RIVISH BLACKOUT ON PALESTINE POLICY STILL EFFECTIVE: WILL BE LIFTED BY FRIME MINISTER

LONDON, Sept. 24. (JTA) -- Authorative quarters today stressed that they don't believe for a moment in the truth of a report circulated by Reuters that the Fritish Government has decided to refer the whole issue of Palestine and of Jewish imigration to the United Nations Organization with a statement that this is a responability that all the Allies must share in common.

The same quarters told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency officially that there is still a "complete blackout" with regard to the government's policy on Palestine. This blackout will probably be lifted only by an announcement which Prime Minister Attles hirself is expected to make, they emphasized.

(The Reuter report also stated that British Government circles are displeased with President Truman's letter urging the admission of 100,000 displeased Jews from Europe to Palestine. It added that the British Cabinet had proposed to Truman that the United States should share the responsibility with Britain of settling the mestine problem, but the U.S. authorities turned down the offer; therefore Britein rill amounce that for the time being Jewish immigration to Palestine will be limited to 1,500 persons a month, and that this is a stop-gap policy until the United Nations Organization makes a decision.)

The Manchester Guardian, one of Britain's leading newspapers, today says that resident Truman's request for the immediate admission of 100,000 Jews to Palestine tannot honestly be said to be a helpful contribution to the solution of the Felestine problem," because it would mean the repeal of the White Paper.

"This will have to be done sooner or later," the paper writes, "but it cannot be done without substituting something in its place. It is absurd to imagine that the bitish Government could comply with Truman's request as a temporary expedient which the Arabs would not notice and which would not affect the final decision. Certain modifications might be made and should be made now, but the only solution is a new and final policy which will settle the problem of Pelestine for good."

Admitting the urgency of helping displaced European Jews who desire to go to blestine, the Guardian proposes an alternative energency measure of separating the the from other displaced persons and granting them self-government, and also encouraging vocational training among them. "If they felt that their conditions were tole rable their life was not entirely wasted, they would be more content to wait with patience for a decision which will safeguard their future in Palestine and elsowhere," the eidtorial says.

EDMANN SAIS PAIESTING ISSUE HAS BRACHED CRITICAL STAGE; CRITICIZES LADGE GOVERNMENT

LONDON, Sept. 24. (JTA) - Pointing out that a "critical stage" has again bear-reached in the Palestine issue, Dr. Chaim Weismann, president of the Jewish Agency, total emphasized that the Jewish people will never accept a policy which will prevent the rebuilding of Jewish national life in Pelestines

that Britain in connection with the latest developments concerning Palestine, Dr. Elmenn revealed that the British Government has not yet replied to the demand of the Arish Agency for 100,000 immigration certificates. He told the 600 delegates, who must from all parts of England, that the Jewish Agency rejected an offer by the British inthrities to grant 1,500 Palestine visas to Jews monthly.

#### Charges Cabinet With Adopting Unilateral Decision on Immigration

Dr. Weizmann severely oriticized the Labor Government for continuing the White lager policy. He sharply protested the fact that the government did not confer with representatives of the Jewish Agency, and adopted its decision unilatorally.

"The Government," he reported, "did not see fit to hold any conference with the Jewish Agency which is the internationally-recognized mouthpiece of the Jewish jeople. But the Cabinet must realize that it can not decree the fate of a people without consulting its representatives. Unilateral decisions might be imposed by force, but a policy which would refuse the Jews a chance for rebuilding their national life within their historic homeland is not one to which the Jewish people will ever submit.

"No earthly power could make the homeless Jew turn his back to Palestine," Dr. Seimann continued. "No obstacle will deter him from trying to regain its shoes. Adversities cannot stifle, but will only make more intense the urge for freedom."

## Warns of Increasing Tension Among Jews in Palestine

The leader of the world Zienist movement pointed out that two months have assed since the labor Government assumed office, but the White Paper which was contended by the Labor Party as a breach of faith, is still in force. Jewish emigration to falstine, he said, is at a standstill, while the restrictions against acquisition of land by Jews are being applied most rigorously.

"The state of affairs with regard to immigration is intolerable," he declared."

Nil Jews were being killed in the millions, the world stood aghast, but did nothing to save thom. Now the so-called liberated remmants are comtinuing to deteriorate and to go under, but there is still no resoue. Their misery is indescribable. Lives are being lost daily. The vest majority only demand that they be allowed to proceed to lalsttine, yet the doors are barred."

Dr. Weizmann revealed that when the Jewish Agency rejected the offer of 1,500 tertificates monthly, it informed the British Government that the Agency "could not have sealings on the basis of the immoral and illegal White Faper." He pointed cut that at the rate proposed by the Government it would take a year to evacuate only the refugees to assembled in Italy. He concluded by warning Britain of the increasing tension among the Jews in Palestine.

