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### HAGANAH ROUTS ARAB INVADERS ON BORDERS OF TEL AVIV; JEWISH DEATH TOLL REACHES ELEVEN

JERUSALEM, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- As British troops in Jerusalem battled rioting Arabs attempting to break out of the Old City, which has been placed under an indefinite curfew, a crack Haganah unit tonight routed Arabs along the Tel Aviv Jaffa boundary, which had been the scene of almost continuous violence since last night. The border area was under curfew tonight, enforced by large contingents of British troops.

The Haganah squad, composed of former commandos, crossed the boundary into Jaffa and eliminated Arab snipers in house by house and street by street operations, after a day of Arab attacks of varying intensity which resulted in at least seven Jews killed and 40 wounded, and an unknown number of Arabs dead and injured. The death toll since the outbreaks began is estimated at eleven Jews and 13 Arabs.

One of the slain Jews was Moshe Neumann, a top Haganah officer who died leading a counter-attack against the Arabs, and another was an unidentified policeman. A Haganah official charged late today that many of the Jewish casualties were inflicted by British police and troops, who were accused of obstructing the Jewish defenders.

The Tel Aviv-Jaffa battle resembled full-scale combat operations. Both sides used automatic rifles and Bren guns. At one point Arab units penetrated 150 yards into Tel Aviv under cover of machinegun fire, but were repulsed by Haganah troops. Many combatants were wounded when they were caught in the battle zone, and Dr. Kopeka Jamin, 50, a physician, was killed while making his rounds.

Flames from burning shops and other buildings in both Tel Aviv and Jaffa lit up the scene as dusk descended. Firemen battling the blazes were hampered by the steady shooting from the Arab side. Brigade Commander Caspi of the Tel Aviv fire department was seriously wounded while fighting a fire in several houses. Eventually, however, the fires were brought under control.

### Curfew Extended When Arab Rioters Mass for Attack

The curfew in Jerusalem, which was to have been lifted at noon today, was extended until further notice when menacing crowds of several hundred Arabs gathered at the gates of the Old City, ready to swoop down on the Jewish sections as soon as the curfew was lifted. Despite a cordon of British troops, a mob of rioters broke out of the curfewed area brandishing daggers and shouting "Death to the Jews."

A Jewish truck driver, Moshe Pinto, 27, was stabbed to death when the mob caught him as he was fleeing from his truck, which was halted by the rioters. Another Jew, not identified, was stabbed and seriously wounded by another group of Arab rioters. Two Arab ringleaders were wounded when the mob they were leading refused police orders to halt. Two other Arabs were killed by two policemen who returned their fire.

when they were shot at while seated outside a cafe near Jaffa Gate.

Several new fires were set today in Jewish shops and some looting took place, although the city was generally peaceful. Many of the fires completely gutted the shops before the fire brigade arrived. Other shopkeepers hurriedly evacuated their goods to safer quarters.

### Haifa Arabs Repulsed When They Attempt To Break Into Jewish Area

In Haifa Arab bands twice attempted to break into the Jewish quarter, but were repulsed by Haganah units. One group attacked a Jewish cafe in the Kinasway, modern business quarter, but was dispersed by a grenade thrown from a nearby rooftop. A second Arab crowd converged on the old Jewish business center in Khirbat Square, but scattered after an explosion believed caused by a grenade. The situation in Haifa calmed down somewhat tonight after the Irgun had threatened to blow up Arab houses if the attacks did not stop immediately. Earlier, however, Abraham Kizengold, 20, was killed in the Vadi Rushmieh suburb of Haifa. Two other Jews were injured when Arabs stoned a bus.

The attack on Tel Aviv started on a small scale when Arab bands opened fire on a small police post in one area, seriously injuring one Jewish constable and wounding two others.

The Arabs launched a heavier attack in the Geula quarter abutting Jaffa later in the morning, and a heavy exchange of fire took place as the Haganah swept into action and gradually repulsed the assailants.

The Mogen David, the Jewish Red Cross organization, was mobilized for action, and its ambulances were to be seen speeding to various areas of the city throughout the day to pick up wounded and administer first aid.

