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TO-AMERICAN INQUIRY COMMITTEE WRITES UNANIMOUS REPORT: COMPROMISE INDICATED

LAUSANNE, April 21, (JTA) -- Judge Joseph C. Hutcheson and Sir John Single-British and American co-chairmen of the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on estine are en route by air to their respective governments bearing a compromise. unanimous, report, it was learned here today.

The committee completed its deliberations yesterday, well within the 180. period allotted it. Despite all the rumors which have circulated in recent weeks. despite the frequently acrimonious debate which occurred while the recommendations e being drafted, no minority report was written.

From today on, the fate of Palestine rests in the hands of the two governats and the Anglo-American inquiry committee no longer exists, its members scatterto their homes in England or the United States. It is assumed that the State Detment and the Foreign Office will contact each other for the purpose of arranging ultaneous release of the report in Washington and London.

It is not known yet if the report will be released immediately, or whether two governments will first consult as to the decisions to be taken on the basis the report, and release it only when they are ready to announce these decisions. is understood that when the committee visited Foreign Minister Bevin during its trings in London, he intimated that whatever they recommended would be acted upon,

In the 104 days that elapsed between Jan. 7, when it opened hearings in hington, and yesterday, the committee, in part or in whole, visited London, Paris, i, Berlin, Stuttgart, Munich, Nuremberg, Frankfurt, Prague, Warsav, Cairo, Jarusal-Beirut, Demascus, Baghdad and Riyad, studying the problems of the Jews of Europe h in and out of displaced persons camps and in the Middle East, and the problems Palestine.

D YUGOSIAV JENS ARRESTED AT TRIESTE EN ROUTE TO ITALY; LA SPEZIA REFUGEES TOTE DELAY

ROME, April 21. (JTA) -- Four hundred Jewish refugees en route from Yugovia to Italy, apparently in the hope of eventually emigrating to Palestine, were ained at Trieste, it was reported here today. The refugees were taken to a camp Bologna which is under the jurisdiction of the Allied Control Commission.

Meanwhile, the 1,040 passengers aboard the "Fede" at La Spezia have decided postpone their departure for Palestine until April 26. Their decision was taken lowing receipt of a cable from Harold Laski, chairman of the British Labor Party, ting that the British Covernment would announce its decision within a week. Laski d that he had met with Foreign Secretary Bevin, and the latter "showed great inest" in the case.

The cable arrived as the leaders of the would-be immigrants received word at enother Italian vessel, the "Fenice," would join the "Fede" in case the British ted to the trip on the grounds that the first vessel was overcrowded. It was to the assembled Jews as they gathered on the dock to commamorate the third ansary of the Warsaw ghetto battle.

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"We are impatient to leave -- and we will leave," one leader stated, "but we eve in Prof. Lacki's good-will and sympathy for our cause, and that is the reason we decided to wait another week. At the same time, we are preparing to sail if vorable decision is not reached by the British by next Friday, or if that decision ne that we consider negative."

He explained that a negative decision would include one splitting the group two -- one to leave now and the second next month, a move which has been reported the probable British solution. There is definite evidence that the group is planning an early departure. vater tanks are being refilled while scores of men and women, clad in shorts and rts, are disinfecting all parts of the ship. There are no police --either British Italian -- around the dock area and, so far as this correspondent can tell, there is British force in town sufficiently strong to restrain the vessel from departing.

The police originally stationed on the deck of the ship departed after Prof. it obtained from the refugees their plots not to try to escape. Two members of British Field Security Service — one a sengeant and the other in civilian alothesspending most of their time sun-bathing or in the lobby of La Spezia's only major al, bemcaning the fate which ordered them here to keep watch on developments, such the arrival and departure of American correspondents. The ruler of Transjordam made his appeal at a reception tendered him in the b city of Hebron.

The postal workers' walkout, which precipitated the country-wide strike wave, entering its twelfth day, while the sympathy strike of railroad, utility, telephone, egraph and other civil service workers is now in its sixth day.

It is understood that emergency measures to deal with the disruption of seres resulting from the strikes were discussed restords at a meeting of the Palestine formant's executive council. Discussions between Government officials and strike down are continuing, but neither side would make any comment, although the Governat is believed ready to make some sage concessions.

7.000 RUMANIAN JEWS REPATRIATED FROM USSR; WERE DEPORTED BY FASCIST REGIME

BUCHAREST, April 19. (JTA) -- A total of 17,000 Rumanian Jevs have passed through Czernowitz en route home from the Soviet Ukraine, to which they were deported by the former Fascist government, it was reported today.

PRACUE, April 21. (JTA) -- Czechoelovakian Jews who registered as of German or Hungarian nationality in the 1930 census cannot obtain relief parcels from Jewish relief organizations abroad, it was learned here today.

The Ministry of the Exchequer has refused to permit relief parcels to be delivered to the Jewish community councils free of customs charges unless the Supreme Founcil of the Federation of Jewish Community Councils signs a statement promising to distribute the packages only to Jews who registered as of Czechoslovak, Slavio, or other Allied nationality in 1930. The Supreme Council refused to sign such a statement. Jewish leaders expect that treasury department officials will take a more favorable view of the situation and will reverse the decision.

ARAB MAYOR OF HERRON SURMITS PETITION TO TRANSJORDAN RULER ASKING "ANSCHLUSS"

JERUSALEM, April 21. (JTA) -- The Arab mayor of Hebron has forwarded to mir Abdullah, ruler of Transjordan, a petition, which is said to contain the signatures of 5,000 citizens of the city, demanding political union with Transjordan, it was reported here today.

