X JEWS KILLED AS ARABS REACT TO PARTITION; HIGHER COMMITTEE CALLS GENERAL STRIKE

JERUSALEM, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- Six Jews were killed today and 16 injured in not was feared to be the first move by extremist Arabs to resist the U.N. decision of establish Jewish and Arab states in Palestine.

Five Jews were killed when Arabs ambushed two Jewish busses, while the body f Moshe Goldman, 35, was found near police headquarters in Jaffa, which was the cene of an Arab anti-partition demonstration. In Acro Prison, Arab prisoners at-acked Jews in the exercise yard. The rioters were dispersed by warders using tear as and rifles.

The Arab Higher Committee, following an emergency meeting, proclaimed a threelay general strike, beginning Tussday. The Committee ordered a complete boycott of lews and said that persons found dealing with Jews would be considered traitors. It anounced that it would soon take the "necessary proliminary measures for implementing a non-occeperation policy in preparation for a declared state of emergency." It told the Arab populace that it would receive instructions shortly. Arabs in Nablus, about 25 miles north of Jerusalem, Jumped the gun this morning, calling a spontaneous strike.

Haganah Mobilized; British Troops To Be Pulled Out of Jewish Areas

The Arab violence brought a prompt response from the Jewish community. A 'mobilization of security forces was ordered immediately, and it was revealed that Haganah units had alroady taken over guard duties around Petach Tikvah, Tel Aviv and other Jewish areas.

Jewish Agency representatives were called to the government offices today and informed that British troops and police will be removed from predominantly Jewish areas within the next few days. Jewish police will be responsible for all security measures, subject to the contral British authority in Jerusalem.

Unofficial celebrations continued throughout the day in all Jewish centers, despite the threats of Arab violence. Tens of thousands of people filled the streets in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, marching, singing, dancing and generally giving expression to their joy at the recreation of the Jewish State more than 1,800 years after its destruction. The first official celebration will be held on Chanukah, the first day of which has been declared a national holiday.

Frenzied Joy and Excitement Sweep Jerusalem and Tel Aviv

Indescribable joy and irrepressible excitement swept this reserved old city sarly this morning, the moment the United Nations vote partitioning Palestine became known. Self-controlled Jerusalem threw off all restraints. People poured half-dressed into the empty, heavily guarded streets. Young and old danced the Hora while British soldiers in heavily armored cars joined in the fective spirit. The soldiers Permitted the merry-makers to ride on their vehicles.

Around 3:30 a.m., a huge British car bearing 50 human beings all over the outside and clinging on the top roared into the Jewish Agency's building courtyard.

was difficult to make out the driver. He was at the wheel, peering through a prov slit in the armor around which girls' legs were draped.

Jewish Agency executive members mingled with the crowd until semeone remized Mrs. Goldie Meiracn, political chief of the Agency in Jerusalem. At the sistence of the crowd, Mrs. Meirson appeared on a balcony, making a brief address: e labored for this moment, hoped and sacrificed for it and above all believed that would came. Therefore, every one of us deserves it." Addressing herself to the splaced Jews in European camps, she said: "The end of your suffering has come. Arab Governments Encourage Incidents; Some Arab Leaders Call for Peace

Reports reaching here tonight indicated that officially encouraged tension as mounting in the Arab states. In Damascus, an attempt was made to set fire to the U.S. legation and the American flag was torn down. Communist Party headquarters are burned down. In Cairo and Alexandria students demonstrated, while in Bagdad, government spokesmen led by the Premier said that active measures would be taken immediately to "save" Palestine.

However, there were indications that the Arab opposition was not united. In athanya a large delegation of Arab notables called on Mayor Oved Ben Ami, constabilating him on the establishment of a Jewish state and voicing the hope of future coperation between Arabs and Jews. Arab members of the League to Combat Anti-scatter issued a manifesto calling on the Arabs not to be misled by provocateurs. Simultaneously, the Jewish Agency appealed to the Arab population for cooperation and friendship and urged the Jews not to be provoked.