### British Refuse Agency Request to Convey Inter-Urban Traffic

Traffic between Haifa and Jewish colonies in the south was resumed at noon today, but vehicles travelling to Jerusalem proceeded only under armed convoy. Similar convoys have been established to guard traffic between Tel Aviv and Jerusalem and linking other Jewish cities. Traffic to the Negev is being maintained and no incidents have been reported, although last night there were unconfirmed reports that several Negev settlements had been attacked.

The Jewish Agency is scheduled to meet again with government officials to demand that the authorities keep the peace or entrust Jewish security forces with the tasks. Early today, a senior government official informed the Agency that police escort could not be given inter-urban convoys since that might be interpreted as British implementation of partition.

Scattered reports say that Arabs are massing in various parts of the country. A violent demonstration took place today in the Arab city of Hebron and a large concentration of armed Arabs was reported to have assembled in the town of Tulkarm, northeast of Tel Aviv. Settlers at Beth Halevi reported that they had also observed a large group of Arabs.

Dr. Hussein Khalidi, secretary of the Arab Higher Committee, revealed late today that Sir Henry L. Gurney, Chief Secretary of the Palestine Government, had asked him to call off the Arab strike, which still has a day to run, since it was endangering the security of the country. Dr. Khalidi said that no decision has been reached by

the Higher Committee. He alleged that the disturbances were caused by "irresponsible elements who had taken matters into their own hands" and that measures for easing the situation had been discussed with Sir Henry.

#### Agency Political Aide Summoned to Conference with Government

Mrs. Goldie Meirson, political secretary of the Agency office in Jerusalem, met with Gurney tonight at his invitation. She was brought to Jerusalem from Tel Aviv in a car accompanied by an armed convoy. The Chief Secretary is understood to have reported on his meeting with Dr. Khalidi and to have stated that the government would not tolerate "high-handedness" on either side.

The Irgun Zvai Leumi tonight published an open letter to the Arabs, extending the hand of friendship. "We will heartily shake a friend's hand, but will cut off an enemy's," the letter said. "As we stood and fought alone against 100,000 well disciplined and exceedingly well armed soldiers and won the battle, so we can meet an Arab onslaught and win," the letter concluded, "but we want peace."

Speaking at a meeting called by the Histadruth to celebrate statehood, David Ben Gurion, Agency chairman, said tonight that although the area the Jews had sought had been cut in half, "we have been given the largest part of the cultivable land and the main water resources, which provide almost unlimited possibilities for development." He stressed that the new state will remain merely on paper unless 1,500,000 Jews are brought in within the next ten years. He called for cooperation between Arabs and Jews and a democratic regime based on a Labor foundation.

#### Sneh Warns Palestine Jews Against "Machinations" of British and Arabs

Despite the U.N. decision to partition Palestine, there is great danger that Arab and British machinations will interfere with the establishment of a Jewish state, Moshe Sneh, member of the Jewish Agency executive and reputed leader of the Haganah, last night told the annual conference of the Jewish Journalists Association.

"We face a great struggle in translating the message of Lake Success into a reality," Sneh asserted. "Whereas we had a two-thirds majority on our side at Lake Success, here we have the reverse" situation--two of the three decisive factors in the Palestine situation are opposed to partition, he said.

He predicted that the British and the Jews would come into conflict in two areas--immigration and security. He pointed out that the Jews could not agree to continuation of the present monthly immigration quota of 1,500 during the transition period preceding independence. As for security, he pointed to a situation which developed yesterday as evidence of the difference between the two points of view. In response to a Jewish Agency request that either British troops or Jewish security forces be assigned to protect traffic along the main highways, the government promptly suspended all civilian vehicular traffic, a move which the Agency charged would choke off Jewish industry and commerce.

Referring to future relations with the Arabs in Palestine, he said: "Our aim must be to preserve a unified Palestine, giving the Arabs living in Palestine a sense of greater freedom and equal rights than they enjoy in neighboring Arab countries."

Turning again to the international scene, Sneh stressed the importance of friendly relations with "Palestine's greater neighbor--Russia." In order to gain the Soviet Union's friendship, he stated, "we must show them friendship." He urged Jews to "change their attitude" toward the U.S.S.R., which he characterized as "the only power in the wide world where anti-Semitism is really fought and where almost none exists."

