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HOUSE COMMITTEE TOLD SELF-INTERESTS OF U.S. WOULD BE SERVED BY ADMISSION OF DP'S

WASHINGTON, June 4. (JTA) -- Admission of displaced persons to the United States would serve the "self-interests" of this country and provide the only "logical, humane and practicable solution" of the DP problem, Rep. William G. Stratton, Republican of Illinois, today told the House Sub-Committee on Immigration, at the opening of hearings on his bill providing for the admission of 400,000 DP's at the rate of 100,000 annually, using unfilled war-time quotas.

Rep. Stratton, who was the only witness to appear today because of the lengthy questioning by committee members, listed the non-repatriable DP's in Europe at 850,000. Of these 80 percent are Christians, while the others are Jewish, "most of whom are going, or live in the hope of going, to Palestine," he said.

He appended to his prepared testimony eight exhibits which list some 90 national labor, veterans, religious, women's, social and welfare organizations representing over 40 million people, who support immigration of DP's to the United States; editorials, magazine articles and newspaper columns, local citizens committees and prominent citizens supporting his bill.

Committee Member Says U.S. Has No Obligation to DP'S

Strong opposition to the bill was voiced by Rep. Ed Gossett, Democrat of Texas, who contended that the United States bore no responsibility for DP's. "Because we fought the war to liberate these folks," he asked Rep. Stratton, "do you mean to say we have to take them over here?" Gossett cited opposition of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars to any increased immigration.

Stratton replied that as a member of both organizations, he did not believe that the views of the heads of the two groups always represent the views of a substantial number of the members. Gossett retorted that if Stratton could gain the support of the Legion and the VFW, "I'll vote for your bill." Throughout the hearing he reiterated that this country has no obligation to let the alien enter. "This is our country," he said.

Stratton emphasized that his bill does not by-pass existing immigration laws which, with their screening tests and usual requirements, would apply to the DP's seeking entrance to the United States. Pointing out that certain classes are "temporarily non-quota within the framework of the quota laws," he said that his measure would make "a limited number of DP's non-quota for a limited period of time." Of the 2,500,000 available quota numbers from 1930 to 1946, Stratton said, only 559,000 were used. He cited the admission by Sweden of 41,000 refugees between 1939 and 1944, and said that if the U.S. had "furnished refuge on a similar scale and in the same proportion to our population, 850,000 refugees would have come to the U.S."

Attacking the argument that DP's would compete with Americans for available jobs, Stratton presented letters supporting his bill from A.F.L. president William Green and C.I.O. president Philip Murray. He introduced into the record lists of

refugees who are Nobel prize winners, and several hundred refugees named in "Who's Who in America" and in "American Men of Science."

Stratton said that international cooperation is impractical and peace uncertain unless the U.S. "takes its fair share of the DP's." Under questioning by Rep. Frank Fellows, Republican of Maine, chairman of the sub-committee, he said it was "regrettable" that Canada, Australia and South Africa had not yet accepted a share of the DP's, but insisted that the U.S. must take the lead and set the example for other countries. He argued that the DP's would fill still existing man-power shortages and would stimulate growth of the nation which, he asserted, is in danger of being far outstripped by Russia.

Gossett expressed objection to the exclusion from the terms of the bill of the "Volksdeutsch," declaring that "the Germans driven from the Sudetenland are just as much DP's as any other person in our occupied zone." Suggesting abolition of the DP camps, Gossett said that the U.S. maintains soup lines for the Germans and "why can't the DP's get in those lines too?"

When the committee resumes the hearing on Friday, it will hear Assistant Secretary of State John H. Hilldring, Rep. Noah Mason of Illinois and the Rev. Samuel McTrea Cavert, general secretary of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ.

UNRRA Director Says Displaced Jews Consider Europe "A Graveyard"

Declaring that he favors any plan to get displaced persons out of camps in Germany and Austria, Major General Lowell Rooks, Director General of UNRRA, today told a press conference that there are still about 170,000 displaced Jews in UNRRA camps and that they consider Europe "a graveyard" which they are anxious to leave.

Voicing support of the Stratton Bill, Gen. Rooks said that the United States, "just as any other country, must do its share in taking displaced persons who cannot or will not be repatriated."

