NY ERITONS ARRESTED FOR ATTACKS ON JEWS IN LIVERPOOL, MANCHESTER, SALFORD

LONDON, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- Twenty arrested Englishmen faced court action today Myerpool, Manchester and Salford, charged with participating in anti-Jewish riots, sulting Jews on the streets, attacking synagogue buildings and wrecking and looting dsh shops

The arrests took place during a night of terror against Jews in Liverpool and If a dozen other cities, carried out under the disguise of "revenge" for the two Bria sergeants hanged by the Irgum in Palestine. It was estimated this morning that than 150 attacks took place throughout England, 101 in Liverpool alone.

In Liverpool, where the anti-Jewish excesses reached their peak during the to hours of the night, attempts were made today to renew the rioting. Several of the attempts, simed at looting Jewish shops, were broken up by the police. Twelve the hooligans arrested in Liverpool were remanded on tail. Five were released on il in Salford, and three fined in Manchester, where several new attacks occurred to-

Liverpool Mayor Appeals for End to Rioting

The Mayor of Liverpool this morning appealed to the citizens of his city to wents with the police in preventing further attacks and looting in shops owned by the Jews and non-Jews. He pointed out that under any circumstances the persons who ffered were innocent and themselves condemned the actions of extremists in Palestine.

A cabinet factory owned by a Liverpool Jew was set on fire and demonstrators trater hoses with which firemen were attempting to put out the blaze. Police said at children were encouraged by hundreds of adults to loot stores whose window fronts with been smashed. One Jew was beaten so badly that he was hospitalized. Special conthles were called to duty during the night and flying squads of police were on the we for many hours until a heavy rainfall just before dawn dispersed the mobs.

In London a meeting of the Jewish Ex-Servicemen's Association was broken up volice to prevent trouble from a hostile mob of several hundred persons. A short be later the League of Ex-Servicemen held a meeting at which scores of policemen were mount. A Mosley news-letter was distributed and anti-Jewish speeches were made. In lorion suburb windows were broken in a synagogue and the bulletin board was torn m. Synagogue windows were also destroyed in Ramagate.

Some 400 demonstrators surrounded a dance hall last night in Manchester and Aused to permit the Jews inside to leave the building. They were eventually rescued Theavily-reinforced police squads. The windows of a large clothing store were smashby a mob which shouted: "Down with the Jews" and "Death to the Jews." Among the doters were a number of soldiers.

THE FREVAILS IN PALESTINE; NO ACTION BY EXTREMISTS AGAINST GOVERNMENT REPORTED

JENUSALEM, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- No extremist action against the government or spiritish military forces took place during the last 24 hours, marking the first moved day in Palestine since July 16, a government press release announced today.

Laborites Determined to Check Extremists, Even at Cost of Blood

Histadruth leaders today announced that they will do everything possible to bory out the anti-extremist plans drawn up last week by the Jewish Agency and the wish Matienal Council, even "if it costs blood."

A Jevish Agency spokesman today called on the government to take firm measures is and attacks by British troops and Palestine police against the Jevish population and bring to justice the perpetrators. But the military authorities denied knowledge if any such incidents. The same spokesman emphasized that the decisions adopted by the Agency and the Jevish National Council last week to combat extremism will take the form of "actions not words." He declined, however, to define the actions.

He also made public a message received by the National Council from a group of inhabitants of a Jewish DP camp in the British zone of Germany who thanked the Jews of Pelestins for their efforts in behalf of DP immigration and condemned the killing of the British soldiers by the Irgun.

The Haganah issued a statement last night warning the government to punish intens responsible for attacks on innocent Jows and to take measures to prevent furber ricts or the resistance movement would. At the same time the Sternists and Irgunsters distributing pamphlets in Tel Aviv calling on the Jewish youth to revolt it has Haganah and the national Jewish institutions which they accused of plotting institutions. The Irgun also announced that it had not booby-trapped the bodies to hanged sergeants, but had left mines nearby "to hit the living enemy."

MS REFUGEES SETTLE DOWN TO "NORMAL" LIFE ON SHIPBOARD AS DEADLOCK CONTINUES

FORT DE BOUC, France, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- The 4,500 Exedus refugees today completed first week of their sit-down strike abourd the three British prison ships, termined more than ever not to disembark on any but Palestinian soil.

As apparently neither the British nor the French governments have issued new structions to their officials concerning the fate of the immigrants, the Jews have tiled down to as normal a life as possible on shipboard. Classes have been institutfor the several hundred children, and four teachers are holding forth on a number of blecto.

Despite choppy sees, which make transchipment of supplies difficult, the retees' diet is improving steedily. In fact it has become so good, that they are now tenting their soldier guards with baskets of fruit sent by various relief organisa-

WITATIONS OF DISPLACED JEWS SUBMIT MEMORANDUM TO U.N. COMMITTEE ON PALESTINE

CMEVA, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- A ten-page memorandum representing the views of modeling displaced Jews in Europe was submitted today to the United Nations Special mitter on Palestine in behalf of six DP organizations.

