BEVIN SLANDERS U.S. INTEREST IN ADMISSION OF JEWS TO PAIRSTINE; DEFEATS RESOLUTION

BOURNEMOUTH, England, June 12. (JTA) -- Implying that people in America insist on the admission of 100,000 displaced Jews to Palestine "because they do not want too many of them in New York," Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin made a passionate plea today before the annual convention of the British Labor Party now in session here, urging the rejection of a resolution on Palestine introduced yesterday by various leaders of the party.

The resolution, which asked for the lifting of restrictions on Jevish immigration to Palestine and land acquisition there, was withdrawn following Bevin's address. He indicated that Britain is not inclined to accept the recommendation of the Anglo-American inquiry committee to admit 100,000 European Jews to Palestine immediately.

"If we put 100,000 Jews in Palestine tomorrow," he said, "I would have to put another division of British troops there. I am not prepared to do it. I must say to the Jews and the Arabs: 'Please, put your guns sway. Don't blow up the British tomay who is quite innocent in this business. You are creating another phase of anti-Sentitic feeling in the British Army."

Speaking of American interest in securing the admission of 100,000 displaced Jews to Palestine, Herin stated: "The agitation in the United States, and particularly, in New York, for 100,000 Jews to be put in Palestine- and I do not want the Americans to misunderstand mes- is because they do not want too many of them in New York."

Advocates "Arbitration Tribunal" to Settle Land Problems in Palestine

After expressing gratitude to the Government of the United States for joining with Britain "in grappling with this problem," Bevin said that the more he studied and development in Falestine and Transjordan and the possibility of fertilizing it, he more he was convinced that there would have to be a joint decision to have the said publicly comed and allocated on lease by an arbitration tribunal.

"The Pelestine problem," he told the convention, "is a terrific problem. Realy it is a Colonial Office problem, but I recognize that you cannot longer leave it as colonial problem. It is international, and I came to the conclusion that the more iping out of the White Paper will not lead very far."

Stressing that the land problem in Palestine is "perumount," Bowln suggested hat in order to carry out the Londonneilt Plans, land must be publicly owned. "If you not to raise Arch life squally to that of Jewish, you cannot do it by taking eway all heir land," he smid, adding that he does not believe in racial states.

"In Palestine they want a Palestinian State, so that their voice can be heard a the chancellories of the world. That is what I am trying to do. It is going to take tience and work to accomplish it," he asserted. He expressed the belief that Paltine Jevish "brains" will be welcomed by the Arebs all over the world. He reiterated that "Jews must not be bounded out of Europe" and that "we must strive to see that Jews in the country of adoption observe the laws of the country."

Harold Last, chairman of the Labor Party executive, insisted on an early transfer of the 100,000 Jews to Falestine. "Neither Areb blackmail, nor strategic policy in the Middle East should make homeless wanderers the victims of hesitation and timidity of our Deming Street," he declared. "Any British statement who is scorificing Jews who escaped the tortures of Hitleries to Areb leaders, undermines the elementary principles of Socialism which he represent."

ANCIO-AMERICAN COMMITTER OF REPERTS STARTS STUDY ON DISPLEMENTATION OF PALESTINE REPORT

LONDON, June 12. (JTA) -- A joint Anglo-American committee of exports is to start work in London tomorrow on the study of a large number of questions commerced with the implementation of the report of the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on Palestine, a Foreign Office spokesman stated this morning.

It was officially umphasized that so far no decision has been taken by Britain on whether or not the report is to be implemented. The British Government will not take any decision on policy before receiving the written comments on the Palestine report due from Jews and Arabs by June 20, or before it has received a top-level decision from Mashington on the extent to which United States assistance may be expected if the recommendations are put into effect. But, in the meanwhile, the joint committee of experts is to study the practical problems which will arise if Britain finally decides to act on the recommendations of the Palestine report.

