IG POWERS PARLEY ON PALESTINE OPENS TODAY; U.S. WILL FAVOR CONCILIATION, SPOKESMAN SAYS

LAKE SUCCESS, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- The United States will press for a new effort solve the Palestine issue by conciliation between the Jews and the Arabs at the ig Powers talks which open tomorrow in the New York apartment of Soviet delegate mirei Gromyko, it was indicated here today by an American spokesmen who quoted the pinion of U.S. chief delegate Sen. Warren Austin. However, the spokesman pointed ut that the American delegation has not drafted any formal proposals on the coniliation question.

Earlier, another American spokesman indicated U.S. dissatisfaction with Friday's ote at the Security Council at which only part of the American resolution favoring ormation of a Big Five Committee and pressing for a new attempt at conciliation was dopted by the eleven-member body. The vote, he said, removed from the original U.S. esolution "its substantive proposals with the exception of the closing appeal."

Observers here point out that of the four nations meeting at tomorrow's parby-Britain refused to participate -- at least three openly favor another attempt at conciliation. The only nation which has not yet demanded such a course is the Soviet mion which, however, with the United States, took the lead in hammering out the artition decision at last year's General Assembly session.

WIET WEEK-EIN IN PALESTINE; JERUSALEM, TEL AVIV TELEPHONE, TELEGRAPH LINES CUP

JERUSALEM, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- Palestine had one of its quietest week-ends since ast November despite the fact that at least 11 Arabs and Jews died in a number of attacks in various parts of the country yesterday and today. Five Arabs died in Haifa then a morter shell exploded and one Arab and five Jews were killed when an Arab mob stormed a Jewish roadblock between Gaza and Beersheba after the circulation of a false rumor that the Jews had kidnapped 12 Arabs.

Telephone and telegraph lines between Jerusalen and Tel Aviv were cut late tmight. There were several clashes in Jerusalem and on the road leading to the adassah Hospital on Mt. Scopus and there was some activity on the Tel Aviv border. vo different convoys were attacked on the Jerusalem-Tal Aviv road today and one was forced to turn back by the intersity of the Arab attack.

In Jerusalem today the Jewish community council declared that Jews would not ay taxes to the municipal government until they were satisfied that the money would e used for Jewish projects while Daniel Auster, former Jewish mayor of the city, said that the Jews would take care of their section if separate municipal councils were formed and each body was permitted to spend its funds on improvements for its own cople. Meanwhile, Dr. Arraham Grenovsky, director of the J.M.F., told a press conference that committees had been established to preserve and expand Jevish industry, trade and housing in the city.

Plans for a 13-member provisional Jevish government of Palestine representing political parties have been completed here by the Jevish Agency and the Sational ovish Council, with the portfolios being allocated as follows: Repai, 1; (Faneral Monies, 3; United Labor Perty, 2; Mirrachi, 1; Poels Mirrachi, 1; Revisionists, 1; Miagoba, 1, the Revisionists have thus far refused to enter the covernment.

000 JEWISH FAMILIES LEAVE PAKISTAN; INDIA CUTLAWS RECKUITING MOSLEMS FOR PALESTINE

NEW DELHI, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- Approximately 1,000 Jevish families have begun excels from Pakistan to India, press reports from Bombay received here this weeknistes. The migration follows in the wake of a wave of anti-Jewish agitation in he new Moslem state which was sot off by the flighting in Palestine, the reports say.

A Moslem organization known as the "Thaksars," which has been recruiting colom youths in India to fight against the Jows in Palestine, has been outlawed by he government, it was announced here.

RITISH LABORITES SEEK "NO CONFIDENCE" VOTE AGAINST COVT. BILL ON PALESTINE MANDATE

LONDON, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- A vote of "no-confidence" will be sought against the overment by some members of the British Lebor Party when the bill to terminate the alestine Mandate has its second reading in the House of Commons next Wednesday, it as revealed this week-cni by Ian Mikardo, Laborite M.P., at the opening of the mual conference of the Poale Zion of Great Britain. He declared that the motion f "no confidence" will be made because the bill provides for termination of the andate without mentioning the successor states of the Mandatory and without probing for transfer of power to the U.N. Palestine Commission.

The conference adopted a resolution calling upon progressive forces throughout he world to uphold the U.N. decision against attempts of "reactionary Arab fascist eaders who seek to overthrow it by force." Other resolutions urged passage of legistion against anti-Semitism in Britain and welcomed preparations to form the first swish Government in Palestine.

urkish jews ask govt. To mediate palestime conflict; minister favors arab solution

ISTAIBUL, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- A proposal that Turkey become the mediator between the Arabs and the Jews in the alestine conflict was made here in the Jewish publication "La Boz de Turkiye" and supported by the Turkish newspajer "Istanbul." It was mpasized that it would be advantageous to Turkey if peace were restored in Palestne, which is Turkey's third largest customer.

At a press conference, Turkish Foreign Minister Necmettin Sadak said that the alestine problem is provoking as much enricty in Turkey as in other countries of he Middle Fast. Emphasizing that Turkey voted egainst pertition at the U.N. eneral Assembly, he added: "The matter becomes more and more complicated. Natural-J, we would wish that the issue be settled in accordance with the desire of the rabs,"

DRE ARRESTS EXPECTED FOLLOWING SETZURE OF PARIS ARMS CACHE DESTINED FOR PALESTINE

PARIS, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- Further arrests by the French police are expected interaction with the discovery yesterday of a large arms cache destined for shipment to the "Jevish underground" in Falestine. Ten persons have already been seized by the police as part of the group attempting to ship Sten guns, rifles, machineguns, and grerades and British made bullets. Large sums of money in British and French bulknotes were also found.

