INISH AGENCY UNLIKELY TO GET U.N. PEPRESENTATION; COMMITTEE WILL PULE TODAY

FIGHRIC MEADOWS, April 28. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency is unlikely to secure representation at the United Nations General Assembly on Palestine, which opened here today, it was indicated by various delegations, following the election of Oswaldo Araha, chief Brazilian delegate, as president of the Assembly. Dr. Araha received by of the 50 votes cast.

He announced that the Steering Committee, which was elected today, and which will act on the Agency request for participation and the Arab demaid that the agenda be enlarged to include an item on termination of the Mandate, will meet tomorrow and report back to the Assembly on Wednesday. Dr. Aranha said that the requests of the Levish Agency and the Hebrew Committee for National Liberation for representation had been referred to the committee.

The decision to postpone the plenary session of the Assembly until Wednesday came after the Syrian delegate, Firis el Khouri, who is the chief Arab spokesman, protested an original ruling by the president that the Steering Committee would have men hour temorrow to come to some decision and would then report to the plenary session.

The Steering Committee is composed of the seven vice-presidents of the Assembly and the chairmen of the six principal committees all elected today by the Assembly. The vice-presidents are the representatives of the Big Five: Alexander Farodi France, Warren R. Austin of the U.S., Sir Alexander Cadogan of the United Kingdom, Pr. Kuo Tai-chi of China and Andrei A. Gromyko of the USSR, plus Asaf Ali of the Indian delegation and Dr. Neftali Ponce, Ecuadorian delegate.

The six committee chairmen are Lester B. Pearson of Canada, for the Political and Security Committee; Dr. Jan Papanek of Czechoslovakia for the Social Committee; Mammud Hasan Paoha of Egypt for the Economic Committee; Herman C. Eriksson of Neden, for the Trusteeship Committee; Josef Winiewicz of Poland, for the Budgetary Committee; and Dr. Tiburcio Carias of Honduras for the Legal Committee.

Both Agency Demand, Arab Request for Agenda Enlargement Seen Doomed

The feeling here that the Agency's chances of getting a non-voting seat are alight are predicated chiefly on the fact that the U.S. delegation is reportedly very cool to the Zionist request. The Arab demand for additions to the agenda is also believed to be docmed. The majority of the delegates seem determined to prevent anything which might lead to a full-dress debate on the basic aspects of the Palestine issue, and want a fact-finding commission appointed with as little discussion as Possible.

Agency Boycotts Session Pending Decision on Its Plea for Seat

Meanwhile, the Agency announced that pending a decision on its demand for a mm-voting seat, none of its representatives would attend the Assembly sessions. Explier, Joseph M. Froskauer, president of the American Jewish Committee, conferred with Merren Austin, chief U.S. delegate, and voiced support of the Zionist plea.

Following the election of Dr. Aranha, the Agency submitted to him a formal monandum reiterating its request for participation. It asked for the right to take part in all discussions, receive all Assembly accuments and have its own memoranda and communications circulated by the secretariat. "This will afford at least a partial remedy for an otherwise grossly inequitable situation," the memorandum stated.

In his inaugural address, Dr. Aranha declared that the problem which had brught the Assembly together had most decisively challenged, through the ages, the minist and tentiments of individuals and peoples, Now, he said, "time has brought forth an hour of decision for our consciences." Declaring that the existence of an equitation such as the United Nations "with the capacity... of endeavoring to solve the gravest human problems" was evidence of the wisdom of those who preceded us in the tack of ensuring world peace, the president reminded delegates that they would be called upon to decide questions which were not theirs individually but were the burden of all.

"It is within our choice to make the U.N. the balence of justice, security and issee," he said, "or to allow it, through our lack of wisdom, to be transformed into me more sword to be blindly wielded by force and instinct." He told the Assembly that it had no warrent to postpone or to allow confusion to cloud the issues of the task entrusted to it by the peoples of the world.

Jewish Circles Fear Latin-American Delegations Will Line Up With Arabs

The 20 countries of the Latin American bloc were highly pleased with the election of Dr. Aranha. They hope to play a decisive role at the session. "The Palestime case," one of the Latin American delegates said, "provides the Latin American ations with an excellent opportunity to make a vital contribution to world peace by sitting in impartial judgment on a crucial case. None of us has a serious Jevish rolen, and we are far enough removed from the whole situation to take an objective rive of it."

Jevish circles were not too hopeful today with regard to some of the Latin American countries, since it is known that the Latin American bloc is inclined to tot with the Arab bloc on certain issues. On the other hand, they expressed the top that the French delegation might support the Jewish request in view of the growing friction in North Africa between France and Arab dependencies.

The U.N. secretariat distributed the texts of the Palestine Mandate and the Malfour Declaration, while the British delegation distributed copies of a memorandum the British Government submitted to the League of Nations before the Mandate was confirmed by the League, in which it said that it did not aim at making Palestine "as levish as England is English."