Rooks said the British Government has not yet replied to an UNRRA letter assuring the British that neither UNRRA officials nor employees were in any way aiding the alleged illegal immigration of Jewish displaced persons through Italy. Early in April representatives of the British Government charged that UNRRA was linked with or aiding the movement of the Jewish refugees toward Palestine. Rooks today added, however, that the British Government had ceased their attacks on UNRRA on this point.

Rooks was "quite certain" that the estimated \$160,000,000 yearly budget for operation of the International Refugee Organization "will not suffice" unless the number of refugees are reduced considerably. He added that if the IRO does not begin to function by June 30, the central committee of UNRRA may recommend that the camps continue to operate for a short while after that date. He estimated that UNRRA funds were sufficient to keep the camps open another two months after the end of June.

Asst. Secretary of War Stresses Need for Passage of DP Bill

MUNICH, June 4. (JTA) -- Assistant Secretary of War Howard C. Petersen, who is touring the American zone of Germany, said here today that passage by Congress of the Stratton Bill was the only real solution to the DP problem. Petersen said that the present program of DP care had been designed as a stop-gap system and cannot continue indefinitely because of "the debilitating effects which do not permit normal life."

PALESTINE TRAINS ATTACKED AGAIN; TWO YOUTHS GET LIFE TERMS FOR RAIL SABOTAGE

JERUSALEM, June 4. (JTA) -- Two freight trains were blasted today by Jewish extremists a few hours before a military court here sentenced two youths to life imprisonment for rail sabotage.

One train was blown up while travelling between Lydda and Tel Aviv, damaging the locomotive slightly and injuring the engineer. The other was derailed near Ben-Gamina, but there were no casualties.

The two convicted youths, Abraham Madar and Shlomo Mussawari, told the court that Britain was flouting the will of the world by holding military trials during the period of the U.N. inquiry. The president of the tribunal asserted that only their youth, both are under 18, saved them from death sentences. They were captured at the colony of Nachliel with explosives in their possession.

The trial of five Irgunists charged with participation in the Acre prison break on May 4 continued into the second week today. Three of the defendants are offering no defense, but two have pleaded not guilty and their attorneys are presenting their case. Meanwhile, the official committee probing the jail delivery has completed its investigation and will issue a report shortly.

A magistrate in Tel Aviv today acquitted Gad Yishai, 15, and Menachem Yaskola, 14, who were charged with posting Irgun leaflets. The court said that the "prosecution had not produced satisfactory evidence that the Irgun was an illegal, underground organization."

It is reported that the government is negotiating with the Syrian Government for the extradition of several Sternists believed to have fled across the border. The Syrian press has been carrying scare stories of Jewish terrorists flooding the country, and several suspects have been arrested in recent days.

New Palestine security measures, including the formation of mixed Anglo-Arab-Jewish police patrols, will be discussed in London by Col. Grey, chief of the Palestine police force, who is now en route to England, the press reports today.

Mixed police patrols have already been introduced in Tel Aviv and have proven a success. It is known that Col. Grey also favors an increase in the number of Jewish policemen in Tel Aviv.

Force Will Be Used to Curb Terror, if Other Means Fail, Meirson Warns

LONDON, June 4. (JTA) -- The Jewish community of Palestine does not want to launch a civil war against the terrorist groups, but if no other means of curbing them is found to be effective, force will have to be used, Mrs. Goldie Meirson, Jewish Agency political chief in Jerusalem, said today. She told a press conference here that "armed gangs cannot be allowed to dictate Yishuv policy."

Dr. Nahum Goldmann, who shared the press conference with Mrs. Meirson, expressed satisfaction with the developments at the U.N. session on Palestine. Dr. Goldmann, who has just arrived from the U.S., said that it was possible that the American Government might make a public statement of policy on Palestine before the U.N. inquiry commission and not wait for the next General Assembly session in September.

JEWISH AGENCY ASKS U.N. INQUIRY COMMITTEE TO RECOMMEND IMMEDIATE REMOVAL OF WHITE PAPER

TAKE SUCCESS, June 4. (JTA) -- Urging establishment of a Jewish state as a fundamental solution of the Palestine problem, the Jewish Agency for Palestine today proposed to the United Nations Palestine inquiry committee that it recommend immediate removal of discriminatory restrictions against Jewish immigration into Palestine and Jewish land settlement.

