1,200 JEWS ARRESTED IN ITALIAN PORT SMORTLY EEFORE EMBARKING FOR PALESTINE

ROMS, April 5. (JTA) -- Three Jewish non-commissioned officers of a Palestine regiment were arrested in connection with the discovery by the Italian police of 1,200 Jewich refugees who entered Italy illegally for the purpose of migrating to Pelestine, it was amounced today by Allied Forces headquarters.

The 1,200 Jews were arrested last night at the Italian port of La Spezia as they were about to embark on three smell steamers which were to take them to Falestine. The three ships have been impounded. The Jewish refugees arrived at the port in thirty-seven Allied trucks, according to reports.

The suspicions of a patrol of Italian police were aroused by a jeep containing two Allied non-commissioned officers. Asked for their identity papers, the two men irove off at high speed, followed by a fusilade of shots. Further investigation disclosed that a convoy of trucks nearby was crammed with Jews saiting to beard the three ships.

PRENCH COVEREDUNT DENTES REPORT THAT EX-MUFTI IS BEING RELEASED FROM HOUSE ARREST

PARIS, April 5. (JTA) -- A spokesman of the French Foreign Office today authorized the Jevish Telegraphic Agency to deny a report from London that the French Government is releasing the ex-Murti of Jerusalem from house arrest, under which he has been held since the fall of the Masi regime and his surrender to the French military authorities in Germany.

"You can officially deny that the ex-Mufti is being released from house arrest. His status remain unchanged," the French official said.

The ex-buffi is being held incommunicado in a Paris suburb. The London report said that the news that he was supposed to have been released today came "from good authority."

Funeral of murdered jew in poland converted into demonstration against terror

- KARSAW, April 5. (JTA) -- The funeral of a Jew murdered this week by Polish fascists in the city of Estovice was converted today into a demonstration against the anti-Senitic terror.

Sepresentatives of Jevish communities from many cities in Silesia, as well as delegates from Jevish youth groups and from Foliah political parties attended the Cunerel. The marderel Jev, tron Milgrom, was a veteron of the notorious Osviecim camp. All speakers at his grave emphasized the need for more rigorous measures to ourb anti-Jevish terrorism in Foliah which is attempting to drive Jevs who survived the Nazis out of Palish Meritory.

A mass meeting organized by Jevish Youth groups, which followed the funeral, as addressed by a representative of the Federation of Polish Youth Organizations, who bledged the will not rest until all restings of reactioners bands are considered.

D-DAY CONFERENCE OF DISPLACED JEWS CONCLUDES IN MUNICH: PROTESTS FORCED TRANSFERS

MUNICE, April 5, (JTA) -- A two-day confurence of 80 representatives of Jewh committees of all the DP camps in the American zone concluded here today.

The conference discussed the problems which are now emerging as a result the forced transfer of displaced Jess from one camp to another, particularly the amsfers at Fuerth, Bamberg and Stuttgart. It also heard reports from delegates on ontaneous demonstrations which broke out in all camps demanding that German police ould be disarmed before entering Jevish camps.

A mass-meeting which was scheduled to be held here last night in connection th the conference was cancelled at the request of the military authorities. The eting was called to protest the forced transfer of displaced Jews, as well as the eatment of Jewish refugees by German police.

The conference heard a report from the Stuttgart delegate on the circumstances der which Sammel Danziger, a displaced Jew, was killed by the German police during raid on the Stuttgart camp Last week. The delegate reported that the policemen undered Jewish homes after they entered the camp with police dogs in the early hours the morning.

Preparations for Passover observances are now being made in all camps, it was corted at the conference. Most of the Jews in the camps are already provided with brohs. A special kosher kitchen will be opened in Munich within a few days to prote sedorim for several hundred Jews in the Munich area who reside outside of camps.

. ARMY HEADQUARTERS ISSUES STATEMENT ON PRACEFUL DEMONSTRATIONS OF DISPLACED JENS

FRANKFURT, April 5. (JTA) -- U.S. Army headquarters here today released a stement explaining the psaceful demonstration of 35,000 displaced Jews in seventeen camps throughout the American zone, and amphasized the fact that all rallys were in a nature of mourning ceremonies and that no violence had occurred. The statement is

"Following the death of a displaced person at Stuttgart on Thursday, March 28, rish displaced persons throughout the U.S. zone made preparations to hold tradition-mourning corresonies, on the seventh day following the death, in the IP centers and sewhere.