LEMS AGENCY CHARGES BRITISH, ARABS AT U.N. ATTRAPTING TO DELAY PALESTINE SOLUTION

JERUSALEM, April 28. (JTA) -- Palestine Jews are "not optimistic" over the citeme of the special U.N. session, a Jewish Agency spokesman today declared at a mess conference today.

Charging that the British and Arabs are conducting a parallel strategy at the U.N., he stated that the former are trying to achieve a delay in the solution of the problem by the appointment of an inquiry committee, while the latter are seeking a similar delay by demanding a full discussion of the issue.

The Arab-Jewish Democratic Student Organization, a Communist youth group, toay called an appeal to the U.N. asking its assistance in abrogating the Falestine Emists. The group urged that the British administration be withdrawn from the counry and that British troops be ordered to evacuate. It also requested U.N. aid in establishing an independent democratic state.

A 21-year-old Jewish youth and a small boy were wounded today when a hand greade was thrown at a military vehicle in Jerusalem. Police and troops condened off the area and searched for the assallant, but he escaped. However, two unexploided bombs were found in the vicinity.

The dusk-to-dawn curfew was partially lifted in Jerusalem tonight. The Mea Searin quarter, where a great number of the city's Jewish population reside, however, will remain under curfew. It is this area which recently was under martial law. The military authorities, in announcing the lifting of restrictions, said that soldiers had been ordered to behave courteously toward the Jews, but he also cautioned the populace not to run away when challenged by a sentry.

A high government official, explaining why martial law was not imposed on Mel Aviv immediately after the bombing of the Sarona police barracks Friday, said that the government would not enforce "control" because of the U.N. session on Melsetine unless the terrorists "Zorce it" by their actions. Jewish circles, however, believe that Tel Aviv will be placed under martial rule if another outbreak cours. It is expected that the city will be divided into 12 districts, each separated from the others, and that the economic as well as the social and political sativities of the community will be puralyzed.

Joseph Shechter, Chief Rabbi of Ireland, today called on High Commissioner Str Alen G. Cunningham. Following a 90-minute visit, Rabbi Shechter declared that Dumingham was optimistic that terrorism would be suppressed within the next rew weeks. Despite Rabbi Shechter's explanation that he and Cunningham were old friends, some circles here insist that he is acting as liaison man among the government, the Jewish Agency and Anglo-Jewish circles.

The Palestine Government denied a report circulating here that new detention camps for intercepted viseless Jevish immigrants are under construction at Tobruk, Trenaica. The report said that the African camps would be used when the number of refugees interned on Cyprus passes 20,000, which is expected to occur early this sumer.

RER HEM ARMY POLICY TO HALT ATTEMPTS BY JEWS TO LEAVE GERMANY EN ROUTE TO PALESTINE

MEMCH, April 28. (JTA) -- Leading Jewish circles here today voiced concern were the possibility that the U.S. Army in Germany has been ordered to adopt a new policy to prohibit so-called illegal border crossings such as was attempted near excitesgaten during the week-end when 300 displaced Jews were turned back five miles that Austrian frontier. Military authorities have refused to comment at this ties on the reports of a new policy.

EMMARIAN FASCISTS ATTEMPTING TO ESCAPE EUROPE AS JEWS, BUDAPEST NEWSPAPER REPORTS

EUDAPEST, April 28. (JTA) -- Hungarian Nazis in the French zone of Germany are posing as Jewish refugees and are attempting to emigrate as such to havens in Muth America, the Sunday newspaper Fueggetlen Magyarorszag reports.

It charges that the fascists, pressed by French authorities and fearing restriction to Eungary, have obtained false identity papers and a considerable sum of the profession and unnamed organization. Among the "refugees" are former members of the relativistic, labor camp guards and special police and storm troopers responsible for the torture of thousands of Jews and democratic Hungarians.

EMANIAN JEWS DEMAND JEWISH REPRESENTATION AT U.N. SESSION; CONDEAN VIOLATIONS OF MANDATE

BUCHAREST, April 28. (JTA) -- Demanding a voice for the Jewish people at the U.N. session on Palestine, a huge crowd attending a rally called by the Rumanian Zion-ist Federation here today urged that the 55 member states of the U.N. support the lews' rights under the Palestine Mandate and rebuke violations of the covenant by Britain.

The neeting also adopted a resolution condemning the killing of three visaless imigrants who recently arrived in Palestine aboard the blockade runner Theodor Herzl and the execution of four Jewish youths. Speakers from various political parties sidnessed the assemblage.

MERC COVI. ASKS LEGISLATION TO ENSURE ENTRY OF JEWISH STUDENTS TO PROTESTANT SCHOOLS

QUEEC, April 28. (JTA) -- Jewish school children in the city of Outremont, in Quebec Province, would continue to be educated in schools run by the Protestant Rard of School Trustees for the next five years under a bill introduced in the producial legislature by the government.

The legislation seeks to solve the problem created by the decision last year of the Cutrement Protestant trustees to bar Jevish children from further attendance at their schools, because, they asserted, the funds contributed by the Jevish community in taxes were insufficient to defray the costs of educating the Jevish students. A bill passed by the legislature last Spring provided that the Outrement schools continue to accept Jevish students in the 1946-47 school year, ending this time 30. The new legislation would extend the period through June, 1952.

