#### IN. SESSION ON PALESTINE TO OPEN AT END OF THIS MONTH: LIE SEES ZJONISTS

IAKE SUCCESS, April 9. (JTA) -- The special session of the United Nations ssembly to consider the Palestine Question will probably open the last week in April the first week in May, U.N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie indicated today.

Mr. Lie told a press conference that 14 nations have already formally approved he calling of a special session and he anticipated that he will have received afirmative replies from the necessary 28 of the 55 member nations by next Monday or mesday. April 14 or 15. Under U.N. rules, the Assembly meeting will convone 15 days fter majority approval has been secured.

The Secretary-General said that the meeting would be held in the Assembly hamber at Flushing Meadows. He reiterated that the scope of the session would be etermined by the delegates themselves. In her note requesting the special meeting. ritain suggested that it confine itself to establishing a fact-finding commission hich would report to the next scheduled meeting of the Assembly in September.

Representatives of the Jewish Agency have conferred with him. Mr. Lie dislosed, but only on procedural matters relating to the ways and means of presenting the Zionist case to the Assembly or whatever commission is set up.

He refused to comment on the recent statement by a member of the British delesation that Britain would not consider herself bound by any decision taken by the assembly, but pointed out that under the U.N. Charter the Assembly has the power only to recommend a course of action to a member nation.

The fourteen nations which have already signified their approval of the special session are: Cuba, France, China, United States, Haitt, Handuras, Liberia, Greece, New Zealand, Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, Sweden, Panama and Paraguay.

Questioned about the present status of the International Refugee Organization, Mr. Lie said that it has made no further progress since the Preparatory Commission met in Geneva several weeks ago.

# Foreign Office Vague on Britain's Obligation to U.N. Decision on Palastine

LONDON, April 9. (JTA) -- The Foreign Office today declined to support a statement attributed to a British spokesman at Lake Success that Britain is not bound by the recommendations which the United Nations may make on Palestine.

"If such a statement was said, it was wrongly said," a Foreign Office official declared. Re added that the reputed spokesman of the British delegation at Lake Success had no authority to make any such statement.

At the same time, the official refused to commit Britain to the view that the British Government would be bound by the decision of the United Nations. "I am nov Repared to make any statement to that effect at this time," he told representatives of the press.

## TRITEEN PALESTINE JEWISH YOUTH GROUPS APPEAL TO DISSIDENTS TO END TERRORISM

JERUSALEM, April 9. (JTA) -- Fourteen Palestinian Jewish youth organizations the membership of 80,000 men and women today banded together to issue a joint apal calling for an end to terrorism in the country. The groups represented in the ited front ranged politically from the extreme left to the far right.

The appeal called on the members of the dissident groups to rally around the tional youth organizations and engage in pioneer work to develop Palestine and at a same time "salvage" the remmants of European Jewry. "Only by the united efforts the whole people under national discipline, can our task be achieved," the statent declared. "Our national strength lies in internal discipline," it continued, he essence of our work is immigration and settlement, defense, construction and the estion of a Jewish way of life."

Commenting on the call, a Jewish Agency spokesman said that this appeal might mer the activities of the extremist groups, since their membership is comprised realy of men and women in the same age groups as those in the organizations urging ity and peaceful construction.

### Martial Law Regulations Published by Palestine Government

Apparently anticipating a new imposition of martial law, the government will blish tomorrow in the Official Gazette regulations governing all facets of life in lestine in that event. The main point of the regulations is contained in a secon which gives every member of the armed forces in a "controlled" area the same wers as are given to police officers under the rank of corporal. The regulations so codify the status of banks, the mails and other forms of communication in an ea under martial law.

Military authorities have alerted personnel in all camps in the country for a ssible emergency, the Arab press reported today. The report added that leaves for th policemen and soldiers have been cancelled and troops have been barred from rusalem and Haifa during off duty hours.

British troops spent the entire night searching the Mahne Yehuda quarter of rusalem for a man who last night shot two British constables, killing one and wound-g the other. Apparently retaliating for the killing of a Jew and the wounding of second Monday night by British troops, the attacker struck at approximately the me spot where the Jews were assaulted almost 24 hours later.

