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PALESTINE RESOLUTION INTRODUCED IN SENATE; OFFICIALS MUM ON TRUMAN-ATTLEE AGREEMENT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. (JTA) — Senators Robert F. Wagner of New York and Robert A. Taft of Ohio today introduced a joint resolution calling for unlimited immigration of Jews to Palestine.

The resolution provides that "the United States shall use its good offices to the end that the doors of Palestine shall be opened for free entry of Jews into that country and that there shall be full opportunity for colonization so that they may reconstitute Palestine as a free and democratic commonwealth in which all men regardless of race or creed shall enjoy equal rights."

Official sources today declined to comment on the report that President Truman and Prime Minister Attlee have reached an agreement calling for United States cooperation with Britain in a joint policy for Palestine.

A White House spokesman said there was no word about the report. At the State Department queries were referred to Secretary of State James F. Byrnes, who was not available.

From unofficial sources the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that an address on Palestine in the House of Commons by Attlee, scheduled for this week, was postponed because of the continuing discussions now going on between the State Department and Downing Street.

Palestine Issue May Be Referred to United Nations under Truman-Attlee Pact

LONDON, Oct. 26. (JTA) — Although there was no official confirmation here today of the report that the British and American Governments had reached an agreement on Palestine, after an exchange of correspondence between Prime Minister Attlee and President Truman, reliable quarters said that there were good hopes that such an agreement would be consummated.

The political correspondent of Reuters says today that Attlee is likely to report that a substantial advance in Anglo-American cooperation on Palestine has been achieved, when he makes his expected statement in the House of Commons shortly. He says that although details of the Truman-Attlee negotiations have not been disclosed, there still remains the possibility the two might agree to refer the entire Palestine problem to the United Nations.

The Daily Telegraph reports today that Abdul Rahman Azzam Bey, secretary-general of the Arab League, has cancelled his projected visit to the United States and is leaving tomorrow for Cairo. He will call a meeting of the league on Monday, the Telegraph says, to report on his discussions with Attlee and Foreign Minister Bevin.

Zionist circles today disclosed that immediately after his visit to America, which is expected to take place next month, Dr. Chaim Weizmann will return to Palestine and devote all his time to the Sieff Institute at Rehovoth.

10,000 MORE BRITISH TROOPS DUE IN PALESTINE; SHIP BRINGS 1,003 JEWS FROM EUROPE

JERUSALEM, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- The already formidable British garrison in Palestine is to be reinforced by another 10,000 troops, who are due to arrive in Haifa during the week-end, according to reliable reports. Meanwhile, it was announced that a British army hospital based in Egypt, and another from Syria, have been transferred to Palestine.

Three hundred Jewish refugees disembarked today from the Rumanian-Soviet steamer Transylvania, which arrived at Haifa early this morning from Constanza, bearing 1,003 Jewish immigrants from Poland, Hungary and Rumania. The remaining passengers are expected to leave the vessel tomorrow night after they have been subjected to a rigid health inspection, because of a report that there was typhus aboard the ship. Passage for the group was provided by the Joint Distribution Committee.

RE. N. NAZI LEADER, LEAVES NOTE URGING GERMANS TO RID NATION OF ANTI-SEMITISM

MUNICH, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- Dr. Robert Ley, Nazi Labor Front chief who committed suicide in his war criminal cell last night, left a written appeal to the German people to rid themselves of anti-Semitism, emphasizing that Germany suffered defeat because of the Nazi anti-Jewish teachings. The appeal, written in German, reads as follows:

"We have forsaken God, and therefore we were forsaken by God. We put human religion in the place of His godly grace. In anti-Semitism we violated a basic commandment of His creation. Anti-Semitism distorted our outlook, and we made grave errors. It is hard to admit mistakes, but the whole existence of our people is in question; we Nazis must have the courage to rid ourselves of anti-Semitism. We have to declare to the youth that it was a mistake."

HISTADRUTH LEADER DISCUSSES ZIONIST AIMS WITH SOVIET AMBASSADOR IN PARIS

PARIS, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- The present political situation in Palestine and the Jewish community's struggle to secure abrogation of the White Paper were outlined to Soviet Ambassador Alexander Bogomolov by H. Orenstein, a Histadruth delegate to the recent world trade union conference here and a leader of the left-wing Hashomer Hatzair.

Orenstein expressed the hope, during his conversation with Bogomolov, that the Soviet Union and other great powers would assist in the rescuing of the surviving Jews in Europe. He presented the Ambassador with recently published Hebrew translations of a volume on Lenin by Stalin and a novel by Konstantin Siminov, Russian war correspondent, based on the battle for Stalingrad.

The Palestine labor leader told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that he felt that the resolution adopted at the trade union conference, calling for increased Jewish immigration and understanding between Jews and Arabs, would have considerable influence. He revealed that Vicente Lombardo Toledano, head of the Latin American federation of labor, would tour Palestine shortly on behalf of the World Federation of Trade Unions.

JEWS IN PALESTINE DEMAND ABROGATION OF PALESTINE MANDATE; HOLD CONFERENCE IN JAFFA

TEL AVIV, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- A conference of Arab political groups opened in Jaffa today to discuss a demand for the abrogation of the Palestine Mandate and the establishment of Palestine as an Arab State. The agenda of the conference also includes the question of disarming the Jews in Palestine.

POLAND IS LIKE A CEMETERY, DR. SCHWARTZ REPORTS; JEWS AMAZED TO FIND THEMSELVES ALIVE

PARIS, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- "Poland is like a big cemetery. When two Jews meet each other on the street, they are both startled to find themselves alive."