ARABIAN MOBS TURN ON JEWS; 12 INJURED IN ALEXANDRIA; ASK CONFISCATION OF JEWS' PROPERTY

CAIRO, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- Arab rioters in various Egyptian cities today demonstrated against Egyptian Jews and the United States Government, following the issuance last night of a call for a holy war by the faculty of the most famous Mohammedan university in the Middle East.

In Alexandria mobs estimated to number about 10,000 swept through the Jewish business center, attacking Jews and a number of stores before they were brought under control by police. At least twelve Jews were injured, one seriously, before the riots subsided. A crowd of several hundred were forcibly prevented by police from tearing down the U.S. flag in front of the American embassy building.

In Cairo, where another mob demonstrated in front of the U.S. embassy and threw stones at it, a student deputation called at King Farouk's palace and left a memorandum petitioning the government to confiscate Jewish property in Egypt. In Jewish circles, which have been promised government protection against mob violence and discriminatory legislation, concern was expressed that the government might be forced to give way before political pressure.

Chief Rabbi Nahoum Effendi, queried by Egyptian newsmen as to whether Jews should "fight in Palestine," replied that Egyptian Jews were surprised that their attitude toward the Egyptian nation should be questioned. Pointing out that the government and government have promised that the Jews would have the full protection of the law and would enjoy the same rights as other Egyptians, Rabbi Nahoum said the Jews were subject to the same obligations as other Egyptians.

Reports from Aden, British crown colony on the Arabian coast near Yemen, state that one person was killed and a score injured last night during riots following Arab attacks on Jews.

Various reports from other Arab states tend to indicate that the crest of the wave of violence against Jews is passing. In Damascus police guarded Jewish homes and shops, while in Iraq the government appealed for an end to demonstrations. In Transjordan, where rioting was kept to a minimum, the legislature adopted a resolution promising aid to Arab interests in Palestine fighting the establishment of a Jewish state.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO ANNOUNCE ITS ATTITUDE TOWARD PARTITION "AT AN EARLY DATE"

LONDON, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The British Government's attitude toward the partition plan adopted by the U.N. will be presented "at a very early date," Colonial Secretary Arthur Creech-Jones today told Commons.

He added that at that time the government would inform Commons as to whether it intends to cooperate with the U.N. in the implementation of the plan. A third edition of the forthcoming statement will reveal whether Britain will use the Transjordan Frontier Force to maintain order in Palestine.

The British Government, Creech-Jones declared, is determined to take "all possible steps to preserve law and order" in Palestine until the Mandate is finally surrendered. He repeated an earlier official statement that the withdrawal of British troops would be completed on Aug. 1.

Reporting briefly on recent events in Palestine, the Colonial Secretary said the current disturbances there were sporadic and unorganized. The Haganah, he stated, was out on the streets in force, taking all possible action to restore order and to prevent reprisals by Jews.



U.N. PLANS NO MAJOR DECISION ON PALESTINE UNTIL IMPLEMENTATION BODY FORMED

LAKE SUCCESS, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- No major decisions on Palestine will be taken by any organ of the United Nations until the five-man Implementation Commission is constituted, Secretary-General Trygve Lie indicated today. Lie was questioned at a press conference at which he confirmed that he would soon leave for Palestine for a personal on-the-spot survey.

The Secretary-General announced the appointment of Dr. Ralph J. Bunche as one of the 60-man U.N. staff which will be sent to Palestine to assist the Implementation Commission's staff. Dr. Bunche, who is the director of the U.N. Trusteeship Division, is a noted anthropologist and an authority on dependent territories. He served last summer with UNSCOP during its investigations in Palestine.

At his press conference, Mr. Lie also announced that he has formally notified the Security Council of the Assembly's decision to authorize the Council to take whatever action may be necessary if the peace of Palestine is threatened. However, he expressed the belief that the Security Council will approach the Palestine situation very carefully. The next meeting of the Council is tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, at which time it is expected that it will take some cognizance of the Palestine situation.

The U.N. working group named to draft a constitution for the international zone of Jerusalem held its first meeting today. U.S. representative Benjamin Gerig was named chairman of the group and Sir Allan Burns, British representative, was named vice-chairman. The group consists of representatives of Australia, China, France, Mexico, Britain and the United States. The body will hold daily meetings for the purpose of taking "rapid and constructive action" on the status of Jerusalem, it was announced.

