Anti-Semitism distorted our outlook, and we made grave erms. It is hard to admit mistakes, but the whole existence of our people is in questing we Maxis must have the courage to rid ourselves of anti-Semitism. We have to deduce to the youth that it was a mistake."

ESTADRUTH LEADER DISCUSSES ZIONIST AIMS WITH SOVIET AMBASSADOR IN PARIS

PARIS, Oct. 26. That is the report brought here today by Dr. Joseph Schwartz, European Diator of the Joint Distribution Committee, upon his return from an extensive trip to hand during which he made a study of Jovish needs there.

The repatriation of 150,000 Polish Jews from the USSR, he stated, is now going as. The repatriation is not compulsory, and the Jewish refugees will be allowed to make in Soriet Russia or to return to Poland.

Dr. Schwarts was not able to determine the number of Polish Jews who may those to roturn from the USSR to Poland. He said that it is expected that the Polish Remember will encourage the settlement of these repatriated Jews, as well as other with survivors, in Silesian territory acquired by Poland from Germany.

Jewish settlement in Silesia, Dr. Schwartz declared, started spontaneously with after the liberation of surviving Jews from extermination camps located in the ferm part of Silesia. The Silesian province, he added, is one of the rare sections - prings the only section in Poland - where housing facilities are available. Polish substities are removing the Germans and are putting the houses at the disposal of Jews.

Dr, Schwartz found the food situation in Poland not too serious, and even methat better than in France. However, he stressed the huge needs of the Jewish surtions for clothing and medical care.
