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#### 1,200 JEVISH REFUGERS ARRESTED IN LIALY WILL BE PLACED IN CUSTODY OF JDC

ROMS, April 7. (JTA) -- The 1,200 Jevish refugees detained by Italian authorities abound the 1,000-ton motor schooner "Fede" following their arrest on Friday as they were preparing to sail for Palestine will be placed in the custody of the Joint Distribution Committee, it was reported here today.

Benjamin Brook, JDC representative in Italy, and Dr. Umberto Nachon, Jewish gency representative here, are already in the southern town of La Spezia, where the leve were arrested. The Pelestine office here has received a wire from the refugees, it has appeal that it be forwarded to President Truman and Prims Minister Attles, in hich they warn that if they are not permitted to anter Pelestine, they "will sink the hip and drown with it, because we have reached the last stage of despair."

It is not expected here that any official action will be taken against the reugess. The only charge which could be placed against them is illegal possession of llied stores, since each is understood to have had a ten-day supply of Allied rations.

Three non-commissioned officers who were detained in connection with the afair are reported to have been members of a Jovish military unit, which as part of the ritish forces had been ordered south from Udine. British circles here believe that efugees were loaded onto the trucks which brought them to La Spezia while the convoy as traveling southward.

#### British Reported to Have Ordered Arrest of La Spezia Refugees

JERUSALEM, April 7. (JTA) -- The Falestine Government is determined to oppose
th all its resources "lilegal" immigration above the 1,500 monthly quota it has temrarily set, and, therefore, ordered the Italians to arrest the La Spezia refugees, it
reported here today. The Government is understood to be preparing centers on the
decanese Islands for captured visal se immigrants.

David Ben Gurion, chief of the Jevish Agency, addressing a Labor Party conrence in Heifa last night, said that Jevish immigration to Palestine would continue long as the Zionist movement exists in Kurope. He said that the La Spezia incident is the first time Britain had fought Zionism outside of Palestine. The secret Toice Inreel' regio, also communing on the arrests in Italy, warned today that "nothing Il be allowed to halt Jevish immigration."

The entire Jevish community is aroused by the reports from is Spetia, as well reports concerning pogrous in Europay and nurset in the IP carps in Carmany. Editials in totay's papers declare that Palestine's Jews vill not tolerate continuam of a hostile policy towards the remants of European Jewry whose only crime is at they wish to leave Europe.

#### RIFKIND REPORT RECOMENDING TRANSFER OF JEWISH DP'S TO PALESTINE RELEASED BY WAR DEPT.

WASHINGTON, April 7. (JTA) -- Repid mass recent lement in Palestine of the remaining 100,000 Jews in Germany and Austria was recommended by Judge Simon H. Rifkind, Special Alviews on Jewish Affairs to General Joseph T. McNarney, European Theator commander, in a final memorandum he submitted to McMarney upon completion of his five-months service in Germany it was disclosed today by the War Department. Judge Rifkind recently returned to the United States to resume his duties as United States district judge for the southern district of New York.

In issuing the memorandum the War Department stated that it represented "only the personal views" of Judge Rifkind and was being released "as the comment of a qualified observer on a matter in which there has been substantial public interest."

Righted emphasized that the problem of displaced Jeve "is actually insoluble without Patestine," which, he esid, is the sole hope of the majority of Jevs in Germany and Austria. "Disintegration has abroady begun and may rapidly spread," he said, and "unless the world is prepared immediately to make a place for them, it will drive to despair and disaster this handful of a decimated people. All of them have but one earnest wish, to be quit of Europe, and most of them have one other compelling desire, to emigrate to Palestine."

## Urges Number of Changes in Army Treatment of Displaced Jews

Rifkind recommended a number of changes to improve the effectiveness of policies regarding Jevich DP's. Revision of diet to very the monotony headed his list, followed by more adequate rehabilitation and training projects, provision of more civilian rather than betweeks type housing, intensification of the education and religious programs, "first class effort" in providing opportunities for employment, prevention of "peculiarly inappropriate" tenderies to intensify policing of the persecuted DP groups, non-Jevich as well as Jevich, and an educational program for newly arrived troops and military police for understanding treatment of the DP's.

However, the underlying problem of the displaced Jews, Judge Rifkind stressed, "will cease to be a problem, not when any specified agency has discharged its limited responsibility, but when the Jews concerned have been restored to normal life in an abode in which they strike permanent roots." He warned that the frustration of finding a place outside Europe in which to live was rapidly bringing the Jewish DP's "to the end of their excitonal tetter."

# Criticizes Conduct of UNRRA and Intergovernmental Refuges Committee

Judge Rightind estegorically stated that of the several governmental agencies responsible for DP's, "the Army is the only one that has to date made a substantial and noteworthy contribution." He sharply criticized UMRA for refusal to contribute any supplies to DP's, for failure in the U.S. zone "to bring to its task the necessary intitative, administrative skill and imagination. Conspicuous has been its lack of drive to implement ideas conceived both within and outside its staff." He praised the Growtion of field workers but deplored the lack of routine, technical tackledge conceiving housing, clothing and feeding, and absence of "necessary executive capacity."