In a preliminary memorandum to the committee, the Agency emphasized the intolerable conditions under which large sections of the Jewish people now live, two years after the war, and it called upon the United Nations to take interim action to terminate the White Paper of 1939 and to give full effect to the terms of the Palestine Mandate pending conclusion of the U.N. deliberations.

"Despite the victory over Hitler gained two years ago, the martyrdom of considerable numbers of the Jewish survivors of the European massacres continues in displaced persons camps and elsewhere," the memorandum said. "The Jewish Agency finds it difficult to conceive that the United Nations would wish the present unbearable state of affairs in Palestine and in the camps of Europe to be prolonged because of further protracted deliberations."

Jewish Commonwealth Can Eradicate Anti-Semitism. Memorandum Says

Referring to the political solution of the Palestine problem, the Agency declared: "The issue is not merely one between Jews and Arabs. It concerns the whole world. Only the re-establishment of the Jewish Commonwealth can lay the evil spirit of anti-Semitism and offer the Jews that freedom and security which are the birth-right of every people."

"The fundamental problem has always been security and the right to live free from the recurring waves of hatred and prejudice. For those Jews who wished to find personal security and a new way of life, for the Jewish people as a whole, striving to liberate itself from the scourge of homelessness, a land in which the elementary right of self-government would be granted was an essential. That land, by historical association and continued attachment through the centuries, is Palestine," the memorandum stated.

Turning to the question of Jewish-Arab relationships, the Agency emphasized the advantages derived by the Arabs from Jewish endeavors in Palestine. "Paradoxically enough, since the Balfour Declaration, Palestine has changed from a country of Arab emigration into one of Arab immigration--a phenomenon observable in none of the adjacent Arab countries who express solidarity with the supposedly wronged Arabs of Palestine," the Agency declared.

The Agency cited the large measure of harmony which exists between Jews and Arabs working and living together in Palestine, in spite of contrary claims made by British and Arab leadership. It also noted the fact that independent states in the Middle East were established after World War I for the Arabs, while the Jewish people have no hope for a land of their own except in Palestine.

"The Jewish return to Palestine is no challenge to Arab control over a huge area, no threat to Arab civilization, no obstacle to Arab progress," the memorandum stated. "On the other hand, the Arab claim to dominate Palestine must be weighed against the human need of millions of Jews and the rational need of the Jewish people."

The Agency declared that it approached the United Nations "with high confidence in the justice of its cause."

U.N. SECRETARY GENERAL SEEKS RELEASE OF DOCUMENTARY MATERIAL ON PALESTINE

LAKE SUCCESS, June 4. (JTA) -- U.N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie said today that he is negotiating with Judge Emil Sandstruem, chairman of the U.N. Palestine committee, to make available to the public the 1,000-page documentation prepared by the U.N. secretariat for use by the committee. Meanwhile, Lie told his press conference, copies of the documents have been given to the Jewish Agency and the Arab Higher Committee.

Replying to charges by Syrian delegate Faris el Khouri that the three volumes of documents were biased in favor of the Zionists, Lie said that they were "factual accounts of history." He reported that the Arab Higher Committee and the Jewish Agency had been shown the material and told that corrections would be made if necessary, but the Arabs had made no protest.

Mr. Lie was under fire from the press today for the committee's "closed door" policy. Most of its meetings up to now have been held in camera, although the secretariat succeeded yesterday in obtaining agreement that most meetings in Palestine will be public.

The Secretary-General said that the decision as to whether sessions should be public or private usually rested with the committee concerned, but added that he was attempting to secure full public meetings. He disclosed that he was negotiating for release of "restricted" documents prepared for the inquiry group.

PALESTINE GOVERNMENT INVITES GROUPS AND INDIVIDUALS TO SUBMIT VIEWS TO U.N. COMMITTEE

JERUSALEM, June 4. (JTA) -- The Palestine Government today invited individuals and organizations desiring to submit memoranda to the U.N. inquiry committee to do so as soon as possible and to submit their material in 30 copies. Persons who wish to be heard orally should apply immediately in writing, the announcement said.

The evening papers reports that the British military command in Palestine today dispatched to London for approval the testimony it will submit to the committee at hearings here. Several of the top leaders of the Palestine Arab Higher Committee conferred this afternoon with the High Commissioner on the question of their appearance before the probers.

