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PALESTINE TO GET \$25,000,000 IN REPARATIONS FOR REHABILITIATION OF DISPLACED JEWS

JERUSALEM, April 8. (JTA) -- The Intergovernmental Committee on Refugees has decided to allot \$25,000,000 for the rehabilitation in Palestine of displaced Jews from Europe. it was announced here today by Dr. Bernard Joseph, legal edvisor of the Jewieh Agency. The sum was made available to the refugee committee by the Allied Reparations Commission.

Addressing a press conference. Dr. Joseph said that the Jevish Agency considers the \$25,000,000 to be only a small fraction of the reparations due the Jewish people for property looted from Jews in Europe. The Agency is demanding all German property in Palestine as part of the reparations, he revealed. A memorandum to this effect has been submitted to the Allied Reparations Commission through the Palestine Government, he stated.

Dr. Joseph also disclosed that private Jewish organizations in Palestine. such as settlers associations of Jews from Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland and Greece, have undertaken separate action, supported by the Jewish Agency, to secure reparations for Jews in Palestine who lost their property in the countries from which hey escaped. Representatives of these organizations have left Palestine for various propean countries to take up the matter of reparations.

The Jewish Agency has also submitted a memorandum to the United Nations with egard to general problems of displaced Jews and their emigration to Palestine. Dr. oseph reported. He added that representatives of the Agency are now in various capials attempting to secure support from governments who are members of the United Naions for the demends outlined in the memorandum.

ROBLIM OF DISPLACED PERSONS MIST HE DEALT WITH PROMPTLY UNITED NATIONS BODY IS TOLD

LONDON. April 8. (JTA) -- The problem of European refugees and displaced ersons must be dealt with "rapidly and adequately," it was emphasized here today at he opening meeting of the United Nations Committee on Refusees and Displaced Persons. hich will be in session here for five weeks to decide the fate of homeless people nd to establish an international body which will take over the care of refucees and isplaced persons.

Hector McNeil. British Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs, was unanimously lected chairmen of the committee. Today's session was opened by F.C. Sharpley, head the London office of the United Nations, in the Church Fouse at Westmingtor with presentatives from twenty countries attending. Also present were representatives the Intergovernmental Committee on Refugees and high UNI RA officials in charge of fuces work.

Speaking on behalf of the British Government, Sir George Rendel said that ritain will give its wholehearted cooperation in helping to settle the problem of fugees under principles of justice." This problem, he declared, must be solved cmptly, since homeless and starving people represent a danger to the countries ere they are presently residing.

The Committee on Refugees and Displaced Persons will deal with all aspects the refugee situation in Europe during its session here and is charged with preration of a comprehensive report for presentation to the United Nations Social and commic Council before May 25. It is certain that the report will recommend the esblishment of a permanent United Nations body to assume the functions of the Intervernmental Committee on Refugees and of the League of Nation's Commission on Refugees.

Among the questions which will be studied here are the issuance of intertionally recognized identity documents to refugees and displaced persons, and the ssibilities for permanent settlement of displaced persons in new countries where ey would eventually become full-fledged offizens.

Chief of AMG DP Division En Route to Confer with Inquiry Committee

FRANKFURT, April 8. (JTA) -- Col. Stanley Mickelson, chief of the AMG's Disaced Persons Division, left today for Lausanne, to confer with the Anglo-American mmittee of Inquiry on Palestine, which is now writing its report in that city.

Col. Micrelson testified before the committee when it was in Serlin in Febary, and it is assumed he is going to Lausanne to furnish additional racts it reires before issuing its report.

vish cenetery and memorial plaques in germany defaced by anti-semitic vandals

FRANKFURT, April 8. (JTA) -- Two Jewish memorials here and a Jewish cemetery a nearby town have been desecrated in the past week by anti-Semitic vandals, it was arned today.

Dr. Leopold Esnhaus, president of the Frankfurt Jewish community, in a letter itten today to the local police president, Dr. Rudolph Siegert, asked action to prent similar occurrences and to apprehend the persons responsible for the vandalism. egert immediately offered a reward of 1,000 marks for information leading to the prehension of the guilty persons.