No final decision was taken on the question of whether representatives of Jews and Arabs will be invited to assist in drafting the constitution.

TRIAL OF VICHY COMMISSIONER FOR JEWISH AFFAIRS OPENS; HE OBJECTS TO JEWISH JUROR

PARIS, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The trial of Xavier Vallat, former Commissioner for Jewish Affairs in the Vichy Government, opened here before the High Court. He is charged with responsibility for the passage of anti-Jewish legislation and subsequent persecution of French Jews, among others.

The anti-Jewish phases of the general indictment will be heard today. During the selection of the jury, Vallat objected to the presence of a Jew on the panel. The Jew, M. Triggel-Valermont, was one of the leaders of the French Resistance.

FIRST SHIPMENT OF NON-MONETARY GOLD FOR RELIEF OF NAZI VICTIMS LEAVES EUROPE

GENEVA, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The first shipment of non-monetary gold and other valuables recovered from the Nazis has left Bremerhaven for the United States where it will be sold and the proceeds turned over to the International Refugee Organization for its relief program, it was announced by I.R.O. headquarters here.

The shipment represents about \$1,000,000 worth of jewelry, china, rugs, postage stamps and various other articles, most of which the Nazis stole from Jews and which was later recovered by the American Army in various parts of Europe. Ninety percent of the proceeds will be devoted to Jewish relief and rehabilitation work.

SPECIAL COMMISSIONS TO SCREEN DP'S IN GERMANY DESIRING TO IMMIGRATE TO PALESTINE

MUNICH, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency will establish special commissions to screen displaced Jews desiring to immigrate to Palestine, a spokesman declared today. The commissions, which will be composed of representatives of the Agency, the local Zionist parties and DP organizations, will group applicants in such categories as "youth," "technicians" and "persons with close relations in Palestine."

Meanwhile, the official revealed, Agency offices in the major cities of Germany have been swamped by hundreds of Jews within the past few days applying for immigration. However, the Agency officials have been forced to tell the people that no definite date for the start of legal, large scale immigration to Palestine has been set and that they may have to wait until August 1, 1948, when the British evacuation of Palestine is slated to be completed.

In the interim, the Agency offices plus the screening commissions will complete as much of the paper work as possible in preparation for the start of immigration. Chaim Hoffman, Agency director in the U.S. zone, is conferring with Army officials in an attempt to work out a solution of the extremely troublesome transportation problem. One question mark in the minds of the Agency planners is whether to use a French or an Italian port for embarkation of the DP's after they are brought out of Germany. At the present time the political and labor situations in both countries make the choice a toss-up.

Agency officials continue to emphasize that when immigration starts it will have to be on a selective basis, because it is feared that a pell-mell mass movement may ruin the economy of Palestine. The local officials are still waiting for word from Jerusalem as to the proportion of youth, workers and "close relatives" among the total to be accepted from Germany.

N. BODY ASKED TO INCLUDE FREE WORSHIP AND NO BIAS CLAUSES IN BILL OF RIGHTS

GENEVA, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- Representatives of the World Jewish Congress, the Coordinating Board of Jewish Organizations and the Agudas Israel today urged the U.N. Commission on Human Rights to include in the proposed International Bill of Rights clauses stipulating that there be "no regulation prohibiting or interfering with the free exercise of religious worship and observance and no discrimination in law or practice against any creed or religion."

The Chinese, British and French delegates to the Commission, which began meeting here this morning to draft a preliminary convention on human rights and a Bill of Human Rights, have promised to support the demands of the Jewish organizations.

CZECHOSLOVAK COURT DOOMS NAZI LEADERS RESPONSIBLE FOR DEPORTATION OF SLOVAK JEWS

BRATISLAVA, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The Peoples Court here today sentenced to death Hans Ludin, former German Minister to the puppet Slovak state, and Gestapo General Hermann Hoffle, ex-commander of Nazi troops in the state, following their conviction on charges of mass murder, mass deportation and committing atrocities.

During the trial it was revealed that most of their victims were Slovak Jews, the bulk of whom were deported at the instigation of Ludin, who was acting as personal representative of Adolph Eichman, the Nazi expert on Jews. Hoffle was personally responsible for the execution of more than 4,000 persons and the deportation of an additional 30,000.