Following the conference, Jamal Hussein, deputy chairman of the Higher Committee, told correspondents that he believes that the committee, as well as the Arab governments, will boycott the inquiry committee. He also indicated that Arab newspapermen may not cover the activities of the committee.

After a three-month interval, the Chief Secretary of the Palestine Government today resumed his monthly press conference with editors of the local press in Tel Aviv. He said that the government has done everything in its power to combat the boycott proclaimed by the Arabs against Jewish goods and services, but added that the government cannot enter into "diplomatic controversy" with the neighboring countries who are participating in the boycott.

SCOTLAND YARD DENIES THAT JEWISH EXTREMISTS SENT LETTERS WITH EXPLOSIVES TO BRITONS

LONDON, June 4. (JTA) -- Scotland Yard spokesman today denied in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency a report in the press here that Jewish extremists are sending letters from Italy to prominent people in England filled with explosives and arranged to detonate when opened. Such letters were reported to have been received by Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery, Sir Stafford Cripps and Major General Sir Edward Spears. The assumption that the senders were Jewish extremists is apparently due to the fact that Gen. Spears is admittedly anti-Zionist.

JEWISH AGENCY, JEWISH NATIONAL COUNCIL DIFFER ON WEIZMANN'S APPEARANCE BEFORE U.N. BODY

JERUSALEM, June 4. (JTA) -- A sharp cleavage has developed between the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Council as a result of the latter's decision to invite Dr. Weizmann to appear before the U.N. inquiry committee, which is slated to open hearings here in about two weeks.

It is learned that the Jewish Agency has not asked Dr. Weizmann to testify. The question of what action the Agency will take on the Council's move will be discussed at a session of the executive on June 11, which will take place even if American members of the body do not attend.

Leaders of the Council today indicated that whatever the attitude of the Jewish Agency may be, the Council is planning to compose a delegation which will be headed by Dr. Weizmann and which will speak to the inquiry committee on behalf of Palestine Jewry. At the same time, the Zionist Revisionists today sent a protest to the Council against its decision to invite Dr. Weizmann. The protest emphasized that the Jewish National Council does not represent all of Palestine Jewry since the Revisionists, the Sephardic community and the Jewish Farmers Association are not represented.

Commenting on the decision of the Council to invite Dr. Weizmann to head the Eshkol's delegation, Haboker, organ of the General Zionists, says that "what the Jewish Labor Party is unable to do through the front door, is being done by its leaders through the back door." Davar, Laborite organ, says that Palestine Jewry should receive the members of the inquiry committee with dignity, but should not suspend its upbuilding work for a single day.

Agency Preparing Material for Inquiry Committee in Various Languages

The Jewish Agency is now working day and night to prepare voluminous material for members of the U.N. inquiry committee. Each member will receive, among other documents, a special album containing material written in his native language. However, the Agency is finding it difficult to get a Chinese translator to prepare a copy for Mr. Victor Hoo, Assistant Secretary General of the U.N., who heads the staff accompanying the inquiry committee.

Preparations are also being made in Tel Aviv to accommodate the members of the inquiry committee who are scheduled to spend three days there at the end of the month. In Jerusalem, the government today completed preparations for housing of the committee members in a new Jewish-owned hotel, the Salvia, which is situated in the modern section of the city.

Iraq Preparing Jewish Witnesses to Testify Against Zionism

The Iraq Government is preparing Jewish witnesses to testify before the committee against Zionism, it was learned here today. The Iraq Jews will appear before the committee and describe how Zionism is menacing the position of the Jews in their country, and express their satisfaction with Arab rule.

It was reported today that the U.N. committee will be asked by the governments of Arab countries to visit their capitals and hear their rulers on the Palestine issue.

FORMER Z.O.A. PRESIDENTS ISSUE JOINT APPEAL FOR "FREE ELECTIONS" AT ZIONIST CONVENTION

NEW YORK, June 4. (JTA) -- An appeal to members of the Zionist Organization of America to send to the forthcoming 50th annual Z.O.A. convention "delegates uninstructed, unbound, uncommitted to any group or faction, and unpledged to any candidate or list of officers," was issued here today by seven former presidents of the organization.

Signed by Dr. Solomon Goldman, Edmund I. Kaufmann, Judge Louis E. Levinthal, Louis Lipsky, Morris Rothenberg, Robert Szold and Dr. Stephen S. Wise, the appeal asks that the delegates have a full and free opportunity "to elect such an administration as may best serve the interests of the Zionist movement." It emphasizes that the convention, which is scheduled to open in New York on July 4, is meeting at a time when momentous issues involving the future of Palestine are at stake.

