35.000 DISPLACED JEWS DEMONSTRATE IN U.S. ZONE AGAINST KILLING OF JEW BY GERMAN POLICE

FRANKFURT, April 4. (JTA) -- Peaceful demonstrations in which 35,000 displaced Jews participated took place today in seventeen camps for Jews throughout the American zone, in protest against the killing by the German police of a displaced Jew. Semuel Denziger, during a raid on a Jevish camp near Stuttgart last week.

Military police were on the alert, and a cordon of troops were thrown around several of the camps, but the demonstrations passed quietly, and there were no scenes of violence. At Munich, the Jews attempted to march out of the camp, but were turned back at the gates.

Representatives of regional committees of liberated Jews in Greater Hesse met koday at the Zeilsheim camp and discussed methods of establishing better relations petween the U.S. troop and the Jews in the IP camps. The conference also discussed lans for securing eight farms in the region for the purpose of teaching the displaced levs various methods of farming.

The thirty-eight delegates participating in the conference represented both ews who are still in comes and those who reside in outside communities. Among the uestions discussed was the problem of assigning more UNFRA food packages to Jews who ive outside the camps and the establishment of more synasogues for thom.

Sixty harassed Jews who recently arrived here from Breslau, capital of what as formerly German Silesia and which is now Polish territory, today told the correscodent of the Jovish Telegraphic Agency of the widespread anti-Semitime in that city. hich the Polish authorities have repaired Broclay. RITISH MILITARY COURT SENTENCES TWO JEWISH TOUTHS TO SEVEN YEARS IMPRISONMENT

JERUSALEM, April 4. (JTA) -- A British military court today sentenced two outhful members of the Irgun Zvai Leumi to seven years imprisonment each, on charges I illegal possession of a quantity of hand grenades and bombs.

The defendants, Alexander Bogozovsky, 18, and Ezra Tarazi, 21, are to receive special treatment." They were arrested on Feb. 14 on a bus travelling between Tellyty and Petach Tikrah.

Shortly after their trial opened, both youths dismissed their counsels, in rotest against the defense they were offering. They then made a statement to the ourt declaring that they do not recognize the validity of British rule in Palestine, he new defense emergency regulations nor the country's courts.

Several thousand singing, dancing Jews yesterday forced British troops to with raw from the village of Kfar Marmorek, which they had surrounded in a search for payloipants in Tuesday night's blasting of railway lines.

When word was received that troops had arrived at the settlement, which is near showoit, thousands of persons streamed towards there from all the neighboring colonies of towns. They surrounded the troops and began singing and dencing. After submitting this "cultural" assault for a short time, the soldiers withdrew.

Ansjordan independence scored in congress; urge u.s. delegates to ask uno probe

WASHINGTON, April 4. (JTA) -- Members of the Senate and the House of Repsentatives joined today in conderning on the floor of their respective Houses the ranting of independence to Transjordan. One Congressman suggested that the matter placed before the Security Council of the UNO by the U.S. delegation.

Senator Claude Pepper, Democrat of Florita, sharply attacked British policy a Transjordan and Pelestine, in a general statement in the Senate on foreign policy th particular reference to the Iranian situation. The British Mandate over Palestan "should have been repealed a long time ago," he said.

Rep. Gordon McDonough, California Republican, urged the State Department to moult with the British Foreign Office "to assure the British that the heroic and reative Hebrew people, who have already worked such marvels in transformation in the sect of Felestine, can, by their friendship and trust, be infinitely better guarants of western principals of peace and freedom in the Near East than can illiterate, madic Bedouins." McDonough asked that the American delegates to the 1870 be intructed to investigate this matter in the Security Council.

Rep. Augustus Bennett, New York Republican, compared the separation of Pales-Lo and Transjordan to a situation that might develop abould the U.S. be divided at a Mississippi. He recalled the treaty of 1924, in which Great Britain promised not change the status of Transjordan under the Mandate vithout the approval of the U.S. Vermannt. "To my knowledge," he said, "that approval has not been granted.

Senator Owen Brewster, Republican of Maine, told the Senate that the State partment should "investigate the sudden creation of this new independent state of analorden."

ROSTOV SOVIET HELPS JEWS TO REBUILD SYNACOGUE: SURVIVORS BAKE MATZOHS FOR PASSOVER

MOSCOW, April 4. (JTA) -- The surviving Jeve of Rostov will eat matrons this Passover, for the first time in five years. Machinery for baking the indexensed bread, which was hidden at the approach of the Nazis, has been unearthed and is once more in use.