The objects of the attack were a plaque dedicated to the former Jewish comnity of Frankfurt and one commemorating the synagogue here which was destroyed in e Nov., 1936 pograms, and the cametery in the town of Heussenstams.

Siegert told the Jevish Telegraphic Agency that he would confer with Dr. haus on plans for protecting the plaques against further defacement, asserting it it was impossible to keep a constant police guard around them.

When it was pointed out to him that Heussenstams, which is a very small town, offered a reward of 3,000 marks for information concerning the vandals, while midfurt was only offering 1,000, the police head said that that was a matter for the commoil and he could not take any further action.

1.000 PALESTINE VISAS ASSIGNED TO CHILDREN IN CERMANY, AUSTRIA, CZECHOSLOVAKIA AND FRANCE

MUNICH, April 8. (JTA) -- The first 1,000 Palestine immigration certificates available under the present 1,500 monthly temporary quots have been assigned to children, most of whom are orphaned, it was reported here by Eliahu Dobkin, Jewish Agency dimitgration chief.

Dobkin said that 470 visas had been allotted to children in the U.S. zone, 125 to the British zone and 70 to Austria, These youngsters will be joined in Mcraeille by 300 children from Czechoslovakia, and France. They are expected to sail about April 15.

Dobkin has just returned from Lendsberg, where he attended a conference of the "Ichud," the joint organization of Zionist groups in Germany. The meeting, he said, discussed emigration problems and the forthcoming World Zionist Congress.

(UNRRA headquarters in Frankfurt announced tonight that about 450 Jewish children from DP camps in the Munich area are expected there on Wednesday. They will be joined in Frankfurt by a number of children from the British zone. Both groups will then prooped to Marseille for embarkation to Pelestine.)

ZIONIST EXECUTIVE DETERMINED TO HOLD WORLD ZIONIST CONGRESS IN PALESTINE

JERUSALEM, April 8. (JTA) -- The World Zioniet Executive is determined to enforce the decision of the Zioniet Actions Committee that the forthcoming World Zioniet Congress, which is to open on August 7, be held in Palestine, Dr. Bernard Joseph, legal advisor of the Jewish Agency, told a press conference today.

Dr. Joseph made this statement in reply to questions as to whether the Zionist Executive intends to comply with the request of the Zionist Organization of America that the congress be held in the United States, instead of Palestine.

Opening the election campaign to the congress, David Ben Gurion today advocated the establishment of a labor front based on the demand for the creation of a Jewish Estate. He spoke at a meeting of the Mapai, the Jewish Labor Party, in Tel Aviv and urged that the Mapai, the Poale Zion and the "Movement for Labor Unity" should unite for the elections. He attacked the Hashomer Estair, the left wing of the Histodruth, as a movement which "is splitting labor's ranks," because it favors a bi-national state.

DISPLACED JEWS IN BRITISH ZONE WILL UNVEIL MEMORIAL AT FORMER HERGEN-EELSEN CAMP

HERENFORD, Germany, April 8. (FFA) -- A memorial to thousands of Jews buried in mass graves will be unveiled on the site of the infamous Belsem consentration camp this Sunday, moreting the first anniversary of the liberation of the Jews in Belsem by the British Army.

The British policy with regard to the liberated displaced Jews is different than that followed in the American zone in Germany. The British, for example, have not set up separate camps for Jewish refugees, and the only large congregation of them is the 7,000 at Camp Four at Hoenne. Jews leaving Foland for various reacons rarely so into the British zone because there they receive only the same food rations as the Jermane, or 1,042 calories daily. On the other hand, that are described as "regular DP's," or those who were in the zone from the time of the liberation, now receive 1,750 calories.

AMERICAN JEWISH CONFERENCE DEMANDS MORE VIGOROUS DENAZIFICATION IN U.S. ZONE IN CETMANY

NEW YORK, April 8. (JTA) -- Contending that past denazification procedures have hiled to accomplish their objectives, the American Jewish Conference today urged that lenszification in the American zone in Germany be prosecuted with increased vigor, in communications to Secretary of State James F. Byrnes and Secretary of War Robert P. atterson.