British Will Permit Jewish Militia to Carry Arms; Irgun to End Violence

It was learned that Jevish police will be permitted to work in cooperation with the members of the Mishmar Haam, unofficial militia. The militiamen will be granted permission to carry arms, but will not be given weapons from government armories. The authorities said that they must extend the same privilege to the Arabs, to which Jevish leaders agreed, with the proviso that such permits be given only to those living in the section designated for an Arab state.

It was unofficially announced by the Irgun Zvai Leumi that it would immediately cease its armed attacks and continue its fight for a Jevish State in all of Palestine through political measures. It is believed that the Irgun may reconstitute itself a legal opposition political party. The Stern Group also announced that it will continue to fight partition, but "by means appropriate to the conditions, the time and the place."

Wild Rejoicing At Flushing Meadow When Vote Was Announced

Flushing Meadow was the scone of wild rejoicing yesterday afternoon after the ly had been announced. There was elation among the crowds in the galleries and blobbies where Jews kissed each other and embraced members of the Jewish Agency egation, congratulating them on their achievement. Non-Jewish delegations who proted partition were warmly congratulated by huge crowds.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, surrounded by press representatives, broke into tears le giving a statement to the press, and was unable to continue. He later issued it mimeographed form. It emphasized that the Jews are highly satisfied with the design of the General Assembly, which marks a turning point in Jewish history.

"This noble decision to re-establish the Jewish State and restore the Jewish cople to its rightful place in the family of nations will redound to the everlast-ng credit of the United Nations, and will be recorded as one of the most signifint achievements," Dr. Silver said. "The Jewish people will forever be grateful to be nations which contributed to the decision. We are especially appreciative of the leadership provided by the United States and the Soviet Union, and are happy hat in the solution of the Palestine problem these two great powers worked harmolically together.

"The Jewish people is keenly aware of the great responsibilities which the fecision of the United Nations has placed upon it and it will do its utmost to merit their confidence as it moves forward into the new day to fulfill the Mandate of its destiny. The Jewish people will strive to build the Jewish State in Palestine in the spirit of its heroic spiritual leaders of the past whose teachings made that sountry the Holy Land of mankind.

"We pray for the peace of Palestine. We extend a hand of genuine friendship to the new Arab State which is to be established in Palestine. The Jewish nation in Palestine will be eager to cooperate fully with its Arab neighbor and to contribute within the framework of the Economic Union to the progress and prosperity of the hole of Palestine. In this historic hour we call upon the Arab people of Palestine and all neighboring Arab countries to join with us in an era of peaceful and fruitful hollaboration."

The decision of the United Nations was considered a great victory not only for the Jews, but for the United Nations. In closing the Assembly, Secretary General rygve Lie emphasized that while many issues remained unresolved in the U.N., the rincipal parties to these issues nevertheless joined together in settling the Palestine problem. Dr. Aranha similarly stated in his closing address that he considers this session of the Assembly of historic importance. "I cannot now, as president of this memorable assembly, but express my confidence in this bold and historic experient," he said, commenting on partition.

U.S. and Soviet Delegates Fought to Prevent Further Delay

During the debate that preceded the voting, American delegate Herschel Johnson fought against any further delay. He demanded that the vote on partition be taken immediately since the French proposal for a 24-hour adjournment to give Jews and Arabs a last chance at conciliation had produced nothing. He refused to consider a last-minute proposal by the Arab states that Palestine be declared an independent country on a federalized basis no later than August 1, 1948, with Jewish and Arab cantons under a federal government. This proposal, Johnson said, was nothing but a repetition of the UNSCOP minority report which was decisively rejected by the Ad Hers Committee.

Soviet delegate Andrei Gromyko also argued in favor of immediate voting. He pointed out that the Arab proposal for federalization, as well as a proposal made by Iran during the afternoon session, to adjourn discussion of the Palestine issue until January 15 and hand it over to the Ad Hoc Committee for further study would not contribute to a successful solution of the Palestine problem and would merely create more confusion.

Prior to the conclusion of the Assembly British delegate Sir Alexander Cadogan announced that he was instructed by his government to request that the commission to be sent by the U.N. to Palestine contact the United Kingdom Government to make early arrangements regarding the details for implementation of the partition plan in the light of the British decision to withdraw its administration and forces by Aug. 1, 1948. He did not announce when the British Government intends to terminate the Mandate.

