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### PALESTINE GOVT. REPORTED READY TO ALLOW CONTINUED IMMIGRATION DESPITE ARAB OPPOSITION

JERUSALEM, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- The Palestine Government is expected to announce next week that it will allow continued Jewish immigration during the period in which the Anglo-American inquiry committee is making its investigations, despite yesterday's rejection by the Arab Higher Committee of the High Commissioner's suggestion that 1,500 Jews be allowed to enter monthly until the committee announces its findings.

According to reliable sources, the Arabs will agree to the interim immigration on condition that the immigrants be children or aged persons, and that the Government promise that no matter what the inquiry commission decides, nothing will be done without consultation with and approval by the Arabs. These sources stressed, however, that the Government has made up its mind to announce the continued immigration regardless of any Arab conditions.

Tel Aviv was placed out of bounds for British policemen off duty today, following the distribution, last night, by the Irgun Zvai Leumi, of leaflets admitting responsibility for the bombings in Jerusalem Saturday night, and warning that they were only the beginning of retaliations for the killing of "two of our soldiers in Eritrea."

About 7,000 Jews have been detained for questioning within the last few days in connection with Saturday's violence. They comprise about twenty percent of the Jewish male population of this city. Yesterday, 1,070 were detained and nine held for further questioning.

### UNO COMMITTEE CONSIDERING JEWISH AGENCY PROTEST AGAINST ARAB LEAGUE BOYCOTT

LONDON, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- A sub-committee of the UNO Assembly's General Committee will tonight consider a protest by the Jewish Agency against the boycott of Jewish goods from Palestine proclaimed by the Arab League, it was announced at a press conference today by a UNO spokesman.

The protest, which will be taken up together with other memorandums submitted to the UNO by private organizations, declares that economic warfare against a section of the population of a neighboring country is inconsistent with the purpose and spirit of the UNO, and contrary to the provisions of its charter.

The Agency also pointed out that the Arab states, which were the last to declare war on the Axis, have been the first to offend the charter by action causing racial incitement and economic discrimination characteristic of the Nazi-Fascist regimes. It added that this action has been taken against Jews who, in Palestine and elsewhere, cooperated actively in the military and economic war effort of the Allies.

The Agency memorandum appeals to the Assembly to inform the Arab states that a racial boycott is inconsistent with their obligations as UNO members, and to urge them to withdraw it.

ATTLEE BACKS BEVIN ON TRANSJORDAN; LASKI SAYS LOVE WILL COMPLICATE PALESTINE PROBLEM

LONDON, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- Prime Minister Clement Attlee today told the House of Commons that he was in full agreement with Foreign Minister Bevin's proposal to the United Nations Organization concerning British mandates, which included the establishment of Transjordan as an independent state.

The Prime Minister said that he had nothing to add regarding Middle East mandates, except that Emir Abdullah of Transjordan has accepted the Government's invitation to come to London to discuss matters concerning his country's independence.

Prof. Harold Laski, chairman of the executive committee of the Labor Party, however, said today that independence for Transjordan will make "the Palestine tangle more difficult than ever, since the administrative separation of the two territories is mainly artificial."

In an article written for the Overseas News Agency, Laski supported Bevin's position that no action on Palestine should be taken until the findings of the Anglo-American inquiry committee are made public, but added:

"That to my mind only made it more strange that he should have announced the forthcoming acceptance of Transjordan as an independent Arab state under the trusteeship of Emir Abdullah. What exactly lies behind this he did not seek to explain. Transjordan is mostly a desert country, the artificial separation of which from Palestine in the '20s by the British Government was in large part an attempt to smooth out the conflict of Arab dynamic tangles."

Laski charged that a result of the Transjordan move "is to narrow the area within which the Anglo-American commission can look for a solution to the problem with which it is faced," and asked whether it was motivated by a British plan to cultivate the good will of the Arab League.

The Jewish Agency, it is reported today, has made representations to the Government concerning the Transjordan issue, but the contents of its memorandum were not made public. Meanwhile, the executives of the foreign affairs and Palestine committees of the Board of Deputies of British Jews met today in a joint session and adopted a resolution expressing the Board's "deep concern" over the Transjordan project.

"This measure for a separate status for this area, which is legally an integral part of the territory of Palestine as defined by Article 25 of the Palestine Mandate, is contrary to the Mandate," the resolution said, "and prejudicial to the conclusions of the Anglo-American inquiry committee." It added that the Board will support the Jewish Agency in any steps it takes to affirm and protect Jewish rights under the Mandate.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT WILL APPOINT ADVISOR ON JEWISH AFFAIRS TO GERMAN OCCUPATION STAFF

LONDON, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- An advisor for Jewish Affairs will shortly be appointed to the British occupation staff in Germany, John Hynd, Government spokesman in the House of Commons on all problems dealing with military occupation, today informed Laborite M.P. Samuel Silverman. He added that the Government has decided, however, not to establish separate Jewish centers in the British zone, because it would conflict with the Government's policy of not distinguishing among displaced persons on religious grounds.

In a written reply to Silverman, Foreign Minister Ernest Bevin said that it has not yet been decided whether any Government departments would testify before the joint Anglo-American inquiry committee on Palestine, which opens hearings here Friday.

REPORT CHARGES COLLEGES THROUGHOUT COUNTRY DISCRIMINATE AGAINST JEWISH STUDENTS

NEW YORK, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- Discrimination against Jewish, Negro, and Catholic students in colleges in the city as well as elsewhere, was charged here today in a report presented to the Mayor's Committee on Unity.