That is the report brought here today by Dr. Joseph Schwartz, European Director of the Joint Distribution Committee, upon his return from an extensive trip to Poland during which he made a study of Jewish needs there.

The repatriation of 150,000 Polish Jews from the USSR, he stated, is now going on. The repatriation is not compulsory, and the Jewish refugees will be allowed to remain in Soviet Russia or to return to Poland.

Dr. Schwartz was not able to determine the number of Polish Jews who may choose to return from the USSR to Poland. He said that it is expected that the Polish Government will encourage the settlement of these repatriated Jews, as well as other Jewish survivors, in Silesian territory acquired by Poland from Germany.

Jewish settlement in Silesia, Dr. Schwartz declared, started spontaneously shortly after the liberation of surviving Jews from extermination camps located in the German part of Silesia. The Silesian province, he added, is one of the rare sections - perhaps the only section in Poland - where housing facilities are available. Polish authorities are removing the Germans and are putting the houses at the disposal of Jews.

Dr. Schwartz found the food situation in Poland not too serious, and even somewhat better than in France. However, he stressed the huge needs of the Jewish survivors for clothing and medical care.

POLISH JEWS HAVE ADAPTED THEMSELVES TO NEW LIFE IN KIRGHIZIA; WORK IN FIELD, FACTORIES

MOSCOW, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- The majority of the several thousand Polish Jews who at the beginning of the war were evacuated to Kirghizia from Russian-acquired Polish territory have adopted themselves to the new conditions of life and acquired new trades which give them an opportunity to live a normal life, it was reported here today from Frunze, capital of the Kirghizian Soviet Republic.

About 2,500 of the Polish Jews are employed in factories and on construction work as well as in offices and on collective farms, in the Frunze region alone. Others are working in the Osk and in Djalalabad regions, chiefly in timber yards and in coal pits. About 150 Polish Jews topped their production norms working at construction of a new power station in Voroshilovsk, and 200 Polish Jews are participating in the building of a railway which will connect Frunze with the regions of Tian-Shan and Ilyk-Kul.

Local authorities are helping the Polish Jews to adjust themselves since most of them were formerly small traders and artisans in Poland. Many of the Jews made the adjustment easily and some of them have received prizes and certificates of merit. Abraham Makover, a Jewish engineer who had been jobless in pre-war Poland, is building sugar refineries in the Frunze region. Rivka Kotlitskaya is chief engineer of a thermo-electric station of a sugar refinery in Karabalty. Polish Jews are also working on peat fields, forty kilometers from the city of Frunze.

BODIES OF 512 NAZI VICTIMS, MOSTLY HUNGARIAN JEWS, UNEARTHED IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA

PRAGUE, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- The bodies of 512 victims of the Nazis, mostly Hungarian Jews, have been unearthed at Ceske Velenice, the Prague radio reports. Death resulted from hunger and cold, the broadcast said.

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BRITISH REFUGEE BIOLOGIST CO-WINNER OF NOBEL AWARD FOR WORK ON PENICILLIN

NEW YORK, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- Dr. Ernst Boris Chain, a Jewish biologist who was forced to flee Germany after the advent of the Nazis, has been named co-winner of the 1945 Nobel prize for physiology and medicine for his work in developing penicillin. It was announced in Stockholm last night. The other winners are Sir Alexander Fleming and Sir Howard Walter Florey, British scientists.

Dr. Chain, who is now in New York on a mission for the Medical Research Council of Great Britain, has been a British citizen since 1939 and is a lecturer at Oxford University. In pre-Hitler days he was active in Jewish cultural life in Berlin and was a member of the well known "Sholem Aleichem Literary Club" there.

LONDON BOROUGH COUNCIL SCORES MAYOR FOR ASKING REPATRIATION OF REFUGEES

LONDON, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- At a stormy meeting of the Hampstead Borough Council today, Labor and Liberal members attacked the mayor and 300 other signers of a petition which urged the forced repatriation of refugees now living in England.

Charging the mayor with "fascist and anti-Semitic tendencies," the council adopted a resolution charging that the signatories of the petition "were taking the first step on the road to Belsen." It stressed that repatriation of aliens cannot be pursued without discrimination and disregard for the many considerations involved.

RE-LOCATED JEWS WANT TO GO TO PALESTINE, SAYS RED CROSS REPRESENTATIVE

NEW YORK, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- Ninety-five percent of the Jewish refugees in Europe would like to emigrate to Palestine, while the others want to join relatives in the United States and Britain, Harvey D. Gibson, American Red Cross representative who has just returned from an inspection tour of displaced persons camps in Europe, said today.

Mr. Gibson, who arrived home last night by air from England, said that on his visit to the D.P. camps, which he made at the invitation of General Eisenhower, he found that conditions were much improved over what they had been several months ago. He reported that the inmates were being well cared for and receiving an adequate diet.

VETERAN'S HEAD LAUDS REHABILITATION MATERIAL PREPARED BY JWB WOMEN'S DIVISION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. (JTA) -- Designed to assist community groups in developing a program for the reabsorption of returning veterans to civilian life, an "attitude education" kit, characterized as "a welcome contribution to veteran welfare" by General Omar B. Bradley, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, was presented to him yesterday in his office at the Veterans' Administration by Mrs. Alfred E. Bachrach of New York City, chairman of the Women's Division of the National Jewish Welfare Board.

General Bradley commended Mrs. Bachrach and the organization she represented in the preparation of the kit, saying that "although it is well recognized that the veteran faces many new and strange problems in his return to civilian life, what many people do not seem to be sufficiently aware of is that the attitudes and actions of civilians toward the former service man and woman also need guidance and direction."

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