Emphasizing that "settlement in Germany or Austria cannot be imposed on us,"
that the quarter of a million Jews living in DP camps would refuse to be scattered
in "smong the nations of the world," the memorandum declared that the events of the
three years made the Jewish refugees' belief "unshakable" that the only solution
itsir problem is emigration to Palestine.

The organizations submitting the memorandum are: the Central Committees of crited Jews of the American zone in Germany and the British, French and American es in Austria; the International Committee for Jewish Refugees and Former Concentration Camp Inmates of Vienna, and the Organization of Jewish Refugees of Italy.

The memorandum begins by charging that had Great Britain fulfilled the obliies imposed on her by 52 nations of the world to further the establishment of a teh national home by facilitating immigration and colonization, tens of thousands levs could have escaped from the hell of facist Europe to Palestine. "We thereriraly believe that for our and our children's safety and peace the establishment is jevish state in Palestine is an absolute necessity," the document states. "We in the demands of the whole Jewish people for free immigration to Palestine and wring national independence to the Jewish nation."

The memorandum points out that four plans have been developed for the solum of the general DP problem; first, voluntary repatriation; second, settlement in sountries of present abode; third, absorption into European countries, and, fourth, spation on a large scale to overseas countries.

"These schemes may be suitable for solving the problem of the non-Jewish DP's they do not provide a solution for us to rebuild our lives amid a people responsition the extermination of six million Jews. Moreover, the experience of the last years taught us afresh how deeply rooted the Hitler doctrine of Jewish exterminate is in the German and Austrian people," the memorrandum added.

Excesses Against Jewish DP's Bacoming More Frequent, Memorandum Says

Charging that anti-Jewish excesses are becoming more frequent monthly, the mrandum declares: "Only thanks to the presence of the Allied occupation armies is revical safety guaranteed to a certain extent." It asserts that absorption of PP: into European countries can take place only in insignificant numbers because DP: lack the professional qualifications required by the various countries.

We who have been living witnesses of the greatest disaster in our time want is chapter of our history to come to an end," the document states. "Our experiences series of the homeless people and the fact that two years after the victory of the sorratio nations our misery continues and that so far none of the possibilities of shillitation which have been considered for us have been put into effect has made we haller unshakable that our wandering must come to an end. Palestine is the only entry where a community of 650,000 Jews is anxious to receive us in their midst. MIAN JINS ASK UNITED NATIONS PALESTINE COMMITTEE TO GRANT THEM A HEARING

NUMBAREST, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- Three major Jewish groups in this country have isis joint memorandum to the United Nations Special Committee on Palestine asking the committee give a hearing to representatives of the Jewish community of Rumania.

The memorandum, issued by the Rumanian section of the World Jewish Congress, the im of Rumanian Jews and the Jewish Party, stresses that the Jews here are vitally terested in free Jewish immigration to Palestine and the ostablishment of a Jewish te. Reviewing the present situation of Rumanian Jewry, it states that because of astrons crop failures coupled with low industrial production, the Jews, who are sty man white collar workers and small businessmen, are in dire economic straits.

It also reports that 40 percent of the Jews of Moldavia are on relief rolls and tweational retraining is useless because the war ruined Rumanian industry. Thores, the memorandum emphasizes, emigration to Palestine is the only way out for the s. for those who desire to remain in Rumania, the document asserts, the establisht of a Jewish state will be a safeguard against anti-Semitism.

British Jewish Group Urges Permanent Trusteeship For Palestine

LOMDON, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- The Anglo-Jewish Fellowship, an anti-Zionist organiutim, has submitted a memorandum to the U.N. Palestine committee advocating placing Abstine under a permanent international trusteeship.

The document urged that the country be given a constitution which would take into account the significance of the country to the three religions and granting autimay to the religious communities in the matters of religion, education and cultural matters. It said that this move would grant the religious communities much of the independence they seek. In addition, it favored immediate immigration to Palestine of "as many as possible of those Jews who wish to go there."

CECNOSLOVAK JEMS URGE U.N. PALESTINE COMMITTEE TO AID EXODUS RETUGEES REACH PALESTINE

FRAGUE, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- A message of protest was today sent to the United latins Special Committee on Palestine by the Council of Jevieh Communities of Czechodownia against the "British inhumanity" toward the 4,500 Exodus refugees.

The Council also asked the U.N. body to help return to Palestine the Jews who have suffered various tortures and indignities for the past decade. Throughout last week and this week-end protost meetings were held in many Jewish communities in all parts of the country.

Polish Zionists Protest Exodus Deportations

WARSAW, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- All Zionist parties in Poland today cabled Emil Sandstrosm, chairman of the United Nations Palestine inquiry committee, protesting against the Killing of three persons aboard the refugee vessel Exodus-1947 and protesting the deportation of the passengers to France. A similar protest was sent to the British Embassy here.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Aug. 4. (JTA) -- A nation-wide congress of the South rical Jewish Board of Deputies was opened during the week-end with welcoming addressible the mayor of this city and other celebrities. A message was received from Field, rabl Jan Christian Smuts, Premior.
