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BRITISH TROOPS INVADE HOUSES, ATTACK JEWS IN AFTERMATH OF TEL AVIV SLAYINGS

TEL AVIV, April 28. (JTA) -- Troops of the Sixth Airborne Division, seven of whose comrades were killed by Jewish terrorists on Thursday, last night attacked the Jewish villages of Nathanya, Beer-Tuvia, and Givat Hayim about 30 miles from Tel Aviv. Many persons were manhandled and windows of houses and shops were shattered and furniture smashed.

The attack at Nathanya began about midnight when soldiers dashed through the streets, smashing shop windows and shouting: "The Germans must come to Palestine." The clash at Beer-Tuvia began an hour earlier and continued for 40 minutes, during which 40 houses were damaged and two settlers severely injured. The Givat Hayim incident was confined to a small group of soldiers who sped through the town in automobiles throwing empty bottles at passersby, three of whom were injured.

In a statement issued this morning, declaring that the attacks were being investigated, the military authorities said that they "deeply deplore such incidents, especially in face of British troops' admirable patience and restraint in face of repeated and unprovoked attacks, culminating in the brutal murder of seven of their comrades."

Tel Aviv remained out of bounds today to all British troops except for reinforcements patrolling the streets, as tension in the city continued high. In an official statement, the municipal council expressed regret at the "outrageous murder" of the seven men, but added that resentment was felt at the announcement by Maj. Gen. A.J.E. Cassels, commander of the Sixth Airborne Division, that the entire population of the city was responsible for Thursday's terror. It added that it felt that unjust punishment had been visited upon a population which was opposed to criminal acts. The municipality is slated to hold another meeting today to discuss the situation created by the curfew.

Charge Whole Jewish Community with Responsibility for Terror

Late yesterday, Gen. Cassels summoned Acting Mayor Eliezer Perlson and told him that he was imposing a dusk-to-dawn curfew in the Lydda and Samaria districts, which include Tel Aviv, and was closing all restaurants and places of entertainment in the city after 8 p.m. Gen. Cassels said that he was sure that many residents of the city had known of the plot in advance and that Perlson could, if he wished, furnish information leading to the arrest of those responsible. He added: "My decision to restrict the whole community has been made in order to maintain public security and because I hold the community to blame."

A hurriedly convoked meeting of the Chief Rabbinate's Council, presided over by Chief Rabbi Isaac Ha-Levi Herzog and Ben Zion Uziel, last night adopted a resolution expressing horror at the "dastardly terror of last Thursday, which resulted in the destruction of young lives" and voiced "heartfelt sympathy for the tragically bereaved families."

BRITISH LABOR M.P. FINDS ANTI-SEMITISM STILL WIDESPREAD IN RUMANIA; ZIONIST PARLEY OPENS

BUCHAREST, April 28. (JTA) -- John Mack, British Labor M.P., who is now touring Rumania, today told a public meeting that he "has noticed that anti-Semitism is still widespread here."

Three hundred and fifty delegates from all parts of the country gathered here today at the opening session of the National Zionist Federation of Rumania.

HUNGARIAN GOVERNMENT OPPOSED TO EMIGRATION; SAYS ARMISTICE TERMS FORBID "FREE TRAVELLING"

BUDAPEST, April 28. (JTA) -- The Hungarian Government is opposed to emigration from the country, including Jewish emigration to Palestine, until a peace treaty with the Allies has been concluded, the press chief of the Foreign Ministry announced today.

He pointed out that under the terms of the armistice "free travelling" in and out of the country is forbidden. During the press conference he was asked why the Government had not yet released Zionist officials arrested for alleged smuggling of Nazis out of the country, although it has been admitted that they are innocent. The press director did not reply but promised to bring the matter to the attention of the Government.

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT WILL SEND TOKEN UNITS TO BRITISH EMPIRE VICTORY PARADE

JERUSALEM, April 28. (JTA) -- The Palestine Government has accepted the British Government's invitation to send representative Palestinian detachments to take part in the British Empire Victory Parade which will take place this June in London.

The Palestine groups will consist of detachments from Palestine regiments, the Arab Legion, and the Palestinian police force. Tentatively each detachment will consist of one officer and 16 enlisted men, eight of whom will be Jews, and eight Arabs. It is anticipated that the Government will have difficulty in finding sufficient Arab soldiers to march in the parade, because all Arabs except 150 have already been discharged. These are either in military hospitals or in detention barracks.

Three hundred Jewish soldiers who enlisted in the British forces in England and are now serving in the Middle East have requested that they be discharged in Palestine. The soldiers, most of whom were refugees in England at the time of their enlistment, have appealed to the Jewish Agency to support their plea for demobilization in Palestine.

SUPERVISION OF RELIEF SHIP UNLOADING AT BREMEN CUTS LOSSES FROM THEFT

BREMEN, April 28. (JTA) -- Loss of American relief supplies due to pilfering during unloading of ships at this port has decreased considerably, Jacques Degorter, Joint Distribution Committee representative, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today.

Losses have declined to less than one percent during the last two months, he said. Previously as much as five percent of each cargo was lost to wharf thieves. Degorter and two Jewish DP's have been supervising the unloading since the JDC discovered that substantial losses were being incurred at Bremen and Antwerp. Relief stores now in warehouses here will be distributed on the basis of 65 percent to Jews in the American zone of Germany, 25 percent to the British zone and the remaining tenth to Berlin.