The aims were discovered in the garage of a rag merchant, Eugene Horn, in the La Chapelle district of Paris. The police said that they surprised the men loading the supplies for shipment to Marseille from where they were to be transshipped to Palestine. Among those arrested was Joseph Kohn, said to have been born in the Maited States.

O CHANGES CONTEMPLATED IN JEWISH OPGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE, CZECH MINISTER SAYS

FRACUE, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- No changes in the organization of Jewish communal institutions are contemplated by the new government, Vaclav Kopecky, Czechoslovak inister for Information and a leading member of the Czech Communist Party, told the swish Telegraphic Agency in an interview here this week-end. It is entirely an internal matter whether Actions Committees are formed within Jewish communal organizations, he added.

Asserting that recent events in the country can be interpreted as essentially a sfeat of those forces which contained anti-Semitic and fascist tandencies, Kopecky eclared that the new regime wishes to respect to the greatest extent the religious, livic and social rights of the Jews.

Asked whether any changes regarding the government's attitude toward the emintion of Czech Jews to Palestine are contemplated, the Minister ensuered in the custive. He stated that there is no reason to change the policy which has been in fact up to now.

Regarding the Palestine issue, Kopecky stressed that the attitude remains positive." Nobody in the government is thinking of changing this positive viewpoint, as stated, adding: "On the contrary, the new Czechoslovak Government will persevere ith increased stress in its efforts in behalf of a solution of the Palestine problem in the spirit of the United Nations decision."

TVE JENS NAMED AS CANDIDATES IN OFFICIAL ELECTION LIST OF RUMANIAN GOVERNMENT BLCC

BUCHAREST, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- Five Jewish candidates have been named to represent the Jewish population of Rumania as such in a list of candidates of the "Front of Topular Democracy" (government bloc), made public here today. These five are in adlition to a number of other Jewish candidates named by the various parties in the orthocoming election on March 28.

Two of the official Jewish candidates will run in Bucharest--Professor Maximiian Popper, president of the Federation of Jewish Communities and H. Leibovice, anther communal leader. The three largest Jewish communities outside of Bucharestlassy, Timisoara and Bacau--have nominated the following three Jewish leaders: B. Edmann, Marcel Fisler and Edward Manolescu. None of the five candidates is a Monist.

B.O. PROTESTS TO U.S. ARMY OVER RAID ON JEWISH DP CAMP; JEWS VOTE FOR CAMP OFFICIALS

MUNICH, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- International Refugee Organization headquarters in the terical zone of Germany has protested to the U.S. Army against an American troop raid to the Eschwege Camp last week during which a number of buildings were ransacked and 400 displaced Jews arrested.

The Army later announced that a "huge areenal" had been discovered in the camp. which officials point out that the eight rifles and several pistols discovered were all unserviceable--old and rusted.

OINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE ALLOCATES \$50,000 TO AID DISTRESSED JEWS IN ADEN

NEW YORK, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- The sum of \$50,400 was appropriated by the Joint pistribution Committee here this week-end to aid the distressed Jews in the British protectorate of Aden, scene of recent violent Arab pagrams.

The action of the J.D.C. followed an on-the-spot investigation by Harry Viteles, a member of the agency's Middle East Advisory Committee, of current conditions among local Aden Jevs and Yemenite Jevish refugees in the protectorate, located at the Southern tip of the Arabian peninsula.

At the same time, Moses A. Leavitt, J.B.C. executive vice-chairman, reported that Dr. Judah Magnes, chairman of the Middle East Advisory Committee has filed application with the Palestine Government for special non-quota visas for 950 Jewish orphans in Aden, sixty of whom were orphaned in the recent riots.

Viteles spent two weeks investigating conditions in Aden. His report indicated that Arab attacks, which began in conjunction with the general Arab strike in Palestins protesting the U.N. partition decision, resulted in the destruction of many jevish homes, buildings and other properties. He disclosed that of the 170 Jevish chops in Aden, 114 were partially or totally destroyed. Four synagogues and two schools were also looted and ruined, he added.

JEHISH FRATERNAL GROUPS IN NEW YORK TO LAUNCH LOCAL U.J.A. CAMPAIGN AFTER PASSOVER

NEW YORK, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- More than 6,000 fraternal and benevolent organizations affiliated with the Council of Organizations of the United Jewish Appeal of New York will open their 1948 campaign to raise their share of the national goal of \$250,000,000 after the Passover holidays, it was decided here today at a meeting of representatives of the organizations.

Speaking to more than 2,000 delegates, Bartley Crum, former member of the Anglo-American Palestine Inquiry Committee and chairman of the National Council of Americans for Haganah, declared that if the United Nations decision on the partition of Palesthe is negated, then "we will negate all hopes for world peace and security."

Goldie Meirson, head of the political department of the Jerusalem section of the Jevish Agency, told the parley that the Jews in Palestine are determined to defend "to the last man, woman and child" their right to a home and haven. "We want peace, as we have always wanted peace," Mrs. Meirson asserted. "If we have to fight for the right to live and the right to bring hundreds of thousands of Jews into the country--we will fight for it."

Discussing the relief and reconstruction activities of the Joint Distribution Committee overseas, Dr. Jonah B. Wise, co-chairman of the national T.J.A., told the meeting that there are two major areas of need which require American Joury's immediate assistance: the Jewish communities in the Moslem countries and Rumania.

RABBINICAL ASSEMBLY SPONSORS CONFERENCE ON JEWISH LAW IN NEW YORK THIS MONTH

NEW YORK, Mar. 7. (JTA) -- A conference on Jewish law, sponsored by the Rabbinical Assembly of America will open on March 30 at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York, it was announced today.

The purpose of the conference, according to Dr. Israel M. Goldman, president of the Assembly, is to draft a program for strengthening the observance of traditional Judalam in the United States.
