ATTIRE'S STATEMENT ON PALESTINE EXPECTED TOMORROW; LABORITES SEEK TO EASE WHITE PAPER

LONDON, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Although the majority of the British Labor Farty fevors the abolition of the White Paper and the immediate opening of Palestine to Jewish immigration, it was understood here today that Prime Minister Attlee is not premered to go beyond slight modifications and that the White Paper, for the time being, vill continue to remain the basis of British official policy with regard to Palestine.

The Palestine problem will come up for discussion tomorrow at a meeting of labor members of Porlicment. It was emphasized here today that despite Attlee's attitude, leading members of the Labor Party are doing their best to exert influence on the labor Government in order to obtain maximum concessions for Jews in the statement which Attlee is expected to make on Thursday in the House of Commons.

TERTY-ONE CONGRESSIEN PROTEST IN HOUSE AGAINST PALESTINE POLICY OF BRITISH GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Seventeen Democratic and Republican Congressmen joined in an hour's protest in the House of Representatives today against the British Covernment's refusal to date to accede to President Trumen's request for admission of 100,000 Jewish refugees into Palestine, and simultaneously called for establishment of & free and democratic Jewish Commonwealth in Palestine.

Fourteen additional Representatives, nine Democrats and five Republicans, who did not have time to speak, will have their remarks printed in the "Congressional Record."

Starting off the discussion, Representative John W. McCormack, Democrat of Messachusetts, majority leader of the House, warned the British Government that "they will make a great mistake if they do not appropriate the depth of American feeling" on abrogation of the White Paper and fulfilment of British pledges on Palostine . Describing the "intense, deep-rooted, widespread feeling which permeates all classes of our people," McCormack declared that "every effort should be made by our Government and other governments of good will to-save the remnants of this historic people...their rehebilitation constitutes a challenge to mankind which should be met immediately."

The majority leader lauded President Truman's "splendid action" in asking for the prompt admission of 100,000 displaced Jews into Palestine, declaring that is the imediate objective, while "the long time objective is creation as contemplated of a free and democratic Jewish Commonwealtha" He charged that Britain's "cruel policy" in Palestine was part of provailing appeasement which prevented hundreds of thousands of homeless Jews from finding refuge.

Rep. Herman P. Eberharter, Democrat of Pennsylvania, who apportioned the time for the speakers, ridiculed the "arab bogey" and the "Jewish bogey" invoked recently by the Frime Minister of Iraq. He declared that "a Jewish State in Palestine can be a .T.d. HETS

ridgs between East and West and a fructifying influence for the whole of the backand and powerty-stricken Middle East."

Charging that the Arab League is British created and controlled, Rep. Hugh Wesy, Democrat of Washington, declared "there will be no end to imperialism while worful groups within the United States and Britain for the sake of oil concessions and commanding positions on trade routes, are permitted to play Arab against Jew and ke against Arab in Falostine, making contradictory sets of promises to each and keephe mitter.

Urges Jews and Arabs to Join in Demanding End of Mandate

De Lacy urged Big Three action for an early solution of the Palestim issue, to tring "domocratic government, cultural autonomy and suitable and equal economic operunity to Jow and Arch alike in Palestine as a means of satisfying the legitimate dress of two peoples and stabilizing an important area of the worlds" He proposed that Jewish and Arch peoples demand the end of Britain's mandate, and the conwing of a congress to frame a democratic constitution ensuring free elections, representation and cultural autonomy for all.

Rep. Charles A. Halleck of Indiana, Republican minority leader, asserted that a resolution on Palestino which was approved by the House Foreign Affairs Committee less December, was never reported out of the Rules Committee because of Administration opposition.

Rep. Chase Going Woodhouse, Democrat of Connecticut, urged that Congress immediately pass a resolution declaring that the United States use its good offices toward opening of Pelestine for free entry of Jews and looking toward establishment of a free and democratic Commonwealth. She declared that despite pledges by both political perties and a majority of Congress, the State Department "answers inquiries to the effect that these received no instructions from the White House as to U.S. policy in regard to Pelestine," She said that the American people favor opening Palestine to Jewish register in Europe, "We should ask that our Government officials charged with administring our foreign affairs be instructed as to this feeling," Mrs. Woodhouse stated.

