surviving Jews in war-torn props; and what sums are needed now for the upbuilding of Palestine.

"However, since publicity has been given to the UPA proposal for Ifull arbimution at the meeting held on Tuesday with the Inter-City Welfare Fund group, the M finds it necessary to inform the Jewish communities of its actual present offers to the immediate reconstitution of the United Jewish Appeal.

Offered to Arbitrate All Outstanding Problems

"The JDC has consistently offered to arbitrate the problems that remained outdanding and unresolved between the JDC and the UPA. In doing so, however, it insisted that there be taken into account the whole history of the negotiations, the agreements thattively reached, and the action taken by various important Jewish bodies which had definite bearing on the problem. That is what has been meant at all times by the M by its willingness to arbitrate the 'unresolved issues'.

"The proposals of the JDC, to which no reference is made in the statement of the United Polestine Appeal, were based on the proposition that the differences between the two agencies had in effect been both mediated and arbitrated; first mediated in the initial and then arbitrated before the Allocations Committee of the New York United with Appeal for that community. On the basis of the entire record of negotiations, whiting and arbitration, and against the background of all that hat taken place since let hall, the JDC new, in discussing these matters with Messrs. Fred Butzel, Louis the All, the JDC new, on the Inter-City Welfare Fund group, stated that it was newly to accept any one of four formalae. The acceptance of any of these would mean

m immediate sottlement of the long debated issues, instead of the inevitable deleys, involvements and complications inherent in the UPA proposal. These were the for alternative offers made by the JDC:

- b1. To reconstitute the 1945 United Jowish Appeal on exactly the same terms as the 1944 agreement, despite the obviously greater and more cruel need in Europe in 1955.
- "2. To accept the recommondations of the Committee on Mediation appointed by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds Board of Directors in Cincinnti, on February 11th, 1945. These were: (a) The first division of funds to be on symutom and a half million dollars in the ratio of 60% to the JDC and 40% to the Ex. thereafter, all sums to be subject to the action of the UJA Allotment Committee; (b). The ceiling for the Jewish National Fund traditional collections to be \$1,000,000. (The JDC to foregate beginning amount of \$600,000.
- "3. To extend to the whole country and pro-rate on a national scale a formle equivalent to the findings of the Allocations Committee of the Greater New York
 hited Jorish Appeal, vis., 57% to be turned over to the JDC and 43% to the UPA; a roof
 of \$500,000 to be placed over Jewish National Fund collections in that area; and the
 But to have the right to receive \$275,000 in earmarked contributions from Landsmanselecter.
- "4. To accept the offer made by UPA representatives themselves, Dr. James 6. Heller, Messrs. Rudelf G. Sonneborn and Henry Monter on various occasions, to divide the first \$25,000,000 raised in the UJA on the basis of 58% to the JDC and 42% to the UPA, with the JDC giving up the \$600,000 which it had received as an offset am in view of the traditional collections of the Jewish National Fund. Those are to be traded in all other respects as provided for in the 1944 Agreement.

"The JDC offered these proposals to the Roccastitution Committee in an entereor to reach an immediate settlement and reorganization of the UJ. without further slay in long drawn-out arbitration proceedings. This we believed would meet the straight expressed wishes of the Jowish communities of this country.

"In view of these offers on the part of the JDC and in view of the statement issed by the UE. that the incrioan Jewish community understands that the UE. permitted aching to stand in the way of the UE. I the JDC announces that it is propored it my time to renew the United Jewish Appeal for 1945 upon the basis of any one of the foregoing proposals."

Ir. Hyman also stated that the JDC had agreed whole-heartedly to put at the dispace of the fact-finding committee of the Inter-fity Welfare Fund group, all reads, date and material of the JDC that might be requested by that Committee, which he been set up to determine the facts and needs of the various overseas agencies.
