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ANTI-SEMITIC HOODLUMS ATTACK HEADQUARTERS OF BUENOS AIRES JEWISH ORGANIZATION

BUENOS AIRES, March 31. (JTA) -- More than 200 members of the Alianza Libertadora Nacionalista, nationalist and anti-Semitic Peronist organization, attempted early this morning to break into the building here of the Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Association.

The raid was unsuccessful because the building was specially fortified after it was attacked by a group of armed police last November. The raiders painted anti-Jewish slogans on the walls and smashed several windows. They were finally dispersed by police, but no arrests were made.

The attack followed a wild tour of the city by the fascist hoodlums, during which they demonstrated before the headquarters of Socialist and Communist groups and attacked cafes in the wealthy quarter of the city.

STUTTGART CAMP RETURNING TO NORMAL AFTER ORDER BARRING FURTHER RAIDS BY GERMANS

STUTTGART, March 31. (JTA) -- Life at the Stuttgart camp for displaced Jews, where one Jew was killed and four wounded on Friday during an alleged black-market raid by German police, has returned to normal following the issuance of an order by Lt. Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, European Theatre commander, forbidding German police from entering Jewish DP camps under any circumstances.

The displaced Jews, UNRRA officials, voluntary relief workers, and even local American military officials hailed the McNarney order, and pointed out that it would relieve the major sore spot--use of German police against Jews. In conversation with a Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent, one American officer attached to the occupation forces summed up the situation as follows: "If the military government hadn't granted permission to the damned Germans to enter the camp, there would have been no trouble, and nobody dead at the Stuttgart Jewish DP camp."

An investigation was launched yesterday by local American military officials into the conduct of the raid. A board of five officers met all day behind closed doors. Although it is reported that carbines carried by the German police are being examined by ballistics experts in an effort to find out who had killed Samuel Denziger, the Polish-Jewish veteran of Oswiecim, no official statement from the inquiry board is expected until after it reports to American Army headquarters at Frankfurt. It is considered likely that the inquiry will result in arrests among the German police.

The Stuttgart police commissioner, Dr. Karl Weber, defended the actions of the local German civilian police and expressed the opinion that his department had suffered a "loss of prestige," because it had not been permitted to complete the raid begun at six a.m. Friday. He told newsmen here that he wished the military government would permit his police to return to the camp and take up, where they were forced to stop, following the fatal shooting. He also deplored the blow to his prestige re-

sulting from the funeral cortege of twenty-five truckloads of displaced Jews, which made its way through the city to the Bad Constatt cemetery Friday afternoon.

Danziger is survived by a pregnant wife and two children, all of whom managed to live through four years at the Oswiecim death camp with him. Three of the wounded Jews, Salek Weinstein, Emanuel Finkelstein, and Schimon Wildfeuer, were also concentration camp veterans. The last casualty among the DP's has not yet been identified.

U.S. Troops Expected To Be Withdrawn from Camp Today

Immediately after the attack, American troops of the Fifteenth Cavalry Division were rushed to the camp, which consists of a number of apartment houses in the southwest section of the city. Yesterday the number of guards was reduced and it is expected that all American troops will be withdrawn by tomorrow.

Yesterday morning camp inmates were still aroused over the raid and its aftermath. Small knots of Jews were standing around heatedly discussing the soldiers and armored cars used by patrolling troops. One of these groups buttonholed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent and indignantly demanded to know "why the guns of the armored cars are pointed at us? We aren't criminals," they shouted.

At that moment the officer in charge of the troops in the vicinity arrived and the DP's took up their complaint with him. He immediately ordered the armored cars turned around. Shortly thereafter he cut the number of sentries down to eight, and sent the cars away.

Military officials as well as UNRRA workers and the Jews all agreed that the DP's had been getting along well under normal American supervision. They pointed out that other searches had occurred, without German police, and that disorders had never resulted.

Bearing out the assertion of all witnesses that the incident was conducted like Gestapo raids in the heyday of Nazism, Miss Hazel Dobson, an UNRRA nurse from Canada, said that the German police arrived armed with carbines, rubber truncheons, and police dogs. Fela Friedman, a Jewish girl from Radom, Poland, a former inmate of Oswiecim, told newsmen that she had recognized one of the German policemen as a guard at that horror camp. Miss Friedman swears that she could identify him again, given the opportunity. One of the DP's told of having heard a policeman say "your day is over and soon we'll take over again."

Meyer Gutman, chairman of the DP's camp committee, pointed out that an American military police sergeant accompanying the German police attempted to get them to withdraw after the first volley of shots, but was not able to do so. One American soldier, Gutman added, grabbed a carbine away from a German policeman who was attempting to fire it at a Jew. Gutman also insisted that the local German newspaper, the Stuttgarter Zeitung, had helped instigate the raid by terming the camp a "black market center."