The Palestine Arab Higher Committee is meeting here today to take a stand on the Government's granting permission to the 1,040 Jewish refugees, now detained at La Spezia, Italy, to enter Palestine. Tel Aviv Jews have already prepared 100 layettes for the expectant mothers aboard the "Fede," at La Spezia.

It was announced today that the Sephardic Jovs and the Zionist Revisionists, who have hitherto refused to participate in the Jovish National Council, have decided to join. Their decision is a result of a rapproclement arrived at during the hungar strike, in which Sephardic and Revisionist leaders joined.

BOVIET COVERNMENT CRANTS 2,000,000 RUBLES FOR NEW JEWISH THEATER IN EXTENDIDIAN

MOSCOW, April 21. (JTA) -- A Government great of 2,000,000 rubles for the construction of a new theater in Biro-Bidjan was announced here today. The building which will house the Enganovich State Theater is planned as an expansion measure for the expected increase in population in the Jeviah autonomous region.

At the same time, it was reported that a department of history of the Jevish theater has been established at the State Jevish Theaterical School in Moscov. The department, which was named for Schoon Mikhoels, chairman of the Jevish Anti-Fascist Committee of the U.S.S.R., plans to publish a number of works describing the major phases of the devalopment of the Jevish stage.

DIFFISCATED JENISH PROPERTY NOW IN NEUTRAL COUNTRIES TO BE RETURNED TO OWNERS OR HEIRS

NEW YORK, April 21. (JTA) -- Property seized from Jews in Europe after 1933 at now located in neutral countries will be restored to their owners, or their heirs, they can be found, or will be made available for Jewish rehabilitation and resetlement, it was announced today by the American Jewish Conference on the basis of corspondence with the State Department.

The State Department notified the American Jevish Conference that it has aken under advisement the proposal advanced by the Conference that heirless Jevish operty should be made available for Jevish rehabilitation and resettlement.

The sum of \$25,000,000, allowated under the Paris Reparation Agreement for the rehabilitation and resettlement of non-repatriable victims of German action, contitutes a first and prior charge on the proceeds of German external assets, the American Jevish Conference has been assured in the communication received from the State partment.

J. Kenneth Galbraith, director of the Office of Economic Security Policy the State Department, discussing the statement and recommendations on reparations builted to the Secretary of State by the Conference, declared that the State Derment "has reason to believe" that this is also the view of France and the United nadom. The three governments will therefore support this position in future intertional negotiations, both with the neutral countries involved and in the Inter-Alled Reparation Agency.

As for the non-monetary gold found by Allied forces in Germany, which is to made available to the Intergovernmental Committee on Rafugees over and above the 5,000,000 referred to, it is contemplated that the gold would be melted down, sold or foreign exchange, and the proceeds turned over to the Committee.

H-JEMS OF DALLAS RAISE \$10,000 FOR UNITED JEMISH APPEAL CAMPAIGN

MEW YORK, April 21. (JTA) -- The non-Jews of Dallas, Texas, contributed 0,000 in one week to the United Jewish Appeal Caspaign for \$100,000,000, the U.J.A. nonneed today.

The non-Jevish drive was conceived by a Catholic rector, a Methodist ministry, and a Baptist laymen and was sparked by two of the city's leading newspapers, the Bess-Herald and the Hews. The newspapers pointed out in editorials that the Jews of a city had taken part in every community charity drive, and that now they needed a aid of all Ohristians as well as Jews. With the \$70,000 contributed by Christians, a UJJA. Campaign in Dallas passed the \$750,000 mark, nearly twice the quota of 00,000 set for the city.

COMMANDER JOSHUA L. GOLDBERG, FIRST JEWISH CHAPLAIN TO JOIN NAVY, RECEIVES COMMENDATION

NEW YORK, April 21. (JTA) -- An official commendation has been awarded Commander Joshua L. Goldberg, Liaison Officer for the Chaplain's Division of the Bureau of Naval Personnel, by Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal, it was announced here today. The citation reads as follows:

"For outstanding performance of duty as Assistant District Chaplain in the Third Naval District, New York, New York, from January 21, 1942, to December 12, 1945. As the first Javish chaplain to volunteer his services to the United States Navy at the beginning of World War II, Commander Goldberg established a high standard of religious ministry and by his musual abilities, complete devotion to duty and his faithfulness to the traditions of the Navy, contributed to the good will and cooperative fellowship among those who provided religious ministry to service personnel.

"In his additional capacity as Liaison Officer for the Chaplain's Division of the Eureau of Naval Personnel, he acted as consultant and advisor on all matters partaining to the work and service of the Jewish Chaplains and instituted several religious programs recognized for their effectiveness and recommended for all Naval Districts. His readiness to be of aid to all chaplains throughout the Navy, coupled with his efficient procurement and distribution of religious supplies to all groups, contributed directly to the morale and the spiritual welfare of naval personnel and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Laval Service."

AMERICAN JEWISH CONCRESS TO HOLD EMERGENCY CONFERENCE ON ALD TO JEWS OVERSEAS

MEN YORK, April 21. (JTA) -- An emergency conference to map plans for immediate aid to surviving Jevs in Europe and Shanghai vill be held here by the American Jevish Congress on April 28th, it was annuanced today.

In a message to the conference, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt described the plight of the refugee and displaced Jews whom she had seen on her recent trip to Europe and said: "The American people have seen extremely generous and deeply concerned, but until these people are reestablished with some sense of security, we can leave no source of heir untapped."

Palestine jesish leader coming to U.S. to Start Drive for Jerusalem Ymea building

JERUSALEM, April 21. (JTA) -- Zelman White, local legish leader, has departed for the United States to inaugurate a fund drive for the construction of a building for the Jerusalem Young Mon's Rebrew Association. Half the sum needed for the edifice has already been subscribed by Jerusalem Jews.