The charge was based on the killing of Samuel Dantziger, 37-year-old survivor f the Osviccim concentration came who was shot on Friday morning, March 29, by German clice in a mass raid on the Stuttgart displaced persons settlement. Three other Jews ere wounded and twenty-six were arrested.

Henry Monsky, chairman of the Interim Committee of the Conference, declared that he incident "compromised the fair name of the United States and the democratic principles for which we, as Americans, fought in World War II. . BERNHARD KAHN MARKS 70th BIRTHDAY TODAY; HONORED BY J.D.C. LEADERS

HEW YORK, April 8. (JPA) -- Dr. Bernbard Kabn, honovery chairman of the European country commoil of the Joint Distribution Committee, who has been sottee in Jewish fe for more than forty years, and under whose guidance the J.D.C. spent many milons of dollars to aid Jews in Europe, will celebrate his 70th birthday tomorrow.

The occasion was marked at a special party in his honor at the Harmonie Club yesriay at which Faul Beervald, honorary chairmen of the J.D.C., reviewed Dr. Kain's ruice to the Jevish cause. The work of Dr. Kahn, and the "dignity and devotion" with ich he carried out his duties, were also landed by Alexander Landesco, comptroller the J.D.C., who presented a plaque to him on behalf of his co-workers in the J.D.C.

Until 1921, when he joined the J.D.C. as director of the organization's work in tope, Dr. Kahm was for eighteen years general secretary of the Hilfsverein der itschen Juden in Germany. He has been a director of the Kerne Hayesqu since 1939, a ber of the administrative committee of the Palestine Economic Corporation, a member the council of the American Joint Reconstruction Foundation, and a member of many or centual Jewish institutions.

RIGID CANADIAN IMMIGRATION POLICIES HIT IN PARLIAMENT AS HINDRANCE TO DOMINION GROWTH

MONTREAL, April 3. (JTA) -- Canada's refusal to admit any substantial number of European refugees during the war had been severely criticized in recent days in several addresses in the Federal parliament at Ottawa, and there is indication that as a result of mounting pressure, the Government may be ready to make some move towards liberalizing the dominion's immigration policies.

Sen, Arthur Rosbuck, in a speech in the upper house of Parliament last week, charged that "throughout the war Canada maintained a heartless policy of the closed door towards refugees." He said that there were thousand of families in Canada who are anxious to care for friends and relatives in Europe. Sen. Rosbuck pointed out that Canada's future depends on increased immigration, since it "carnot hope to maintain indefinitely its 3,500,000 square miles of territory in the exclusive ownership of 12.000.000 people."

A similar plea was made in the lower house by Lieut. Col. Cecil Merrit, who demanded an immigration quote of no less than 200,000 yearly. He was supported by Col. David Croll and several other deputies. Opposition was voiced, however, by a number of deputies from the province of Quebec, which has traditionally opposed immigration. Their stand was reflected in editorials appearing in several Quebec French-Language papers commenting on the immigration debate.

At the annual meeting of the Jewish Immigrant Aid Society here, M.A. Solkin, executive director, reported that the government had reacted favorably to suggestions that it agree to admit several teachers for under-staffed Jewish schools here, and also orphaned European Jewish children whose families were destroyed by the Nazis.

POLITICAL AND RELIEF PROBLEMS DISCUSSED AT CONFERENCE OF POLISE JEWS IN SOUTH AMERICA

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, April 8. (JTA) -- A four-day Conference of Polish Jews in South America has concluded here after setting up a provisional executive committee to deal with future matters affecting Polish Jews here and abroad and adopting a series of resolutions on political and relief problems.

The conference, which was attended by several hundred delegates from Argentina, Brazil, Uruguay, Chile, Bolivia, Paraguay and Peru, was addressed by Dr. Alberto Guanl, Vice-president of Uruguay, who described the present situation of the Jews throughout the world as "one of the great injustices in international history." He expressed hope that a solution of the Palestine problem would be found shortly, and said that the nations of Latin-America would support Jewish aims in the "world organizations for peace."