"The U.S. Army and UNERA were advised of the preparations by representatives the Central Jevish Committee of Bavaria on Weinesday, April 3, and instructions re issued through U.S. military and UNERA channels that ceremonies of this character buld be permitted within the camp areas, but that provisions contained in military rerument Ordesnes Sumber 1, forbidding public meetings, would not be lifted outside th areas.

"Reports show that there were held on Thursday, April 4, in Jewish displaced "sons camps throughout the U.S. zone, orderly mourning coronnoles within come areas, several areas, principally Munich and Stuttgart, gatherings of Jewish displaced personal comp areas commenced pursuant to preliminary preparations previously made, these gatherings dissolved without any disorder or incident upon boing advised that wanthority had been given for this purpose."

Jewish Cultural Delegation Leaves U.S. for Camps in Germany

NEW YORK, April 5. (JTA) -- A cultural delegation consisting of H. Leivek, 1-moun Yiddien post, Israel Efros, Behrev poet, and Emma Lazaroff Schaver, opera ger, sailed total for Europe to provide cultural programs for Jews in the camps for placed persons. The delegation is sponsored by the World Jewish Congress.

HIRTY JEWS ARRESTED IN PALESTINE IN INTENSIFIED POLICE AND MILITARY SEARCHES

JERUSALEM, April 5. (JTA) -- Combined military and police forces today combed be entire area of Tel Aviv-Petach Tikvah-Rehovoth-Richon L'Zion in a search for terprists. Military road blocks halted all buses and compelled passengers to alight, abjecting them to search and interrogation. Ten Jews were arrested near Tel Aviv and wenty in Rehovoth, as a result of the renewed military activities.

Funeral services were held today in Kfar Warburg for the unidentified Jew who as killed near Ashdod this week during attacks on Palestine railroad installations in trious parts of the country. He was buried under the name Abraham Ben-Abraham.

The Arab press reports today that Arab guards at the Ashdod railway station id not put up any resistance because the Jevish attackers told them that they would be harmed and varmed them to leave the station immediately because an explosion is expected. After the explosion, the attackers extended first aid to the wounded rabs, taking them in buses to the Jevish settlement of Ness Ziona where they left the sees and disappeared.

Eugon Levi, 18, one of the visaless refugees captured last week on the "Tel i," and who was due to be released today, died last night at the Athlit clearance mp.

WS PROTEST DECISION TO CHANGE NAMES OF JERUSALEM STREETS FROM JEWISE TO ARABIC

JERUSALEN, April 5. (JTA) -- The Jewish Mational Council of Palestine and the ief Rabbinate today submitted a formal protest to the Palestine Government opposing e decision of the Jerusalem municipal commission to change the Jewish names of rests in the Old City to Arabic.

"The Jews of Palestine will never consent to have the name of King David Street anged to Tarik Daoud Street," the protest points out. It demands that the Government neel the commission's decision.

MS SENTENCED BY POLISH COURT MARTIAL IN ENGLAND; BOARD OF DEPUTIES SEEKS THEIR RELEASE

IONDON, April 5. (JTA) -- Notwithstanding the fact that Foreign Secretary win has announced the dissolution of the Polish Army in Britain, a Polish court maral in Scotland last week sentenced three former Jevish soldiers to six months imisomment each on charges of describin, it was learned here today.

Two of the three convicted Jeve had originally volunteered into the Polish my. One of them, David Glicenstein joined the Polish military ranks as a volunteer Persia in 1982, while the other, Sinon Getreidehandler, volunteered in Canada berre 1982. They left the ranks in 1984 because of the anti-Semitian which prevailed their units, and have since remained with their relatives in England. They were rested when they appeared voluntarily to notify the authorities that they did not sire remarkation to Poland.

Under Polish military law an appeal against the verdict of the court maral is possible, but the Board of Deputies of British Jews today took legal steps secure the release of the three, and have their sentences suspended until they are patriated to Poland and stand trial there.