The terms of reference of the experts will include the points mentioned yesterday in Meshington by Secretary of State Jemes F. Byrnes. These covered methods of selecting Joylah issignants and of arrending their transport and accommodation. The committee will also have nearly 20 other practical issues before it. But the recommendations of the experts on method, it was authoritatively emphasized this morning, will not prejudge the decision on whether or not to go shead with the admission of the 100,000 Jevish issignants to Pelastine.

State Dept. Unaware of Such Committee; Says Must Be A Misunderstanding

U.S. ZIONIST LEADERS CHARGE REVIN WITH ANTI-SENITISM AT HIGH PROTEST DEMONSTRATION

NEW YORK, June 12. (JTA) .. British Foreign Minister Ernest Bevin was charged here tonight with "having repeatedly given evidence of a virulent anti-Jewish blas," and was bitterly attacked for his statement on Palestine made earlier today at the annual convention of the British Labor Party, in which he said that the people of America insist on the admission of 100,000 Jews to Palestine "because they do not want too many of them in New York."

The attacks were voiced at a huge demonstration at Madison Square Garden called to protest British delay on the recommendation of the Anglo-American inquiry committee that 100,000 displaced Jews be admitted immediately to Palestine. Speakers at the relly included Dr. Abbe Hillel Silvar, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Judge Morriz Rothenberg, Henry Monsky, Bartley C. Crum, member of the Anglo-American inquiry committee, and others.

Terming Bevin's statement a "cheap slur on the American people and a coarse bit of anti-Semitic vulgarity reminiscent of the Maxis at their worst," Dr. Silver said:

"In view of this shocking record of broken pledges and the repeated violation of solemn obligations, American citizens have the right to turn to their representatives in the Congress of the United States, who are now discussing the granting of a loan to Great Britain, and inquire whether the Government of the United States can afford to make a loan to a government whose pledged word seems to be worthless. They should also inquire whether American money, including that of the Jevich citizens of the United States who have given such superb evidence of their loyalty and patriotism during the war end whose secrifices helped to save a collapsing British Empire, should be used to back up a government whose Foreign Minister has repeatedly given evidence of a virulent antigaterish bias.

"We question very such whether Mr. Bevin represents the conscience and the spirit of the British people but it is up to them to repudiate this maligner and cheap vulgarian, and to desain that someone who more truly represents them should occupy such an important post."

Jows Are Not Troubled by "Offensive Valgarity" of Bown's Remark, Says Wise

Rabbi Wise, ridicaling Revin's assertion that he will need another division of British troops in Falestine if 100,000 Jevs are transferred there, pointed out that there are today more than enough British troops in Falestine and that they are not there in relation to the Jevish-Bational Home or in relation to the affairs of the becomes of Falestine.

"He American Jews--and indeed all American people--bave the right to recent and to fling brek the grotuitously and valently insulting remark of Mr. Beyin that the agitation in the United States for the addication of a hundred thousand Jews into Palestine is because Americans do not want too many of them in New York," Rathi Wise said. "I om not troubled by the offensive valently of this remark. Tax troubled because it indicates that, even though President Truman appointed the whole Cabinet, with himself included, is a commission to deal with Palestine, there will be no hope of rulrilling the unanthous recommendation of the Anglo-American committee unless President Truman speaks sharply and acts decisively in relation to the British Government,

"I may to you tonight - I, who em a lifelong affectionate admirer of the Siglish people - that, unless the British Covernment grants the hundred thousand certificates of somisation to Palestine to displaced Jevs, no promise of England is to be rusted. We have no reason to believe that any pledge of Britain will be kept. If here be resentaint because of what I say, let that resentment express itself in the refoundest contempt of the speech and the conduct of the heads of the Labor Governent in Righand, "Br. Henry Monsky, speaking for the American Jewish Conference, said that the allure of the British Government to fulfill the recommendation of the Anglo-American nquiry committee to admit 100,000 Jews into Palestine "seams to be calculated to completely nullify the effect of the report of the inquiry committee." Scoring the systerious escape of the ex-Muftl of Jerusalem, he stated: "This latest episode in that appears to be a planned active companies to block the implementation of the recommendations of the inquiry committee is part and percel of the unholy conspiracy to detect the purposes of justice for the Jewish people."