The lone assailant suddenly emerged from a narrow lane in front of the two licemen, fired two shots, and escaped back up the same lane. In subsequent searchfor him, troops halted and questioned many Jews in the neighborhood, beating up ur Jews who had come to Jerusalem for a visit during the Passover holiday.

Queried at a press conference today as to why the Palestine Government had a gred distribution here of the pamphlet "The Arab War Effort" by Dean Alfange, which tes the aid given the Axis during the war, Richard Stubbs, the government's press floer, said that it was felt that the pamphlet and other publications designed to pose the pro-Axis activities of the Mufti or other Arab leaders would tand to prote inter-communal bitterness and prejudice security.

Replying to another question, Stubbs said that since the end of the war the premient had given Arabs 2,525 acres of public lands and Jews 1,250 acres and that gotlations were in progress with Jewish groups for further grants for veterans. He sto disclosed that Jerusalem was under military curfew for 100 nights in the year ding March 31.

### VER 1.000 POLISH-JEWISH DP'S RETURN TO POLAND TO SEEK POSSIBILITIES OF RESETTLEMENT

WARSAW, April 9. (JTA) -- More than 1,000 Polish Jews who fled this country ast year have returned to explore the possibilitios of permanent resettlement, it as learned today. Hundreds of them have passed through the Czech-Polish border own of Zebrzydowice during the past few days en route from DP camps in the U.S. zone formany.

Most of the returnees hope to settle in Silesia. Their families are remaining a the camps until they can ascertain whether it will be possible for them to estable permanent residence and secure employment in Poland. Their arrival represents be first reversal in the trend towards Jewish emigration from Poland.

Meanwhile, Jewish groups are expecting the arrival shortly of the first transorts of the 15,000 Polish Jews who are to be repatriated from the Soviet Union under agreement negotiated last month between the Polish and Soviet governments. A new roup of repatriates recently arrived from Russia, but no Jews were among them.

### HIEF OF NAZI CAMPS SYSTEM ON TRIAL BEFORE U.S. COURT; STRIPPED JEWS OF VALUABLES

NUREMBERG, April 9. (JTA) -- S.S. Gererel Osweld Pohl, who headed the Nazi oncentration camps system and was a deputy to Gestapo chief Heinrich Himmler, went a trial here today, together with 17 other ES leaders, on charges of attempting to exterminate entire races."

U.S. Prosecutor James McHeney told the American military court that under ohl's direction a special fund was established at the Reichsenk into which gold nd other valuables stripped from Jews murdered in concentration camps were placed. e estimated that the fund reached over \$1,000,000 before the German capitulation.

The presecutor said that Pohl had beasted that he had increased the number of encentration camps to 20 and forced labor camps to 165. McHaney charged that Pohl ad personally witnessed barbarous experiments at Tachau in which Poles, Jews and ussians were used.

## nra head and british refucee expert confer on fate of 26,000 displaced jews in italy

ROME, April 9. (JTA) -- Maj. Gen. Lowell Rooks, Director-General of UNREA, as conferred with Sir George Rendel, British representative on the Intergovernmental stuges Committee, who is now in Italy, on the fate of more than 26,000 displaced evs in the country when UNREA terminates its activities on June 30.

In a press interview yesterday, Gen. Rooks stated that all displaced persons a Europe may be forced to return to their countries of origin if the International sfuges Organization is unprepared to assume responsibility for them when UNRRA is iquidated. Asserting that little progress has been made toward the establishment of the I.R.O., he pointed out that 12 of the 15 countries necessary to set up the reanization have signified their intention of participating, but that none of them has done anything toward appropriating funds for its activities.

# 00 DISPLACED JEWS BARRICADE THEMSELVES IN FRENCH TOWN TO PREVENT RETURN TO GERMANY

PARIS, April 9. (JTA) -- Two hundred displaced Jews from Germany who had plipped across the French border illegally have barricaded themselves in the railway station in the frontier town of Saareguemines to prevent their return to the Reich, twas learned here tonight.

#### JEWS. ALTHOUGH NON-ZIONIST, SUPPORT PALESTINE JEWRY, SAYS WALLACE IN LONDON

LONDON, April 9. (JTA) -- Although most American Jews are not Zionists, they e developed since the end of the war a strong sympathy for the Jews of Falestine, ry Wallace told a press conference here today. He described the growth of promist sentiments among U.S. Jews as "an arazing development."

