. SESSION ON PALESTINE SET FOR APRIL 28, AFTER 29 NATIONS APPROVE BRITISH REQUEST

IAKE SUCCESS, April 13. (JTA) -- Secretary-General Trygve Lie today cabled a 55 member states of the United Nations informing them that the special session the General Assembly on the Palestine issue will open April 29. The cable was at following receipt of approval from the 28th and 29th nations, one more than the fority necessary to call a special session.

In the cable, Mr. Lie listed a six-point tentative agenda for the session. consists of: 1. The opening of the session by the chairman of the Felgian deleganch; 2. Election and report of the credentials committee; 3. Election of a presit; 4. Organization of the session; 5. Adoption of an agenda; 6. Constituting and structing a special committee to prepare for consideration of the question of lestine at the second regular session of the General Assembly.

As the U.N. secretariat made hurried preparations for the meeting, it was wealed that Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin will not attend and that Britain will in no ministerial delegation, merely one Palestine expert from the Foreign Office if another from the Colonial Office to assist Sir Alexander Cadogan, head of the ited Kingdom permanent delegation.

The United States has not yet named a delegate to the special session, but is understood that Warren R. Austin, permanent representative, will attend. The raine, which approved the session, suggested that it be held in Geneva.

At Flushing Meadows, where the session will be held, workmen will commence saning, airing and repairing the assembly hall and conference rooms tomorrow. mg the difficulties facing them will be the installation of telephone service beuse of the nation-wide telephone workers' strike. Other problems include obtaining feteria facilities since the regular equipment was leased out following the close the first regular Assembly session, and transportation which was furnished by the S. Army and Navy but will have to be hired on a commercial basis for this session.

The complete list of countries which replied to the U.N. following Britain's usest April 2 for a special session--all in the affirmative--is: Cuba, France, ited States, Greece, Hitti, China, Panema, USSR, Paraguay, Liberia, Cuba Cocchoslovakia, Scuador, Denmark, Ukraine, Luxembourg, New Zoaland, Honduras, India, Peru, inican Republic, Brazil, South Africa, Norway, Australia, Mexico, Canada, Turkey, Hippine Republic.

Great Britain's right to sit on the investigating commission for Palestine be set up by the General Assembly, unless the Jewish Agency is also represented, a challenged teday by the American Jewish Conference. In a communication to Acting Stretary of State Dean Acheson, the Conference asked the support of the United ates for the proposition that either all parties directly concerned with the Paleste stimation should be included on such a commission, or else, that all be excluded. JEWS EVICTED FROM HOMES IN HAIFA AS COLLECTIVE PUNISHMENT FOR BLASTING OF JERP

JERUSALEM, April 13. (JTA) -- One hundred and ten Jews were today evicted their homes in the Hadar Hacarmel section of Haifa by the Palestine Government collective punishment for the blasting of a military jeep on a nearby road ten ago.

Jewish heads of various sections of Jerusalem and its suburbs were threatenby the local British district commissioner this week-end that they would be held consible for terrorist activity in their areas. They were also warned that if any British personnel were slain, the Jewish quarters would be placed under a severe few.

Two Arab ice cream wendors were attacked and slightly injured by a number of systemical hear a sports stadium. The incident followed the killing Friday of Jew and the injuring of another by an Arab mob. The men, Asher and Isaac ovitz, who are brothers, accidentally entered an Arab mosque while seeking for a set that would lead them to the Walling Wall. Both were recent immigrants to estine and had come to Jerusalem for a holiday visit from Tel Aviv, their home.

The Sternist underground radio today assumed responsibility for the assassice of a British constable last week and the wounding of another as "reprisal" the killing of a Jew and the wounding of a second by British soldiers. Guela en, a Jewish woman sentenced to seven years imprisonment for serving as an anmoser on a Sternist radio station, escaped from a government hospital here where was a prisoner. She had made one unsuccessful attempt to escape previously.

ISH AGENCY RECONSIDERING ZIONIST ACTIONS COMMITTEE MEETING PECAUSE OF U.N. SESSION

JERUSALEM, April 13. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency executive is reconsidering possibility of holding a plenary session of the Zionist Actions Committee on May as scheduled, because of the opening of the U.N. special session on Palestine south, it was learned today.

Since Agency sources anticipate that the session will lest anywhere from 0 to three weeks and then expect to be bucy preparing for the September session en the full question will be reviewed by the Generel Assembly, it is considered shly unlikely that the Actions Committee will meet before the Fall. Meenwhile, ency leaders and a number of technical experts are preparing to loave for the Unid States to attend the special session.