Bartley C. Orum, presenting his views as a member of the Anglo-American inuiry committee, charged that the ex-Mufti was paid in gold by the Maris for his activities and that "he is now using funds given to him by Hitler to carry on Hitler's are where Hitler left off," He urged that the United States Government demand the hamediate arrest of the ex-Mufti and him trial as a war oriminal.

Mrs. Moses P. Epstein, president of Hadassah, said that "the present tactics in Palestine of the British Colonial Office, which are opposed to every rule of humanity, will be fought tirelessly until justice has been done. We shall expose the maneuers of those who would betray the long-suffering Jewish people to the scorn and inlignation of civilized mankind."

JEMISH BRIGADE MEMBER 7 GO ON BUNGER STRIKE AGAINST DELAY IN REACHING PAYSTINE

JENUSALIN, June 12. (JTA) -- Seven hundred members of the Jewish Brigade stranded at Fort Said went on a one-day hunger strike Last Sunday protesting the British Army's postponement of their journey to Palestine, it was reported here today them 150 officers and mem of the Brigade reached the Sarafand army base.

The strike was called off when military authorities promised to send home groups of 150 daily. When the group which arrived today, the first of the promised daily transports, passed through Kantara, border station between Egypt and Palestine, all soldiers were searched thoroughly for weapons.

Colonel Gray, the new inspector general of the Palestine Police Force, paying his first visit to Tel Aviv today, promised Mayor Iarael Rokach that the city's police force would soon be composed completely of Jews. A Jewish commander will be appointed shortly, he said, and all British policemen would be withdrawn. He promised to improve the economic status and housing conditions of the city's police and appealed to the municipality to encourage the emistant of Jewish youth in the police force.

Isaac Ben Ivi, president of the Jevish Sational Council, today revealed the conditions under which the Jevs would agree to cooperate with the Government's ceasus. The Council demands that all visaless imagenus who are in Palestine be given legal status and that the Government give its assurance that it will obtain an assurance ceasus of the Arab population, Hen Ivi told a press conference. The latter point has been accepted, he said, but the first condition is still under consideration.

Weismann Visite "Visaless" Jovish Immigrants at Athlit Camp

ARAB LEAGUE DECIDES TO DISCUSS PALESTINE ISSUE WITH BRITAIN, REJECTS U.S. INTERESTS

BLUDAN, Syria, June 12. (JTA) -- The meeting of the Council of the Arab League concluded here today with the adoption of resolutions refusing to recognize the right of the United States to intervene in Falestinian affairs and a request that Britain enter into bi-interal negotiations with the Arabs on the Falestine question.

The Council decided not to consider the recommendations of the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on Palestine because half the members of the committee were Americans. The Arabe demanded that negociations between Britain and themselves be carried on without consultation with either the Jews or the United States Government. If this demand is not mat by Britain, the resolution said, the Palestine case would be submitted to the United Nations General Assembly and the Security Council.

Apparently unable to resolve the split among Araba in Palestine, which led recently to the formation of an Arab Higher Front in opposition to the Higher Committee, the Council ordered the two groups to effect a reconciliation and form an Arab agency, similar to the Jewish Agency, to represent Palestine Araba at the Arab league, Should such reconciliation fail, the Arab League itself will form an agency and will take over control of the Arab Offices in London, Washington, and Jerusalem, another resolution dealared.

TRIAL OF JEWS CHARGED WITH RAIDING BRITISH MILITARY CAMP OFFINE IN PALESTINE

JERUSALEM, June 12. (JTA) -- A gun battle on the perade ground inside Sarafand camp, the biggest army base in Palestine, between men of the British Third Hussars and Jewish terrorists wearing the uniform of the Sixth Airborne Division was described by the prosecutor at a military court here today when the trial opened of two young Jews charged with seven offenses including discharging firearms at members of the British forces. Four of the charges are punishable by death.