Wallace, who is in England at the invitation of a group of British liberals, used to comment when asked what solution of the Palestine problem he favored, exining that he was here as a guest. He added that American Jews feel very deeply the Palestine question and have given with extraordinary liberality to the Jewish munity there.

He said that when many of his Jewish friends in America ask him how Britain a have difficulty in maintaining 12,000 troops in Greece, when she apparently has trouble in maintaining 100,000 troops in Felestine, he "can't answer that." He comted briefly on the clash of American, Russian and British interests in the oil aring sections of the Middle East.

Asked if resettlement of Jews was hempered by immigration restrictions in the S., he replied that it is quite true that before America criticizes British policy Palestine she should be ready to admit more Jewish and other refugees from Central rope. However, he added, if the U.S. opened its doors to all Jews who wished to me, that would still not solve the Palestine problem.

Replying to another question, Wallace said that he favored the creation of a rdan Valley authority in Palestine, which would provide electric power for industry d water to irrigate huge areas of presently barren land.

## ABS AT INTER-PARLIAMENTARY CONFERENCE LEAVE MEETING WHEN PALESTINE ISSUE BARRED

CAIRO, April 9. (JTA) -- Several Arab delegates stalked out of today's meets of the Inter-Parliamentary Union when the presiding officer ruled out references the Palestine question.

The issue arose during a discussion on the question of migration, when several presentatives of the Arab countries sought to link the solution of the refugee oblem with Palestine. Gueffry Boutros Chali Bey, Egyptian delegate, charged that ionist propaganda" had given a distorted picture of the Palestine situation and relied the religious and cultural links between Egypt and relestine.

British delegate R.R. Stokes, a Lebor M.P. who has been consistently antiionist, interrupted on a point of order, declering that Palestine should not enter to a discussion of the migration problem. Stokes was supported by Senator Alben rkley of the United States, who said that since the Palestine issue had already en referred to the U.N., it should not be discussed by the Inter-Parliamentary nion.

Arab delegates who sought to precipitate a debate on the subject were ruled at of order, and Gahli withdrew his remarks. However, the Syrian and Iraqi deletes and some of the Egyptians withdrew from the meeting.

Earlier, Stokes stated that the whole world should be open to the resettleint of refugees, adding that the Jewish problem should not be confused with the
destine problem, and that a solution of the refugee question should not be left
the Arabs alone. This statement elicited cheers from the Arabs and touched off
se controversy.

### S. IS URGED IN SENATE TO LINK PALESTINE ISSUE WITH AMERICAN AID TO CREECE AND TURKEY

WASEINCTON, April 9. (JTA) -- Senator Edward Martin, Republican of Pennsylnia, today urged the United States to have "a clear understanding" with the British garding Palestine before proceeding with aid to Greece and Turkey.

In the Senate debate on the proposed aid to the two countries, Martin said at the question of Palestine could have been solved with Greet Britain in 1942 and 43 "if, during World War II, we had been tough-ninded enough to lay down conditons for our help and our lend-lease."

Martin said he saw "similarity between the troubles faced by the British in sece and their problems in Palestine" and asked if the United States should not consider the collateral aspects before it is too late. "This is a good time, ne id, for the British to make clear "once and for all" their attitude on Palestine.

# MAQ CHIEF RABEL DENOUNCES ZIOHISM; MIDDLE EAST JEWS UNDER INCREASING COVI. PRESSURE

LONDON, April 9. (JTA) -- A report from Baghdad carried in the London press bday states that the Chief Rabbi of Iraq, Sassoon Knedouri, issued a statement delaring that "Iraqi Jews will be forever against Zionism."

