EMPTOUS DECISIONS ON PALESTIME EXPECTED: SHERTOK CALLS FOR "STRENGTH AND DETERMINATION"

LONDON, Sept. 12. (JTA) -- Zionist leaders in England were told today that mentous decisions" with regard to Palestine may soon be taken by the British Govern-

"The present situation is one of expectancy," Moshe Shertok, chief of the political department of the Jewish Agency, said, addressing Zionist key men upon his re-wn from Paris where he conferred with the French Foreign Office. We are on the breshold of momentous decisions. I cannot imagine the Labor Government will not take be opportunity of righting the wrong done not only by the White Paper, but also during the mineteen hundred years when our people were turned into homeless beggars."

Shertok emphasized that "strength and determination" will be moded. He appaled to those present to exert all possible efforts to mobilise their resources for t show of strengthe While in Paris, Shertok addressed Zionist leaders there on the mm subject. He also conferred with Leon Blum and other prominent personalities on the Palestine question.

Plan to Settle 100,000 Poles in Palestine Amases Country's Jews

JERUSAIRM, Sept. 12. (JTA) - Reports that the British Government allegedly intends to settle in Palestine 100,000 Christian Poles who refuse to return to Poe his hope caused arrangement among the Jews here, especially since the immigration quota for News under the British White Paper is practically exhausted.

"If there is place for socres of thousands of non-Jews in Palestine, then why is there no place for Jewish immigration and colonisation!" Davar, leading Hebrew news-Mar, asks in an editorial today. "We constantly hear that Palestine's absorptive apaity is over-limited and that there is no place for all the Jews knocking at the country's doors. From where does this sudden absorptitivy for scores of thousands of non-Jews come?"

Enumerating a list of arguments, the paper goes on to ask why Arab opposition to mon-dewish immigration is not considered a decisive factor, whereas tht same oppo-sition becomes decisive when it concerns Jowish immigration. "The world which is conwarned - and rightly so - for 100,000 Poles must also care for the millions of Jews to have no other choice except to immigrate to Palestine, the article concludes.

More Arrests of Suspected Terrorists Made in Palestine

JERUSAIEM, Sept. 12. (JTA) -- A number of suspected terrorists were arrested during the last few days, it was reported here today. It was also revealed that after arrest, a packet containing 100 detenators and parts of bombs was found in a post office. The report said that during the last fortnight two caches of explosives were rebbed and a Tel Aviv bank was held up.

MEMBERALIS AUCTION OF PROPERTY OF DEPORTED JEWS IN HOPE THEY WILL RETURN

RRUSSELS, Sept. 12. (JTA) - Acting on the request of Jewish leaders, the bearment office in charge of the property of Belgian Jews deported during the German muntion to extermination camps today cancelled an order providing for the auction of while Jewish property, the owners of which have not yet returned to their homes and tose fate is still unknown.

In asking for the revocation of the order, the leaders of the Jewish community wind out that "it would be utterly unjust," to sell the belongings of deported Jews, im of whom may still be alive, but prevented for the time being from returning to Meium. The authorities, complying with this request, notified the community leaders but the cost of storage would be charged to the owners of the property since it may h mossary to keep the Jewish belongings in storage for an indefinite period.

A bill providing for the transfer to the Jewish community of property of murand Jews who left no heirs will soon be introduced by the Belgian Government, Ministrof Justice Mercel Gregoire told Leon Kubovitsky, the representative of the World wish Congress. The bill will also provide for the surrender of all Jewish orphans to the Jewish community.

N. Gregoire said that the Government is considering granting residential nights to Jewish refugees residing in Bolgium. It also intends to issue regulations mich would check racial propaganda. Mr. Rubovitsky was also received by the Minister for Mar Victims and at the Ministry of Health.

ES IN MOROCCO LIVING UNDER "APPALLING CONDITIONS" HIAS-ICA DIRECTOR DISCLOSES

PARIS, Sept. 12. (JTA) -- The Jews of Morocco are living under "appalling miditions," Dr. James Bernstein, executive director of the Hias-Isa Emigration Assodiction, declared here upon his return from a two-week survey of his organization's ectivities in North Africe.

Of the 65,000 Jews who live in Casablanca, Dr. Bernstein told the JTA, 35,000 maids in the congested Mellah quarter, of whom about 15,000 to 20,000 "live in inservitable misery under Buchenwald-like conditions of sanitation." Families of twelve, he said, are jammed into single rooms, which are in many cases windowless. There is only one dispensary for children, and the single refugee doctor manning it sometimes tets 150 children in a single morning.

Similar conditions prevail among the Jews in most Moroccan cities, the Hiasha director said, with a wealthy minority doing little to help the destitute majority. hase conditions, he explained, are partly due to the fact that under the Vichy regime hers were stripped of their businesses and to the acute housing shortage, but the that reason is the backwardness of the Moroccan Jewish community, whose foremost need, me asserted, is education.

