BRUSALEM, July 6. Says Govt. Restrictions Are Major Obstacles to Development

The Jews have accepted as valid only those objectives laid in the Balfour Declaration and the Mandate, while the Mandatory has often placed own national and imperial policies to the forefront, he claimed.

TOR CONVENTION CLOSES; DEMANDS JEWISH STATE, ASKS U.S. TAKE ACTIVE ROLE ON PALESTINE

NEW YORK, July 6. (JTA) -- Reaffirmation of the principles which have guided the Zionist movement for the past half-century was embodied in a resolution adopted refer to the closing of the Zionist Organization of America's 50th annual convention has shich called for international assistance to re-establish Palestine as a Jewish state and insisted upon Britain carrying out the spirit and letter of the Mandate and reating the Jewish Agency with full powers to organize the immigration of Jews and the description of the land.

Another resolution approved the administration of the Abba Hillel Silver and thanked him for his services.

A rally at the Manhattan Center tonight ending the four-day Golden Jubilee prior was addressed by Senators James E. Murray of Montana and Owen Brewster of Mains. Murray told the 5,000 persons attending the meeting that President Truman "is fails in accord" with the American policy on Palestine and desires to see it applied. Be sated that Secretary of State Geroge C. 40,000 Reached Palestine Since 1945; Immigration Slowed by Lack of Cash

NADIAN GOVERNMENT SENDS SENIOR OFFICIALS TO SPEED EMIGRATION OF EUROPEAN DP'S

CTTAWA, July 6. (JTA) -- The Canadian Government has dispatched two senior fficials to Europe to survey and expedite the movement of displaced persons who will permitted to enter the Dominion as immigrants under a recent Order-in-Council autorizing the admission of up to 5,000 persons, it was reported here during the week-

The officials will consult with the organization already set up in Europe for he emigration of DP's to Canada. Beside considering the admission of 2,000 needle rade workers, the government is also planning to admit 2,000 women domestic workers ad is said to have made arrangements for the migration of 1,500 woodworkers. It is elieved here that the program will gradually be expanded to include many other DP's. he 5,000 will be subtracted from any future quota which the International Refugee reganization may ask Canada to assume.

8.000 displaced jews in Germany, Austria registered with hias for enigration to U.S.

NEW YORK, July 6. (JTA) -- Approximately 40 percent of the Jewish DP's in Gerany and Austria, registered by HIAS for emigration to the western hemisphere, want o join friends and relatives in Australia and Latin America, Abe Grossman, director f HIAS activities in Germany and Austria, said during the week-end following his remain to the United States.

Grossman, who spent 15 months in the occupied zones, said that while 18,000 ewish DP's have indicated to HIAS a desire to immigrate to the U.S., 12,000 others ope to become residents of other Western Hemisphere countries. He said that during he past six months HIAS had sent 1,682 persons from Bremerhaven to the United States, and contrasted this figure with that of 1.902 brought to this country by HIAS during 946. He pointed out that an additional 500 persons have already been processed for minigration to the U.S. by HIAS and are now in Germany, awaiting quota numbers.