The Intergovernmental Committee on Refugees received even more rigorous criticism as an "impotent" organization which "has accomplished nothing in the way of resettlement of Jevish DP's and can accomplish nothing under its present poli-

ss." He said the committee has taken no steps so far to facilitate settlement of rish DP's anywhere and "by appearing to act in this field has discouraged others from ring the initiative."

He recommended that the United States directly negotiate with other immigraon-receiving nations to help remedy loss of valuable time.

#### Says World Jews Indebted to Army for Survival of European Rements

Cataloguing many instances of "the Army's varmheartedness" in dealing with all. splaced persons and ex-personted ones particularly, Rifkind declared that "the Jews the world are everlastingly in debt to the Armed Forces of the United States for the rvival of a remmant of Israel in Europe." He termed the resone phases of liberation fracles of accomplishment," and lauded the "heroic and selfless devotion of many dical and combat officers, and thousands of anonymous American soldiers of all seds."

Rifkind also preised the Army's "great accomplishments" in arrangements for a "semi-permanent living" conditions of "ex-persecutees." He mentioned the wide saure of personal freedom accorded them, encouragement of self-government and broad sedom of movement, higher caloric diet than that permitted the Germans, and priority many items. He cited the provision of plane service to ferry in "sorely needed structors and supplies from Falestine."

He found especially noteworthy the accommodation and care extended to Jews who filtrated from East European countries. He pointed out that the future of East — ropean Jewry constitutes the primary problem, since only a minor fraction of German d Austrian Jews remain in Central Europe.

"Many of the Jews who are today living in Poland, Czechoelovarda, Rumania and mgary are baffled and perplaced, inscours in the present, fearful of the future," frind reported. "Not so the Jews in Germany and Austria. They know what they want; ey want to quit Europe, to live together, not dispersed among a population that rerist them as aliens; they desire to live in the pattern of their own historic culture; ey visualize the realization of their desires in Palestine,"

#### Jews' Desire To Emigrate Responsible for Unrest in Camps

These considerations are "crucially germans" to the Army's task, Rifkind deared, in that they supply the clue to the "sense of axcitement" found in Jevish discased persons centers, "the high pitch of the publications, the mess meetings, denorations, petitions and general atmosphere of political ferror, in sharp contrast the relative quietude in other DP centers. They provide the reason for the Jevish impatience with measures that give an atmosphere of permanency to their enforced sidence in Germany, and their reluctance to do anything that appears to integrate on with the German population."

They also help to explain, he said, the increase of the Jevieh population in a U.S. zone, while that of other IP groups decreases. Finding themselves unvelcome their lands of origin, indigenous anti-Semitian flourishing, their families, friends it homes gone, "they find it impossible to take up normal living in a graveyard of mories."

Flatly declaring that life for these people is "impossible" in their home mutries, and that "they cannot be repatriated, "Rifkind said that the Jews entering le U.S. zone in Germany seek only "a provisional place of refuge as a staging and shabilitation area for migration." He praised the Anny's "sympathatic understanding has fer of the search for asylum, and strongly urged continuation of that policy.

#### DERLY REFUGERS WILL BE ALLOWED TO REMAIN IN SMITZERLAND: OTHERS TO GET WORK PERMITS

GENEVA, April 7. (JTA) -- A considerable improvement in the position of the er 15,000 Jewish refugees in Switzerland is expected as a result of a conference this set-and of cantonal police heads, during which they unanimously approved the draft of decree allowing elderly refugees to take up permanent residence in this country.

At the same time, they approved the issuance of labor permits to refugees, proded that Swiss interests were not affected adversely, but expressed the wish that regees still be compelled to sorve short terms periodically in the "land army" to releve the acute shortage of farm labor.

#### 0,000 POLISH JEWS BEING REPATRIATED FROM USER THIS MONTH, REMAINDER WILL GO NEXT MONTH

MOSCOW, April 7. (JTA) -- Sixty thousand Polish Jevs will be repatriated from an Soviet Union this month and the remainder will return to Poland in May, it was anomated here today by the Committee of Polish Jevs in USSR. Many of the Jevs are retred to be apprehensive about conditions in Poland, because of reports of anti-Jeviah error there.

A total of 9,000 packages for Polish Jews in the USSR are still lying in post fices because they cannot be delivered to addresses who have been repatriated, it as reported at a conference of representatives of the Polish Embassy in Moscow and Yeringin, director of the International Communications Department. In addition yeral thousand parcels are still expected from Iran and Palestins.

The comference, which was called at the suggestion of the Committee of Polish ave and the Union of Polish Patriots, decided to turn over packages for individuals to the Central Committee of Polish Jevs in Moscov which will distribute them to the Miressees wherever possible. Undeliverable cartons and those not addressed to in-lyiduals will be sent to frontier posts and areas in which the repatriates will settle for distribution there. Approximately 3,000 percels will be sent to frontier posts, and each district to which Jevs will be repatriated in May will receive 300 sokages.