LISE COVERNMENT HALTS ILLEGAL EMICRATION OF JEWS UNDER BRITISH PRESSURE

WARSAW, April 13. (JTA) -- The Polish Security Ministry today informed a unference of leaders of the Jewish Central Committee and heads of Jewish political rties that further illegal emigration will be halted. The move is believed to have llowed renewed British pressure on the government to halt the movement of Jews to ilestine as well as for internal reasons.

The conference, which was called by the Ministry, was told that Jewish leaders, particularly the Zionists, would be held responsible for further illegal emigraton. Warnings were also sent to Jewish leaders in Upper and Lower Silesia and in 11 border towns. Frontier guards will be strengthened to implement the policy.

ATE DEPT. EXPLAINS WHY JUNISH DP'S GET LARGER PEPCENTAGE OF U.S. VISAS FROM EUROPE

WASHINGTON, Agril 13. (JTA) -- Figures on the number of U.S. visas issued displaced Jews in the American zones in Europe were made public here by the State partment in answer to a query whether "special priority is given to members of the wish faith" in grenting visas to DP's. The total number of Jewish refugees to rester visas during the last eleven months was under 10,000.

The question was addressed to the State Department by Congressman Edward T. iller, Republican of Maryland, who also wanted to know whether children were reliving priority and how many refugees might seek entry to the United States this ear. Both the letter from Rep. Miller and the State Department's reply are published in the Congressional Record.

Pointing out that the existing immigration statutes pertaining to the alleation of quotas and the "public charges provisions" were being complied with by U.S. onsular officials who issue the visas, the State Department made it clear that riority is given to orphaned children.

With regard to the number of visas which were issued to displaced Jews, the tate Department declared that Jewish organizations have been much more active in suing "corporate affidavits" guaranteeing the support of the refugees once they each the United States than the "non-Jewish welfare organizations." Another reason as that the greater number of persons applying under the German quota were Jewish persecutees" and that screening had ruled out many persons of German ethnic origin ecause of their "status under the Nazi regime."

According to consular reports, there have been a total of 14,474 visas ssued to IP's from Mirch, 1946, to Jennery of this year. Of these 9,627 were Jevah, 2,173 Catholic, 1,969 Protestent, and 705 of other or no religious faith, the tate Department revealed.

RITISE NEWSPAPERMEN THREATENED FOLLOWING EXPOSE OF RENEWED ANTI-SEMITIC ACTIVITIES

IONDON, April 13. (JTA) -- The editor of Reynolds News, a Labor newspaper, and one of its columnists, Tom Driberg, a Member of Parliament, have received threatening notes from feacists following their recent expose of a revival of feacist and anti-Semitic activities in Britain.

The notes threatened that the newspaper "offices will be destroyed and a pointed Star of David will be deeply seared in your Mon6ol skull--Judah Shall Perish, Heil Hitler." They were mailed from northern England and wore signed by the "Gothic Union." In the same envelopes were included anti-Schitic leaflets captioned: "Wir Kummen Wieder."

Police are making intensive investigations into the activities of fascist groups particularly in Leeds, which has a large Jewish population, and in London where a second hate groups, "The Northwest Task Force," has joined the Union for British Freedom in spreading anti-Jewish propaganca including a call to Britons to "throw Jews off public vehicles and knock them into the gutter."

A petition campaign calling on the government to outlaw fascism was launched today at a meeting of the Association of Jewish Ex-Servicemen of Manchester and Salford districts.

g urges "less restrictive" U.S. Immigration policy on refugees at U.J.A. Parley

PITISBURGH, April 13. (JTA) -- Harold L. Ickes, former Secretary of the erior, today called on the United States to make its immigration policy "less trictive" and admit a large number of refugees. Mr. Jokes spoke here at a United ich Appeal Tri-State conference attended by more than 400 Jewish leaders from hegivania, Ohio and West Virginia.

Asserting that both the United States and Great Britain have "a distinct al obligation" to facilitate Jevish immigration to Palestine, the former Secretary the Interior deplored the "meskness" with which the U.S. Government has "subted to the recalcitrance of Great Britain's" policy on Palestine. Commenting on sident Truman's request for military and financial assistance to Greece and Tur-, Mr. Ickes asked: "If Great Britain can no longer supply the funds to maintain tottering monarchy in Greece, how does it happen that money can be found to intin tryanny in Palestine?"

"Our government seems to feel the urgent obligation to assume certain resmibilities " towards Greece and Turkey, he added. "If we can make this \$400,000,-0 investment, we can make an investment in insistence that Great Britain disavow e illegal and immoral White Paper" and return to the policy of the Balfour Declaraon. "The Jews who have gone to Palestine have made good beyond the fondest hopes civilized peoples everywhere," Mr. Ickos concluded.