Representatives of the Arab countries reacted to the partition decision with the usual threats of forthcoming bloodshed. The Saudi Arabian delegate told the Assembly that his government was not bound by the partition decision which he said "destroyed the charter and all other covenants preceding it." He added that Saudi Arabia therefore reserves the right to act in any way she deems fit. A similar announcement was made by the representative of Yemen who said that his country does not consider itself bound by the resolution.

The representatives of Iran and Pakistan termed the decision as "illegal," but Egypt and Lebanon abstained from making any statement although they joined the other Arab countries in demonstratively walking out of the Assembly after the vote was taken.

The Arab statements, however, made little impression and passed almost unnoticed by the crowds who streamed out of the Assembly chamber jubilant over the decision finally to establish a Jewish State in Palestine. It was estimated that at least 15,000 people were turned away from yesterday's session.

N. DECISION TOUCHES OFF GAY CELEBRATIONS IN JEWISH DP CAMPS THROUGHOUT GERMANY

BERLIN, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- The Jews in the camps for displaced persons in stern Germany and Berlin, who have been tense and irritable during the recent weeks f negotiations over Palestine in the United Nations, reacted today with wild exteration to the news that they had been granted the Palestinian homeland which had been their goal, in most cass, since the war ended.

Spontaneous all-night celebrations took place late Saturday night when the eport of the U.N. vote on Palestine was first broadcast in the camps. These have ow given way to organized festivity which is expected to continue through the early art of this week.

All the year's despair and hopelessness seemed to have been wiped out of the learts of the Jewish remnant. A vicitor to the DP camps was almost irresistibly infected with the exultation of the Jews as they sang, shouted, cried, paraded, laughed, cheered, prayed, in round-the-clock observances.

Even as the ceremonies were taking place, responsible officials of Jewish organizations here, as well as underground spokemmen, expressed the certainty that there would be a virtually complete halt to the present illegal movement of Jews from the occupation zones toward Palestino. It is now felt in Germany that any further illegal movement of the Jews from the DP camps would antagonize world opinion and could serve no useful purpose, especially since the hope is voiced here that the legal exodus from Germany, Austria and eastern Europe can get under way by Feb. 1, 1943.

Jewish Agency officials told the writer that they were already making plans to systematize immigration into partitioned Palestine. They said they would strongly oppose unorganized movements which might prematurely crowd the migrants into areas which were temporarily unprepared to receive them or to offer them food or any kind of housing. They expressed the conviction that the Jews would wait patiently in Germany until their individual turns ceme for immigration, now that Palestine was no longer a promise but a real guarantee for them.

Displaced Jews in Italy Dance in Streets; Hold Meetings in Cemps

ROME, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- Large crowds gathered last night in front of the headquarters building of the Central Committee of Jewish Refugoes in Italy to cheer the U.N. decision on the partitioning of Falestine. Shouting, drinking and exuberant dancers through the street. Mass meetings commemorating the decision will be held today at all DP and refugee comps.

JENISH AGENCY RAISES ZION FLAG IN LONDON; BANNERS FLY FROM HOMES IN JEWISH SECTION

LONDON, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency huilding on Great Russel St. today raised the Jewish flag, which was also flown by many Jewish homes in the Jewish-populated East End.

An Agency statement issued here today doclared that the U.N. decision recognizes the justice of the Jewish claim for statehood and vindicates the "wisdom of the great, far-sighted act taken by Britain in 1917." The Jewish State brings peace to the Jewish people, the message said, and progress to the Middle East and will bear its responsibilities in a fitting manner.

The British Broadcasting Service last night reported the U.N. decision as though it were a catastrophe. This morning's newscast emphasized the Arab opposition to the decision and the Arabs' threats of war. Referring to the voting at the

bly yesterday, the broadcaster said that the vote was taken under pressure and the crowds applauding the decision were predominantly Jewish.

A report from Dublin said that the Jowish community in that city rejoiced meiastically when the news from Flushing Meadow was announced. Many Jews heard news at a crowded Mizrachi meeting in Dublin.

BUFNOS AIRES, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- Enthusiastic celebrations continued until v this morning as Argentine Jewry celebrated the announcement of the U.N. decisetting up a Jewish State in Palestine.