The report points out that in medical schools, in particular, but also in liberal arts colleges, discrimination has increased. "In the last decade preceding the war years the percentage of Jewish students of the total student body admitted to undergraduate colleges fell about 50 percent," it says. It was also emphasized that many Jewish students have detoured into medicine through the path of spending several years in dentistry schools or in fields bordering on medicine.

Although most of the schools and university's publicly deny the existence of discriminatory quotas, many deans and other faculty officials have admitted privately in conversations with committee members that such quotas are in effect, the report said.

It urged the establishment of a state or city-supported university, including full graduate and professional facilities, as a measure to provide the educational facilities denied by the private non-sectarian colleges.

LEHMAN CONFIRMS MORGAN'S VISIT TO U.S.; GENERAL, UNRRA OFFICIALS TO CONFER IN LONDON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- Director General Herbert H. Lehman of UNRRA, questioned by reporters today following a visit to President Truman, confirmed that Lt. Gen. Sir Frederick E. Morgan was coming to the U.S. to appeal his ouster as UNRRA chief in Germany. Gov. Lehman said that he had not discussed the Morgan incident with the President.

(A dispatch from London reports that Morgan arrived there last night and is planning to discuss his Frankfurt statements, for which he was ordered to resign, with UNRRA officials in London this week. His assistant, Brigadier W.A.S. Stawell is at present acting chief of UNRRA activities in Germany.)

FILIBUSTERING SENATOR CHARGES IMMIGRANTS FROM EASTERN EUROPE UNDERMINING OUR LAWS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- The filibuster in the Senate against the FEPC bill continued today, led by Senators Laybank of South Carolina and Eastland of Mississippi.

Eastland said the bill would give preference to minority groups over veterans of the Anglo-Saxon race. He attacked immigration from eastern Europe, saying that it had introduced into the country the influence of a school of thought from that area which would destroy our system of jurisprudence.

WAR DEPARTMENT AWARDS CITATION TO B'NAI B'RITH FOR WAR SERVICE ACHIEVEMENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- Lt. Col. Elliott Niles, member of B'nai B'rith's national war service committee, announced here today that the War Department has awarded B'nai B'rith a special citation for its outstanding contribution to the morale and welfare of Army personnel.

Official presentation of the citation will be made to Henry Monsky, president of B'nai B'rith and chairman of its national war service committee, during the annual meeting of B'nai B'rith's executive committee in Washington, Feb. 3-4, by a ranking War Department official.

SWEDEN WILL OFFER TEMPORARY REFUGE TO THOUSANDS OF WAR-WEARY JEWS FROM POLAND

NEW YORK, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- The Swedish Government is making arrangements to receive thousands of Jewish refugees from Poland, Premier Albin Hansson told a delegation of the World Jewish Congress, the Congress announced here today.

The refugees, including many children, will be admitted into the country to recuperate from the ravages of war and pogroms, but will not make Sweden their permanent home. The Premier gave assurance that his Government would continue to aid the Jews, and said that his Government will continue to view the Zionist cause with favor.

10,000 ATTEND SERVICES COMMEMORATING LIBERATION OF HUNGARIAN JEWS FROM GHETTO

BUDAPEST, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- More than 10,000 persons attended anniversary services here to commemorate the liberation of the Hungarian Jews from the ghetto.

In an address before the services, Chief Rabbi Simon Hovosi paid tribute to the Red Army and the Allied forces. Urging the leaders of the Government to suppress anti-Semitism, he warned that another Jewish outbreak might bring disaster to Hungary, and expressed the hope that lawful Jewish claims would be satisfied and reparations made. Premier Zoltan Tildy, the president of the Parliament, and other Government leaders attended the ceremony as well as Red Army generals and members of the American and British military missions.

BODIES OF SIX JEWS KILLED DEFENDING WARSAW GHETTO REBURIED IN "SOLDIERS' GRAVE"

WARSAW, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- The bodies of six Jews killed in the heroic defense of the Warsaw ghetto against the Nazis in April 1943 were today exhumed at ceremonies arranged by the Jewish Socialist Bund. A large crowd attended the ceremonies during which the bodies were laid in a common "soldiers' grave."

Representatives of the Polish Army, of various political parties, as well as Dr. Emil Sommerstein, president of the Central Committee of Polish Jews, and Philip Piratin, Communist member of the British Parliament addressed the gathering.

NEARLY HALF OF JDC 1945 APPROPRIATIONS USED TO AID JEWISH CHILDREN IN EUROPE

NEW YORK, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- Nearly half of the Joint Distribution Committee's 1945 appropriations of over \$28,600,000 was used for emergency care for the surviving 150,000 Jewish children of Europe, the JDC revealed here today.

Nearly 24,000 children are known to have been aided in JDC-supported Jewish institutions, in five European countries from which full reports are available. In Rumania, from which reports are not complete, some 2,500 children are in OSE homes which are supported by the JDC, while another 2,400 are being cared for in Greece..

TORAHs, BIBLES AND LATZCHES BEING PREPARED FOR SHIPMENT TO JEWS IN POLAND

NEW YORK, Jan. 23. (JTA) -- In response to requests by the religious leaders of Polish Jewry, through the American Federation for Polish Jews, the Vaad Hatzala has presented the federation with twenty-five Torahs, 500 prayer books, bibles, phylacteries and other religious objects for distribution throughout Poland, it was announced today.

The shipment will be transported overseas within the next few days on a special vessel which the federation has chartered to carry relief to Polish Jews. The ship will also carry the first shipment of ten thousand pounds of matzoh which the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the U.S. and Canada are presenting to the destitute Jews of Poland for the Passover holidays.

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