William Rosenweld, national chairman of the U.J.A. and president of the ited Service for New Americans, who also spoke at the conference, emphasized that evish war refugees and displaced persons may enter this country at the rate of 600 a month or more in 1947 if we are ready to help these tired, besten people adst to a strange land and strike new roots. They are desperately eager to stand on eir own feet, but they need time and individualized care to realize their aspirators, he added. "For this reason, the financial obligation of U.S.N.A. is a cumutive one as new arrivals must be cared for."

Discussing the global aspects of the U.S.N.A. program, Mr. Rosenwald delared that the Jews of America must "implement American world leadership in finding a calightened and constructive solution to the over-all problem of Jewish homelessess. If the newcomers are properly cared for, proposals for the relaxation of imgration barriers will receive favorable support from public opinion," he said.

"The progressive example of America 83 proficated on U.S.N.A. assumption of esponsibility for needy Jevish newcomers has worldwide significance," he stated. If through manifold services we demonstrate our capacities to receive and provide or larger numbers, it is bound to affect the immigration thinking of all other civilzed nations, notably that of Britain in liberalizing her policy of Jevish immigration to Palestine."

HERTICK CALLS ON U.N. TO TAKE IMMEDIATE MEASURES TO ADMIT 100,000 JEWS TO PALESTINE

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 13. (JTA) -- The United Nations should take swift steps to provide immediate admission into Palestine of 100,000 Jews still "rotting in the D.P. camps" of Europe, Moshe Shertek declared today before 350 Jewish community leaders at the Connecticut State Conference of the United Jewish Appeal.

"International covenants have guaranteed Jewish rights in Palestine," he aid. "We will base our case for immediate admission of 100,000 of our brothers and disters who are rotting in Europe's DP camps on that daring and vision which has made Palestine an example to the entire world, and which has contributed greatly to the willbeing of all peoples in this part of the world." With the support of American Jewry through the United Jewish Appeal, we stend prepared to welcome every Jewish survivor in Europe who wants to start life anew in the Jewish homeland.

CHIEEN N.Y. COLLEGES CHARGED WITH USING PHOTOGRAPHS FOR DISCRIMINATION PURPOSES

NEW YORK, April 13. (JTA) -- Charging that eighteen colleges in New York ate request photographs of applicants for admission in order to facilitate distiningtion against Negroes, Jews and other minority groups, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, esident of the American Jewish Congress, wrote to Chancellor S.P. Capen, president the Association of Colleges and Universities of the State of New York, suggesting at the numbers of the association cease to request photographs from prospective todents.

The colleges which request photographs from applicants are: Adelphi, Alfred armard, Brooklyn Polytechnic, Clarkson, Colgate, Columbia, Cornell, Hamilton, New ork University, Ransselner, Rochester, Russel Sage, Skidmore, St. Lawrence, Syrabse and Union.

WASHINGTON, April 13. (JTA) -- A resolution has been introduced to the House f Representatives to issue a three cent stamp in honor of Haym Salomon, Polish Jewshimmigrant who aided the American colonies in their fight for independence, alomon was one of the foremost financiers for the Continental Congress and sacrificed his personal fortune to help outfit and feed Washington's armies.

The Post Office Department last Friday issued a similar stamp to commemoate the 100th anniversary of the birth of Joseph Pultizer, American publisher, who rose to world fame after arriving in this country a penniless imaggrant. He left a considerable fortune to projects for the advancement of the arts.

RUM URGES MOSCOW "BIG FOUR" PARLEY TO SECURE ADMISSION OF 100,000 JEWS TO PALESTINE

UTICA, N.Y., April 13. (JTA) -- The statesmen meeting at the Moscow Confernce should take immediate steps to allow 100,000 homeless European Jews to enter falstine as a concrete measure toward the realization of world peace, Bartley C. Frum, former member of the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry on Palestine, urged today at the New York State Conference of the United Jewish Appeal for \$170,000,000, attended by more than 350 Jewish leaders from all parts of the state.

Mr. Crum, who has seen conditions in Europe and Palestine at first-hand, declared that "the Jevish community of Palestine is economically capable of absorbing 1,000,000 of Europe's surviving Jews within the next five years."

PALESTINE ECONOMIC CORPORATION REPORTS PROFIT; SAYS PALESTINE IS FIT FOR INVESTMENT

NEW WORK, April 13. (JTA) -- The net profit of the Palestine Economic Corporation in 1946 amounted to \$286,446, after Palestine, British and United States taxes had been deducted, Robert Szold, chairman of the board of directors, amounced today.

Last year was one of the most profitable in the twenty-year history of the Falestine Economic Corporation, largest American business enterprise in Palestine, Mr. Szold said. Net income was greater only in 1945, when it amounted to \$337,716. "Economically, Palestine is a going concern and fit for investment," he declared, adding that the Palestine Economic Corporation is continuing steadily its development of low-cost housing projects, direct investments in basic manufacturing undertakings and extension of credits for agricultural improvements.