ZIONIST POLITICAL BODY HOPES ARABS WILL ACCEPT FRIENDSHIP OFFERED BY JEWS

NEW YORK, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The Political Advisory Committee of the World Zionist Organization, composed of representatives of all Zionist groups, today issued a statement expressing the hope that "the Arabs in and around Palestine will grasp the bond of fellowship which is extended by the Jews of Palestine and the Jewish people everywhere."

The Committee, which was the advisory body to the Jewish Agency executive during the U.N. General Assembly session, emphasized its confidence that "Jews and Arabs together can build in Palestine a model of democracy, culture and prosperity for the entire Near and Middle East."

The statement declared that the majority of the Committee received the United Nations decision "with gratification." At the same time, it expressed regret over the fact that Jerusalem is outside the Jewish state and that "important areas of Palestine linked with Jewish history and contemporary Jewish achievements are excluded from the Jewish state."

The Committee expressed its appreciation to all nations which voted in favor of partition at the Assembly, and singled out the United States and the Soviet Union for giving the lead to other nations "in fostering an equitable solution." It congratulated the members of the Jewish Agency executive for the "effective and statesmanlike" conduct of their presentations before the U.N.

"We do not underestimate the difficulties, the hardships and the hazards which will beset the establishment of a Jewish state and particularly the initial chapter of its existence. Yet we are confident that the obstacles will be surmounted by the Jewish community of Palestine reinforced by multitudes of newcomers who have been earning for their chance to enter Zion's gates of salvation, and by their fellow Jews throughout the world," the statement said.

Dr. Israel Goldstein, chairman of the Committee, in issuing the statement said that "there has been close contact and continuous exchange of opinion between the Political Advisory Committee and the executive of the Jewish Agency" and that "in no instance did the Agency executive disregard a view supported by a majority of the Committee," nine members of which are from Palestine. Dr. Abba Hillel Silver and Moshe Bertok, members of the Jewish Agency executive, expressed their appreciation to the Committee at a press conference today at the Agency headquarters here.

UNSCOP CHAIRMAN TELLS ZIONISTS TO BE "CAREFULLY OPTIMISTIC" ON JEWISH STATE'S FUTURE

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The Zionists should be "carefully optimistic" concerning the prospects of the Jewish state because of "alarming events on the horizon," Emil Sandstroem, former chairman of the United Nations Special Committee on Palestine, today told a meeting of 2,000 Jews celebrating the U.N. partition decision.

In his first speech since his return from Lake Success, Sandstroem praised Jewish colonization work in Palestine and described the Haganah as the strongest military force in the Middle East. He received a tremendous ovation from the audience and was thanked by Swedish Zionist leader Hugh Valentin for his contributions to the solution of the Palestine problem.

The news of the U.N. decision on partition was received with great joy by Jews throughout Sweden. Many Jewish leaders expressed their pride in the fact that Sweden's representatives on UNSCOP had played so important a role in the final decision and lauded the role of their country's delegation at Lake Success.

JEWS IN POLAND THANK GOVERNMENT FOR ROLE OF DELEGATION AT UNITED NATIONS

WARSAW, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- Jews throughout Poland are greeting the news of the U.N. decision on a Jewish state with the greatest of enthusiasm and celebrations are taking place in all communities.

Mass meetings are being held by Jewish organizations of all shades of political opinion and all synagogues are conducting thanksgiving services. Speakers at most of the rallies are emphasizing the leadership of the Polish, Soviet and American Governments in pushing the partition decision through the General Assembly. The Central Jewish Committee and the Jewish Agency office in Poland have sent messages of thanks to the President and various Cabinet officers.

JEWSH REFUGEE COMMUNITY OF SHANGHAI CELEBRATES U.N. DECISION ON PALESTINE PARTITION

SHANGHAI, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The Jewish refugee community of Shanghai, numbering about 14,000 persons, turned out in force today to celebrate the forthcoming establishment of a Jewish State.

In the Hongkew slum district where most of the refugees, who came originally from Germany and Austria, live, the Revisionist youth organizations Betar and Brith Mampeldor held a parade. V. Zoubitsky, chairman of the United Zionist Revisionists, speaking for all Zionist parties in the community, thanked the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. for their aid in achieving the partition decision at the U.N.

