ANGLO-AMERICAN SUB-COMMITTEE TOURS WARSAW CHETTO: CONFERS WITH JEWISH LEADERS

WARSAW. Feb. 11. (JTA) -- Members of a sub-committee of the Anglo-American Committee on Palestine, which arrived here over the week-end, today toured the ruins of the Warsaw Chetto, and viewed huge open graves containing the carbonized bodies of martyred Jews.

The committee members, several of whom went as they stood before the graves. suggested that the ruins be preserved intent as evidence that the Jews suffered terrible sacrifices in the battle to destroy Nazism. The people in England and America. they said, had no conception of the haroism and sufferings which the Jews endured.

Later, the sub-committee, headed by Sir John Singleton, co-chairman of the full committee. was received by Foreign Minister Wincenty Raymovski. It will also meet with Minister of Social Welfare Jan Stanczyk and Jacob Berman, saviser to Prime Minister Eduard Osubka-Morawski.

The sub-committee also visited Dr. Emil Sommerstein, chairman of the Central Jevian Committee, who told it that most of the Jevs in Poland want to emigrate, because they feel that they are "alone." rather than for economic reasons. Dr. Sommerstein said that he feels that the only solution for the problem of the Jews is creation of their own state in Palestine.

An official delegation of the Jewish committee called on the sub-committee members, and speaking in behalf of the entire Jewish population, with the exception of the members of the Jevish Socialist Bund, described the tragedy of the Jevs of Poland and their desire to settle in Plestine. They also told of the heroism with which the Jews of Poland fought the Nalls. The Jewish spokesmen paid tribute to the friendly attitude of the Government and reviewed its efforts to aid Jevish survivors. Questioned by some members as to what form this governmental assistance took, the delegation replied that it was both economic and politicial.

Accompanying the inquiry group members on their visit to the ghetto site were Ionis Segal, general secretary of the Jevish National Workers Alliance in the United States, who is in Poland on behalf of the World Jewish Congress; Dr. Adolph Berman, a Jevish deputy in the Polish National Counciliand other local Jevish Leaders.

The Anglo-American probers will shortly leave for Lodg where the "League for Working Palestine" plans to organize a street description of all Jews in the city to indicate their desire to go to Palestine.

## CRUM SATS HE WILL RECOMMEND INSCRIPANTE EVACUATION OF ALL JUNE WHOM DP CAMPS

MMICE, Feb. 11. (JPA) -- A recommendation that all Jewish refugees be released from DP camps immediately will be made by Bartley Crum, American member of the Anglo-Aperican Inquiry Committee on Palestine, he told the JTA today.

Crum said that no matter how much conditions in these camps may be improved in the future, the Jevish survivors of Maxi persecution "will be ruined spiritually and

psychologically" if they are not enabled to settle in permanent homes. He stressed, however, that no Jew must be forced to go anywhere against his vishes.

Crum made these statements at the conclusion of a three-day tour of the American zone by a sub-committee of the Anglo-American body, during which virtually 99 percent of the camp residents interviewed declared that they desired to go to Palestine. The sub-committee also saw the results of a vote organized in the camps by the UNRRA, which showed that of 19,311 refugees, 18,702 wanted to go to Palestine, 393 to the United States, 13 to Germany and the remainder elsewhere.

Sir Frederick Leggett and Crum, who comprise the sub-committee, heard testimony that 70 percent of Hitler enti-Santtism remains in Germany. This was alleged by Israel entman, chairman of 1,000 displaced Polish Jews living in a "comp" established on a sity block in the heart of Stuttgart, who based his charge on the fact that only 30 percent of the voters in last week's general elections in the American zone cast their ballots for the left parties such as the Socialists, Communists or Christian Socialists.

### Director Says Impossible Run Camp Life on Other than Zionist Lines

Harry Lerner of Omaha, UNERA director of the camp, told the committee that it us impossible to organize camp life along any lines other than Zionist. We tried to organize a boys! alub, "he said, "with debating, classes, dances, but the time the third meeting was held it was a Zionist rally." In reply to a question by Leggett, he said that there were no outside elements influencing the RFs to think along Zionist lines. "If we wanted to give an agricultural program," Lerner added, "it turned out to be a couple of farmers talking about Palestine. If they sang songs, they turned out to be Falestine songs. If they spoke about trees, it was about planting trees in Falestine."

When Crum asked Guttman: "You believe there is no future for the Jews in Europe - that Hitler has won the var against the Jews?" the latter replied: "Yes, we feel, however, that if the democratic world had really wanted to deal properly with Hitler, he would not have won his war against the Jews to such an extent." Guttman emphasized that despite their confidence in the democracies the displaced Jews feel that their only ultimate security lies in building a home of their own in Palestine. He deprecated the threat of Arab violence, stating that the Arabs would not molest the Jews if they were not incited, and, if they did, the Jews could defend themselves.

