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### IN DIQUIPY COMMITTEE ON PALESTINE OPENS FIRST MEETING TODAY; ARABS TEREATEN BOYCOTT

MAKE SUCCESS, May 25. (JTA) -- The final version of the agenda for the first weting of the United Nations inquiry committee on Palestine which will open here toprov at ? o.m. was announced today by the U.N. Secretariat. It consists of:

- 1. Opening of the meeting by Secretary-General Tryave Lie.
- 2. Election of a chairman.
- 3. Discussion of the committee's plan of work.

It is not considered likely that the fact-finding commission will begin a iscussion of its itinerary tomorrow. It is known, however, that informal talks are already taken place on the body's method of procedure end on the possibility of ts visiting displaced persons comps in Europe to hear testimony from the refugees Memselves. It is fairly certain that the probers will decide on European hearings.

Meanwhile, Faris El Khoury, Syrian delogate to the U.N., yesterday threatened m Arab boycott of the commission if it decides to visit the DP camps. Reiterating the oft-stated Arab position that there is no connection between the plight of the levish refugees and Palestine, El Khoury said: "It would be a cause of cutting off plations with the committee, I am afraid. Of course, I don't know; and we still reserve the position of our governments."

The Lebanese delegate, Charles Malik, declined to make any statement conterming his government's position on the matter. He stated that the Arab delegations ad forwarded their recommendations to their respective governments, whose decisions would probably be announced early in June.

(In Cairo, the former Mufti of Jerusalem told a press conference that he was minfully surprised" by the turn of events at the recent U.N. session on Palestine. rolling a direct answer to a question on the possibility of an Arab revolt in the Frent of an unfavorable U.N. decision, he declared: "I can only state that all Arabs we totally discatisfied and will very likely press the Arab governments to support m armed uprising of the Arab peoples." He also revealed that the Palestine Arab igher Committee will meet shortly to discuss its attitude toward Britain and the Problem of Zionism.)

### THER PUZZLED BY BEN GURION'S REPORTED PROPOSAL FOR PALESTINE PARTITION

NEW YORK, May 25. (JTA) -- Puzzled by reports from Palestine of David Ben m's advocacy of the partitioning of Polestine into a Jewish state and continuate the British mendate in the remainder of the country, Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, man of the American branch of the Jewish Agency and head of the American Zionist gency Council, issued a statement emphasizing that the Jewish Agency "has never tred any such proposal." The statement reads:

"Mumerous inquiries have reached me concerning press reports of a statement thated to David Ben Gurion, chairman of the executive of the Jevish Agency in sales, favoring the establishment of a Jevish state in those parts of Palestine have been settled by Jews as well as the Negev, and continuation of the Mandate he sections which Jews have not colonized.

"I find it difficult to credit these reports inasmuch as the executive of the law Agency has never approved any such proposal, nor has the executive any authority do so. The case of the Jewish Agency was officially presented by its representes, including Mr. Ben Gurion, at the recent special session of the United Nations. The same case, more fully documented, I undoubtedly be presented to the committee of inquiry of the United Nations unste General Council of the movement should prescribe a different course.

"Our movement has taken no position favoring either partition or bi-national. If the committee of inquiry should propose these or any other solutions, our ment will have full opportunity to consider them and determine its attitude. It his regretable to have the situation made more difficult now by confusing verse of our position. We stand and will continue to stand upon the full Zionist gam as adopted by the Zionist Congress at Basle, and as subsequently re-affirmed the executive of the Jewish Agency at its recent plenary session in Jerusalem."

### 50 VISALESS JEWS ARRIVE IN CYPRUS; TWO WOMEN INJURED DURING TRANSSHIPMENT

JERUSALEM, May 25. (JTA) -- The more than 1,450 visaless Jevish refugees from blockede runner Mordei Higetaot (Ghetto Fighters) who were deported to Cyprus terlay, arrived in Famagusta this afternoon, according to a report from the island sived here. ### ANIAN COVERNMENT INCREASES SUBSIDIES TO JEWISH HOSPITALS, SCHOOLS FOLLOWING PROTESTS

BUCHAREST, May 25. (JTA) -- The Rumanian Ministry of Finance announced yesterthat the government will grant Jewish schools, hospitals and cultural institums 25,000,000,000 lei (nominally \$165,000) during the coming fiscal year.

## TOAGO CITY COUNCIL ORDINANCE PROHIBITS PRINTING, POSTING RACIST LITERATURE

CHICAGO, May 25. (JTA) -- The Chicago City Council has passed an ordinance roldding the printing or posting of racist literature.

The measure provides a maximum of six months imprisonment or a fine up to 00 for exposing an individual or racial or religious group to hatred or ridicule as to endanger the public peace. " It will not affect newspapers and bonafide ridicals.

### EMAINS OF MRS. BRANDEIS BURIED ALONGSIDE TEOSE OF LATE SUFFREME COURT JUSTICE

LOUISVILLE, Kentucky, May 25. (JTA) -- The remains of Mrs. Alico Goldmark Frandeis, wife of the late Supreme Court Justice Louis D. Brandeis, were today buried maxt to those of her husband at a ceremony on the grounds of the University of Louis-Tille. Both were cremated after their deaths.

In a message marking the occasion, George Alpert, president of the board of trustees of the projected Brandeis University, said: "Louis D. Brandeis and his wife both had a consuming interest in education. Many years ago, the justice set forth the following concept as a basis for the growth of your institution: 'To be great, a university must express the people whom it serves, and must express the people and the community at their best. The aim must be high and the vision broad; the goal seeming-ly attainable but beyond immediate reach.' The trustees of Brandeis University have adopted this concept. In the years to come, we hope to grow in the manner prescribed by Justice Brandeis."