JEWS IN SOUTH AFRICA JUBILANT; ANTI-PARTITIONISTS DROP LEAFLETS FROM PLANE

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- Thousands of Jews in this city last night participated in a mass rally to celebrate the imminent establishment of a Jewish state. The meeting was sponsored jointly by the South African Zionist Federation and the Board of Deputies of South African Jews.

Government officials, lead by Minister of Justice Colin Steyn, congratulated the Jews and expressed pride at the part played by Premier Jan Christian Smuts in the establishment of a Jewish homeland. Bernard Gering, chairman of the Zionist Federation, also thanked Smuts for helping frame the Balfour Declaration and his active role in subsequent developments.

During the meeting a plane dropped leaflets, signed by the Anti-Partition League, bitterly attacking Jewish acquiescence to a partition decision as a "betrayal" of Jewish aspirations.

HADASSAH TO PLANT 10,000-TREE FOREST IN PALESTINE IN HONOR OF UNITED NATIONS

NEW YORK, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The Hadassah will plant a 10,000-tree forest in Palestine in honor of the United Nations, it was announced today at a reception tendered by the organization's national board for members of the Jewish Agency executive and the World Zionist Organization's Political Advisory Committee.

At the same time, it was announced that some 900 Hadassah chapters throughout the country would be asked to increase their voluntary contributions to the organization's social welfare program in Palestine by 50 percent this year. In a series of telegrams President Truman was thanked for the American Government's role in achieving the U.N. partition decision, and American representatives at the U.N. Herschel Johnson, Warren Austin and Maj. Gen. John Hildring were praised for their activities.

ANGLO-JEWISH NEWSPAPER LOSES \$24,000 LIBEL SUIT TO ANTI-SEMITIC PROPAGANDISTS

CHICAGO, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- An award for \$24,100 for libel was today handed down by a Chicago court against the Anglo-Jewish weekly "Sentinel" and its publishers, Max Fishbein and Jack Feldman, following a jury trial.

The plaintiffs are Lawrence Dennis, Joe McWilliams and E.A. Deatherage, all of whom were among the defendants in the Washington sedition trial, and J. Parker Sage. The four have been identified with anti-Semitic propaganda and anti-Jewish organizations. Another action of similar nature, brought by three persons including Elizabeth Dilling, notorious anti-Semitic propagandist, was ruled a mistrial.

The plaintiffs charged that their reputations had been damaged by statements in the Sentinel describing them as "seditionist traitors and criminals." The defendants said they will appeal the decision.

POLICE CHIEF IN ARGENTINIAN CITY SAYS HIS DEPARTMENT IS FIGHTING ANTI-SEMITISM

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The police chief of the city of Santa Fe, where anti-Jewish agitation has been increasing within recent months, has written an open letter to El Litoral, most influential newspaper in the city, defending his department against charges that it is not attempting to halt anti-Semitism.

He insisted that the police are investigating various slanderous pamphlets and caricatures and slogans painted on walls throughout the city in an attempt to find out who is responsible for them. However, Jewish observers point out that no arrests have been made although the anti-Jewish activities have occurred continuously over a period of several months. The local nationalist group has issued a statement expressing opposition to the anti-Semitic propaganda.

JOINT DEFENSE APPEAL TO HOLD SECOND ANNUAL CONVENTION IN PHILADELPHIA NEXT MONTH

NEW YORK, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- The second annual convention of the Joint Defense Appeal will be held in Philadelphia on Jan. 3, 4, and 5, it was announced here today. Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, president of the American Jewish Committee, and Justice Elmer Steinbrink, chairman of the Anti-Defamation League, will deliver keynote addresses at the conference.

TWO JEWS AMONG SIX AWARD WINNERS OF ARGENTINE ACADEMY OF MEDICINE PRIZES

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 3. (JTA) -- Two Jews were among the six prize winners of the annual awards of the Argentine National Academy of Medicine, it was announced here.

The most important prize, the Marjono Castex Award, was presented to Dr. Alfredo Pavlosky, chief of the Institute of Radiology and Physiotherapy. The second Jew was Dr. Jose Sverdllick, specialist in eye diseases. Dr. Pavlosky is a former assistant to Dr. Bernardo Houssay, who was awarded this year's Nobel prize for medicine.
