#### M. SECURITY COUNCIL TO DISCUSS REPORT ON PALESTINE SECURITY NEXT TUESDAY

LAKE SUCCESS, Feb. 17. (JTA) -- The Security Council today decided to dete the Palestine Commission security report Tuesday, February 24. 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### I.H. COMMISSION BELIEVES SECURITY COUNCIL MAY DECIDE TO SEND FORCE TO PALESTINE

LAKE SUCCESS, Feb. 17. (JTA) -- Karel Lisicky, chairman of the U.N. Palestime Commission, today indicated at a press conference that the members of the Comsission believe that the Security Council will support their request for an adequate international armed force to back implementation of the U.N. partition decision.

Asked if the Commission will go to Palestine without an armed force, he amided a direct reply, but declared that the Commission "helieves in its work." In the event that the Security Council does not agree to provide armed support, the Commission will at that time determine what to do next, he stated.

Lisicky refused to comment on how an international force should be constiked. This, he said, was up to the Council to decide, in consultation with military merts. Frequently in the past, armed forces have been supplied quickly, he pointed but. "It is possible that this is the last time you are meeting the 'five lonely bilgrins. " he told the newsmen, adding that he wished to emphasize the word lmelv.

Asked if non-implementation meant danger to the partition scheme, Lisicky realied that it would imperil implementing the General Assembly plan but not partition. sevidently drew a distinction between the two concepts.

Questioned on the present status of interim immigration, he replied that the witish quota system was in operation by British will. He rebuffed suggestions as the difficulties and the shortness of time involved in setting up a police force wish all that was involved was "the will" to do it.

# Alteration of Timetable on Partition Decision Urged by Philippine Number

Sen; Francisco urged that if an international armed force is sent to Palestine, it should be composed of units assigned by the great powers, each unit forming only a component part of the force. He suggested that one power send only artillery mits, another provide the mechanized force, while a third would be responsible forting air force. In this way no power need fear that the contingent of another nation would possibly remain in Palestine after peace is restored, since each unit could not maintain itself without the others, Francisco's statement pointed out.

Christopher Mayhew, British Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs and United Kingdom representative at the U.N. Economic and Social Council, today revealed at a press conference a British proposal that the Council call on member states to notify the U.N. of steps they have taken to abscrib their share of European refugees. He refused to comment on a question seeking to define the relationship between Britain's desire to clear the refugees out of Europe and her equally strong desire to keep them out of Palestine.

# ARABS LOSE 57 MEN IN BATTLE IN EASTERN PALESTINE; SUFFER CREATEST SETBACK OF CONFLICT

JERUSALEM, Feb. 17. (JTA) -- The Haganah today announced that 57 Arabs were killed and 80 wounded in yesterday's battle at Tirat Zvi, on the eastern border of Palestine. The official British figures are 30 Arabs and one Jew killed, while the Arab Eigher Committee claimed that 78 Jews had died in the battle, which ended in the most severe setback yet suffered by the Arabs since the outbreak of hostilities.

A British police station in the town of Beisan, in the same vicinity as Tirst Zri, was the target of a 40-minute attack this morning, but no one was hurt. Later an armored car was fired upon in the same area, but again without any casualties. Both attacks are believed to be the work of Arabs.

Arab snipers wounded four British soldiers in Jerusalem today, while two krabs were killed and two Britons injured in an explosion which wrecked a building in the city. The Haganah reported today that its members had killed five Arabs and wunded eight others yesterday in mopping up a series of clashes recipitated by krabs in Haifa. For the second day in a row Arab Legionmaires encamped near the city fired on a Jevish bus and killed two persons and injured several others.

A Jew was shot dead in a Tel Aviv street today, allegedly by Britons in an armored police car. Last night the Stern Group sent a task force into the Arab village of Abu Kebir, on the Tel Aviv-Jaffa front, which killed a number of Arabs. The Stamists apparently withdrew from the village, a notorious base for raids on Tel Aviv and traffic to and from the Jewish city, without having lost any mem.

# ELI JEIS CHARLESPENDED SENTENCES AFTER PLEADING GUILLY IN THE SHIPMENT CASE

MEN YORK, Feb. 17. (JTA) -- Six Jews who pleaded guilty to charges that they attempted last month to ship 60,000 pounds of dynamite illegally to the Jewish resistance forces in Palestine from a Jersey City pier today received suspended entences. Judge Sylvastor J. Ryan, of Federal Court, said that although the men had committed a "rash and impulsive act," he did not regard them as criminals.

The suspended sentences were handed down after U.S. Attorney John F.X. . Modeley told the court that the six men had given full statements to his office, had no criminal records and that "there was a complete absence of commercialism or racketering."

