MES MERCY SUBMITS MEMORANDUM ON PALESTINE ISSUE TO SOVIET DELEGATION AT SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11. (JTA) — For the first time since the Soviet Revolumissions of the world Zionist movement today directly communicated with high Moscow fidels by submitting to the Soviet delegation at the United Nations Conference a symbol dealing with protection of Jewish rights in Palestine.

The nine-page memorandum, in the Russian language, explained to members of issuet delegation the functions of the Jewish Agency as the internationally recognized representative Jewish body for Falestine and cutlined the observations of the syon the drafts of the United States and British proposals regarding international misship of mandated territories. The document was submitted to members of the mixtdelegation in the hope of securing Soviet support for recommendations contained sixts.

Seek Russian Support of Jewish Demands at Peace Table

It has been known for some time that Jewish Agency Leaders in London were whith a means of presenting to Stalin the Zionist position on the Palestine problem inter to secure Russia's support at the peace table for Jewish demands. It has also we known that President Edward Benes of Czechoslovskia agreed to act as mediator and smoothly brought the Zionist views to Stalin's attention. Stalin's reaction was said at that the U.S.S.R. will not oppose any decision which the United States and English my take regarding Palestine's future.

Serious disagreement has developed at San Francisco between the United States and the British regarding the question of trusteeships, Jewish leaders instated in Falestine's fate have seen fit, therefore, to present their observations on thitsed States and British trusteeship plans not only to the delegations of those fauties, but also to the Soviet delegation which represents one of the powers sponsing the security conference.

Details of the Agency memorandum are expected to be made public early threek. In bringing them to the attention of the Moscow delegation it was emphabled that the Jewish Agency, authorised to watch over Jewish interests in Felestine, sant remain indifferent to any of the possible solutions of the question of interestimal trusteeships, since this question will directly affect Felestine.

Jewish National Council Congratulates Stalin on Victory Over Nazis

Jerusalem, May 11. (JTA) -- The executive of the Jewish National Council was subject to Premier Joseph Stalin expressing Palestine Jewry's "heartfelt congre-

ation to you, as the great leader of the Soviet Union and to the Red Army and all pulse of the Soviet Union on the glorique victory over fascism and Masism won by alarmy together with the other Allies."

IONDON, May 11. (JTA) - Official Czechoslovak circles here today described an error a broadcast on the Pregue radio yesterday which said that planes attached to bernn forces which have refused to surrender to the Red Army twice bombed Theremstadt. MILAN, May 11. (JTA) - The anti-Jewish laws introduced here by the Mussoim regime in 1938 were annulled today in a decree issued by the mayor of this city.

The order said that all anti-Semitic measures would be considered mull and all phing general regulations by the government "to restore normal relations between allians by implementing social equality."

THE JEWS MAY SECURE RETURN OF MUCH OF THEIR CONFISCATED VALUABLES AND PROPERTY

LONDON, May 11. (JTA) -- Dutch Jews may recover much of the cash and valuales stolen from them during the German occupation, it was indicated today in a breadst on the Dutch radio which revealed that three directors of the Lippman-Rosenthal us, with which the Jews had been compelled to deposit their money and valuables, had her appured by forces of the interior, and that about 500,000,000 guilders had been and la safe deposit waults.

According to an estimate published in the Nazi newspaper De Wasg during the supplier, the capital stolen from Jews totalled 500,000,000 of which 150,000,000 was itself, a like amount in business enterprises and 200,000,000 in real estate. A conlikeable part of the Jewish property, consisting of cash and bonds, is reported to have the saved, and there is a possibility that the proceeds from the sale of confiscated al estate and businesses were entered on the books of the Lippman-Rosenthal Bank.

Declaring that the majority of the American people support the rebuilding histine as "a free and democratic Jewish commonwealth," Wegner reminded the mix of the resolutions introduced by himself and Senator Taft, and by Representahes Wright and Compton in the last session of Congress, urging the United States to p appropriate measures for free Jewish immigration and colonization of Palestine.

Senator Wegner then presented to the Senate a resolution recently passed the New York State Legislature, expressing concurrence in these views, and asking lagess to enact legislation in line with these resolutions.

MIMITION OF 750,000 ACRES PLANNED IN PALESTINE, WILL BE ABLE TO ABSORB 500,000 SETTLERS

NEW YORK, May 11. (JTA) -- Long-range plans for an irrigation system that all reach throughout Palestine have been made by the Palestine Economic Corporation, kergest American business enterprise in that country, it was announced by Julius km, resident of the corporation, at a press conference today. Rabbi Wise indicated that the release of thousands of Jews from concentra-macings "orestes a sharp crisis in relief needs." He declared that the JDC has ap-Triated nearly \$12,000,000 during the first five months of 1945 for relief and redilitation overseas. The coming months will bring unprecedented requests from dislevel Jews who have returned to their homes, he said, and from communities now acwible to JDC relief shipments. These requests will necessitate the acceleration of athly appropriations.