The shooting occurred, according to witnesses, after a twelve-year-old Jewish boy was handcuffed and dragged out of a house into the street, where the DP's had already been assembled in accordance with orders issued over the camp loudspeakers by the German police. As the boy was driven into the street, the crowd hooted at the police, who thereupon began to beat the Jews with rubber truncheons. Danziger was one of those beaten and knocked down. When he arose, he was shot through the head without warning.

RIFKIND HITS USE OF GERMAN POLICE IN JEWISH DP CAMPS; URGES TRAINING OF JEWISH POLICE

NEW YORK, March 31. (JTA) -- Judge Simon H. Rifkind, who until recently was adviser on Jewish affairs to the United States command in Germany, said today that "as long as German police are used in centers for Jewish displaced persons, there will be violence."

In a letter to Dr. Stephen S. Wise, president of the World Jewish Congress, Judge Rifkind recalled that he had recommended to U.S. military authorities that they recruit and train displaced Jews to act as a supplementary police force in the Jewish DP centers. He lauded the order of Gen. Joseph T. McNarney barring German police from entering Jewish camps under any circumstances.

The Jewish War Veterans, in a telegram to President Truman, said that the use of German police against the displaced Jews is "an affront to decency and humanity." The organization urged the President to order the withdrawal of German guards from the Jewish centers.

Military Authorities in Washington Mum on Fracas in Stuttgart Camp

WASHINGTON, March 31. (JTA) -- High military authorities yesterday refused to comment on the raid by German police in the Stuttgart camp. A spokesman for the Civil Affairs Division of the Army told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that no report has been received as yet from the military authorities in the Stuttgart area, and that no such report has been requested.

A demand that summary action be taken against all U.S. Army personnel guilty of abuse of discretion in the raid, was voiced in a statement issued here by Representative Emanuel Celler of New York. He also urged that German police "with their Nazi methods" be summarily punished.

JEWIS WILL RESIST "UNFAVORABLE SOLUTION" BY ANGLO-AMERICAN COMMITTEE, SILVER WARNS

NEW YORK, March 31. (JTA) -- A warning that should the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on Palestine, which is now in Switzerland writing its report, submit an "unfavorable solution" it would be resisted grimly by Jews, inside and outside of Palestine, was given tonight by Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, president of the Zionist Organization of America, at the 38th annual B'nai Zion Order Day Dinner held at the Commodore Hotel. More than 2,000 persons attended.

"The Jews will resist any substitute solutions that may be offered," said Dr. Silver, "they may be destroyed, but they will not be conquered." He criticized President Truman for "yielding" in consenting to the appointment of a Palestine Commission and called upon American Jews and "their Christian sympathizers," who he said, it had been revealed by polls, represent "the overwhelming majority of the American people," to demand that the President and the State Department "by their actions, reflect the will of the American people, as it has been twice expressed by the Congress of the United States and by nearly all the State legislatures of our country."

Others who spoke were Louis Lipsky, president of B'nai Zion, Judge Morris Rothenberg, president of the Jewish National Fund, and Dr. Stephen S. Wise.

LORD GORT, FORMER HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR PALESTINE, DIES IN LONDON

LONDON, March 31. (JTA) -- Field Marshal Lord Gort, who resigned as High Commissioner for Palestine last November, after serving in that post for little over a year, died today. Lord Gort's resignation was regretted by the Jews of Palestine, who had found him cooperative. At the time he quit, it was reported that he disagreed with British policy in Palestine.

HUNGARIAN NAZIS WHO DIRECTED MURDER AND DEPORTATION OF JEWS HANGED IN BUDAPEST

BUDAPEST, March 31. (JTA) -- Ladislaus Endre and Ladislaus Baky, under whose direction several hundred thousand Hungarian Jews were either murdered or deported to death camps, were hanged here yesterday.

The two former ministers in the pro-Nazi Salazi cabinet were convicted by a Peoples Court in January of war crimes and anti-Jewish atrocities. During their trial police fought off an enraged mob which sought to lynch them.

ARABS IN PALESTINE SPLIT; FIVE GROUPS CHALLENGE LEADERSHIP OF EX-MUFTI'S KINSMAN

JERUSALEM, March 31. (JTA) -- Leaders of the Arab political parties who boycotted the inaugural session of the new Arab Higher Committee in Jerusalem on Wednesday, left for Cairo to challenge before the Arab League Council the bid of Jamal Hussein, extremist Arab leader and kinsman of the Mufti of Jerusalem, for leadership of Palestine Arabs.

They intend, it is understood, to protest to the council against Jamal Hussein's alleged "dictatorial" methods. They represent the National Defense, Palestine Arab Reform, Istaglist (Independence), National Bloc and Palestine youth parties.

