AGENCY MININ DETERMINED NOT TO PERMIT RAISING OF PALESTINE ISSUE AT FARLEY ON LEVANT CRISIS

LOMBON, June 5. (JTA) -- The British Government is determined not to permit helestime question to be dragged into the forthcoming international discussions ste Levant crisis, well-informed observers here stated following Prime Minister archill's address in Commons today on the situation in Syria and Lebanon.

3,000 HAVE DIED IN BEISEN CAMP SINCE LIBERATION; 50 PERISH DAILY; JEWS WORST OFF

EERGEN-BEISEN, Germany, June 5. (JTA) -- More than 18,000 people have died in the camp since its liberation by British forces several weeks ago, and about 50 ere all dying daily, despite the fact that the camp's administrators and British solters are working as hard as possible to aid the inmates. The camp seethes with dis-Unicoment, and the greatest number of complaints come from the Jews.

About 18,000 people remain here - housed in former Wehrmacht barracks to which En moved when their former vermin-infested quarters were destroyed last week. the survivors, two-thirds are hospitalized, suffering, mainly from tuberculosis, elemition and other allments. Efforts are being made to repatriate those who are withy enough to travel, and, as a result, a good number, especially from western ropen countries, have already left. This has left a large percentage of Jews among Mas remaining. It is estimated that there are 12,000 Jews here, while 3,000 have ken transferred to the Lingen Camp.

Indicative of the disorganized condition of the Jewish survivors is the fact at up till now, no proper census has been taken. Jews from Buchenweld and other Ene trive here seeking relatives and bringing complete lists of their camps to extage. Those here avidly seize these lists, looking for the names of relatives, but by have not listed themselves. One mother here did not know that her child was in be comp for several weeks.

The confusion among the Jewish survivors is due to the excitement resulting in liberation and from the habits and suspicions developed during their imprisonth. These feelings are aggravated by the belief that their own people are not thing of them, which is very unfortunate, since welfere teems of the Joint Distriwhen Committee have been in Paris for weeks seeking permission to come to such tags as Belsen.

Those men who are most distressed are the Jews from Poland, who do not want to him there, but do not wish to be classified as stateless. The camp administration whiled to send all persons who did not wish to return to Poland to the stateless camp is linger, but thousands refused to declare themselves stateless fearing that they made be decided to endless world wendering. In preference to that, they indicated they would be willing to return to Foland temporarily. Eventually, 3,000 were permitted to go to Linger, with the understanding that the question of their status will be left unsettied.

Sick Jews Ask for Bread; Complain of Inadequate Rations

Joseph Rosensaft, chairman of the camp's Jewish Committee, which was formed mythis week, refused to make public a list of the Polish Jews, fearing that they made be declared stateless. Rosenseft also voiced the constant camp complaint that the food rations are indequate. "When I walk through the hospitals," he told a strespondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, "from every side weak voices whisper bread, bread." I have to go outside and round-up some bread for them." He exhibited to this slices of bread, comprising the hospital ration. Yet, this ration has been dered by the medical officers of the camp and the camp commence he for F. T. Hills.

Major Hill a few days ago increased by half the non-hospital bread ration, exhining that he realized that plentiful amounts of bread seem the only real symbol of few to the internees, although their regular diet, he added, already comprises the full 2,000-calory normal diet, and is superior to the average diet of an English civilies in the last five years. The daily diet includes eight ounces of bread, plus six of bissuit, ten of meat, nine of fresh vegetables, nineteen of potatoes, one-half muse of cheese, one quart of milk, fruit, vitamin tablets and other items. The potawration is also being raised by one-half.