The synagogue at Rostov, which was descrated and partly destroyed by the fazis has been restored and is in full use again. A new wing has been added to the two-svory stone building and the interior has been enlarged to accommodate one thousand worshippers.

Two thousand prayer books and a number of torahs have been collected and contributed to the synagogue. A large part of the books were saved by workers at the local museum, who, at the risk of their lives, hid them in cellars and garrets throughout the German occupation of the cit;

When the Jevish refugees from the city returned, a small congregation began meeting at the home of Wolf Lipkovitz, chairman of the Jevish community. After a while the group grew too large for Lipkovitz' home and they rented a private hall in thich they held services. With the aid of the Council on Religious Affairs of the degional Soviet and individual Jews of the community, the congregation collected funds and rebuilt their house of worship.

In addition to the synagogue's restoration, the congregation has also reabilitated the local Jevish cemetery, which the Nazis had descrited, and a new urial society has been organized. Funds are also being collected to erect a monument in memory of the martyred Jews of the city.

DEWISH BABY OF MOTHER WHO ESCAPED NAZIS ADOPTED BY RIGA JEWS AS SYMBOL OF WEW LIFE

MOSCOW, April 4. (JTA) -- One of the first children born to the liberated ews of Higa has been adopted by the Jevish community as a symbol of their escape from the Hazis and the rebirth of a new life.

The child's mother, Freda Mikhelson, miraculously survived the first massacre f Rige Jews. Left for dead by Termon execution squads, she climbed out of a common rare and hid in the attics of friends throughout the occupation of the city. The aby boy has been named "Jude," the name of a people whom the Nazis did not succeed a excerminating.

rgentive interior minister says government is opposed to anti-semitism

BURNOS AIRRS, April 4. (JTA) -- The Government and people of Argentina are prosed to anti-Semitim, Interior Minister Ger. Felipe Urdapillata today told Leon tuboviteky, secretary-general of the World Jevish Congress.

The Covernment will adhere to the Constitution, which promises equality to 11 citizens, Gen. Urdspillets said. He promised that measures would be taken to urb anti-jetish demonstrations by Peronista celebrating the election of their leader to the Presidency.

J.D.C. REPORTS ON RELIEF SENT TO POLAND; SPENT \$2,000,000 ON SUPPLIES, \$500,000 IN CASH

NEW YORK, April 4. (JTA) -- The Joint Distribution Committee today took issue with charges made by unnamed "leaders of Jewish communities of Poland," who, in a statement distributed by the Polish Telegraphic Agency, declared that Polish Jews are receiving only "very small aid from world Jewry."

Describing the plight of the Jews in Poland as "excruciating," the statement said that "the help received from the Joint Distribution Committee has not been enough even to wipe off the tears of the Jewish orphans," and appealed for the immediate sending of funds, clothing and food.

Replying in behalf of the JDC, Moses A. Leavitt, secretary, pointed out that than \$1,000,000 worth of relief goods was made available to the Jews of Poland by the J.D.C. in 1945, in addition to \$500,000 transmitted during November and December when transmission of funds from the United States to Poland became possible. One million dollars worth of supplies have also been purchased by the J.D.C. for the Jews of Poland since the beginning of 1946 and these supplies are being sent to Poland as rapidly as shipping and other conditions permit, he said.

"In the first three months of 1946, the J.D.C. has shipped from the United States alone \$460,767 worth of relief supplies," Mr. Leavitt emphasized. "A typical shipment of these relief supplies, which left New York on March 11, contained the following items: 52,700 pounds of powdered coses drink, 5,040 pounds of powdered eggs, 14,500 pounds of tea, 20,000 pounds of coffee, 5,500 dozen pairs men's wool hose, 1,166 dozen men's union suits, 2,000 mackinaws, 4,200 man's sweaters, 2,500 dozen ladies underpents, 1,000 dozen children's underpents, 10,000 blankets, 25,025 pounds of scap, and 100 sewing machines. A total of 500,000 pounds of matzohs have also been shipped for Passover.