#### MAND WILL NOT PERMIT JEWS TO EMIGRATE AFTER MARCH 31; EXCEPTION MADE FOR PALESTINE

WARSAW, Feb. 17. (JTA) -- Jewish leaders were informed here today by Polish subtorities that no Jew holding Polish citizenship will be permitted to emigrate from the country, except if he holds a visa to Palestine. Emigration to countries other them Palestine will be prohibited after March 31, the authorities declared.

In informing the Jewish leaders of the new policy of the government with nearl to Jewish emigration, the authorities emphasized that this policy is in no way inside at Jews, but is part and parcel of the decision taken by the government with nearl to emigration from the country in general.

The authorities explained that the government considers that the condition of the Jevish population in the country has become hormal and, therefore, there is makinger any need to encourage Jevas to Leave Poland and become wanderers or immates of refugee camps in other countries. No difficulties will be made for Jeva applying for engration passports prior to March 31, no matter what their destination is, it was indicated. Such passports will be valid for one year.

A report on the situation of the Jews in Warsaw was disseminated here today by the government information office. The report says that "gradually the Jewish gualation in Warsaw is being housed in reconstructed homes and the city is once sain becoming the center of Jewish life, especially of its cultural life."

There are about 6,000 Jews in Warsaw at present, the report estimates. Of these, about 2,500 are employed in various kind of office work and many are working a sartisans in cooperative shops. "Hundreds of private retail stores and small handicant shops are being established," the report adds.

The Polish Government recently assigned a building to the Jewish Committee in which the Jewish Cultural Center is now being organized," the report says. "Jewish youth voluntarily formed two labor brigades of 100 persons each who are participating in the reconstruction of the capital. The brigades chose the area of the former jests and have begun to clear the square in preparation for the construction of the proposed memorial to the heroes of the ghetto. Jewish youths from all parts of Poland till pass through these brigades. The youngsters are quartered in nearby army barness."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17. (JTA) -- The Supreme Court yesterday refused by a vote of five to three, to consider the cases of 14 Nati doctors found guilty by the European Washing Nar Crimes Tribural of inhuman medical experiments on prisoners and concentration camp victims. The 14 doctors appealed to the Supreme Court for a reversal of their convictions by the European court last Engages.

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#### nja. 1948 campaign for \$250,000,000 to be launched at national parley in Washington

NEW YORK, Feb. 17. (JTA) -- The 1948 campaign of the United Jewish Appeal for \$25,000,000 will be formally launched at a national conference of American Jewish comman leaders at the Shoreham Hotel in Weshington, D.C., on February 21 and 22. More than 5,000 Jewish communities from coast to coast will participate in the U.J.A. drive-the largest fund-raising effort ever undertaken by a voluntary welfare organization in the history of the United States,

Henry Morgenthau, Jr., former Secretary of the Treesury and general chairman of the U.J.A. campaign, vill preside at the two-day conference which will appraise ment world developments in relation to the 1948 needs of the Jews of Europe and Alestine as well as those homeless Jews able to find haven on American shores. The Makington conference will mark the opening of 3,500 local community drives. The remaining 1,500 Jewish communities conduct their U.J.A. drives during the fall.

In amouncing the national parley, Mr. Morgenthan called upon the Jews of herica to marshal "their spiritual and material resources for the supremely urgent tasks of the United Jewish Appeal." He added that "we face now one of the most critical moments in the history of the Jewish people in Europe and Palestine. What the Jews of America accomplish in 1948 through the United Jewish Appeal will have a totaire effect on the destiny of the Jewish people overywhere," he said.

HEW YORK, Feb. 17. (JTA) -- Declaring that "an indescribably serious situation exists in Palestine at this moment," former Governor Herbert H. Lehman tonight talk a metting at the Hotel Pierre here of United Jewish Appeal communal leaders from less County, that "it is our primary responsibility to provide the means of protection for the 700,000 Jews in Palestine.

"The Arabs have organized themselves to defy and frustrate the will and declaim of the United Nations," Gov. Lehman asserted. "The Jews want peace, but the faces that have meased themselves for a concerted attack on the United Nations, have plaged them into war-a war which the Jews are without the arms with which to defend themselves.

"If the Jews of Palestine cannot defend themselves, pending the creation of m stequate U.N. force, the inevitable result will be the utter destruction of a sarred decision of the United Nations. It has become painfully clear that the time calls for action—action on the part of the U.S. to implement its decision—positive action on the part of American Jews to give that decision meaning," Gov. Lehman said.