"During the past few years we have become increasingly concerned with the tendency in the Zionist Organization which allows one administration virtually to appoint or designate its own successors, contrary to every democratic principle; and to use the administrative machinery to that end, contrary to all principles of civil service," the appeal says. "Unfortunately, Zionist conventions have been reduced to mass meetings and demonstrations of assent, and through controls from above have ceased to be deliberative assemblies for the determination of Zionist issues and the election of an administration truly reflecting the views of the rank and file.

"Deeply deploring this state of affairs in our movement, we former presidents of the Zionist Organization of America, belonging to no single party or group, holding different opinions on many Zionist questions, appeal to the Zionists of America to send to the convention delegates uninstructed, unbound, uncommitted to any group or faction, and unpledged to any candidate or list of officers, leaving to the delegates themselves, through their own uncontrolled committees, the full and free opportunity to elect such an administration as may best serve the interests of the Zionist movement."

A spokesman for the ZOA administration, commenting on the appeal, said tonight that "the proper answer to this telegram will be given by the democratically constituted annual convention of our organization which will be held in New York at the beginning of next month. We are confident of its verdict."

AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE, JEWISH LABOR COMMITTEE REPUDIATE BEN HECHT'S ADVERTISEMENTS

NEW YORK, June 4. (JTA) -- A joint statement by the American Jewish Committee and the Jewish Labor Committee, repudiating the advertisements signed by Ben Hecht, co-chairman of the American League for Free Palestine, approving Palestine terrorism was issued by both organizations today.

The two groups repudiated the Hecht announcement as being "completely unrepresentative of general Jewish sentiment in the United States" and as emanating from a small group which speaks for itself alone. "Responsible Jewish organizations, while unceasing in their efforts to undo the evil consequences of the British White Paper policy in Palestine, condemn terrorism and are appalled at the publication of such statements as are contained in the above-mentioned advertisement," the statement says. "The cause of the Jews is identified everywhere and at all times with peace, mutual understanding and the orderly processes of law. Terrorism is hostile to the spirit of Jewish religion and tradition."

(In London, Dr. Nahum Goldmann, member of the Jewish Agency, today described Ben Hecht's advertisement as "disgusting.")

U.P.A. AGENCIES SPENT OVER \$52,500,000 IN 1946 FOR PALESTINE DEVELOPMENT

NEW YORK, June 4. (JTA) -- A total of \$52,621,000, the bulk of which comprised contributions from American Jews, was spent last year by the United Palestine Appeal and its agencies in Palestine for the rehabilitation and resettlement of immigrants as well as for the over-all development of the country, according to a report made public today at an executive committee meeting of the U.P.A. by Dr. Israel Goldstein, national chairman.

Heading the list of the expenditures in the budget of the Jewish Agency was the cost of immigration which totalled \$13,650,928 for an estimated 26,000 Jewish refugees who reached Palestine last year. Included in this sum is an expenditure of \$3,224,911 for pre-migration aid and relief to refugees outside of Palestine as well as for their training abroad and transportation to Palestine. Care of immigrants on arrival which involves feeding, clothing and providing initial accommodations accounted for \$2,745,434, while training of newcomers in Palestine cost \$1,716,309.

To help cope with Palestine's acute housing shortage accentuated by the steady influx of newcomers which has created considerably crowded conditions, the Jewish Agency allocated, within its immigration expenditures, \$3,216,826 for construction of housing projects. Aside from private construction, 4,700 housing units were built last year with Jewish Agency help. The program for the current year provides for 7,295 housing units to accommodate between 12,000 and 13,000 people.

Jewish National Fund Spent \$16,000,000 for Agricultural Work

For agricultural development the Agency spent \$6,567,399, the major portion of which went for the establishment of new settlements and consolidation of those already in existence. Thirty-four new settlements were founded in 1946, bringing to three hundred and thirty the number of agricultural settlements in Palestine which played an important role in the absorption of newcomers. The Agency expended \$3,076,190 for the resettlement of ex-servicemen in agricultural and economic enterprises. Of the 20,000 Jewish servicemen demobilized last year, about 18,000 sought and received the services and aid of the Jewish Agency.

