JERUSALEM, Dec. 10. (JTA) -- Efforts to bring about a truce between Arabs and n the troubled boundary area between Jaffa and Tel Aviv were upset today by lestine Arab Higher Executive, which insisted that the Arabs not begin negons for an armistice until they received the approval of the ex-Mufti of Jeruwho is now in Cairo attending a meeting of the Arab League Council.

The mayor was also told that the Execuas at that very moment telephoning the ex-Mufti. Since no reply has yet been by the ex-Mufti, the arrangements remained suspended.

The present disturbances have been accompanied by a sharp increase in food in Arab markets, especially in Jerusalem. The price of bread in the Old City ared and is now four times higher than before the disturbances. There is also te shortage of dairy products, fruits and vegetables in the Arab sections of lem, while no such shortage is felt in the Jewish section of the city where is sold at the normal price.

High Commissioner Warns Both Jews and Arabs; Explosions in Haifa

High Commissioner Sir Alan G. Cunningham today issued a stern warning to Jews abs reminding them that the British are still responsible for the maintenance ce and order in Palestine. The warning said that the government will take sessures if the disturbances continue.

The Irgun Zvai Leumi, dissident Jewish underground organization, which has been since the United Nations partition decision, tonight issued a new call to the f Palestine to embark on an "offensive war to foll British intrigues." The h, according to the Irgun proclamation, hope to force the Jews to exhaust lives by a prolonged defensive war, to prevent the Jews from receiving addition-power and arms at this time, and to eventually face a large, well-organized once equipped with the most modern British weapons.

Meanwhile, armored cars sped today to the center of Haifa after two explosions, by machine gun and rifte fire, had shaken the city. Fires were started in

y, Haifa's main street. A Jewish policeman was stabbed to death and two fews were slain by gunfire. One British soldier was also shot to death and a was wounded.

Eighteen Arab prisoners today escaped from the Acre prison, which the Irgun ed last May 4 to free some 250 Jowish and Arab inmates. The escapees saved in the bars of their cell and celled the jail well with ropes. It was reported then the guards loosed shots at the fleeing Arabs they were in turn brought heavy small arms fire from three directions. Acre is an all-Arab town.

Later in the day 80 Jewish prisoners, all in the jail, were removed from Acre Central Prison at Jerusalem. The transfer was reportedly carried out for rity reasons."

Agency Submits Charges Against British Officers: Six Jews Killed Near Geza

Country-wide police searches for arms armong the Jewish population are still on. A Jewish Agency spokesman said that some of the British police officers agreeating the situation. He charged them with "paying off old scores." Docuderports of the conduct of certain police officers have been sent to the Pales Government, he revealed.

Members of the Jewish security force today reported that they saw British Arab police officers set fire to Jewish houses in the Jaffa-Tel Aviv border zone fire at anybody who attempted to extinguish the blaze. Others charged the Briwith the "wanton murder" of a Jewish youth, Gedalia Harari, who together with teen more Jews, was arrested near the border battleground. Five of the fifteen, inding Harari, were released and told to leave the Manshieh police station. As left, a shot was fired by a member of a patrol which was assigned to escort to Tel Aviv, and Harari fell dead. The others escaped unharmed.

Six Jews, including one woman, were found dead this morning near the colony fevulot, in the vicinity of the Arab city of Gaza. The six were members of a ty which were tilling a field three miles from Gevulot. The seventh and last er of the party escaped the Arab ambush and fled to a police station. It was cred that a police detachment hurrying to the scene of the murders was itself acked and one constable seriously wounded.

The Haganah today destroyed with explosives an Arab house at Karatiya, in the ev, from which shots had been fired for several days at a nearby Jewish settlett. Four Arabs died in the destruction of the sniper's nest. Three Jews were led by the snipers days ago.

A British constable was stabled in the Old City by several Arabs who made off this rifle. The Tel Aviv municipal council issued a statement condemning yestay's attacks on British armored cars in Tel Aviv, which were presumably carried by the dissident groups. At the same time, the council urged inhabitants in the der districts not to Acave their homes in a panic and not to spread rumors.

GOVERNOR OF JERUSALEM EMPOWERED TO GOVERN CITY BY DECREE TO CHECK VIOLENCE

LAKE SUCCESS, Dec. 10. (JTA) -- Wide powers to the U.N. The sub-committee il adjourn December 16 along with its parent organization, the Trusteeship Council. wever, its work will continue through two groups of experts from the Secretariat d others to be designated. It will reconvene early in January.

PARIS, Dec. 10. It is expected that Pellepoix will be conowned to death but that Vallat will escape with a milder sentence.

World Jewish Congress Receives Appeal For Aid From Aden Jewish Community

NEW YORK, Dec. 10. (JTA) -- An appeal for monetary and other assistance to Jevish community of Aden, where scores of Jews have been killed by rioting Arabs ng the past ten days, has been received by the World Jewish Congress headquarters today.