Declaring that the J.D.C. has received acknowledgment from the Central Jewish Committee in Warsaw of funds given it by the Joint Distribution Committee and of large quantities of relief supplies, Mr. Leavitt concluded: "The J.D.C. recognizes that the help it has provided is limited in terms of the need existing among Polish Jewry. But it is shocked to see that no recognition has been made of the substantial assistance it has already furnished. The latest statement made by unnamed Polish representatives can only serve to have a harmful effect on the great fund-raising efforts now being made in the United States to meet not only the needs of Polish Jewry, but the anomnous needs of a distressed Jewry throughout Europe and many other parts of the world."

Jews in Europe Get \$1,100,000 Worth of Supplies in 3 months, Warburg Reports

NEW YORK, April A. (JTA) -- More than \$1,100,000 worth of relief supplies of food, clothing, medicines and machinery--the greatest three months' shipments in its thirty-one year history--were sent to Jevish survivors overseas in the first quarter of 1946 by the Joint Distribution Committee, it was announced today by Edward N.M. Warburg, chairmen of the organization.

Mr. Warburg disclosed that the supplies are shipped "in an ever-increasing stream in a program designed to meet the attensive and imperative needs of Jewish sufferers in nearly fifty countries throughout the world." He pointed out that the chief recipierts of the IDC relief shipments, totalling more than 2,000,000 pounds, are Jewish survivors in Foland and Germany. "Joint Distribution Committee activities in the Supplementary persons centers of Germany and Austria are supplementary to the basic needs which the Army meets," Mr. Warburg said.

ANTI-SEMITIC SUSPENDED PRIEST CONVICTED OF DISCREERLY CONDUCT AT ANTI-JEWISH RALLY

CHICAGO, April 4. (JTA) -- Arthur W. Terminiello, suspended Alahama priest, was fined \$100 last night following his conviction on a disorderly conduct charge arising from an anti-Semitic meeting conducted by Gerald L.K. Smith, head of the American First Party.

The sentencing of Smith on a charge of contempt of court as a result of statements he made concerning Terminiello's trial was postponed until Monday. Smith and mother of his sides, Fred Kister, are awaiting separate trial on the same disorderly bonduct charge of which Terminiello was found guilty.

In his instructions to the jury which convicted Terminiello, Judge McCorwack cointed out that the First and Fourteenth Assendments to the Constitution insure "full recoon in expressing all ideas on matters of public concern, but they do not permit person to say whatever he pleases in whatever circumstances." The defense counsel loved for a new trial, threatening an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court, if his motion as denied.

ise challences accuracy of ien saud's statements to anglo-american inquiry committee

NEW YORK, April 4. (JTA) -- Dr. Stephon S. Wise today issued a statement hallenging the accuracy of remarks allegedly made to members of the Anglo-American committee of Inquiry on Palestine by King Inn Sand.

Dr. Wise, who conferred with the late President Roosevelt after the latter reurned from Yalta, en route from which he met with Ibn Saud, denied the accuracy of the Arab King's allegation that Roosevelt had told him that "he was convinced that alestine was not the place for the Jews." President Roosevelt's version of his conersation with Ibn Saud, Dr. Wise said, was in complete variance with this declaration.

He also questioned the validity of Ibn Send's statement that President Truman as proposed the immigration of 100,000 Jews into Palestine "while refusing to permit ews to enter his country."

alestine will open its doors to large numbers of displaced jews, wise predicts

WASHINGTON, April 4. (JTA) — The belief that "Palestine will open its doors" o a large number of displaced Jews was expressed here tonight by Dr. Stephen S. Vies, directing a dinner arranged by the United Jewish Appeal. Dr. Wise called for support f the U.J.A. \$100,000,000 drive. "enator Alben Barkley, Senate majority leader, was no other principal speaker.

Dr. Chain Welmmun, president of the Jevish Agensy, sent a message from Jerualem, emphasizing that he regards the \$100,000,000 campaign of the United Jevish Apcal as "a surreme ettampt of American Jews to set the footsteps of a stricten people nto the pathway of security, freedom and life."

"We in Palestine," Dr. Weignam stated, "are secure in the knowledge that marican Jewry is solidly and affirmatively supporting the Jewish Mational Home and ll it means for an independent existence for the Jewish people. I know that all, author Zioniete or non-Zioniete, will give their unreserved and pre-minest support to the Palestine Foundation Fund and Jewish Mational Tund which, through the United alostine Appeal, are included in the United Jewish Appeal. In this year 1946 all ther enterprises for Palestine, worth as they are, will be subordinated and put into heir proper framework under the overshadowing, historic chligation to the United Jewish Appeal."