Rep. Chat Holifield, Democrat of California, declared that Arab hostility to write expansion in Falestine is "greatly over-emphasized." He expressed the opinion that "reactionary loaders among both the original Jewish inhabitants and Arab fanatics," with the acquiescence of the British, have encouraged the existing hostility. He said that a Jowish Palestine is "right policy" not only because it was promised to the Jews and as roward for their sufferings, but "because such a policy seems to me to be most in accord with American interests."

Says Oil Interests Responsible for "Shameful Hypocrisy" on Palestim

Rep. Thomas Lane, Democrat of Massachusetts, declared that "active interest in all lines" in Arab countries neighboring Palastine is largely responsible for the "shareful hypocrisy" toward that problem. "We have the right to demand that Britain work with us for a solution and not an evasion of this problem," Lane said.

Rep. Goodwin, Republican of Messachusetts, said Britain has the duty to repudiate the White Paper and the U.S. has a duty to act "vigorously" for that end, while helping to bring about a Jewish Homeland in Palestine.

Rop. John Coffee, Democrat of Washington, favored establishment of a Jewish homeland in Palestine. Rep. Philbin, Democrat of Massachusetts, urged that the President and State Department intensify efforts toward opening the doors of Palestine for

THER-DAY CONFE. ENCE OF CLRISTIAN MINISTERS APPEALS TO ATTLEE FOR A JEWISH PALESTINE

METYORA, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- The American Christian Palestine Committee, at a dinner tonight concluding its three-day conference on Palestine, addressed an appeal to Prime Minister Attlee emphasizing that the difficulties in carrying out the Labor harty's pledges on Palestine, as well as the ostablishment of a self-governing Jewish Commommenth there, can be overcome "if your government and ours act jointly, and with the backing of all the United Nations, to create an international trusteeship which will ensure the free passage and settlement of all Jews who might wish to go to Palestine in the expectation of finding permanent security under, a government of their own thoseir."

The appeal emphasized that the organization speaks for "more than 2,000 Christian ministers and more than 250 members of Congress.

The conference also sent a message to President Truman thanking him for his request that Britain admit 100,000 Jews to Palestine and asking that "the United States take all action required to convince all parties that it is determined to see a Jewish formsealth established in Palestine as a permanent home for the Jewish people."

ES, BISENHOURR REPORTS TO THUMAN ON IMPROVEMENT IN TREATMENT OF DISPLACED JEWS

MESHINGTON, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- General Dwight D. Risenhower, in a 2,000-word mply to President Truman's letter of August 31, transmitting the Harrison report on comitions among displaced persons, particularly Jews, in Germany and Austria, has assured the President that "real and honest efforts" have been made to improve the living standards of these people.

In his letter, dated Oct. 8, and released today by the White House, Gen. Eisenbær points out the difficult housing problems faced in the U.S. zone and states that hasing "is on a reasonable besis," and that minimum daily calories "for racial, religues and political persecutees" have been raised to 2,500. Adequate and suitable ching and shoes have been made available, according to the General, and "uniformly smellent medical attention is available to all Jewish people in our centers where the two generally adequate sanitary facilities."

Stating that army surveillance had been perhaps "overzealous," Eisenhower quoted from a lotter he has sent to subordancte commanders, directing that volunteer unsered displaced persons should themselves do the necessary guarding. "Everything should be done to moourage the displaced persons to understand that they have been freed from tyramy," directed Eisenhower, "and that the supervision exercised over them is merely that necessary for their own protection and well-being, and to facilitate essential mintenance," Eisenhower further has instructed that military supervisors may be emplowed but are to be used as sentries only in emergency.

Says Army Working With Expert Advice of UMRRA and Jewish Agencies

Gen. Eisenhower acknowledged that "in certain instances we have fallen below standerd," but pointed to the intricate problems of readjustment from "combat to mass retriction and then to the present statio phase with its unique welfare problem." He wild that the Army was conscious of these problems and working on them with the expert strice of URRAL, Jewish agencies and our chaplains."

In freely admitting need for improvement, Eisenhower called attention to need for more books in the schools, for further development of leisure time and welfare activities, fostering of paid employment outside the centers, obtaining of additional quantities of furniture, bedding and fuel. He said progress had been made in reuniting failies but that postal communications between displaced persons and their relatives and friends cannot yet be insugurated.

"You can expect our continued activity to meet the needs of persecuted people,"

"he. Bischhower wrote the President." Perfection never will be attained, Mr. Fresident,
but real and honest efforts are being made to provide suitable living conditions for
these persecuted people until they can be permenently resettled in other areas."