The political resolutions of the conference lauded the Polish Government for its decree outlawing anti-Semitism; protested against the "reactionary" forces which are supporting the "Nazi-fasciet bands" inside Poland; urged UNERA and the UN to consider the problems of the Jews of Europe; demanded disbandment of the DP camps and action to facilitate the return to Poland of those desiring to leave; protested against the calestine White Paper and halled Jewish achievements in Palestine.

The resolutions on relief declared that the Jewish Central Committee in Waraw, under the leadership of Dr. Emil Sommerstein, is the recognized representative ody of Polish Jewry and all relief should be sont to it; helled the relief activities if the Joint Distribution Committee and the "political works of the World Jewish ongress," pledged support to both and urged coordination among the two organizations and the World Union of Polish Jews.

.400,000 JEWS STILL SUFFERING IN EUROPE AFTER YEAR OF LIBERATION, SEN. BARKLEY SAYS

SYRACUEE, N.Y., April 8. (JTA) -- The "bitter paradox" of the new peace is that urope's 1,400,000 surviving Jewish people, who are ending their first full year of iberation from the yoke of Hitleriam, have not yet been freed from the terrors of tarvation, displacement, political disfranchisement and economic dispossession, U.S. enator Alben W. Barkley, of Kentucky,majority leader of the Senate, declared yester-ay before more than 250 delegates attending an extraordinary New York State Regional onference sponsored jointly by the \$100,000,000 United Jewish Appeal and the National ouncil of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. The delegates met at the Syracuse otel.

Senator Barkley demanded that Palestine be opened to large-scale Jevish immiration and colonization. "The governments of the world cannot leave these so-called isplaced Jevs of Europe indefinitely in camps," he declared. "Those people cannot go in living in a 'no-man's land' ringed in by invisible walls of homelessness and desair. The gates of Palestine must be flung open to enable tens of thousands of hungry ind invanted Jews of Europe to find sanctuary and a new life there." The Senator apealed to the "great open heart of the British people" to open the gates of Palestine to Jevish immigration.

Isidore Sobeloff, executive director of the Jevish Welfare Federation of Detroit, ddressing the conference, said that the great crisis affecting 1,400,000 Jevish survivors in Europe is the first concern of American Jevry. Discussing "Post-Wer Sights or Jevish Community Planning", Mr. Sobeloff said: "The race against death in Europe as entered its most critical stage. When we couldn't reach the Jews of Europe and illions died, it was tragic and hopeless. Now that we can reach so many of those who emain, it would be worse than tragic if we were to fail to do everything that is umanly possible to help them."

Moses A. Leavitt, secretary of the Joint Distribution Committee, described the ar-flung activities of his organization in fifty countries throughout the world. He old the assembled delegates: "Your presence here at this critical moment in Jewish istory is a sign that we in America do not propose to turn our backs on the crucial ufferings of our people in war-shattered Europe." He added that hundreds of thousands f Jewish men, women and children in Europe look to the JDC for immediate aid.

First 2,000 Jewish Refugees from Europe Arriving in U.S. Next Month

Edwin Rosenberg, first vice-president of the National Refugee Service, disclosed hat 2,000 refugees are due to arrive in the United States next month under the terms f President Truman's recent directive speeding up quota immigration. That monthly ate vill continue thereafter, he said. The National Refugee Service, he added, "is harged with major responsibility to see to it that none of the newcomers to America ver becomes a public charge."

The delegates representing 24 communities in New York State also heard Major udsh Nadioh, former advisor on Jevish affairs to Gen. Elsenhover, Joseph Goldstein f Rochester, a director of CJFWF, J.H. Rubens of Rochester, Edward H. Kavinoky of uffalo, president of the New York region of GJFWF. The delegates pledged themselves o give "unreserved support" to the \$100,000,000 compaign of the United Jevish Appeal.