## END OF U.S. DELEGATION TO PALESTINE FAVORS RETURN OF DISPLACED JEWS TO NATIVE LANDS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24. (STA) -- Rep. Victor Wickersham of Oklahoma, who has hat returned from a visit to Palestine as the head of an eleven-man Congressional deention, today told the Jewish Tenegraphic Agency that he would recommend to the hase of Representatives the return to their former homes of such Jews as could be returned from the displaced persons camps in Europe.

For those who cannot be returned to their homes, Rep. Wickersham will urge imigration to the United States and other countries which are members of the United ations. Only as a last alternative will be propose the sending of such Jews to Palestim, which he believes should be placed under an international trusteeship.

"My group," he said, "feels that Palestine should be an international religias center available to all religions. I don't think Jews should be sent without the full approval of the people in Palestine, Arabs and Jews."

Urging "less agitation" on the Palostine issue in the United States, Rep.
Rickersham said: "It is not the Jews of the United States who want to go to Palestine. If the Jews of the United States did not subsidize those who want to proceed to Palestime, they would be returning to their countries, whence they came. If more Jews are sent in, I fear there will be trouble with the Arabs."

Asked if he favored removing immigration restrictions in the United States in order to accommodate the displaced Jews now in the camps in Germany who could not be returned to their former homes, Wickersham said: "Tes, if the other United Nations all take their proportion." He emphasized that "those of us who are anxious to force the displaced Jews into Palestine, should be willing to divide the others up among ourselves. With 56 United Nations, that would not make a great number for any nation he pointed out, adding that he thought that most of his eleven-men delegation agrees with his viewpoint.

# ESTISH WOMAN COLLAPSES WHILE TESTIFYING AT NAZI CRIMINALS TRIAL; RECOGNIZES HER TORMENTOR

LUENEBERG, Germany, Sept. 24. (JTA) -- Sophia Litwinska, one of the Jewish women who survived Nazi torture at the Oswiecim extermination camp, today collapsed while testifying before a British military occurt here, when she reorgaized among the 45 Mazi criminals on triel one of the S.S. guards who forced her and 3,000 other women to parade maked, before sending them to the gus chambers.

The guard, whose name is Hoessler, was one of the deputies of Josef Kramer, the "Beast of Belsen," who is on triel with 44 of his assistants, for atrocities committed upon the immates of the Oswiecim and Bergen-Belsen camps. Mrs. Litwinska was able to resume after she was given first aid by a British Army nurse.

Facing the 45 Nazis responsible for the extermination of hundreds of thousands of Jews and others - among whom there are nineteen woman - Mrs. Littlenska wert as the told of her horrible experiences in the Oswiecim gas chamber, where she and other Jewish women were driven under showers that sprayed poison gas instead of water. She desoribed the frantic cries of the victims and the dense, choking fumes.

Mrs. Litwinska was taken from the gas chamber while still alive, because the camp administration decided at the last minute that she could still be used for forced labor. She was gut to cleaning latrices with her bore hands, she told the court, emphasizing that she was arrested in Lublin by the Mazis only because she was a Jewess, and was sent to the Oswiecim camp immediately after her arrest in May, 1940.

- .5. Basic factor is psychological attitude. This is the year of liberation in the opportunities for constructive aid abroad are unsurgassed. At home we can plan ith courage and imagination for the needs of today and tomorrow.
- 6. While war chests are on their way back to peace time community chest level also Jawa are still acutely aware of pressing and unsolved Jawash problems.
- .7. Will communities have the experience and competence to put over effective fall campaigns.

## MERICAN JEWISH CONFERENCE NAMES THREE TO WORK WITH UNRRA AMONG DISPLACED JEWS

NEW YORK, Sept. 24. (JTA) -- Throe representatives of the American Jewish Conference will go abroad to work with UNERA for the rehebilitation of displaced Jews in the American zone of occupation in Germany and Austrie, the conference announced today. Herbert H. Lehman, UNERA director general; in a letter to the conference gave the go-shead signal on the project, which was originally broached to the War Department by the conference early in May, soon after V-E day, and later submitted to UNERA.

In addition to three already named, the conference will appoint three other representatives, two of whom are now in Europe engaged in similar work, as soon as they can be released from their present assignments. The three persons accredited today are: Major Alfred Fletshman of St. Louis, Mos, who has relinquished his post as this of the Special Projects Branch, Office of the Air Surgeon, in Washington, Hans lam of New York, who is now assistant to the director of the American Zionist Emergency Council and Dean Sammel L. Ser of Yeshiva College in New York City, who did extensive work in Europe to promote and revitalize Jewish religious and educational institutions after the last World War.