The two accused, Yousel Simkhon, and 19, and Isaac Bichael Arbel, and 24,refused to plead and dispensed with the services of a counsel. They declared that they refused to submit to the jurisdiction of the court on the grounds that they did not believe in the justice of a military court or the Defense Emergemy Regulation under which they were charged.

The prosecutor said that between 30 and 40 Jowe entered the Sarafahd base in a stolen three-ton military truck on Earch 6 to raid the Hussars' examition duap. One of the Jowe was wearing the insignis of a sergeant major of the 5 thin Airborns divisions. The contry at the amminition tent was overpowered and the raiders began loading arms and amminition on the truck. When the slarm was consided, the Hussars closed in and a "regular battle" followed.

The Jews threw a hand granade at a British sergeant major. It burst only a few feet from him but he ascaped injury. Taking dower behind armoved cars on the parade ground, the Jews returned the Russars' fire and then escaped in the truck which, riddled with bullets and with a nine millimeter shall embedded in the chassis, was found later a few miles from the base.

The accused, wearing flammel trousers with open-mack shirts, were guarded by three British policisms aread with Sten gums. They smiled frequently to friends and relatives in the public gallery. The proscutor said the two accused were captured a few miles from Sarafand by a British police inspector 30 minutes after the raid. They were found at have gumshot wounds which had been expertly dressed.

PALESTINIAN JEWISH YOUTH SENTENCED TO 14 YEARS FOR COVERING DANIGRANT LANDINGS

JERUSALEM, June 12. (JTA) -- Yigdal Frucht, an 18-year-old Jevish youth, was today sentenced to 14 years imprisonment by a military court for taking part in a diversionary attack during an attempt by Jevs to cover the landing of visaless immigrants of March 25.

Frucht and two other jouths were charged with firing at British soldiers and illegally carrying arms and ammunition. Oved Rabinovitch, one of the other Jews, was sentenced to a four-year term and the third jouth was acquited.

SEYSS-INQUART ADMITS AT NUREMBERG TRIAL HE "PRESPATED" STERILIZATION OF JEWS IN HOLLAND

MERCHESO, June 12. (JTA) -- Arthur Seyss-Inquart, Austrian Nezi who was Hitler's Governor of Austria and later of the Netherlands, today told the International War Crimes Tribusal that "for a time" he tolerated sterilization of male Jews in Holland. "It was voluntary." he declared testifying in his own defense.

He said that the shorthand record, according to which he admitted that the idea of sterilization was his own, was faulty work on the stemographer's part. After a complaint from a Christian church he had investigated, sterilization of Jevish women and finding it a complex operation he ordered it stopped, he declared.

PALESTINE CHIEF RABBI VISITS DISPLACED JEWS IN CERMANY; WARNS THEY MUST BE TRANSFERRED

FRANKFURT, June 12. (JTA) -- The delay in implementing the recommendations of the Anglo-American inquiry committee that 100,000 displaced Jews be transferred to Palestine is "bringing the refugees to a state of psychological despair whereby they feel mankind has forgotten them," Palestine Chief Rabbi Isaac Herzog warned today at a press conference here following an eight-day tour of DP camps in the U.S. zone of Germany.

Later, Rabbi Herzog told a Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent that he mad delayed a trip to Holland in order to meet with General Sir Frederick B. Morgan, MERA chief in Germany, and Maj. Gen. Morl E. White, who is commanding the U.S. forces in Europe during Gen. Joseph T. McMarnay's temporary absence, and to discuss the DP ituation with them.

Rabbi Herzog also exid that he "was moved to see that after all they had sufared," the wast majority of the surviving Jews "still retained hope in life and in the moral progress of humanity." He said the refugees and displaced Jews have one rest desire--"to join humbs with their brethren in Palestine.

LONIST GROUPS IN AMERICA SPILIT ON BLESTION OF DELECATES TO NORLD ZIONIST CONCRESS

MEW NEWS, June 12.
