NEW HERMITS J. D. C. TO START RELIEF WORK IN GERMANY; THREE TEAMS LEAVING PARIS

PARIS, June 6. (JTA) -- Supreme Headquarters of the Allied Expeditionary Forces today granted permission to the Joint Distribution Committee to enter Germany in order to extend aid to stateless Jews in coordination with the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration.

Three groups of J. D. C. workers are leaving immediately for the camps at Bergen-Belsen and Salzwedel where 3,000 Jewish internees are concentrated. The office of the Joint Distribution Committee here is also planning to send physicians, nurses and welfare workers to Dachau and Buchenwald. The personnel will be recruited in the United States by the J. D. C., in England by the Jewish Committee for Relief Abroad, and in France by the OSE.

A contingent of 500 Jewish children from Buchenwald is expected here tomorrow. The J. D. C. and the OSE have arranged that the children be placed at Thionville temporarily so that they may regain their health.

Jewish Agency Negotiating With UNRRA on Sending Relief Teams to Europe

TEL AVIV, June 6. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency for Palestine is negotiating with the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Agency concerning the sending of relief teams from here and from England to assist the Jews still in concentration camps and the survivors of shattered Jewish communities in Europe, it was disclosed at a conference of the Palestine Labor Party by Eliahu Dobkin, chief of the immigration department of the Jewish Agency. He said that three such teams have already been sent, but many more are needed.

Dobkin stressed the need for a sufficient number of immigration certificates to secure the admittance of Jews released from Buchenwald, Dachau, Theresienstadt and other camps, most of whom have no place to go. Discussing the recent allotment by the Palestine Government of 3,000 visas--which leaves only 1,000 remaining under the White Paper quota--Mr. Dobkin said:

"We never knew such pain as in distributing these certificates. We allotted 700 to rescue 31,000 refugees in Switzerland; for Italy, 140 were allotted to 1,000 persons clamoring for admission, including 500 orphans; to Belgium and Holland, 400 were allotted to save 48,000 people, among whom there are 2,500 Belgian orphans. More than 100,000 Jews were found in the concentration camps in Germany and the most tragic problem is that of those who are stateless and face new internment, and whose only demand and hope is immigration to Palestine."

ALL ANTI-SEMITIC ORGANIZATIONS WILL BE DISSOLVED IN FRANCE, MINISTER ANNOUNCES

PARIS, June 6. (JTA) -- Following the dissolution yesterday of three anti-Semitic organizations, Minister of the Interior Adrien Tixier today issued a statement announcing that the government is determined to dissolve "all groups whose actual purpose is to conduct anti-Semitic action or spread anti-Jewish propaganda under whatever camouflage these activities may be carried on."

SOLDIERS OF JEWISH BRIGADE SUPERVISING RECONSTRUCTION WORK OF GERMAN WAR PRISONERS

LONDON, June 6. (JTA) — Soldiers of the Jewish Brigade are supervising German troops who are clearing up the ruins of Klagenfurt, in Austria, the correspondent of Dziennik Polski, semi-official organ of the Polish Government-in-Exile, reported today.

He says that the Germans "look rather miserable, but it is difficult to say whether they are upset by the heavy, unpleasant work, the defeat generally, or because they have been placed under the guard of soldiers of the Jewish Brigade. On the soil where Hitler attempted to destroy the last few Jews," the correspondent continues, "the flags of the Jewish Brigade are now flying, and a German mansion has been converted into a synagogue."

The same paper reports that hundreds of Polish Jews released from concentration camps in Anglo-American zones in Germany have indicated that they do not wish to return to Poland. Most of the Jews, it said, wish to settle abroad, with the majority of them desiring to go to Palestine.

BRITAIN WARNED NOT TO ENCOURAGE ARAB NATIONALISM; DANGER TO JEWISH INTERESTS CITED

LONDON, June 6. (JTA) — A warning that Arab nationalism, although presently directed against France, may eventually threaten British interests in the Arab countries and the interests of the Jewish National Home in Palestine was sounded today by the Manchester Guardian, leading liberal daily.

The paper warmly supports Gen. de Gaulle's proposal that the relations of the Arab countries to the Western Powers should be considered as a whole by the great powers, and not be limited to the French-Syrian dispute only. "The United Nations could then make plain to the Arabs that they, too, must make concessions for the sake of world peace," the Manchester Guardian says.

The article reminds the British Government that in spite of appeasing the Arabs by closing the doors of Palestine to Jewish immigration, Britain had trouble in Egypt and in other Arab countries during the war. "The Arab peasant," the article says, "is not likely to distinguish too carefully between French and British imperialism. He may argue that if he can get rid of the one, he can also get rid of the other. In the long run we, too, may find it difficult to reconcile the promises to the Jews in Palestine and our economic and strategic interests in Egypt and in Iraq with our present encouragement of Arab nationalism."

FIRST ZIONIST MASS-MEETING HELD IN RIO DE JANEIRO; BRAZIL MAY RELAX IMMIGRATION LAWS

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 6. (JTA) — The first Zionist mass-meeting in many years took place here last night as a result of the lifting by the Brazilian Government of the ban on the Zionist movement. The hall was decorated with the Blue-White Zionist flag and with flags of the United Nations. A representative of the Communist Party was among the speakers who brought greetings to the gathering.

It was learned here today that the Brazilian Government intends to introduce more liberal immigration regulations and to abolish the restrictions against Jewish refugees who are natives of Axis countries.

JEWS LEAVING FRANCE FOR PALESTINE CAN TAKE WITH THEM ONLY \$100 IN CASH

PARIS, June 6. (JTA) — Jews who are permitted to emigrate from France to Palestine cannot take with them more than the equivalent of \$100 in cash, it was revealed here today. The restriction is due to the existing Anglo-French financial agreement on export of capital.