"Jews and Arabs have enjoyed the same rights end privileges in Iraq for 1,000 sars," Dr. Khedouri is further reported to have said. "The Jews do not regard themelves as a distinctive part of this nation. The Zionist press had tried to create ifferences of opinion between Jews and Arabs, but I and every Iraqi Jew oppose and all fight such an aggressive attitude. Iraqi Jews are not Zionist and never will

The Jews in Iraq and other Middle East countries have been subjected to inreasing anti-Zionist pressure in recent months by their governments. Iast month is Syrian Government varied the country's Jews to denounce Zionism and threatened but the death penalty would be imposed on persons aliting refugees to reach Palesine by way of Syria. Violent anti-Zionist distribes have been voiced in the syptian Parliament and attacks made on the nation's Jews for their alleged pro-Ziont sympathies.

# 09 JEWISH REFUGEES LEAVE FRANCE FOR PALESTIVE ON VESCEL CHARTERED BY HIAS

NEW YORK, April 9. (JTA) -- Four hundred and nine Jewish refugees left for life from Merseille. Sunday on the HIAS-chertered vessel Providence, Iseac L. Asof-y, executive director of the organization announced here tode. All but twelve I the 318 adults and 91 children were DP's in the British zone of Germany and are le first group to be admitted to Palestine under a British plan to divide the Jewish migration quota between Cyprus interness and LP's in the British zone.

Asofsky also disclosed that special representatives of HIAS are now in Sac aulo, Brazil, negotiating with Brazilian Immigration Commissioner Pericles Mello de Ivalho for the admission of Jewish refugees on a basis of full equality. The HIAS novys have requested that their organization be permitted to select Jewish immitants to Brazil with emphasis on mechanics, artisans and professionals and that the IAS and the Brazilian Jewish community be permitted to assume corporate responsibility for a definite number of immigrants.

#### SH ACRICULTURAL SOCIETY CRANTED \$263,000 IN LOANS TO JEWISH FARMERS LAST YEAR

NEW YORK, April 9. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agricultural Society granted over 3,000 in leans to Jewish farmers in 16 states during 1946, Dr. Gabriel Devidson, aging director, announced in his annual report released here today. He also nated out that the Society was placing a greater emphasis on placement of veterans refugees on farms in this country.

Nearly 500 veterans applied to the agency during the year, including a number non-Jews referred by Christian organizations, the report stated. Forty veteran illies have already been placed during the first year of the veterans program, but Davidson said that it was expected that the rate would be speeded up this year. all,105 families were settled on farms mostly in the Zest, and California, Michin Illinois and Florida in 1946.

In his summary of work among the refugees, Dr. Davidson revealed that "by e end of 1946 approximately 5,000 refugees had come to the Society's offices, 259 individual consultations had been held and 505 families settled on farms in lifornia, Connecticut, Florida, Illincis, Indiana, Michigan, Missouri, Massamastts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Maryland and Virginia. these families 429 are, according to report, still on their farms, a showing itch speaks for itself. Loans in the amount of \$616,893 were made directly by the solety, \$69,153 was lent by other agencies, mainly by the Central Loan Trust. Of he \$68,042 aggregate \$485,800 has already been paid back--much of it before aturity."

The report disclosed that The Jewish Agricultural Society has granted more an \$10,000,000 in loans to Jewish farmers in 40 states since the Society's founding in 1900. It also summed up the Society's general activities, pointing out that to Department of Agricultural Education and Extension maintains a staff of agricultural information on all phases of farming. During 1946 these extension pecialists made 3,039 farm visits, held 75 farm gatherings, meetings and demonstrations attended by over 4,000 farmers. In addition, advice and aid were given to 1,631 who sought individual consultations at the Society's offices. Under its auscides interstate conferences of farmers were held. The Society conducts agricultural night classes for farm aspirants in New York City and Chicago and maintains a purchasing service for individual farmers and farm cooperatives.

# PALESTINE'S HAPOEL SOCCER TEAM WELCOMED BY MAYOR O'DWYER AT CITY HALL

NEW YORK, April 9. (JTA) -- Palestine's championship soccer team, Hapoel, which arrived here yesterday, was welcomed by Mayor William O'Dwyer today at City Hall.

Sponsored by the Jewish National Workers Alliance and the American Soccer League, Happel's good-will tour will get underway May 4 at the Yenkee Stadium when the group meets an all-star American team. Games are also scheduled for other major cities, including Chicago, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Los Angeles. Part of the tour's proceeds will be used to erect a modern sports stadium in Tel Aviv.