Both the native and the French authorities in Morocco have indicated a desire to be helpful, and have aided in solution of the refugee problem, Dr. Bernstein said. disclosed that the Hias-Ion is arranging for the repatriation of the few Jewish refugees remaining in Casablanca and for 1,000 in Tangiers.

The situation in Algeria, he declared, is somewhat better. The UNRRA camp at Milippoville is being liquidated, and all its inmates are being transferred to Italy with the exception of those who may have a possibility of emigrating or returning to their homelands. These latter will remain in Algeria in the custody of the Hias-Ioa until transportation can be secured for themSOFIA, Sept. 9. (Delayed) (JTA) -- Sofia Jews were highly gratified at the gesence in the Sephardic synagogue today of high Government officials, who delivered buf addresses during an intermission in the Rosh Hashonah services.

Minister Without Portfolio Dobri Terpecheff expressed the gratitude of all the bigarian people for the manner in which the country's Jewish citizens aided in the stuggle to overthrow fascism here. He said that with few exceptions Bulgarians resized friends of the Jews, and that their blood which was spilt in the common struggle unint the Nazis and their followers in Bulgaria had comented brotherhood.

Me Terpecheff appealed to the Jews to bear patiently the temporary sufferings they are undergoing. He assured them that the Government would do its utmost to impose their position once the severe economic crisis has been weathered. General topicoff, former commander of the Bulgarian First Army, speaking on behalf of the smedforces, said that the persecution of Jews had been something imposed on Bulgaria by its fessist rulers.

Other officials attending the Rosh Hashonah services included Regent Pavloff, hepty for Minister Gen. Lekarski, and a representative of the Soviet minister.

SWIET RED CROSS WELCOMES INQUIRIES FROM ABROAD CONCERNING MISSING RELATIVES IN USSR

MSSCOW, Sept. 12. (JTA) -- The Soviet Red Cross has set up a central information bureau to assist persons trying to locate relatives and friends in Russian territory, the Jewish Anti-Pascist Committee announced today.

Although designed primarily to assist Soviet citizens to find their family am friends deported by the Germans, the bureau will answer inquiries from nationals of all the United Mations, and will bear all the expenses of the investigations, the amount must be introduced in the control of the investigations instructions:

File requests through welfare organisations or local Red Cross offices and funish the following information: 1 - Name of person scught; 2 - His or her year and plee of birth; 3 - Nationality and citizenship; 4 - Former profession and home and business address; 5 - Date of leat content and any information received at that time. Semiers should give their full names and addresses, and indicate their relationship to the person scught. A separate request should be filed for every individual about twa information is desired. The address of the information bureau is Klimetovsky. Aroulek. 1. Moscowe.

The bureau already has information concerning persons sent to the Dachau, Ridansk and Oswiecim camps, according to the announcement. Records from other camps in Germany are being obtained, but in many cases it will be impossible to secure any text because the Nazis destroyed all records.

LD.C. OFENS OFFICE IN FRAGUE; WILL CONDUCT RELIEF WORK THROUGHOUT CZECHOSLOVAKIA

PARIS, Sept. 12. (JTA) — Harold Trobe, a representative of the Joint Distribution Committee, left here today for Prague to open a J.D.C. office there to direct relief activities for Jews in Czechoslovskia. He will work with a local staff which will be supplemented by Jewish social workers from the United States.

RER BERGSON INTENDS TO LEAVE U.S.; WILL RE-APPLY IN LONDON FOR AN AMERICAN VISA

MASHINGTON, Sept. 12. (JTA) -- Peter Bergson, chairman of the Hebrew Committs of National Liberation, who was ordered by the Board of Immigration Appeals to less the United States by November 1, or face deportation to Palestine, today declared that he intends to proceed to London, and while there re-apply for a U.S. visa.

hr. Bergson entered this country on a six-months visitor's visa which was heter extended, but in April of this year he was refused permission by the State Degreent to remain on a permanent status.

At a pross conference today Mr. Bergson reported that he had sent a letter to President Truman asking his intervention for the opening of Palestime to Jewish survivers in Europe, especially to the "Hebrows of Europe who still find themselves in the gradial and violent surroundings of the concentration camps into which they were placed by German barbarians."

ERESENTATIVES OF WORLD JEWISH CONGRESS WILL VISIT EAST EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES

MEN YORK, Sept. 12. (JTA) - Representatives of the World Jewish Congress will soon visit Jewish communities in the liberated Bastern European countries; it was amounced today by the Congress following a moeting of its executive.

Dr. Stepehn S. Wise, Dr. Nahum Goldmann and Baruch Zukerman reported on the decisions of the European conference of the World Jewish Congress in London which they stituded. They said that the problems of rebuilding the organization of the World Jewish Congress in liberated territories were discussed at the conference and with various delegations. The next full session of the World Jewish Congress—the second since the founding of the organization—may be held in the near future, they reported.