U.N. COMMISSION ON HUMAN RIGHTS OPENING IN N.Y. TODAY; GETS PLEA FOR BILL OF RIGHTS

NEW YORK, April 28, (JTA) -- Proposals for an International Bill of Rights which would guarantee basic liberties and make specific provision against discrimination on grounds of sex, language, nationality or religion have been submitted by the American Jewish Committee to the United Nations Commission on Human Rights, which will begin meeting here tomorrow, it was announced by Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, president of the Committee.

Three specific recommendations among those submitted call for guarantees against discrimination, or incitement to discrimination on the grounds of race, sex, language or religion, in legal treatment of all persons or groups, and in matters of education, economic opportunity and public and private employment. Another recommendation asks that the International Bill of Rights to be drawn up by the U.N. be made part of the constitutions of all U.N. members, and that the U.N. establish machinery for supervision and enforcement of human rights provisions.

The American Jewish Committee also requested that peace treaties with former enemy states obligate these states to include the International Bill of Rights in their constitutions, and that the Commission on Human Rights be authorized to designate representatives to these states with power to collect information on the observation of the Bill, which would be made part of international law and come under the jurisdiction of the International Court of Justice.

ADMITTING CONTINUED ANTI-SEMITISM IN GERMANY, BYRNES PLEDGES THOROUGH DENAZIFICATION

NEW YORK, April 28, (JTA) -- Admitting that anti-Semitism and other Nazi doctrines still persist among elements of the German people, Secretary of State James F. Byrnes, in a letter to the American Jewish Conference, pledged that there would be no relaxation of the denazification program.

The letter was in reply to a communication from the Conference protesting the killing of Samuel Dantziger, during a raid by German police on a camp for displaced Jews at Stuttgart.

Replying to a similar protest from the Conference on the Stuttgart incident, Maj. Gen. O.P. Echols, director of the Civil Affairs Division of the War Department, wrote that all aspects of the Dantziger case were being carefully investigated and called attention to the new, more rigid denazification enforcement program recently put into effect.

DEWEY, LEHMAN, O'DWYER WILL HEAD NON-SECTARIAN DRIVE FOR UNITED JEWISH APPEAL

NEW YORK, April 28, (JTA) -- Governor Thomas E. Dewey, former Governor Herbert H. Lehman, Bishop William T. Manning and Mayor William O'Dwyer will serve as honorary chairman of the Community Committee of New York on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal, it was announced today by Nelson A. Rockefeller, chairman of the committee.

Terming their endorsement "an inspiring symbol of the way in which Americans, since the founding of our country, have joined together to help alleviate the sufferings of distressed peoples," Mr. Rockefeller added: "The sponsorship of these leaders is most encouraging to the members of the Community Committee of New York. It is evidence of the sympathy and concern which the community as a whole feels for the Jews who suffered so bitterly under the Nazi regime, and of the support coming from people of all faiths and from all walks of life."

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ROLE OF JEWISH PARTISANS IN WAR AGAINST NAZIS TO BE DEPICTED IN NEW VOLUMES

ROME, April 28. (JTA) -- Historical material for a study of the role of Jewish partisans in the war against Nazism is being collected among Jews now living in Italy, Germany and Austria.

The All-European Union of Partisans, which is sponsoring the research, plans to publish two books, one of which will be the "Yiskor Book of Fallen Jewish Partisans," and the other will be "Jewish Contributions to the Soviet Partisan Movement." Present plans call for the publication of these volumes in Palestine. Most of the Jews of Poland and Western Russia who were partisans during the war are now scattered through Central Europe and Italy.

U.S. BUSINESSMEN LEAVING FOR PALESTINE BY AIR TODAY TO SURVEY COMMERCIAL POSSIBILITIES

NEW YORK, April 28. (JTA) -- A group of 15 American businessmen and industrialists will leave for Palestine by plane at 11 p.m. tomorrow from La Guardia Field. This flight which has been arranged by the Palestine Economic Bureau of the Zionist Organization of America will constitute the first post-war air tour of Palestine.

The tour has been arranged with the primary motivation of boosting Palestine-American trade relations. The group of Americans going on the tour will study the possibilities of establishing branch factories, distribution centers, service centers and other facilities, using Palestine as a center for the distribution of American-made products throughout the Middle East.

U.S. JEWS MUST SHOULDER EVERY PROBLEM AFFECTING JEWS THROUGHOUT WORLD, SAYS JDC HEAD

PROVIDENCE, R.I., April 28. (JTA) -- Pointing out that the Joint Distribution Committee is being called upon to expend this year \$60,000,000, which is one-third of all its expenditures since it was founded in 1914, Dr. Joseph C. Hyman, executive vice-chairman of the JDC, stressed today that American Jews must now shoulder "every problem affecting the destiny and the needs of Jews throughout the world."

Dr. Hyman spoke before the first annual meeting of the General Jewish Committee of Providence at the Hotel Biltmore here. Archibald Silverman was re-elected president of the group.

ARGENTINE JEWS PLEDGE 2,000,000 PESOS FOR PALESTINE FOUNDATION FUND

BUENOS AIRES, April 28. (JTA) -- The national convention of the Argentinian section of the Palestine Foundation Fund today pledged to raise 2,000,000 pesos (approximately \$600,000) in the current year.

The first Latin American convention of the ORE and the OSE opened here today with delegates from Bolivia, Chile, Peru and Uruguay attending. The congress was called to coordinate the work of the various Latin American branches of the two organizations.

YISHIVA UNIVERSITY ENROLLS STUDENTS FROM 25 STATES, 20 FOREIGN COUNTRIES

NEW YORK, April 28. (JTA) -- An enrollment of 1,100 students, the highest in the history of Yeshiva University, with students from twenty-five states in the United States and from twenty foreign countries, including for the first time students from Brazil and Peru, was reported today by Dr. Samuel Belkin, president of the institution.

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