Absence of these delegates from the Arab Higher Committee was a setback for Jamal Hussein who has been trying to weld the strife-torn organization into a body representative of all shades of Palestine Arab opinion. The chairmanship has been left vacant for the "rightful owner"--the Mufti, Haj Amin El Hussein, who is now in French hands.

According to a Cairo report, Jamal Hussein told the League council yesterday that he regretted the failure of the Palestine Arabs to agree on composition of the Higher Committee, but said that elections would soon be held in order to make the committee more representative.

The council reiterated its approval of the boycott of "Zionist" products from Palestine, and drafted a plan for committees to be set up in every Arab country to enforce the ban.

BRITISH GOVT. URGED TO OUTLAW ANTI-SEMITIC INCITEMENT; AUSTRIA BANS ANTI-JEWISH BOOKS

LONDON, March 31. (JTA) -- The British Government was called on today to introduce legislation prohibiting anti-Semitic and other racial incitement and discrimination. A resolution adopted at the annual meeting of the National Council of Civil Liberties declared that such measures would safeguard democracy, which, it said, was threatened by re-establishment here of fascist groups.

The newspaper Reynolds News reports today that the Austrian Government has drafted legislation outlawing literature fomenting anti-Semitism and racial hatred. It has also appealed to all citizens to surrender Nazi publications, and warned that after a period of grace, possession of such literature will be punishable.

TWENTY-FIVE JEWS KILLED IN POLAND LAST MONTH BY ANTI-GOVERNMENT BANDS

LONDON, March 31. (JTA) -- Twenty-five Jews were killed in Poland last month by anti-Government bands, a Warsaw dispatch to the Sunday Observer discloses.

UNO SHOULD PROPOSE HUMANITARIAN SOLUTION OF PROBLEM OF JEWISH SURVIVORS, SAYS SEN. KILGORE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, March 31. (JTA) -- The United Nations Organization should act to guarantee a humanitarian solution of the problem of the Jewish survivors made homeless and stateless by the war, Sen. Harley M. Kilgore of West Virginia stated today, addressing a meeting here of the Central Ohio Conference of the United Jewish Appeal.

Senator Kilgore told the 225 delegates that the problem of Europe's distressed Jewish survivors "is a world problem that concerns everyone." Unless the uprooted Jews of Europe are given new roots, "he declared, "unless these dispossessed and out-cast people are admitted into the company of free men, the whole world will be that much farther away from real security."

The West Virginia legislator warned, at the same time, that Americans must "take safeguards in this country to see that fascism does not sweep to power by placid creed against creed, race against race, and color against color." Asserting that America "must remain united if it is to escape the fate of Germany where civilization failed," Senator Kilgore warned that "the seeds of hatred are now being sown in this country and if properly planted might become a threat to our democracy."

The conference was also addressed by Dr. Imrich Rosenberg, Deputy Director of Repatriation in the Czechoslovakian Government, who arrived in the United States recently from Prague; Dr. Renzo Levi of Rome, president of the Jewish Relief Organization of Italy; and Captain Herschel Schacter, first chaplain to accompany American combat troops into the Buchenwald concentration camp.

ZOA CALLS FOR UNITY IN BID TO AMERICAN JEWS TO SUPPORT GENERAL ZIONIST PROGRAM

NEW YORK, March 31. (JTA) -- The National Administrative Council, the ruling body of the Zionist Organization of America between conventions, at a special all-day session today at the Hotel Commodore here, attended by 150 delegates, unanimously adopted a declaration addressed to American Jewry calling for a "united front, outwardly and inwardly" of all Zionist forces in preparation for the forthcoming World Zionist Congress which convenes in Palestine on August 7.

Presented as the official ZOA platform for the World Zionist Congress, the declaration is a bid to American Jews to support General Zionist candidates in the June elections of American delegates to the Congress.

Declaring that "the primary aim of our movement in this hour is the establishment of a free and democratic Jewish Commonwealth in Palestine," the declaration, issued over the signature of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, ZOA president, urges that "all party and group considerations must be subordinated" to this aim. "Because of our non-partisan outlook and because of the numbers we represent and our historic achievements, we General Zionists are equipped to lead the Zionist movement to victory as we have led it in decades of great achievements in the past," it said.

CANADA ASKED TO ADMIT REFUGEE RELATIVES OF PERSONS NOW RESIDING IN DOMINION

MONTREAL, March 31. (JTA) -- The hope that Canada will follow the example of the British Government, which has approved a scheme to admit to the United Kingdom survivors of German concentration camps who have relatives there, able and willing to look after them, was expressed by a delegation from the Canadian National Committee on Refugees received by J.A. Glen, Minister of Mines and Resources, who also heads the immigration department.

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