FIRST TRANSPORT OF DISPLACED JEWS WILL SAIL FOR THE UNITED STATES NEXT MONTH

FRANKFURT, April 5. (JTA) -- Between 800 and 900 displaced persons, most of them Jovs, will sail for the United States on May 1, the AMM announced today, confirming earlier reports that emigration was imminent.

The first group of these DP's will leave Munich on April 25 while other groups will leave Frankfurt and Stuttgert the following day. The three groups will converge at Brewen where they will sail for an American port under the care of the War Shipping Administration.

After the first transport, present plans call for shipping between 800 and 900 weekly to the United States, with the provision, however, that not more than 3,900 permits will be issued in any one month. The Displaced Persons Division of the AWG will be in charge of transporting the enigrants to Bremen.

Eight Ships Assigned To Carry Immigrants from American Zone

NEW YORK, April 5. (JTA) -- Eight ships have been assigned to transporting displaced persons and refugees from the American zone of Europe to the United States under fresident Trumen's order facilitating immigration, the War Shipping Administration anhomosed yesterday.

The first trip to pick up immigrants will be started on April 18, when the farine Flasher sails for Bromen from New York, the announcement said. A second ship will follow two days later. It is estimated that the admission of the 39,000 immigrants authorized under Freeident Truppan's order may take more than a year.

The ships, which were formerly used as troop transports, will have a capacity of 1,000 persons each. As troopships they carried as many as 3,500 per trip.

INISTES IN NEW CREEK ROYALIST CARINET IMPLICATED IN COUNTRY'S ONLY POGROM

ATHENS, April 5. (JTA) -- Gen. Styliance Gonatas, who as Covernor-General of acedonia in 1922, was charged with responsibility for the only anti-Semitic outbreak n modern Greek history, has been appointed Minister of Communications in the new roy-list government formed yesterday by Juage Pausyotis Paulitsas.

When a bend of rowdies attacked the Salonita suburb of Campbell, which was opulated meinly by Jews, looted shops, burned down houses and murdered several people, onates refused to meet with Jewish leaders who were demanding action against their seallents. Although the government never admitted Gonatas' responsibility for the ogrom, Fremier Eleutheriois Venizelos found it necessary to express "disapproval" of is part in the incident.

Gonetae had close, although not clearly defined links with the quieling Seurity Battalions which operated under German direction during the occupation.

PTETRATIONAL UNION AGAINST RACIAL PREJUDICE APPRAIS FOR AID TO JEWS IN GERMAN CAMPS

PARIS, April 5. (JTA) -- The world bureau of the International Union Against soial Prejudice today appealed to all political parties and groups throughout the brid to holp the 70,000 stateless Jews now being held in displaced persons camps in rmany, the Perio radio reported.

The Union also protested the maintenance of less camps after victory.

NATE DEBATE DEVELOPS OVER TRANSJORDAN'S LIDEPENDENCE; STATE DEPT, INQUIRY DEMANDED

WASHINGTON, April 5. (JTA) -- Three members of the U.S. Senate today demanded the Senate floor a report from the State Department on the legality of Britain's oclaiming of Transjordan as an independent state without regard to the provisions of Palestine Mandate, and her violation of the charter of the United Nations which ates that no change may be made in the status of mandated territories without the apoval of the General Assembly of the United Nations.

Sen. Francis J. Myers, Pennsylvania Democrat, condemned Britain's unilateral tion as "a direct violation of her treaty with the United States." He pointed out at not only did the British Government abrogate the treaty of 1924 which provides at no change be made in the terms of the Mandate for Palestine, but it also disgarded Article 3 of the treaty which provides that "vested American property rights the Mandate territory shall be respected and in no way impaired." Calling Britain's tion a "dangerous precedent" Myers pointed out that there is now "well over 0,000,000 of American capital invested in Palestine."

"I call upon the Department of State to explain its lack of protest in the regation of a solemn treaty with the United States. I ask action by this body in sanding the facts. I solemnly and vehemently protest this disregard for the rights the people of the United States and the violation of treaty obligations," he said.

Senator Warren Magnusson of Washington said the United States Government hould not in any way recognize Transjordan as an independent state" if publication the Transjordan treaty evidences "what we know now is correct." Magnusson called Senator Arthur Vandenberg to support his argument that the United Nations charter tids any change in the status of mandated territories without approval of the United tions General Assembly. Vandenberg replied that the language of Article 80 of the urter is clear and that the only question is one of fact "as to what the Mandate was I still is."