The letter informed the President that special centers have been established for devish displaced persons, under the supervision of the Joint Distribution Committee. Those Jews who are without nationality or those not Soviet citizens who do not desire to return to their country of origin," are installed in these centers.

Asserting that it has "always been our practice, not just our policy" to remove verish and other victims "with utmost speed from concentration comps," Eisenhower said there were "perhaps 1,000-Jews still in their former concentration camps at the time of "r. Harrison's report," because they were too sick to be moved then. The letter catesistically states that "no Jewish or other displaced persons have been housed in these places longer than was absolutely necessary for medical quarantine and recovery from the cate illness."

RIGHT OF VIENNESE JEWS DISCUSSED AT CONFERENCE WITH U.S. AKMY REPRESENTATIVES

VIENCA, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Discrimination against Jews in the allocation of sertents, business licenses and food rations was discussed today with American militry representatives here by a delegation of the Vienna Jewish community.

Acting upon an invitation from Gen, Mark Clark, American representative on the Allied Control Commission for Austria, the delegation, which was headed by David will, chairman of the Jewish community council, presented written and verbal evidence of the slight of the Viennese Jews.

Brig. Gon. Lester D. Flory, who received the Jewish group in the absence of fam. Clark, who is in the United States, suggested that detailed proposals for remedying the situation be prepared and presented to Gen. Clark upon his return. At the sax time, Gen. Flory emphasized that the matter would have to be discussed with the other three powers on the control commission, and that any action would have to come from the Austrian Government.

800 ERS FROM POLAND AND HUNGARY ARRIVING VIENKLY IN BRITISH ZONE IN AUSTRIA

LONDOH, Oct. 16. (JTA) — Jews from Foland and Hungary attempting to reach Elestine are arriving at the rate of 500 weekly in the British zone in Austria, a Hemm dispatch to the Manchester Guardian reports. It adds that the arrivals report that 100,000 are en route. A conference of the four Allied powers is to be held in Hemm this week to discuss the problem.

The newcomers present themselves to the British authorities with a request that they be housed in displaced persons camp until they can proceed to Falestine via haly, the dispatch says. It points out that there is evidence of organization behind the infiltration, since groups are apparently guided across the frontier, some arrive with mowledge of the comp names and the names of the commanders and many have a definite idea as to just where they want to go.

British authorities have been placed in a difficult position by the wave of eigents, the correspondent says, because there is not sufficient room in the camps for all of them, and, technically, the errivals are not displaced persons, although since they refuse to return from whence they came some arrangements have to be made for them. It present about 3,000 are quertered in camps at Judenburg and Trofciach.

NUISH ELESS ATTACKS BRITISH OFFICER WHO DESCRIBED OSWIECIM VICTIMS AS "DREGS OF GHETTO"

MARSAN, Oct., 16. (JTA) — The entire Polish press sharply attacks Major Claude Manord, one of the British defense counsel in the Lucysburg trial of 45 guards at Ossish and Belsen, for his reference to the Nazis' victims as "dregs of the ghetto." Despits from their editorials were broadcast in Yiddish over the Warsaw radio.

The newspaper Zywie Werszawy writes that "it is now proved that the horror same were useful humanitarian institutions. At long last the mass exterminations have ben justified." The paper adds that "Winwood's place is in the dock alongside his collegues, the Bolsen assassins."

At the same time, the press reports that there has just been discovered in the wrish cemetery at Viroclaw (formerly Breslau) mass graves in which uncounted thousands of wes from Italy, Franco, Belgium and Holland are buried. They were deported from minus concentration camps to Breslau and murdered. The cemetery also contains a mass grave of 2,000 Polish Jawa.

DES-DAY COMPER NCE ON JUDAISM MARKS 70TH ANNIVERSARY OF HEBREW UNION COLLEGE

It is our test at this historic moment to contribute the best that is within us toward the creating of a brotherhood of men in a united world;"

CHICAGO, Oct. 16. (JTA) — A huge mass meeting last night, which filled Chiwe Stadium, heard Senator Alben Barkley of Kentucky denounce Britain's "closed-door"

"When President Truman asked the British Prime Minister to let 100,000 Jews now into Palestine, he meant exactly what he said," Sen. Barkley said. "With the support of the American people, I believe the President will be able to persuede the British Government to permit the movement."

Speakers included Mayor Edward Kelly of Chicago, and Max Silberman, president of the Zienist Organization of Chicago.