Similar questions were asked and similar replies given in visits to comps at leiphein, between Stuttgart and Manich; and Funk Rasserne, Fabrenwald and Freiman-Siellung, all near Manich. At Fabrenwald, which holds 5,000 DFs, the committee was greated by a silent procession carrying banners reading: "Open the Gates of Falestine." Impreds of persons stood silently outside the office, while the committee members held hearings. As they valked through the throng, after the hearing, frum and Legest were stoosted by a boy of thirteen, who asked politely: "May are we waiting here so long to 50 to Falestins? We cannot wait so long. It is unendurable."

At Funk Kaserns, the committee interviewed young Jews who recently fled Poland. They denied that there was an organized underground railway out of Poland, but said that they had been helped by local, committees in the cities through which they passed. They said that they had come to Germany, because they had heard that that was the best way of getting to Palestine.

(A report from Jerusalem today said that four members of the advance escretarial staff of the Anglo-American inquiry committee have arrived there, and that another economic assistant had survived at Cairo.)

MEMOID, Feb. 11. ### AUSTRIAN JEWS FREED FROM CAMPS PROTEST GOVERNMENT'S FAILURE TO ASSIST THEM

VIENNA, Feb. 11. (JTA) -- A demand that discrimination between racial and political refugees in Austria be abandoned was voiced last night at a morting here of 600 Jevish former intermees in Nazi camps. Among those attending were representatives of Chancellor Reopold Figl and of the mayor and city council of Vienna.

Speakers declared that while assistance is being given to parsons jailed for political reasons by the Germans, public officials and agencies are refusing aid to returning Jews, who were interned on radial grounds. One speaker pointed out that the Jews were the "most political" of all the internees, since the Nazis regarded Jews as their chief "political problem."

It was revealed that the Jewish Community Council has registered 1,670 former interness, as well as 32 children under fourteen years old who were also confined in camps. Up to now, the Council has received only \$50 in relief for thom, and some parcels contributed by the American Red Cross.

#### JDC Austrian Director Reports Condition of Viennese Jevs "Is Terrible"

PARIS, Feb. 11. (JTA) -- The condition of the Jews in Vienna, particularly in relation to the food situation, "is terrible," Benson Saks, Joint Distribution Committee director for Austria, reported in an interview here.

Pointing out that it was necessary in recent months to care for 20,000 to 25,000 people, including 5,000 transients monthly, Saks said that the JDC and the American Red Cross were the only organizations providing food and clothing to Vienness Jews. Is asserted that the tuberculosis rate smong Jews was "rery high."

Reporting on conditions in the displaced persons camps in the American and British zones in Austria, Sake stated that several American camps were good enough to be considered model camps, and that conditions in general were improving in all camps. Three camps in the British zone, he edded, are also in "fairly good condition." The JD, Sake eaid, is supplementing Army rations in three transient camps.

He pointed out that the JDC was cooperating with the Vienna Jewish Community Council in various ways, including financial sesistance to homes and institutions maintained by the community. Of the 4,000 Jews in Vienna, 40 percent are over the age of 60, while 45 percent are over 45, Saks said.

## HNGARIAN GOVERNMENT SCORED BY JEWISH CONFERENCE FOR NOT ACTING ON UNGERT DEMANDS

BUMAPEST, Feb. 11. (JTA) -- The Humanian Government's failure to repatriate all Jevish deportees and to return confiscated Jevish property, and its alleged indifference to the existence of anti-Scuttism here, were condemned today at a nationwide conference of Humanian Jews.

Speakers demanded that unclaimed Jevish properties and goods be used to assist surviving Jews, instead of being allocated to government or political party uses. They saked that Jevish property for which there are no claiments be treated differently than property abandoned by fugitive Maxis.

Secretary of State Balogh told the meeting that the Government was aware of the importance of the Jewish problem, but asked patience in face of the imposes difficulties facing the cuthorities. He warned that Jews about not attempt to "monopolite" assistance for themselves, since this might cause a resurgence of anti-Semitiem.

BRITISH NZO CONFERENCE CHARGES PALESTINE ADMINISTRATION LIKE "FOTALITARIAN POLICE STATE"

LONDOW, Feb. 11. (JTA) -- Charging that the Palestine Government was an "oppressive regime displaying the features of a totalitarian police state," the New Zionist Organization of Great Britain today protested the detention of Palestinian citizens abroad, and urged Jewish groups to carry on a legal fight against the Eritrean deportations.

M.R. Ribenfeld, leader of the British EZO, said that it was still possible to include Palestine among the British dominions, but warmed that if Britain continued her present policy against the Jews, the Government should not be surprised if the Jews turned against it.

## KING FAROUK ERRAKS ARAB LEAGUE BOYCOFT TO OFFAIR HIS FAVORITE "ZIONIET" CHEESE

JERUSALIM, Feb. 11. (JTA) -- Repyt's King Farous is breaking the Arab League byout against Jewish-made goods from Falestine, according to a report from the Cooperative Association of Jewish Agricultural Settlements.

Farouk, it seems, has devaloped a taste for the occeprative's Requestort cheese, and when the association balted shipments to his palace, fearing their return by Government agents enforcing the beyout, the King missed his delicacy. Falace purchasing samts contacted the Falestine Government trade representative in Egypt for an arrianation of the cheese shortage. After communications were emblanged between the Falestine trade agent and the cooperative, shipments were resumed, and the King is reported enjoying his cheese once again.