Complementing the agricultural development program of the Jewish Agency, the Jewish National Fund, whose activities are largely financed by the U.P.A., expended \$16,143,547, of which more than two-thirds, \$11,025,339 went for land purchases. The balance covered a wide range of operations including afforestation, road construction, hydrological surveys, water supply, anti-malarial projects and general land amelioration.

J.D.C. LEADERS CONFER WITH HEADS OF POLISH GOVT. FOLLOWING TOUR OF JEWISH COMMUNITIES

WARSAW, June 4. (JTA) -- Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice-chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee and Dr. Joseph Schwartz, JDC European director, have conferred here with Premier Jozef Cyrankiewicz and Minister of Industry Hilary Minc. Economic questions affecting the rehabilitation of Poland's Jews were discussed with Mr. Minc.

During a four-day tour of Lower Silesia, where thousands of Jews have been resettled, the JDC leaders visited Jewish communities and inspected farms, mines and industrial plants where Jews are employed. They later visited Lodz, where they participated in a Jewish writers congress.

A reception in their honor tendered by the government on the eve of the departure for Paris today, was attended by representatives of the Cabinet, top diplomats, UNRRA officials, Jewish leaders and U.S. Charge D'Affaires Gerald Keith.

POSITION OF DISPLACED JEWS TERMED "CRITICAL" BY DR. SCHWARTZ; MORE AID NEEDED

PARIS, June 4. (JTA) -- The position of Jews in the camps for displaced persons was described today as "most critical" by Dr. Joseph Schwartz, European director of the Joint Distribution Committee, prior to his departure by air for New York.

Dr. Schwartz warned of grave repercussions if aid for the displaced Jews is curtailed. "The next months," he said, "will decide whether the Jewish survivors are likely to build for themselves a normal life, or live hopelessly on outside aid for years. The future of the Jews in Europe depends on the outcome of the Palestine issue."

As a result of hunger, unrest and instability, thousands of Jewish refugees are crossing the borders into countries from where they hope to reach a peaceful territory, Dr. Schwartz said. The U.S. Army is refusing to help the refugees, UNRRA has virtually ceased functioning and the International Relief Organization is not yet operating. The J.D.C. remains the only organization helping the refugees who are arriving in Vienna at the rate of several hundred daily, mostly from Rumania, he reported.

BRANDEIS UNIVERSITY NAMES PROVOST; WILL HEAD INSTITUTION UNTIL APPOINTMENT OF PRESIDENT

BOSTON, June 4. (JTA) -- Appointment of Prof. Max R. Grossman as provost of Brandeis University was announced today by George Alpert, president of the board of trustees of the non-sectarian Jewish-sponsored university for which a \$15,000,000 endowment campaign is now in progress. At the same time, Professor Grossman's resignation as director of the Boston University Division of Journalism was announced.

As provost of Brandeis University, Prof. Grossman is the institution's first faculty appointee and will be charged with the administration of all academic interests of the university until a president is named, Mr. Alpert declared. Prof. Grossman will complete his teaching duties at Boston University early in July. His appointment to Brandeis University became effective June 1st.

AMERICAN JEWISH CONGRESS GETS CIO AWARD FOR FURTHERING DEMOCRACY BY COMBATTING BIAS

NEW YORK, (JTA) -- Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, president of the American Jewish Congress, Jacob S. Pobofsky, president of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America and Emil Rieve, president of the Textile Workers Union, tonight received on behalf of their organizations awards from the CIO Committee to Abolish Discrimination.

The awards were presented for "outstanding service to the cause of economic and political democracy in the field of race relations." In a brief address, Dr. Wise recalled that Hitler had destroyed the trade union movement as part of his seizure of power and said that a veto of the Taft-Hartley Bill by President Truman will strengthen economic democracy in the U.S. Mr. Pofofsky warned that the peddlers of race hatred must be stopped now before economic unrest provides a fertile field for their propaganda.

DR. SAMUEL GOLDENSON RETIRING AS RABBI OF TEMPLE EMANU-EL IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, June 4. (JTA) -- Dr. Samuel H. Goldenson, who has served as rabbi of Temple Emanu-El here for thirteen years, announced his resignation last night, effective the end of this year. Dr. Goldenson, who is past the retirement age of 65, had planned to leave the pulpit last December, but was prevailed upon by the congregation to remain an additional year.