In a cable signed "The Aden Jewish Sufferers," it is stated that Arab mobs, uding native troops, burned down two synagogues and the community's only two bols, as well as pillaged and burned nearly every Jewish-owned shop and killed wounded many Jewish men, women and children. If it were not for British troops transit," the cable said, the "whole Aden Jewry would have been wiped out."

Immediately after receipt of the message, the Congress cabled the British sign Office and the British Governor of Aden, Sir Reginald Stuart Champion, and led on them to take "all necessary precautions to avoid repetition of last week's its and to rush supplies for the homeless and destitute Jews from the nearest suptlespots." An appeal for supplies to be sent to the Jews in Aden was made to the Department.

MAL U.J.A. CONFERENCE OPENS TODAY AT ATLANTIC CITY: WILL PROCLAIM 1948 GOAL

ATLANTIC CITY, Dec. 10 (JTA) -- More than 1,200 Jewish leaders representing inties in every section of the United States will assemble here tomorrow to open ive-day national conference of the United Jewish Appeal at which the 1948 over-relief, rehabilitation and resettlement goal will be established.

The conference, which will take place at the Chelsea Hotel, will discuss plans the participation of American Jews in providing the financial support for the Ilding and defense of the Jewish state in Palestine, as well as for the receptor an expected immigration to Palestine of 75,000 displaced Jews during the gyear.

The conference will also discuss at great length the needs of the Jews of Europe the world-wide reconstruction problem of the Joint Distribution Committee, Plans establishing Jewish refugees in the United States under the auspices of the ed Service for New Americans will also receive consideration.

Dr. Weizmann, Gen. McNarney Among Principal Speakers

The problems involved in the migration of masses of homeless European Jews to stine and in the establishment of a Jewish state will be discussed by Dr. Chaim mann, former president of the Jewish Agency; Eliezer Kaplan, Agency treasurer; Moshe Shertok, head of its political department. Maj. Gen. John H. N ZIONISTS CALL UPON U.S. GOVERNMENT TO FURNISH ARMS FOR JEWISH STATE

NEW YORK, Dec. 10. (JTA) -- The Zionist Organization of America today called Government of the United States "to facilitate the acquisition by the Jewish for Palestine, through appropriate arrangements, of adequate military equipor defense and security uses in Palestine." At the same time, it also urged S. Government "to make available the necessary ships and facilities for the ortation of large numbers of Jews to Palestine for the resettlement in the Jewate."

The move made by the Z.O.A. is a part of the new policy program of the organia formulated at the recent meeting of its National Administrative Council, under airmanehip of Dr. Emanuel Neumann. The resolution calling for American queries aid to the Jewish state emphasizes that the lack of adequate military equipor defense and security of the state "would severely handicap the preservation and order in the event of continued disturbances inspired by intransigent teaders."

Another resolution called upon the U.N. to prevail upon "Arab governmental and leaders whose actions are in defiance of the decision of the Assembly to cease esist from creating and causing conditions constituting a threat to the peace." so urged the U.N. to initiate effective collective measures for the prevention emoval of threats to the peace.

The policy resolutions assured the Arab inhabitants of Palestine "that the h state will live in accordance with the verse of the Bible inscribed upon the can Liberty Bell ("Proclaim liberty throughout the land, to all the inhabitants eof.") "It is a foremost purpose of the Jevish people to establish and preserve and friendship with the neighboring nations of Palestine and the Arab people."

Pledging maximum support in campaigns for funds required for the protection, sportation, absorption and colonization of Jevish emigrants into Palestine, the A. decided that "a special and adequate sum must be made available in the next y days for the defense and security of Jevish Palestine." It instructed its adstration "to take appropriate steps, in consultation with existing fund-raising seiss, to ensure such adequate provision for defense and security."

NAM COVERNOR OFFERS 30,000 JEWS WELCOME IN HIS TERRITORY; STUDY INITIATED

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.(JTA) -- The Freeland League for Jewish Territorial Coloniion today received from the Governor of Surinam (Dutch Guiana) an official commuation welcoming the settlement of 30,000 Jews in Surinam, and expressing satistion that the League has appointed a commission of experts to start a detailed, the-spot study.

"The coming of this commission," the Governor declared, "is in conformity with decisions of the Legislative Council of Surinam and of the Netherlands Governtto admit 30,000 Jews into Surinam for colonization. The task of this commission I be to prepare, in cooperation with the Surinam authorities, a plan covering all tails of the contemplated colonization. The conditions of the colonization will decided by all parties concerned, after the plan of the expert commission will be been laid before them."

The commission consists of A.M. Fisher of Honolulu, civil engineer who conructed a highway in Surinam during the war; Ray C. Roberts, soil correlator the U.S. Department of Agriculture; Dr. Atherton Lee, an expert in tropical agrillure, former head of the J.S. Agricultural Station in Puerto Rico; Dr. G. Gaglioli, tert on tropical medicine, residing in British Guiana; and Harry G. Clement, an enomist working with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations.