Complete concurrence in Senator Myers' proposal for a full State Department ret on action contempleted by the United States Covernment was expressed by Senator in Brewster of Maine. He also declared that the Senate abould inquire into reports at the Emir is considering hiring 29,000 Folish troops for Transjordan.

Case May Be Brought to the Senate's Foreign Relations Committee

In a press conference following the Senate debate Senator Myers said that he written to Secretary of State James F. Byrnes today, asking for a full report on Transjordan affair because of, what he termed, Britain's action in violation of aty obligations.

"If the report is not satisfactory," Myers said, "I will ask Mr. Byrnes and the te Department to go even further." He suggested that if the State Department retwas not satisfactory he would take the matter to the Sanate Foreign Ralations Comtee.

Representative Agustus Bennett, New York Republican, who spoke yesterday on House floor condemning Britain's action, told the press conference that "the worst mg about the Transjordan affair is that it was sprung upon us without any warning before the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry had had time to finish its investion and report. Part of the report now becomes useless," he said, "because Transdan is much the greater part of Palestine and setting it up as an independent state power it from the recommendations which may be made by the committee."

Former Senator Guy Gillette, now president of the American League for A Free seting, also participated in the press conference.

INT DEFENSE APPEAL LAUNCHES \$5,000,000 DRIVE; STASSEN ATTACKS ANTI-SENTTISM IN U.S.

NEW YORK, April 5. (JTA) -- Condemning anti-Semitism as "an attack on the pes of free men around the world," Harold E. Stassen, former Governor of Minnesota, at night called upon the people of the United States to fight racial bigotry in this untry. He spoke at a dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria launching the 1946 \$5,000,000 mpaign by the Joint Defense Appeal of the American Jewish Committee and the Antifamation League of the B'nai B'rith.

Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, president of the American Jevish Committee, who esided, called upon the people of the United States "to build a community free from tee, prejudice and ill-will of man toward man," He outlined the functions of the bint Defense Appeal and the work carried on by the American Jevish Committee and the ati-Defamation Legue, and pointed out that New York is expected to raise half of the 5,000,000 which the Joint Defense Appeal seeks.

Emphasizing that the fight against bigotry conducted by the Jewish organizaions is not an isolated battle, Stassen said: "Anti-Semitism is not only an attack
the Jews. Anti-Semitism is an attack on the American way of life. Anti-Semitism
an attack on the hopes of free men around the world. It must be recognized as such
id dealt with as such. I am optimistic about the future. I do not underestimate the
unsions and tragedies that follow in the wake of war. But there are a number of
ivorable developments since the war. First smong these I would list the establishant of the Human Rights Commission of the United Nations Organization. This Commision will give world-wide emphasis to besic human rights."

Enumerating other factors and developments which demonstrate the growth of iter-racial goodwill in this country, Stassen warned: "But let not this note of thims in the nout vigilance and determination in the months and years shead. The seeds I hatred were sown widely and cleverly before the war, and the resultant vicious rowth has not entirely disappeared. The recent Senate fillbuster on F.E.P.C. and the intents of some of the fillbustering speeches sharply point the dangers. Reports one Europe show the tragic aftermath of hatred and of war. Misinformation and mis-inderstandings are widespread. The efforts by subversive elements to thrive on distribution are continuing. Some seek to increase the discrimination, as a means to livide and undermine. Others seek to exaggerate the discriminations; also as a means o divide and undermine.

Henry Monsky, president of the B'nai B'rith, spoke of the role Stassen played t the San Francisco conference of the United Nations in securing the establishment of he Human Rights Commission. The dinner was attended by 1,600.

R. MOSES SCHWARTYMAN, MEMBER OF ZIONIST ACTIONS COMMITTEE, DIES IN LONDON

LONDON, April 5. (JTA) -- Dr. Moses Schwartzman, prominent physician and Miclogist died here today at the age of 65.

Born in Odesea, Dr. Schwartzman served as a chairman of the executive of the dessa Jewish Community from 1918 to 1920. He was the first radiologist on the staff the London Jewish Hospital and was active in a number of health organizations including the CSE. He was also a member of the Action Committee of the World Zionist arganizations.
