ENT ADOPTS PALESTIME RESOLUTION BY OVERTHELMING VOTE, HOUSE OPENS HEARINGS ON MEASURE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17. (JTA) -- The Senate tonight adopted the Wagner-Taft mediation on Palestine, overriding the protests of Sen. Tom Connally, who asserted that "the President of the United States doesn't want this resolution.

Passage of the resolution by an overwhelming voice vote followed defeat of m mondment by Sen. Thomas Hart, of Connecticut, which had asked that the word "free" b struck from the section of the resolution asking "free immigration into Palestine," m proposed other changes weakening the resolution.

The Senate began consideration of the resolution early today, but interrupted the debate for several hours to act on a bill appropriating funds for UNRRA, for which km. Consally secured precedence. Although many Democratic and Repulican Senators wised their support of the bill, the opposition was confined mainly to Connally, who ast the sole vote against the measure in the Foreign Relations Committee last week.

Manwhile, on the other side of the Capitol, the Foreign Affairs Committee of the House of Representatives began hearings today on an identical resolution, which was introduced lest week by Rep. Daniel Flood of Pennsylvania.

Wagner, Taft Say Resolution Meeded As Guide to Inquiry Committee

Opening the debate in the Senate, both Wagner and Taft said immediate adoption of the resolution was imperative so that the Anglo-American Committee on Pelestine weld know that the traditional American policy with regard to Palestine had been redfirmed.

Wagner said: "We do not want the committee to have the discretion to make its own decisions on matters of fundemental policy. We do not want the committee to Meast promises or reformulate objectives. We do not want the committee to substitute the judgment of a few men, however worthy, for the intent and determination of the Amerisan Congress and the American people. We should, by this resolution, let the committee know what we want it to do, and we expect it to do just that without delay.

Taft addeds "We intend this resolution to be a reaffirmation of the Balfour belaration. We are clearly committed by gronise and obligation as solemnly as pos-tible to carry this through. " Sen. Abbon Barkley, of Kentucky, majority londer, also spoke in favor of the resolutions

Lessing J. Rosenweld, chairman of the American Council for Judaism, told the Foreign Affairs Committee that he opposed passage of the resolution and objected to its use of the parases "Jewish National Homeland" and "free entry." Committee Chairma Sol Bloom asked what alternatives Rosenwald could suggest and Rosenwald replied that while not advocating any alternatives, he would suggest that Russia take many Jaws urtant than ever.

VIENNA, Dec. 17. (JTA) -- The disapproval of the Allied Control Commission is resulted in the dropping of one prominent anti-Semite from the cabinet of the new intrian government, but another, who is even more prominent, remains.

in attention two weeks so with the temporary resignation of Dr. Leo Srole, camp welfare director, have been ameliorated, according to a report received today from A.C. blassgold, camp director. While denying that conditions at their worst could be comered with those of former Nazi slave labor camps, Glassgold did affirm that improvements are being made.

Friday and Saturday 1,000 inmates were taken from Landsberg to Eunich, where a settlement built by the German Labor Service has been turned into a D.P. femily center. Additional relief camps are being planned and the population at Landsberg will be lept to the 4,200 for which there is adequate room, said Glassgold. A COMPERENCE CLOSES; DEMANDS JEWS RECEIVE AID COMMENSURATE WITH THEIR SUFFERINGS

ATLANTIC CITY, Dec. 17. (JTA) — The three-day conference of the United Jewis Ingal concluded today after adopting a resolution asking that surviving Jews in imp, regardless of their present citizenship status, "should have equal access to all facilities provided by governmental and intergovernmental bodies for the relief, sublitation and resettlement of the victims of war and oppression."

The resolution emphasized that Jows must receive from these agencies "aid creaturate with their adnormal misery and their exceptional hardships." "We are remind," the resolution continued, "that insofar as it lies within the range of our real support, and our material resources, the Jews who have survived this time of unrelicited destruction shall be enabled to live again as free, and equal human beings. It is lands in which they live they must be granted the civil and religious status of all other citizens."

A sharp attack on UNRRA was voiced last night by Joseph Rosenzaft, the chairned the condition of displaced Jews in the British some in Germany. Ex Rosenzaft chargthe URRA with replacing Jewish doctors and nurses in the Belsen hospital with Germi physicians and nurses, wearing Nazi uniforms.

Rosenzaft praised the JDC for its work at the Belsen camp, but severely crimized the Vaad haatzala, declaring that the latter organization has done nothing for the Jews in camps in the British zone.

Capt. Robert Camzon of Paris, the president of the Jewish Scout organization of France, and a leader of a Jewish Maquis unit, addressing the conference, stressed mutths survival of 150,000 Jews in France is due primarily to the efforts of the family people to protect their Jewish neighbors, "We can say without any exaggeration that one time or another during the Mazi occupation every Jew who is alive today was said by a non-Jew," he declared. "The French people, at great risks, shielded the sain their midst.from Nazi oppression and took special pains to save Jewish chilten."

Capt. Gamzon, who is the grandson of the lete chief Rabbi Alfred Levi of James, expressed the gratitude of the Jews of France for the assistance extended to the yamerican Jews through the JDC during the dark period of the occupation. He appelled for further aid, emphasizing that if American Jews continue sending help to the arriving Jews of France, they will bring about the emergence of a new and vigorous waim that will be the answer of Franch Jewry to Hitler's destruction.

Today's session of the conference was devoted primarily to discussion of elabrate plans for assuring the success of the \$100,000,000 United Jewish Appeal campin for 1946, which the conference proclaimed yesterday. A report on the surviving Jews of Belgium was given last night by Faul Phillipson of Brussels, the vice chairman of the Association of Jewish War Victims in Belgium. He said that there are no more than 35,000 Jews in Belgium, and that they rether assistance to help them survive the winter. He praised the Belgium Government is its sympathetic attitude towards the Jews, but indicated that relief must be forthman; from the Jews of the United States, if Belgian Jewry is to be enabled to regain its former strength and status.

Dr. Abraham Granovsky, chairman of the board of directors of the Jewish Natimal Fund in Jerusalem, reported to the conference on the accomplishments of the JNF, massing that the organization is in great need of large amounts of money, because it is faced by a persistent and acute rise in the cost of land in Palestine. He expressed the conviction that Palestine can solve the problem of the homeless Jews of large.

Major Judah Naidich, former adviser to Gen. WE FINDS MAY FORCE FEPC TO QUIT; DERECTOR SAYS JOB DISCRIMINATION MOUNTING

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17. (JTA) -- The Fair Employment Practices Commission may at oretire in a few months when its present funds of \$63,000 have come to an end, the director Ealcolm Ross told newsmen today after a White House conference with Presignature.

"If these people use violence against anybody during their meetings," the hilly Express" reported Ede as saying, "then they will be dealt with by the pelice in the ordinary way. There is nothing to prevent them holding meetings, but they must foliathe rules the same as everyone else."