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCES DEMOBILIZATION PLAN, RE-SETTLEMENT IS DISCUSSED

JERUSALEM, June 6. (JTA) — The Palestine Government today announced a plan for the demobilization of men in the armed forces similar to the British demobilization plan.

The problem of resettlement of demobilized Palestine Jewish soldiers was one of the major subjects of discussion today at a plenary session of the Jewish National Council. Return of the Mizrahi organization to active participation in the council was predicted following the adoption of a resolution on Sabbath observance which would ban the transportation of men and goods on Saturdays by Jewish drivers.

60 REMAIN OF HAMBURG'S 20,000 JEWS; AMG RETURNS COMMUNITY HOUSE TO JEWS

HAMBURG, Germany, June 6. (JTA) — Six-hundred and fifty Jews — all of whom were married to non-Jews — are all that remain of the 20,000 who formerly lived in Hamburg, Dr. Heineman, director of the Jewish Self-Aid Committee, today told a Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent. It is expected that 500 of the last transport of Jews sent from here to Theresienstadt will return, Heineman said.

The military government authorities have returned the Jewish community's office and house, which had previously been occupied by the Gestapo. Heineman is requesting the return of two old peoples homes and an institution for the disabled, the only Jewish buildings which were not damaged by Allied bombings. Thus far, he said, nothing has been done to return the property of individual Jews which was seized by the Nazis.

All synagogues in Hamburg were totally destroyed in 1938, with the exception of the new temple on Oberstrasse, the exterior of which remained. The Nazis moved newspaper printing presses into the building and they are still there.

BULGARIA TERMINATES HEBREW BROADCASTS; RESUMES NORMAL TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATIONS

SOFIA, June 6. (JTA) — The Bulgarian radio today terminated its broadcasts in Hebrew since telegraphic communication between Bulgaria and the rest of the world has been resumed.

The Hebrew broadcasts were conducted by Welwel Pomeranietz, a correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, for the benefit of the Jews in Palestine. In his last talk over the Sofia radio today, the JTA correspondent thanked the Bulgarian government for the facilities given him to broadcast Jewish news to Palestine, England and other countries during the eight months when no regular telegraphic communication between Bulgaria and other countries existed.

ONLY 12 OF 734 JEWS DEPORTED FROM NORWAY BY NAZIS SURVIVED, SAYS OSLO RADIO

STOCKHOLM, June 6. (JTA) — The Oslo radio said today that only 12 of the 734 Jews deported from Norway by the Germans are believed to have survived. The others are presumed to have been murdered.

Of the 1,800 Jews who lived in Norway before the German invasion, 825 succeeded in escaping, the broadcast said, while the Nazis deported 734, including 180 women and children. Of the deportees, 470 were Norwegian citizens.

INTRODUCTION OF BILL IN CONGRESS ON OSWEGO REFUGEES HELD INADVISABLE BY JEWISH GROUPS

NEW YORK, June 6. (JTA) — Following a conference with representatives of leading Protestant, Catholic and Jewish agencies who are concerned with the problems of refugees in the United States, Congressman Samuel Dickstein, Chairman of the House Committee on Immigration, today stated that the introduction of any bill aimed at changing the status of the Oswego refugees is inadvisable at this time. His views are supported by the representatives of the organizations with whom he conferred.

Mr. Dickstein expressed the belief that the Immigration Committee's sub-committee on Oswego would soon be in a position to recommend a program that would provide amelioration for the special problems of the more than 900 refugees living at the Oswego shelter. The sub-committee, originally scheduled to visit the shelter on June 11, has postponed its "on-the-scene study" for a week or ten days, because important matters in Washington on that date make it impossible for the members of the sub-committee to be away from the Capitol.

Participating in the conference with Mr. Dickstein were representatives of the following agencies: American Christian Committee for Refugees, American Friends Service Committee, War Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Conference, Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society, National Council of Jewish Women, National Refugee Service, Inc., National Board, Y. W. C. A., National Community Relations Advisory Council, which includes, among others, the American Jewish Committee, American Jewish Congress, Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai Brith and the Jewish Labor Committee.

PROF. SHOTWELL LAUDS EFFORTS OF DAVIS AND PROSKAUER FOR COMMISSION ON HUMAN RIGHTS

NEW YORK, June 6. (JTA) — The efforts of John W. Davis, one-time Democratic candidate for President of the United States, and of Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, president of the American Jewish Committee, which led to the establishment of a Commission on Human Rights by the United Nations Conference at San Francisco, are praised by Prof. James Shotwell in the current issue of Survey Graphic. Prof. Shotwell is one of the consultants to the U. S. delegation at San Francisco, representing the Carnegie Foundation for International Peace.

"The amendment to the Dumbarton Oaks plan providing for the Commission on Human Rights was inserted in the charter at the insistence of the consultants to the American delegation," Prof. Shotwell writes. "The proposal for such a commission was first developed by the Commission to Study the Organization of Peace which sponsored it in a nationwide campaign. The credit for the final achievement of it, however, goes to all of those who joined together to ensure its success, and not least to the eloquent public advocacy of the commission by John W. Davis—and by Judge Joseph M. Proskauer in the meeting of the consultants."

CENTRAL CONFERENCE OF AMERICAN RABBIS WILL HOLD ANNUAL CONVENTION IN ATLANTIC CITY

ATLANTIC CITY, June 6. (JTA) — The fifty-sixth annual convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis will be held in Atlantic City, June 25 - 28, at the Hotel Chelsea, it was announced here today. Owing to travel restrictions the attendance will be limited to officers, chairmen of committees and past presidents. The Conference has a membership of 550.
