LOMDON, Septe 25. (JTA) -- Reliable sources today told the Jewish Telegraphic jest that the British Government has reached a decision on Felestine which does not action to the stand taken by the Labor Party at its last convention. #### Anti-Zicnist Decision Will Be Changed in Six Months Says Davor

ERUSAIEM, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The British Government's reported decision to mintain the White Paper with relatively minor modifications is only temporary, the Whiteal correspondent of the influential Lebor daily Davar says today.

#### Wise, Silver Say Jews Will Resist Continuation of White Paper, Mass Meeting Called

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (JTA) -- The Jews of Palestine will "resist to the bitterend" the decision reportedly taken by the British Government "to continue with slight nodifications the infamous policy of the Palestine White Paper and to restrict wish immigration there to a trickle," Dr. Abba Hillel Silver and Dr. Stephen S. Wis, co-chairmen of the American Zionist Emergency Council, declared in a joint statement issued today.

They announced that a mass meeting to give expression to "the sense of apprebasion and indignation aroused by this news" will be held at Madison Square Garden on Smday evening, September 33, to be followed by an emergency conference of Zionist leders in Washington. The text of their statement follows:

"News of the utmost gravity has receded us concerning the policy to be pursed by the British Government in regard to Palestine. In spite of the unequivocal resolution adopted by the Labor Ferty Conforence last May in favor of the opening of flastine to unrestricted Jewish immigration and the establishment there of a Jewish migrity; in spite further of the appalling condition of those Jews in Europe who marived the Nazi massacres and for whom there is no hope except among their own people in Palestine, the new Labor Government, from which so much had been expected, sparently intends to continue with slight medifications the infemous policy of the labetime White Paper and to restrict Jewish immigration there to a trickle.

"This policy the Jewish people will never accept. With full awareness of our responsibility as leaders of the Zionist movement in this country, we express the solem werning that such a decision can lead only to a catastrophe. The Jowe of Falestins will undoubtedly resist to the bitter end. They will not stand calmly by and with the finel destruction, after 'liberation,' of the surviving remnants of their irchers and sisters in Europe. Nor will they for themselves accept the prospect of becaming ultimately a minority, tolerated or otherwise, within one of the many Arab Satuss. The recollection is too close of the threats and poproms of the Mufti of Jewiselm and of the massacre of the Assyrian minority by the Arabs of Iraq. They will have the unqualified support of Jews everywhere, as well as of those who have not closed their minds to the horrors vicited on the Jews of Europe.

"We believe that there are still in Britain those whose conscience will not be stilled and who, if they are made aware of the facts, will not permit this cynical denial of aims previously affirmed. At this eleventh hour we call on them to take testion. But we call also on our own Government which bears a major responsibility in this crists. Despite a series of commitments by Fresident Roosevelt reaffirmed by Fresident Truman looking to the opening of Falestime to Jewish immigration and to the establishment of a Jewish State, no effective action has been taken to that ead. The moral and political authority of our Government is deeply involved and we look to the administration of Fresident Truman to take immediate steps to prevent a shameful and perhaps irreparable injustice."

IMEMEBERG, Sept. 23. (JTA) - The president of the court before which the rial of Josef Kramer, "the Beast of Belsen," and 44 of his subordinates is taking place today visited the Bergen-Belsen compessorted by judges and lawyers attached to the prosecution and the defense.

Kramer, who was commandant of the camp, and Dr. Klein, the Nazi doctor respensible for the death of thousands of people there, were also brought to the camp balouffed together and under military guard. # ONLY TRENTY PERCENT OF 140,000 JEWS IN NETHELIANDS SURVIVED NAZI OCCUPATION

ANSTERDAM, Sept. 25. (JTA) — Twenty-five thousand Dutch Jews have already registered with the Jewish Registration Office here, and information concerning another 8,000 is expected to be obtained shortly. Latest figures indicate that 107,000 iss were sent to death camps by the Nazis, and only about 20 percent of the Metherland's Freenr Jewish population of 140,000 have survived.

Roliable sources here say that action will shortly be taken against members of the "Jowish Council" which functioned as a liaison between the Germans and the Jowish community during the East coccupation. The members of the council carried out the crears given them by the Germans, which frequently involved the selection of Jows for deportation and the detailed arrangements for their transfer to concentration camps.

There has been a great deal of vocal and written criticism of the "council" where since Holland was liberated. In reply, those accused of collaborationism have published a statement defending their conduct.