Large crowds gathered in cafes, synagogues and Jewish institutional buildings. crowds' celebration was somewhat dampened by the news of Argentina's abstention. hough the conviction prevailed that the abstention did not indicate an antiitic attitude on the part of the government.

Jewish youths improvised a song entitled "The Jewish Homeland Is No Longer An usion," which was sung continuously. Extemporaneous speeches were delivered in my parts of the city and Jewish newspapers published special editions.

Former members of the Jewish Legion, and leaders of many Jewish organizaions, issued statements heartily endorsing the creation of the Jewish State.

DEWISH ORGANIZATIONS OF VARYING BELIEFS JOIN IN HAILING U.N. DECISION ON PALESTINE

NEW YORK, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- Jewish organizations of varying functions and political orientations joined during the week-end in hailing the U.N. establishment of a Jewish State. '

The American Zionist Emergency Council, speaking for the entire Zionist movement in the U.S., called the Assembly's decision "a milestone in the history of the world." It expressed "deep thanks" to the U.S., the Soviet Union and the other governments who had fought for partition and paid tribute to the "ceaseless efforts" of American Zionists. The Council foresaw difficult days ahead, but voiced confidence that the Jews of Palestine backed by American public opinion could meet all eventualities.

The Zionist Organization of America, in a statement issued by Dr. Emanuel Neumann, 20A president, announced a victory-thanksgiving rally in Manhattan Center on Tuesday night, to be addressed by Drs. Silver and Neumann. A two-day extraordimary conference of the ZOA's administrative council will be held next week-end to discuss problems arising from the creation of a Jewish state:

Dr. Israel Goldstein, national chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, said the U.N. action was payment of a "debt due the Jewish people from the world in reparation for the tragic story of persecution and homelessness." He warned, however, that both inter-governmental assistance as well as large-scale giving by American Jews will be necessary to implement fully the decision to set up a Jewish State.

The American Jewish Committee, through Judge Joseph Proskquer, welcomed the Assembly action and hailed the contributions of the U.S. delegation. It reiterated, A. NEWS

ever, the Committee's position that "there can be no political identification of soutside of Palestine with whatever government may there be constituted."

Hadassah, which hailed the U.N. move as "a decision which will end Jewish elessness," immediately wired its branches in 47 status to set aside this Wednessas Victory Day. Mrs. Samuel W. Halprin, president of the organization, said thadassah's institutions in Palestine would continue to serve both Jews and Arabs ke as they have been doing.

The National Council of Jewish Women, in a statement issued by Mrs. Joseph t, president, said that the General Assembly "has taken a long step which will p solve a problem that has caused injustice and hardship to thousands of Jews DP cemps and Palostine." She termed the U.N. action "a necessary part of any bram that will enable the Jews of the world to rebuild their lives in freedom and writy," but pointed out that "it is not a complete and permanent answer to all the blems which world Jewry faces today."

Justice Meir Steinbrink, national chairmen of the Anti-Defemation League, id establishment of a Jewish State "means life and dignity for thousands of our llow Jews who have faced only death and degradation." He added that by normalizing a lives of DP's and disinherited Jews, the new state will help to eliminate antagonabetween Jews and non-Jews in many parts of the world and deprive anti-Semites this country of fuel to feed the fires of anti-Semitims.

Revisionists Oppose Partition; Histadruth Group Sets \$7,500,000 Goal

Meir Grossman, president of the United Zionist Revisionists of America, opbed the partition vote, declaring that "against the background of the present-day wish tragedy and the ever-increasing need for Jewish immigration, this decision sclearly unjustifiable." He said that the Revisionists would continue to fight for temational revision of the boundaries of a Jewish state to extend it to the conties of historic Palestine.

The National Labor Committee for Falestine, which concluded its 24th annual envention here today, called on the labor movement of the U.S. to support the new evish state and urged the Arabs to abide by the U.N. decision. Calling on American evry for greater efforts to support the Histadruth, the convention adopted a 7,500,000 quota for the 1948 Histadruth campaign.

Other organizations which voiced gratification at the Assembly decision inluded the Mizrachi Women of America, Jewish War Voterans of the United States, Ioneer Women, and the Massada, Zionist youth group, whose 13th annual convention in Incinnati today adopted a resolution backing the Haganah and declaring that an atack on Jews in the Middle East would constitute an attack on American Jewish youth.

