EURN SERKS PAIR TREATMENT OF JEWS EVERYNDERE TO LESSEN PALESTIME INMIGRATION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22. (JTA) - President Truman qualified his recent stateant on Palestine in a conference in the White House yesterday with Rep. Adolph J. Salath, the latter told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today.

Representative Sabath said that the President assured him of his deep interest in the welfare of the Jewish people and that he was trying to secure fair, just and quitable treatment for them everywhere in the world.

Such fair treatment, when it prevails, the President told Rep. Sabath, might be expected to lessen the pressure for Jewish emigration to Palestine and would make massessary the tremendous effort to transport large numbers there.

Rep. Sabath also declared that the President had expressed concern over the trouble in store by reason of Arab opposition to Jewish immigration to Palestine, but, at the same time, he is still trying to enlarge opportunities for immigration there. The President is working at it both ways," Sabath said.

Asked whether there had been any Arab communication to the President after his recent statement on Palestine, Rep. Sabath said he did not know, but he assumed that the President knew how the Arabs felt.

THIED HATIONS AUTHORIZED TO CURB ANTI-JEWISH PERSECUTIONS IN ANY COUNTRY, ATTLES REPORTS

LONDON, Aug. 22. (JTA) - Under the provisions of the United Nations Charter elepted at San Francisco, action can be taken against any state which persecutes its wish nationals, Prime Minister Attlee today told the House of Commons.

Asked whether he considered that the charter empowered the United Nations to intervene when some state emberked, for example, on persecution of Jews under the pretext that it was an internal matter, the Prime Minister replied affirmatively.

Earlier, Atthee refused to give the Commons any details on his consultations at Potedam with President Truman regarding the Palestine problem. He also declined to answer a quostion as to whether he would consider the establishment of a small impartial Anglo-American commission to examine on the spot the Falestine question and present a joint report to the respective governments.

"I am at present not in a position to make any statement on this matter," he said. The question was put to Attlee by Capt. Marples, one of the now members of the louse. At the same time, the Prime Minister promised to make a statement on the Palestine issue "as soon as we have time to consider the matter." This promise was made after a question by Lord Winterton, who is known for his pro-Arab. sentiments.

The question asked by Lord Winterton was as follows: "In view of the perturbation caused in Arab countries by statements of some government members and by unfounded rumors that His Majesty's Government is friendlier to Jews than to Arabs because of its present composition, will the Prime Minister care to make a statement and, particularly since a serious situation is developing."

In answering that a government statement will be forthcoming as soon as the whist can find time to consider the Palestine issue, Frime Minister Attlee comphanised that in the meantime he hopes that the unfounded rumors will be contradicted,

SIMER HORES U.S.-BRITISH NEGOTIATIONS ON PAIESTINE WILL NOT BE PROTRACTED

PLYMOUTH, Mass. Aug. 22. (JTA) — The hope that the negotiations on Palesthe between the governments of the United States and Britain "will not be long protested" and that the Jewish Agency will be made a party to them, was expressed here takey by Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, leader of the American Zionist movement, in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Dr. Silver, who played a leading role at the World Zionist Conference which scaladed in London last week, said that there need be no fear about the necessity of smaller 500,000 American soldiers, or any fraction of that number, to keep the peace in Faleting.

"Palestine has been a center of tension for so long just because no clear, firm and sustained decision backed by an unwavoring authority was ever made," Dr. \$11-re said. "The Arabs were encouraged to believe that a threat of violonoo will always succeed in preventing the implementation of the Balfour Declaration and the Falestine Endste. Falestine is no exception to the many areas of political rivalry and tension in the post-war world concerning which decisions are being made today by the great pares of the world, which they are resolved to back up with their prestige and authority. The Jewish rights in Falestine cannot be made dependent on Arab consent. The wish problem is not en Arabian, but a world problem."

Commenting on the results of the World Zicnist Conference, Dr. Silver said:
The conference defined afresh in unmistakable terms the classic Zionist position and
committed all Zionist officials to strict adhorence to it. It was realized that there
can be no thought of extremist or moderates in the conduct of the movement. The conference revealed fundamental agreement, and such differences as did exist were quickly
resolved once the political decisions were adopted.

Falestine Arabs Continue To Attack Truran's Statement; Ask 3rd of Mandato

JERUSAIEM, Aug. 22. (JTA) -- Resolutions urging the British Government to imediately surrender its mandate over Falestine and to proclaim it an independent ecuntry, and protesting the recent statement on Palestine by Fresident Trumen were adopted at a meeting here today of the executive committee of the Falestine Arab Farty. The party is do by the Husseini family, of which the ex-Mafti of Jerusalem is a profinent member. The committee also urged a meeting of the Arab League to discuss the Falestine problems.

Meanwhile, the Arab and the Jewish press continue to duel over the Truman statement. The Arab papers charge that it contained "inconsistencies" and embarrassed britain by asking it to swerve from its established policy. Davar, leading Hobrew daily, tuday says that "the Arab press' great confusion and enger concerning Truman's statement indicates the importance the Arab public attaches to it."

SUMAN JEWS ASK GOVERNMENT ACT TO RESTORE RIGHTS AND PROPERTY DENIED THEM

PRAGUE, Aug. 22. (JTA) — A memorandum urging the restoration of property and rights taken from the Jews of Slovakia by the former pro-Nazi regime has been presented to the chairman of the Slovak National Council, autonomous parliament of the Slovakia section of Czeohoslovakia, the Fratislava radio said today.