#### exish yours, noteded in pattle following palestine ratiooad blasting, dies

JENUSALEM, April 7. (JTA) -- Abmer Ben Shemen, 18-year-old Jewish youth, who is wounded in an engagement near Batyam between British troops and a group of 31 Jews blowing the blasting of the Ashhod railway station last week, died yesterday in a proximent hospital at Jeffs.

The pouth was buried in the Hachalet Itzhak cemetery. Funeral services were inducted under supervision of a large force of policemen and not even the closest platives of the boy were permitted to attend.

#### ECH COVERNMENT ABOLISHES ALL REFERENCES TO RACE, RELIGION IN OFFICIAL PAPERS

FRAGUE, April 7. (JTA) -- References to religious preference or racial origin Czechoslovak citizens will no longer be made on official forms of Government agenes in Bohemia and Moravia, Minister of the Interior Vaclay Nosek announced here to-

In instructions to all administrative agencies and national committees, Nosek id: "Reference to racial origin or religious denomination in official communications contrary to the democratic spirit of equality of all citizens in a free country and ist be considered a survival of the ideology introduced by the fascist occupation press."

The instructions emphasized that "in the Czechoslovak Republic the concept 'aryans' and 'non-aryans' does not exist," and that "the rights and duties of echoslovak citizens is unaffected by their racial origin or religious denomination." lose who were persecuted by the Nazis for religious and racial reasons are placed on a equal footing with those persecuted for political reasons. Those who in the 1930 may declared themselves of Jevish nationality, and who did not commit any acts gainst the Czechoslovak Republic, will retain full Czechoslovak citizenship, Mosek treased.

#### estapo orders sending jews to camps unearthed; may ald in tracing missing jews

FRANKFURT, April 7. (JTA) -- Orders issued by the Gestapo in Frankfurt sendng some 15,000 Jews to concentration camps have been uncerthich here by American inestigators, it was announced today. The old travel orders were discovered in the ellar of the oriminal police Swilding.

It is expected that the papers will eventually be turned over to Jewish oranizations to facilitate the tracing of many Jews whose whereabouts are still unnown. However, they must first be cleared by U.S. military authorities who are now ramining them.

### OUTH AFRICAN MATZON RATIONING BREAKS DOWN; BOARD OF DEPUTIES APPEALS TO RETAILERS

JOHANNESBURG, April 7. (JTA) -- Control of the distribution of matcohe in outh Africa has broken down and the Board of Deputies of South African Jews today apealed to retailers to make an equitable distribution despite the breakdown on the anufacturing and wholesale levels.

During the war years, the Covernment allocated wheat for match baking to manuacturers provided the Scard of Deputies controlled the distribution. This surrangement was satisfactorily carried through until the end of the war. This year because if the importation of a considerable smount of matches, the manufacturers have withream from the rationing system and will sell on the open market. The importers ofered to submit to the same Scard of Deputies' control, but local manufacturers refused to continue cooperating with the Board.

#### ZIONIST CHOURS APPRAL TO EVERY JEW IN AMERICA TO EBCOMS ELECTOR TO ZIONIST CONCRESS

NEW YORK, April 7. (UTA) -- A joint proclamation calling upon every Jew in the United States to purchase a "abelel" and thereby become an elector to the 22nd World Ziomist Congress which is scheduled to take place in Palestine this summer, was issued here today by the Ziomist Organization of America, Hadassah, Poele Zion, Mizrachi, Rashamer Hatzair, Loft Poele Zion and the Jewish State Party.

The proclamation calls attention to the "crucial importance of this first postvar international assemblego of Zionists following upon the greatest catastrophe in Jerian history and the decimation of European Jerry."

#### J.D.C. APPROPRIATES \$3,819,250 FOR APRIL RELIEF PROGRAMS FOR JEWS IN EUROPE

NEW YORK, April 7. (JTA) -- Appropriations of \$3,819,250 for Agril by the Joint Distribution Committee for the relief and rebabilitation of Jewish survivors oversees bring the agency's total allocations this year to more than \$17,574,000, it was anounced today by Dr. Joseph C. Hyman, erecutive vice-chairman.

One-half million pounds of relief supplies were shipped by the Joint Distribution Committee from New York yesterday and today on the SS Sea Nymph and SS Louisa M. Alcott headed for Austria, Czechoslovaiia, Rungary, France, Germany, and Yugoslavia, where they will be distributed among the Jeviah survivors by J.D.C. representatives stationed in Europe. Approximately 432,600 pounds of the supplies shipped were foodstuffer the belance clotking.

#### METFODIST RELIEF COMMITTEES CONTRIBUTES \$10,000 TO UNITED JUSTISH APPEAL

NEW YORK, April 7. (JTA) -- A contribution of \$10,000 has been made by the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief to the United Jeviah Appeal campaign for \$100,000,000, the U.J.A. has announced.

In presenting the gift, Blahop Eerbert Welch, chairman of the Methodist committee, expressed the hope that it "sill serve as a token of the spirit in which we join with you in the common task of bringing relief to the suffering and hope to the oppressed and despairing."