HAS PREVIOUS CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS "NOT PERPETRATED FOR MATERIAL GAIN," JUDGE SAYS

E FOR JEWISH STATE EXPECTED TO CLINCH DECISION TO SET UP PERMANENT CONFERENCE

CHICAGO, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- The U.N. decision to set up a Jewish State would vide the necessary impetus to win over wavering delegates to support of a permatorganization to succeed the American Jewish Conference, it was predicted here ay as the 435 delegates representing 62 national organizations and scores of comities began debate on the blueprint for the new organization. A final vote was expected before tomorrow.

Louis Lipsky, Conference executive chairman, and Dr. Maurice N. Eisendrath, airman of the Committee for Future Organization, expressed confidence that the sendrath plan for a permanent body operating through existing national organizations, would win overwhelming approval.

Dr. Israel Goldstein, Conference co-chairman, told 3,000 delegates and spectors at the Chicago Civic Opera House that word of U.N.broke up the pre-conference ucus meetings and merged the Zionist and American Jewish Congress blocs, meeting adjoining rooms, in a victory celebration pledging to work together in a new era r Judaism. Pointing out that American Governmental, financial, moral and political pport for Palestine is needed more than ever, Dr. Goldstein declared: "We Jews of erica pledge ourselves to help the infant Jewish State."

Proposing "Judea" as the name of the new free, democratic, Jewish State, Dr. sephen S. Wise declared: "We go forward to give help and counsel to our Jewish rothers to build the Jewish State, but we in America must not dominate those who we suffered and fought in Palestine to build the Jewish State." He proposed Dr. haim Woizmann as the first president of the new state.

The conference telegraphed President Truman appreciation for his part in chieving victory. "You will be long remembered and honored in the annals of Jewish istory for your efforts to restore the homeland," the telegram said. Messages of preciation were dispatched to U.N. leaders, Jewish spokesmon, the American delogation at Lake Success, David Ben Gurion and the Vaad Loumi in Palestine. The U.N. ecision ends "20 long centuries of national homelessness, and premises a new era of eace and security for a people many times the defenseless victims of savage oppression," the Conference wired U.N. leaders.

MOSLEY SETS UP SCHOOL FOR TRAINING LOCAL FASCIST LEADERS IN "POLITICAL THOUGHT"

LONDON, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- A report that Sir Oswald Mosley has organized a school in Wiltshire for training district leaders in his new fascist Union movement was published today in the Sunday Pictorial. The paper describes the district leaders as "a not very handscme-looking bunch" who are being trained "in political thought, orstory and discipline."

While the paper takes a light view of the new Mosley party and asserts that the British people never regarded Mosley as anything but a political entertainer, Reymolds News, under a headline reading "Stop Him Now," warns that disorder is certain if Mosley is allowed to hold meetings since his advocacy of violence will inevitably provoke "violent reactions." The paper urges the government to "drive fascism underground where it belongs--down in the sewers."

(JTA) -- Mayor William O'Dwyer yesterday urged community-de support of the 1947 appeal of the Evderation of Jewish Philanthropies of New rk for \$15,000,000, warning that failure to reach this goal "could well spell dister" for the 116 Federation-affiliated hospitals, health and social welfare initutions and would cause the entire city to suffer because they make "an enormous attribution to the solution of our social welfare problems." In his message the yor asked that people of "all races and faiths contribute to the drive, saying at in disponsing its services to 350,000 men, women and children the Federation non-sectarian."

ILLIAM EDLIN, EDITOR OF JEWISH DAY, DIES; WAS 69 YEARS CLD

NEW YORK, Nov. 30. (JTA) -- William Edlin, editor of the Yiddish daily, the evish Day, died today of a heart attack at the age of 69. He had long been active a the field of Jewish journalism and for a time specialized in music and drama critism. He came to this country from Russia at the age of 12 and was educated in an Francisco public schools and Columbia University.

Mr. Edlin had been a member of the Day staff since its founding and served as Mitor for many years. His last published work was an editorial in today's Day miling the establishment of the Jewish State in Palestine.