Jewish Chaplain Says There Are "Needless Deaths" Sime Liberation

Two Jewish chaplains of the British Army provide the only link between the Jewish immates and world Jewry. They have worked incessantly to reunite families and remiables communications, but they are unable to cope with the tremendous needs here. It Blish Hardmann arived here within a few days after the camp was liberated and high bury 20,000 in mass graves. Ec complains of needless deaths since the liberation, declaring "either we save them or we don't. I can't understand why if oranges are needed, planes couldn't bring them. I can't understand why the doctors here are to short-staffed, overworked, and are still unable to cope with the need. Why not wing in more doctors?"

Capt. Michael Etern, the other chaplein, stressed the need for some sort of which liaison group between here and Dachau, Buchenwald and the other camps for interchanging of lists. He also suggests that reunions be arranged in the camps for those finding relatives alive in other camps.

Until this week, the persons who died here were still being buried naked in mis graves. Now, shrouds and grave markers are being arranged. Among those who resulty died was Hirsch Liebman, a well-known Zionist from Sosnowitz. Among the survives ere Rabbi Klein from Budepest, Rabbi Helfgot from Yugoslavia and 500 children, of the life are orphans under 15.

The orphans are now being well cared for in a separate nursery. A school has also been started by a Sgt. Declaren, with the assistance of teachers found in the same. Using five Languages, the school will conduct classes in writing, drawing, withmetic, handicrefts and singing.

Rosensaft, who is a survivor of Oswiccim, said that 500,000 were shot while he must there. Among them was Isaac Bornstein, a JDC representative in Poland, and M. Melstein, who was a leader of the ghetto community in Theresienstadt before being deported to Poland.

TOLK MOSLEM LEAGUE DEMANDS RELEASE OF PALESTINE EX-MUFTI: THREATENS UPRISING

PARIS, June 5. (JTA) — The return to Palestine of all deported Arab leaders, spension of Jewish immigration into Palestine and the proclaiming of Palestine as an imperial tarab country was demanded today at a conference of the Palestine Arab firth bild in Jerusalem, attended by 3,000 delegates, the Paris radio reports.

The paper was quoted as saying that "if the British desire to prevent the bloomst for which the Middle East has been preparing, the Mifti's release must be said immediately. It would be fatal folly," it continued, "if the British charged high the treason for opposing the policy of Jewish appeasement in Falestine."

AUSTING RABBIS APPEAL FOR RETURN OF JEWISH CHILDREN SHELTERED IN MONASTERIES

TEL AVIV, June 5. (JTA) — An appeal to the nations of the world "to return the Jewish people the children and orphans who are now in monasteries and in other Existin institutions throughout Europe," was issued here today at a rabbinical confume attended by more than 500 rabbis and heads of rabbinical institutions of Emins.

MESSAS RELIEF TASKS OUTLINED AT JEWISH SOCIAL WELFARE CONFERENCE

MEW YORK, June 5. (JTA) -- The three-day session of the National Conference of which Social Welfare concluded here today with a round table on overseas relief which Louis H. Sobel of the Joint Distribution Committee, who served as chairman it discussion, outlined the staggering tasks confronting all agencies now prowing aid to Europe's starved and destitute millions.

Mr. Sobel laid particular stress on the plight of the Jewish survivors of the sui holosaust and outlined briefly the Joint Distribution Committee's broad program with has made possible the survival of many of the remaining European Jews, and sith is now maintaining many of the 1,250,000 who are still alive on the continent.

Participating with Mr. Sobel in the discussions were Martha H. Biehle, Amerissresident representative of the Intergovernmental Committee on Refugees, Max Silveritin, Idaison officer of the Welfere Division of the United Nations Relief and Resilliation Administration, Ilja Dijou of the Hias-Ioa Emigration Association, and Mrm B. Tart, executive vice-chairman of the American Ort Federation.

Miss Biehle described the Intergovernmental committee's work in the care of tabless persons, and its program for their resettlement. Mr. Dijour pictured the wird Hicem in the field of emigration and transportation, and Mr. Tart described to monitional and trade training activities of the Ort and its plans for expansion it his work in the near future as an integral part of the relief and rehabilitation but for European Jewry.