It reports that the memorandum was submitted by a delegation representing the Association of Jewish Religious Communities in Slovakia, which was assured by the council chairman that the problem of restoration of rights would be solved. The Jewish representatives, the broadcast added, expressed the desire of the Jewish population to principate in the economic and social reconstruction of the country as citizens equiped with equal rights.

MES TEROWN INTO GERMAN-OWNED HOTEL IN JERUSALEM; OWNER URGED TO LEAVE PALESTIME

JENUSAIEM, Aug. 22. (JTA) -- Two bombs were thrown into the Applinger Estal here Monday ovening by unidentified persons, the police announced today. The botal is owned by a Gorman recently released from internment in Falestine.

Leaflets urging the public to boycott the hotel and protesting the release of the interned Germans were distributed outside the building's entrance. They also demand that the owner, a Mrs. Applinger, leave the country. A seventeen-year-old exist girl, Malka Strassburger, was arrested when some of the leaflets were found to her.

Meanwhile, unidentified assassins mardered Joseph Davidescu, a resident of the colony of Zichron Jacob. Ten shots were fired into Davidescu's body through a mindow as he sat at home talking to a neighbor. The local press says that Davidescu ms formerly connected with military intelligence.

EMISE YOUTHS IN BUIGARIA CONTRIBUTE SUNDAY LABOR TO INCREASE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION

SOFIA, Aug. 22. (JTA) -- Jewish youths affiliated with the Hechalutz movemut have contributed 3,500 work days in recent weeks to step up the mining of coal and to increase arricultural production, it was announced today.

The extra work has been performed by 100 Chalutsim who have organized themthese into Sunday Labor Brigades. Their offorts are reported to have favorably imressed villagers who had been assured by the Masis that the Jews were not capable of sgricultural labor.

180 GREEK JEWS LEAVE UNKRA CAMP IN PALESTINE TO RETURN TO HOMELAND

JERUSAIEM, Aug. 22. (JTA) -- One-eighty Jews were among 2,000 Greeks who left an UNERA comp near Gaza yesterday to roturn to their homeland. They are travelling by sea.

AMERICAN KEREN HAYESOD SENDS \$1,000,000 TO PAIESTINE FOR RECONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

NEW YORK, Aug. 22. (JTA) — The American Palestine Foundation Fund (keren layesed) today sont the first million dollar check in its 25 years of activity to lalestine, according to a statement by Sol Roiter, of Newburgh, N. Y., its nating Fresident. Mr. Reiter announced that this represented a partial payment on the 1945 collections in the United States. The money will be spent for reconstruction work.

LAGE CONTINGENT OF JEWS ARRIVES IN ITALY FROM SWITZERLAND EN ROUTE TO PAIESTINE

ROES, Aug. 22. (JTA) -- A contingent of 705 Hungarian Jewish refugees arrived here today from Switzerland en route to Palestire. An additional 150 are due tomorrow. They are part of the group released from the Bergen Belsen camp in Germany prior to the lad collapse as a result of the efforts of Jewish groups in Switzerland.

Most of the refugees, among whom are twenty infants and many children, appear bealthy as a result of the treatment they have received in the six months since their release by the Germans. The bulk of them are young people, although there are a few deletly persons, some of whom are ill. According to present plans, they will embark for Falestine at Bari or Taranto.

A minor incident occurred when the train carrying the transport paused at Rimin. An impromptu parade organized by the refugees encountered German prisoners who were working on the reilroad. British troops guarding the Masis appearantly feared that the Jews might attack the Germans, but according to a JDC representative who is sempanying the emigrants, they restricted themselves to flinging a few harsh words at the Masis.

MESTINE REFRESENTATIVES IN GREECE LAUD J.D.C. COOFERATION IN WELFARE ACTIVITIES

ATENS, Aug. 22. (JTA) -- Jacob Chernevitz, a representative of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, and Elihau Shachnai, a representative of the Palestine Red Mogen Derki, which is providing medical assistance for Jews here, today issued a joint statement lauding the cooperation of the American Joint Distribution Committee "in carrying out a total welfare program for Greek and stateless Jews in Greece."

"Two Hachshara centers established by the Zionist organization here for seventy-five Jewish youths are being maintained by the Joint Distribution Committee," the statement said. "Similar cooperation is given by the J.D.C. representative here in settvities comporning education, child welfare and emigration to Ralestine. The J.D.C. stablished the first Grock Jewish orphanage and is giving hasic assistance to returning Jewish deportees. It also finances the Athens Jewish medical disponsary and prorices regular minimum assistance to at least 6,000 Greek Jews, as well as to 90 needy Jewish university students."

The statement emphasizes that the JeD.C. maintains the religious personnel of the Jewish communities in Greece and has established loan institution to grant small credits to Jews for rehabilitation. It also finances a cooperative Jewish restaurant in Salonika where 350 Jows receive hot meals daily for ten cents per meals

(In New York, the Joint Distribution Committee today reported that seventyfive tens of special foodstuffs and medical supplies have been furnished by the organitation to needy Jews in Hungary, Rumania and Vienna. Twenty-eight tons of medical supplies, surgical instruments and essential foods have been sent from Sweden to the Jews in Czechoslovalcia.)