The problem arose as a result of the parochial education system in Quebec movines. Schools are operated either by the Catholic or Protestent communities, with the government furnishing subsidies. Since most Jewish parents do not wish to have their children attend Catholic schools, where they would receive religious instruction, Jewish students have been sent to the Protestant schools.

In a statement issued here in connection with introduction of the new bill, Michael Gerber, president of the Eastern Division of the Canadian Jewish Congress, disclosed that the Congress had made representations to the government concerning the direct stuation. It asked the following:

"Provisions for equal treatment, no segregation of Jewish children from Protestant children; Jewish students shall not be compelled to study any religious subtes cutside their own faith; they shall be excused from attendance on specified Jewish religious festivals and the board shall consider Jewish teachers eligible for upointment to the teaching staff." The committee further stressed "the desirability of laying the Outremont agreement coterminous with that of the Montreal School kard which runs until 1955 and that there be no differentiation between Jewish and Investant proprietors in matters of taxation."

MATE DEPT. CUILINES PROCEDURE FOR REGAINING CONFISCATED JEWISH PROPERTY IN HOLLAND

WASHIGTON, April 28. (JTA) -- The State Department today announced the protime for regaining property in the Netherlands which had been seized by German spaces during the Nazi regime.

Persons whose property was seized by Lippmann, Rosenthal and Co., of Sarlatistrat, Amsterdam, an agency used by the Gerrans to confiscate Jevish property in the Netherlands, may now present claims for that property, the department advised. Satclians of the firm, which was taken over by the Netherlands Government at the time of the liberation, still hold a small part of the confiscated property, which will be restored upon proper identification, it was announced.

Owners of property which was sold, or which cannot be identified, may file delies with the custodians to share in the fund which will be realized from the liwasten of the assets of the agency. Heirs of a person who had an account with the commitation and whose death has been officially proved are also authorized to file caims, the Department stated.

REBUNICAL COUNCIL ASKS FAIR TREATMENT FOR LABOR, FEDERAL F.E.P.C., ADMISSION OF DP'S

DEROIT, April 28. (JTA) -- Fair treatment for labor, adoption of a Federal [LEP.C., the admission of displaced persons to this country and the expansion of while health programs were advocated in a statement of the Social Justice Commission of the Rabbinical Council of America released here today, on the eve of the Orthodox goog's lith annual convention.

The statement declared that religious-minded people "cannot tolerate laborbiting and red-labelling as a mask for an assault on the honest gains of the trade mion novement." Asserting that "the synagogue knows no class distinction," it said tat "we believe that every synagogue should serve the worker in a craft or trade or stop along with the employer, the professional worker and the intellectual." The fundation also announced the Council's readiness to "join with other religious agentles in the achievement of a larger measure of social justice."

Rabbi Uri Miller, president of the Council, addressing the opening session of the convention tonight condemned "the brutal Nazism" of the British officials in Alestine and "concentration camps" in Cyprus and Africa. Commenting on the special U. session which opened at Flushing Meadows this morning, he declared: "It is our semest prayer that the deliberations of the statesmen of the world may be characterised by a spirit of justice and righteousness. We welcome the righteous judgment of the statesmen. We expect to be vindicated by their decision."

JENSH CONCRESS SUPPORTS BILL TO HALT DEPORTATIONS OF ALIENS WITH FIVE YEARS FESTDENCE

WASHINGTON, April 28. (JTA) -- Representatives of the American Jewish Congess, the C.I.O. Maritime Committee, the Polish-American Congress, and various Italim-Marican groups today urged the House Sub-Committee on Immigration to give a favorable report to a bill to enable the Attorney General to suspend deportation of aliess "of good moral character" who have lived in the United States for five or more

Simon Sobolof, City Solicitor of Baltimore, and a representative of the American Jevish Congress, suggested that quota numbers to legalize the entry of certain alleas for whom the Attorney General might wish to suspend deportation, be taken from the quota of the year in which they entered. At present, the bill provides that they be taken from the current year's quota, a practice that would even further limit wat numbers available for displaced persons.

ENSE WAR VETERANS URGE U.N. TO GRANT JEWISH AGENCY REPRESENTATION AT SPECIAL SESSION

ST. LOUIS, April 28. (JTA) -- A request that the United Nations Special Assembly on Palestine give official representation to the Jewish Agency was voiced in resolution adopted here today by the regular quarterly meeting of the national exemitite committee of the Jewish War Veterans of the U.S. The resolution urged the latted States representative, Warren R. Austin, to officially plead the case of Jewish representation.

Other resolutions adopted urged the passage of the Stratton Bill on displaced France which would provide for the admission of 400,000 displaced persons into this comby during the next four years, the Klein Bill which would prohibit Federal aid to colleges under the G.I. Bill of Rights if the college or university engages in displainatory practices, and the bill introduced by four Senators which would establish a Federal Fair Employment Practices Commission.
